Roy C. Deaver, Director, Brown Preacher Training School in Hico, will be the speaker in a special series at the Hico Church of Christ October 7 through 10. He is currently at Freed-Hardeman Col-

lege, Abilene Christian College and National Christian University. The speaker has been awarded the A. A., B.A., LL.D. and Ph.D. degrees. He was the founding president of Fort Worth Christian College, now a part of Abilene Christian College. He currently serves as an Elder for the Brown Trail Church of Christ in Hurst.

Dr. Deaver is a noted lecturer, writer and educator. He has, in years past, participated in several religious debates, and has conducted meetings in more than 30 states. Members of the Hico church are pleased to introduce this proclaimer of the gospel to the community, and to invite Hicoans to hear him speak.

Bulldogs, Tigers to Tee It Up Friday

The Hamilton Bulldogs, enjoying one of their most successful seasons in recent years, hit town Friday night for an encounter with Hico's not-so-successful Tigers.

The Bulldogs, with 20 seniors aboard this year, are 2-1 in three outings, squeaking by De Leon in the season opener, blasting Goldthwaite, and dropping a 20-0 decision to always-powerful Clifton. Hamilton had an open date last week.

On the other side of the ledger, Hico has won but once in four out-

ings, downing Grandview, and losing to Early, Whitney and De Leon.

The Bulldogs are led by Richard Wulf at quarterback, and depend on the running of two fine backs, Paul Addison and Ken Eddleman. Mike Harris, Ken Miller and Larry Doty are top linemen for Hamilton.

The two teams have met only once in recent years, with the strong Tiger eleven of last year bringing home a 20-6 win.

The Bulldogs are favored in every quarter to down the Tigers in the 8 p.m. contest and up their record to 3-1.

Routine Session Held By Council

New paving and seal-coating of city streets took a greater portion of time at the Monday City Council meeting, and Mayor O. L. Davis said that the contractor had material on the site and work would start this week.

Expected to be completed in the program is the street and new

bridge leading to the west part of town, two alleys in downtown, and new streets recently cut in the Jaggars Addition. Also, Mayor Davis said that if funds hold out, the streets in City Park would be paved.

Other discussions during the two-hour session centered around the tax structure of Warner Cable TV, and that company's renditions for back years; telephone company connect charges; and the possibility of securing additional housing units.

On the latter matter, Davis said he would be in contact with the architectural firm that handled the last program here, and see if it would be possible to secure additional units at this time.

The Mayor also informed Councilmen that the last Revenue Sharing Check was being withheld, pending completion of an additional report form.

And as a last order of business, the Council appointed E. V. Meador to fill a vacancy on the City Hospital Board. The vacancy occurred last month when D. E. Bulloch resigned.

Bearcats Take Shakey 7-6 Win From Tigers Last Week

A hungry band of De Leon Bearcats blew into town last Friday night and found waiting for them an equally hungry group of Hico Tigers, and when the firing was over two hours and 50 minutes later, De Leon had escaped with a narrow 7-6 victory.

Defense was the name of the game, with neither team able to generate much offense. The officials stepped off more yardage than Hico or De Leon made, thus the length of the contest.

Flag-throwing was so predominant that 212 yards were stepped off against the two teams. Hico collected 100 yards, and De Leon 112. Even the fans were penalized as one official threw a flag on the De Leon spectators for an over-enthusiastic shout against the checkered shirt gang.

For the most part of three quarters, the two teams slugged it out between the 30-yard markers, with De Leon making the only serious threat in the initial quarter. A bad center snap on a punt gave the ball to the visitors at the Tiger 25, but the end result was an off-market field goal attempt.

The Tigers made the only serious threat in the second quarter, moving to the Bearcat 23 before running out of downs. Hico controlled the ball most of the second quarter but was never able to dent the end zone.

The Tigers kept the visitors in a deep hole most of the third quarter, with only one threat being made until late in the third period. De Leon recovered a fumbled punt at the Tiger 49, moved to the 22, but ran out of downs at that point.

A Tiger fumble set up the De Leon TD late in the period. Gaining possession at the 29, the Bearcats used up the remainder of the clock, and Craig Smith scored on a one-yard plunge on the first play in the final quarter. Smith's kick was also true, and the Bearcats owned a 7-0 lead.

Hico started its lone TD drive from the Bearcat 41, and the big play was a pass from tailback Buddy Mayfield to end Ervin Haynes, good for 25 yards and six points. The Tigers elected to go for the win, a two-point conversion pass fell incomplete, and that was the ball game.

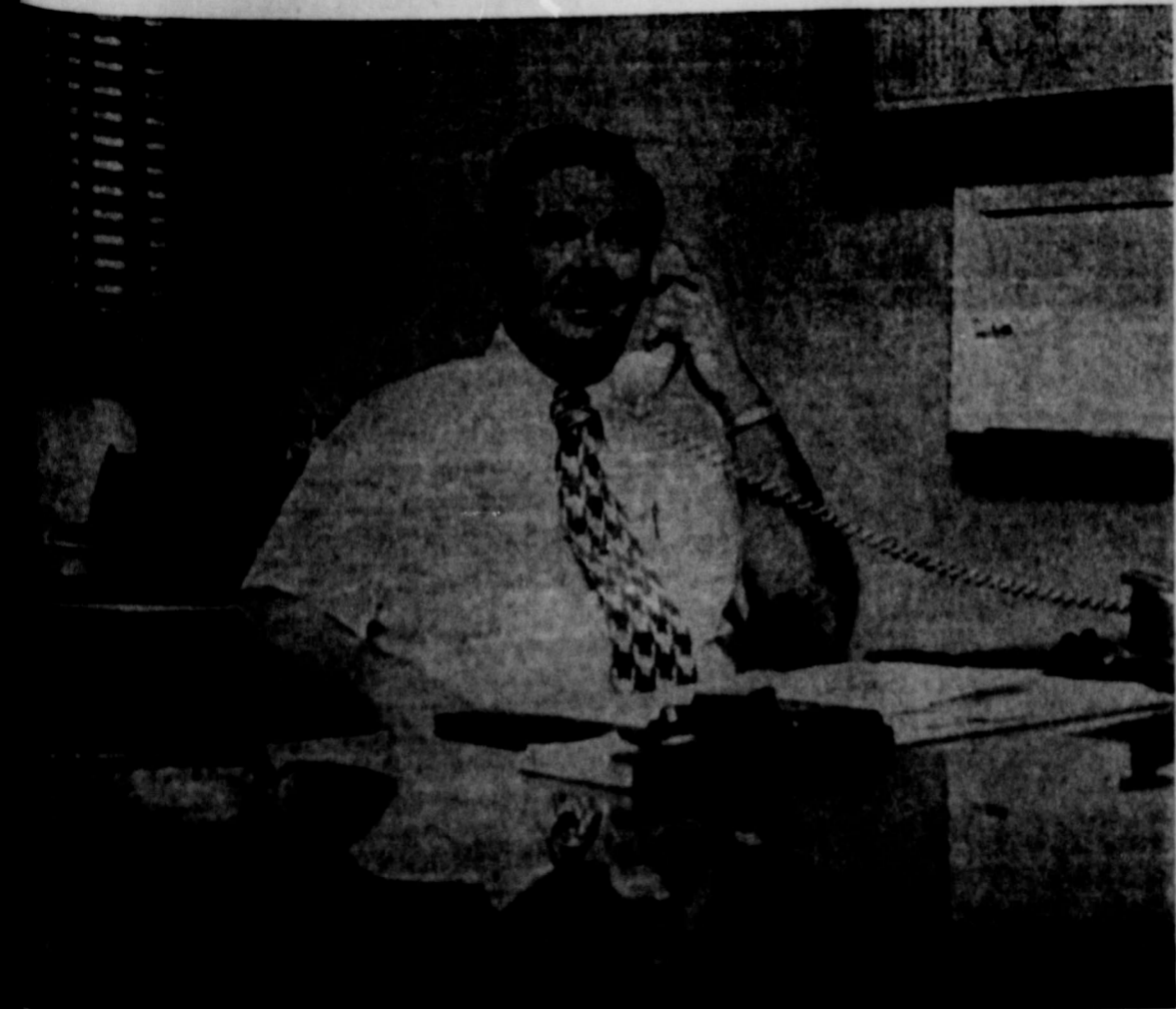
Fern Gene Jordan Promoted With Continental Oil Co.
