Hico City Council met in special called session Monday morning, and adopted an amendment to the recently passed City Ordinance on trash hauling.

The amendment was in the nature of penalty for non-payment of the \$2.00 monthly fee for the trash pickup, which will be added to water bills for the first time in September.

Councilman W. C. Howard moved, and Alvin Casey seconded that the penalty clause be added to the ordinance, and the motion passed.

Penalty for non-payment of the \$2.00 assessment will be discontinuation of water service, with a fee of \$2.00 charged to restore service.

Mayor Pro Tem Wayne Rutledge presided at the short session in the absence of Mayor O. L. Davis.

A World War II ration book issued to Ella Leeth of Hico led to the suspect's arrest, according to Constable Buck Shepherd. Shepherd said that Don Lavender of the Fort Worth Sheriff's Dept., called him Saturday about the ration book, and after investigation here, he found that a number of the books were in an old safe in the back of the local department store. The newest addition to Salmon-Ross was formerly the N. A. Leeth building.

The suspect was being investigated in Fort Worth on a complaint from relatives when the book was found, and Lavender, knowing about the Hico burglary, called Shepherd.

Shepherd said Wednesday that another suspect was under surveillance at this time. Around \$7,000 in merchandise was taken in the local burglary.

Lunchroom Policy.

on the HICO

Have you dusted off your stadium and gone shopping for a new outfit? You may have forgotten during the hot months, but Hico Tigers haven't. Coach arranged to keep the weight open all summer. Many of the boys have worked out before after hay hauling, truck driven loading, and other such building occupations. A sum-mer job in the sun is good prepara-tion for August football.

The teachers are already hard at work. The faculty has in-service all this week. The Tiger team sniping and found good-bulletin boards and attrac-tive classrooms prepared for the day of school on Monday.

Important is our school to last week we were in Kotze-bue, Alaska, an Eskimo village of people who live north of the Arctic Circle. They are so eager to see visitors their new high school. A small "pre-fab" building built to this remote and tree-land by ship is staffed by teachers under 2-year contracts with the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

In 1968, if a student went beyond high grade he had to go to a boarding school many miles from home.

Some we spent an evening with the King Island Eskimos who

showed us their dances and hand-craft. Why, several years ago, did their entire village leave King Is-land, their home, and the source of their economy—perfectly situat-ed for seal and walrus hunting? They will tell you they moved to Nome for one reason—so their chil-dren could attend school there.

Yes Bay, Alaska, has about 20 residents in the summer—vacation-ers who come to fish; but during the long winter, there are only five permanent residents—Roger and Susan and their three delight-ful and very bright pre-schoolers. Summer is busy at the island lodge, but winter on an iced-in bay leaves time for reading. The bookshelves are full of very fine children's books, and the good collection of adult books includes several cur-rent works on education. We ask-ed Roger how the children would go to school, the nearest one being three hours away by boat or 30 minutes away by float plane. He and Susan plan to hire a teacher to live with them and tutor their three children.

Ketchikan, a smaller town than Stephenville, is located on an island in southeastern Alaska. Building costs, due to the town's remote location, are astronomical. Near their community college, the citi-zens have built two new schools, including an indoor olympic-sized swimming pool, a large gymnasium,

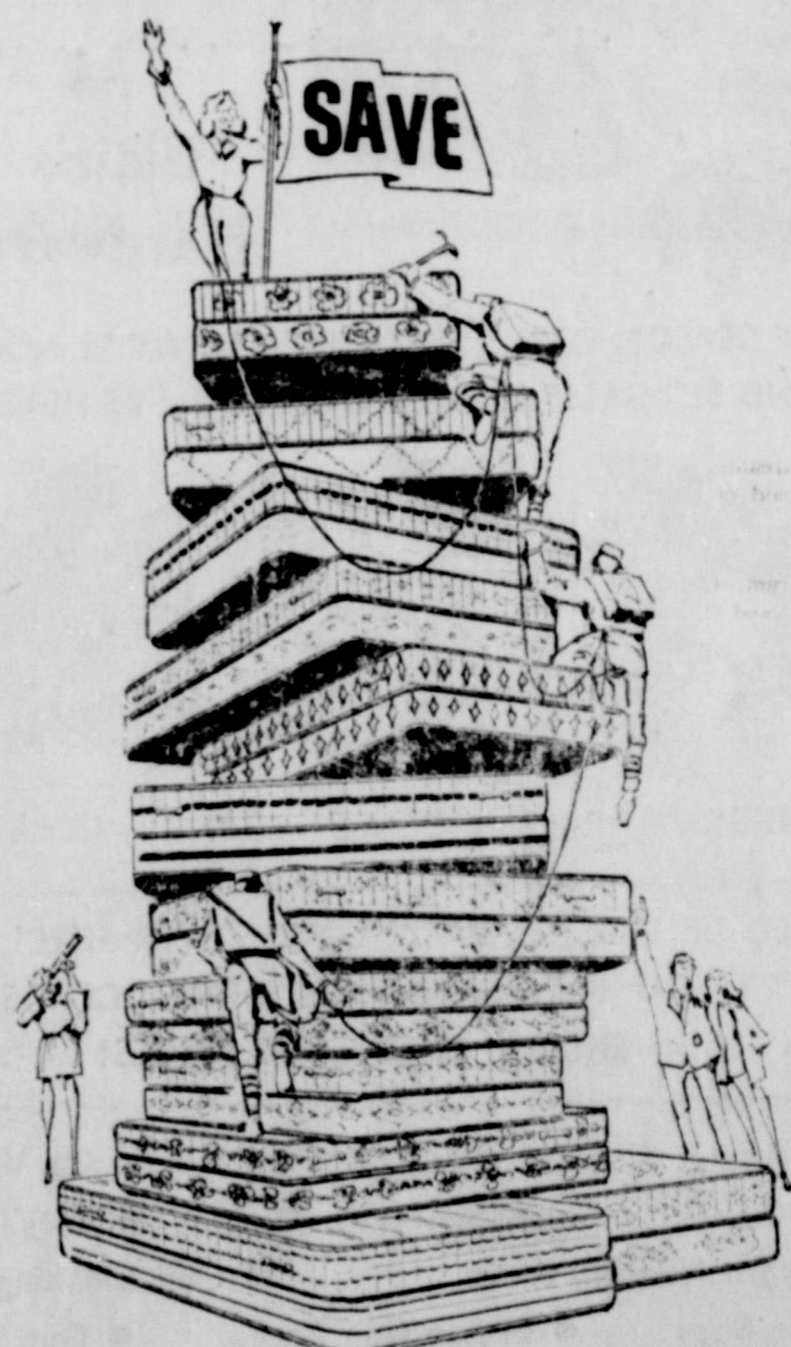

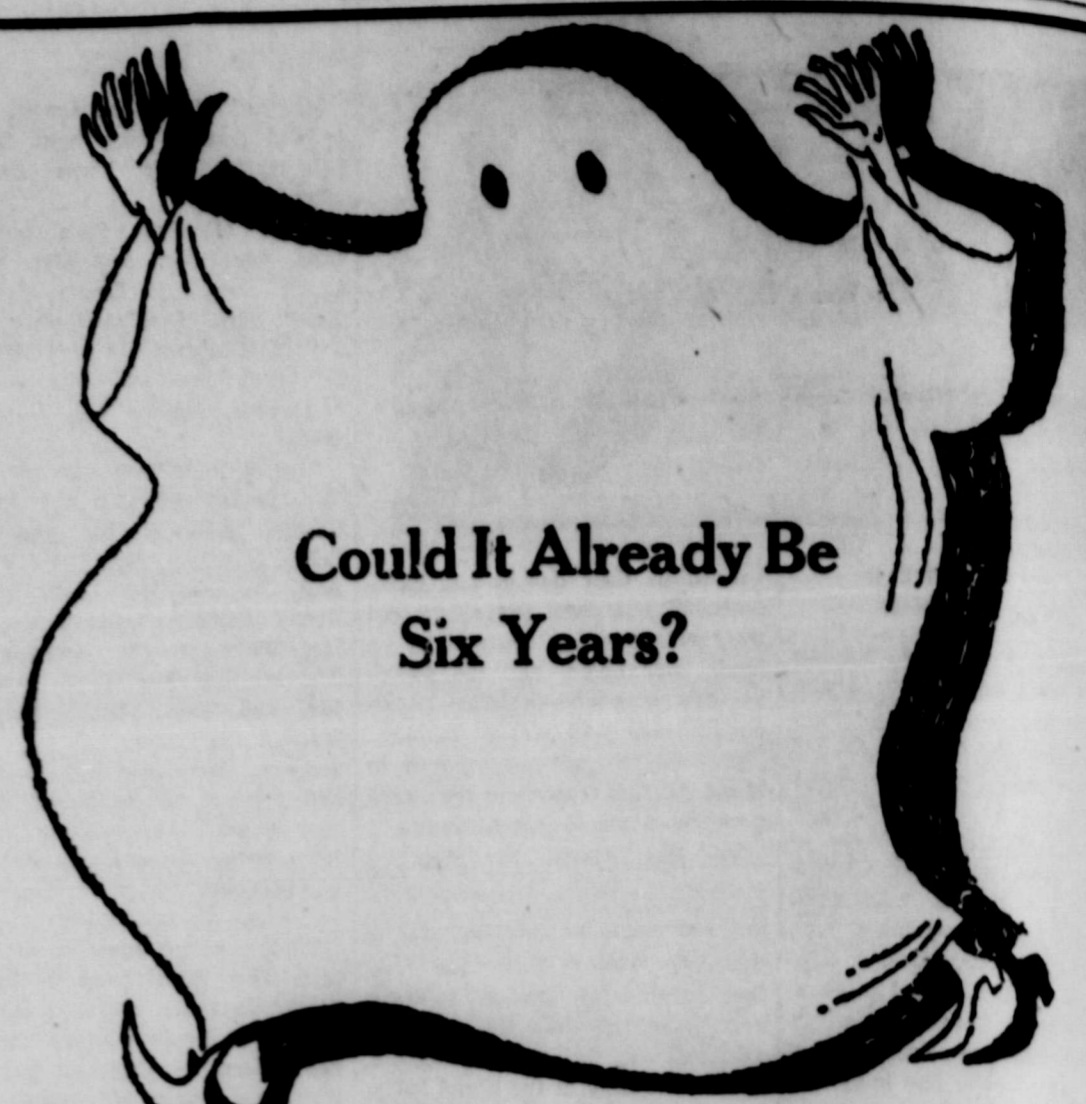
