



Hamilton County homeowners and forage producers should be on the lookout for the second generation of army worms in lawns and pastures. It is estimated that second generation worms should occur somewhere between Aug. 22-25. So it is important that producers check closely for these pests.

Usually these pests are most active in late summer and fall, but favorable temperatures and moisure conditions have brought on their early arrival.


