## Antlerless Permits to Be Issued

Parks and Wildlife Department biologists across the state have completed their recommendations for antlerless deer harvest, and Hamilton County falls in the same category as last year, a limit of two deer, either sex.

Special antlerless deer tags will be issued based on over-population, carrying capacity of the land, and in ratio to the population of land having surplus deer.

The special permits will be issued in Hamilton County on Nov. 7-8 at the Courthouse.

Bosque County landowners may receive tags on Nov. 5-6 and tags will be issued in Erath County November 14-15.

## Night Hunters

Hamilton County Game Management Officer Royis Tucker issued an appeal this week to landowners and sportsmen to give him all assistance possible in controlling night hunting in the area.

Tucker said that the poaching was perhaps worse right now than at any time since he has been stationed in the county.

He asked landowners, sportsmen, and others to notify him or other law enforcement officials if they detect wrong-doing on the country roads.

Not only has property been damaged by the night hunters, but numerous cases where livestock were shot have been reported.
