H.E.C.E. Program at Hico High School Has 23 Students

(Ed Note: Following is the first of a series on HECE students at Hico High School. One student will be featured each week during the coming months.)

Home Economics Cooperative Education is a fairly new program in Hico High, this being the second year. This year there are 23 students enrolled in the class and working in the community. To help the public know a little more about the program and the students participating in it, an introduction of each student will be made each week.

Tony Mayfield is in the second year of the program. He worked last year for Mayfield's Station and this year for B. F. Thomas Enterprises at Exxon Station. He will earn his 15 hours, Tony works week nights and weekends.

Tony is involved in football, H.E.R.O. Club, in which he serves as reporter, and member of the senior class.

Tony hopes to enroll in the auto mechanics course at Texas State Technical Institute in Waco upon graduation from high school.

Two Classrooms To Be Constructed; Bid Opening Nov. 6

The Hico School Board, in its regular meeting Monday, accepted the plans and specifications submitted by Maples and Jones, Architects and Engineers, for a classroom addition for the Elementary School.

At the same time, the Trustees authorized the advertising for bids on the structure. Bids are to be opened November 6th, and school officials are hopeful that construction can begin soon after that date.

The base bid is for two classrooms, two restrooms, and storage area. It also includes covered walkways to the bus loading area, and alternates for air conditioning the two classrooms.

The addition, which will face to the south, will be of brick construction, and will be 38-61 feet overall. The dimensions does not include the covered walkways. It will be separate from the existing elementary building, being connected by an eight-foot walkway. Another walkway will extend the length of the building to the bus loading area.

Rather than vote a bond issue for the addition, the Board has made arrangements to borrow the needed funds, and will amortize the indebtedness out of local funds. No cost estimate was given by school officials.

Other business at the Monday meeting included discussion of curriculum and a possible adult course in Conversational Spanish. The Board established policy in receiving transfer students from non-accredited schools, and for student participation in extra curricular activities.

Routine business and approval of bills was also included in the meeting agenda.

Fish Delivery Set Friday at Brownwood

Channel catfish and redear sunfish fingerlings will be delivered to Hamilton County farmers and ranchers Friday, Oct. 19.

The U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service Fish Distribution Unit from Inks Dam Hatchery will arrive at the Brownwood Coliseum in Brownwood at 10:00 a.m. People from Hamilton County who want their fish will have to meet the truck there.

Everyone who has fish to pick up will receive notification from the National Fish Hatchery. A large container of water will be necessary to transport the fish from Brownwood.

Approximately 63,370 channel catfish and 17,500 redear will be distributed to 88 farmers and ranchers for stocking 146 ponds in Hamilton County.

Fish are distributed twice each year, channel catfish and sunfish are delivered in the fall, and black bass in the spring.

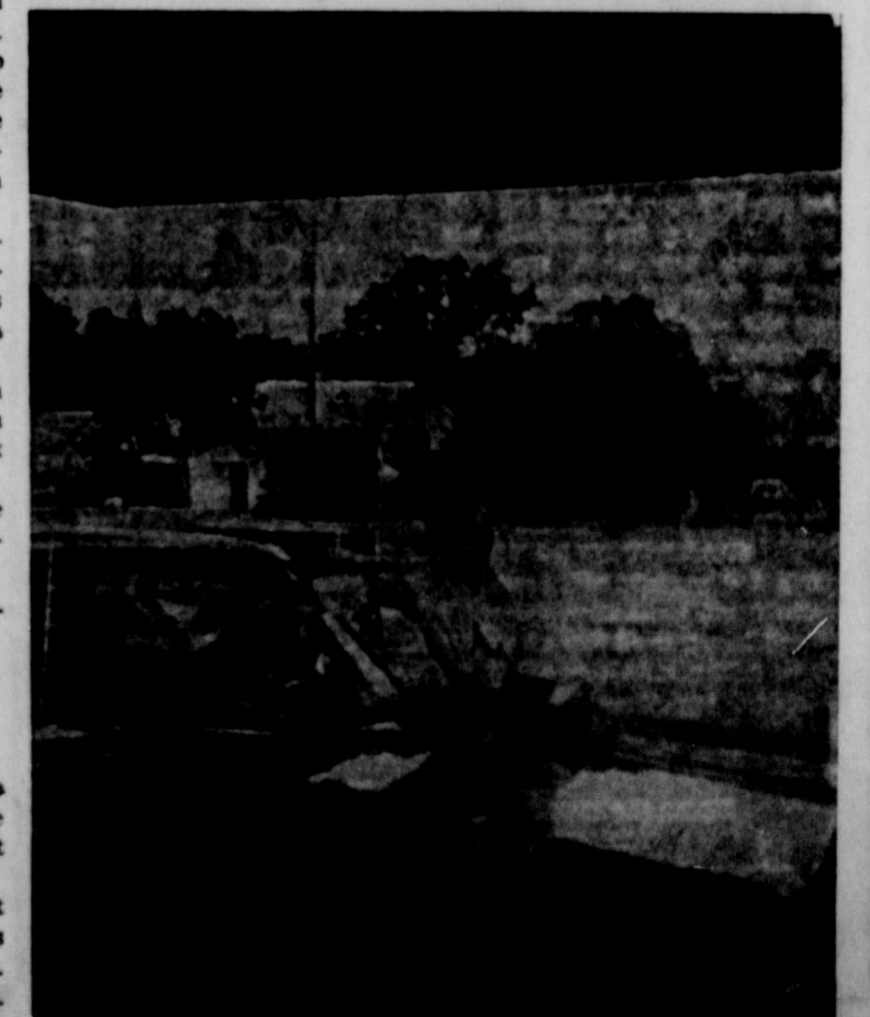
Prior to this year, the fish have been distributed in Hico and Hamilton.

'HISTORY OF HICO' IS PROGRAM TOPIC BY JIMMIE RAMAGE FOR GARDEN CLUB

The Hico Garden Club met Friday, Oct. 12 at 2 p.m. in the Community Center with Mrs. John Goightly presiding.

Following the invocation by Mrs. C. H. King, Mrs. Goightly welcomed members and guests. Members answered roll call by naming a tree that changes its colors in the fall.

After a short business meeting, Jimmie L. Ramage, Hico High School Principal, gave a most interesting and informative program on "History of Hico."

The original town was founded before the Civil War, in 1856. It was located on Honey Creek, later in Hamilton County. This county was not formed until 1858, and was named after Gen. James Hamilton, Gov. of South Carolina, who promoted the cause of Texas Independence.

Among the early settlers were John Anderson, John C. Barbee, Isaac Steen, N. A. Fuller, Isaac and Thomas Malone, and James R. and Henry Miller.

In 1860 J. R. Alford arrived from Kentucky bringing a small stock of dry goods. This same year the people petitioned for a post office. The petition was granted in 1861, and Mr. Alford was made postmaster and given the honor of naming the town. He called it Hico in memory of his hometown in Kentucky.

In 1870 there were two stores, one owned by Ike Malone, the other by Haggood and Day; also a saloon and a crude hotel.

By 1874 the population supported eight stores. There was also a school that served as a church. J. C. Hutchinson operated a gin powered by horses. The only licensed physicians in the area were Dr. N. A. J. Snellings and Dr. Alford.

Supplies were brought in by wagons. Ike Malone was one of the more prominent freighters. He made regular trips to Waco, Comanche and Brownwood. The rifle he carried is still in possession of the Malone family in Hico.

On one occasion a group of men attacked Mr. Malone and robbed his house. The robbers were caught near Waco and returned to Hico where they were locked up in a log shed on the Charley Oxley place. That night a mob stormed the shed and shot the robbers. The bodies were buried in the cemetery located in a pasture on the R. B. Segrest farm (now owned by Kal Segrest).

In 1878 John Barbee built a corn mill and cotton gin on Honey Creek. This was the old stone mill which stood for many years after the town was moved.

The Texas Central Railroad was built through the county in 1880 about two miles from Hico. Officials proposed that the people move the town over to the railroad. This proposition was accepted and the town moved en masse to its present site. Within a year the town had a population of over 500. In 1883 the town was incorporated, and as the years went by prospered despite two disastrous fires in the fall of 1890. The first destroyed the entire east side of Pecan St. A few weeks later the west side was destroyed.

The town rebuilt, businesses expanded and by 1892 the population was over 1000.

In Hico's hey-day, between 1908-1920 it was a thriving town with numerous businesses.

Today Hico does not have so many businesses, yet it is an up and coming town with very civic-minded people who are proud of its modern stores, bank, newspaper, hospital, motel, fine churches and schools. The growth of Hico can be credited to its excellent educational system down through the years. Such names as Prof. Ben Randals, Supts. W. E. Edelen, C. C. Conner, C. G. Masterson, J. E. Lincoln, and O. C. Cook have contributed in-estimable qualities that

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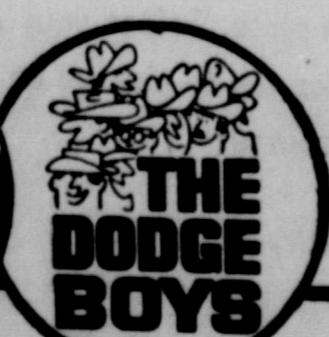

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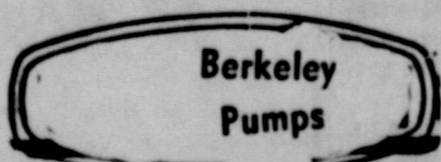
