## Six Amendments Approved Here, Three Fail to Carry

Hico voters, 117 strong, approved six of the Constitutional Amendments in the Tuesday election, while turning thumbs down on three.

Most unpopular of the nine issues was proposition No. 1, the amendment authorizing annual sessions of the Legislature, and raising member's salary to \$15,000 per annum.

Along with proposition No. 1, Nos. 6 and 8 were defeated.

Hico and Glen Rose, two teams that shared the district championship last year, were relegated to the lower division last Friday night as they grunted and groaned to a 0-0 tie. The game left Glen Rose with an 0-2-1 record, while the Tigers went 1-1-1. China Spring and Dublin continued on their way to a collision that will determine the district championship, each with perfect 3-0 records. They meet this Friday night, and the winner will be in as far as the championship and play-off representative is concerned.

In the game last week, it ap-

peared that either team might break it open any moment, but neither was able to do so.

The visiting Tigers made the first overture, using over half of the first quarter to work to the locals' 22 but that effort went for naught. Hico had possession only nine times in the first quarter.

In the second period, the teams also came out about even, Glen Rose intercepted a Hico pass and worked to the 24 before Tony Mayfield returned the compliment and intercepted. Three plays later and Hico was forced to punt.

With 1:05 left in the half, the local Tigers gobbled up a Glen Rose fumble at the 36. A completed pass to the 30 with 40 seconds left found Hico with a chance to get on the scoreboard, but two consecutive losses ended the half.

Hico made overtures starting the second half, taking the kickoff and moving from their own 29 to the Glen Rose 11 before a series of losses and penalties returned the ball to Glen Rose at the 30.

Glen Rose couldn't find the solution on their next series, and punted Hico into a deep hole at the four yard line.

Moving out to the nine, Hico punted and Glen Rose had excellent field position at the local's 37. One running play put the ball at the 30 as the third quarter ended. The series ended for the visitors with a missed field goal from the 11.

And as far as the game was concerned, that was it. Both teams had three more possessions in the final quarter, but never threatened.

## Sgt. Crews Takes Part In Training Exercises By NATO Allied Forces

Melton, England (Spl.)—U. S. Air Force Staff Sergeant James P. Crews, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Carr of Clairette participated in an annual field training exercise conducted recently in northern Greece and northwest Turkey by NATO's Allied Forces, Southern Europe.

Sgt. Crews, a pneudraulic repairman with the 81st Field Maintenance Squadron at Bentwaters RAF Station, England, and other U.S. Air Force, Army, Navy and Marine Corps personnel joined forces with units from Italy, Greece, Turkey, and the United Kingdom for "Deep Furrow 73." The exercise tested allied capability in the eastern Mediterranean, the southern flank of NATO.

Highlights of the operation, which involved more than 50,000 soldiers, sailors and airmen, included an amphibious landing and an airborne assault operation. Active Air Force, Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard personnel provided tactical airlift, fighter and reconnaissance support for the assault and subsequent land operations.

Concluding the meeting, P-TA members and guests were invited to open house at the Ag Building and Homemaking Cottage, where refreshments were served.

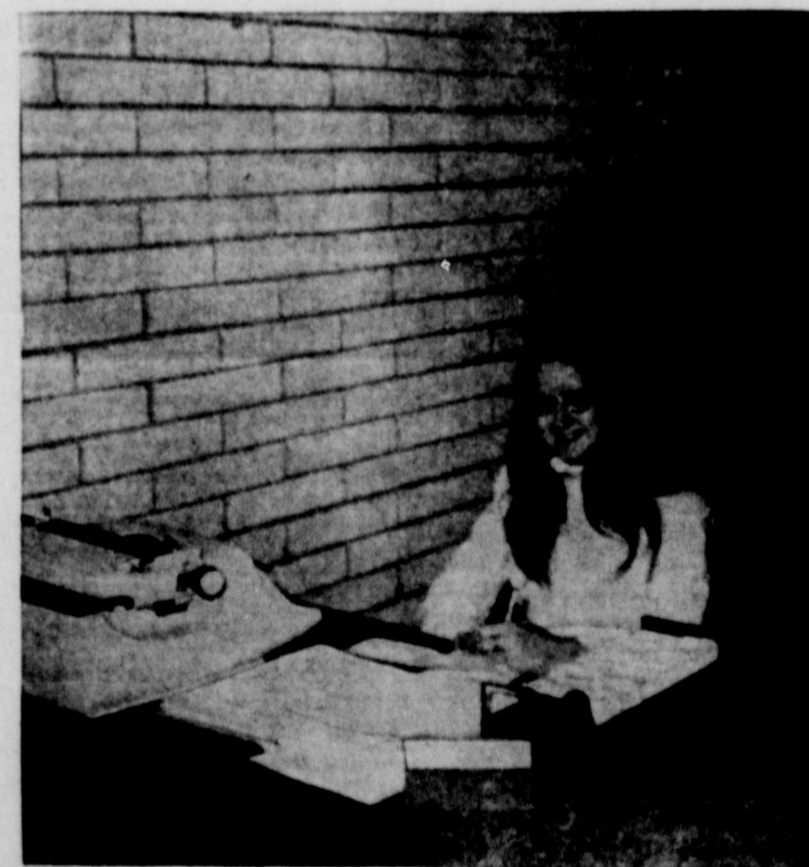
## Major Fred Wilson Completes Staff Officer Course

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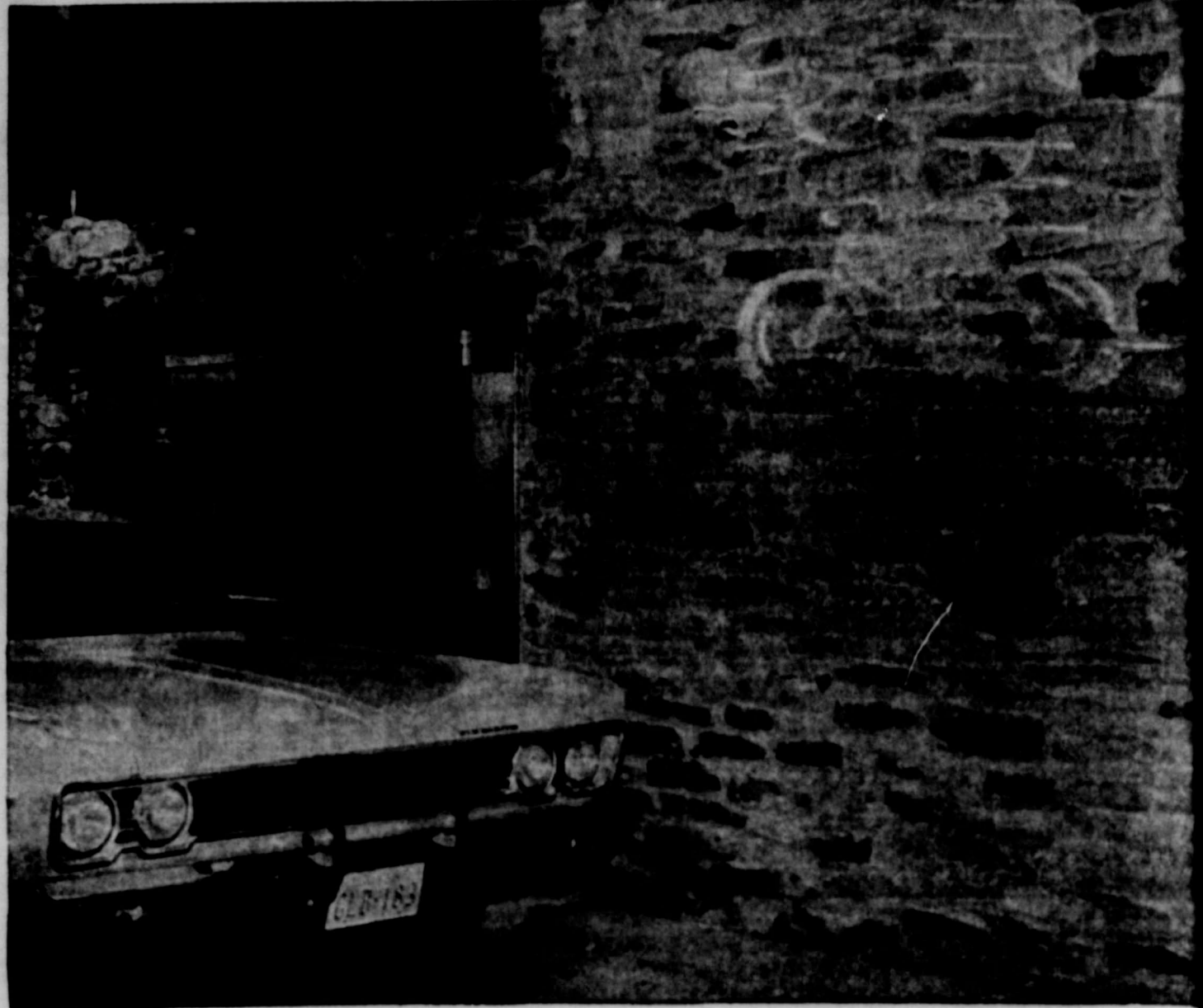

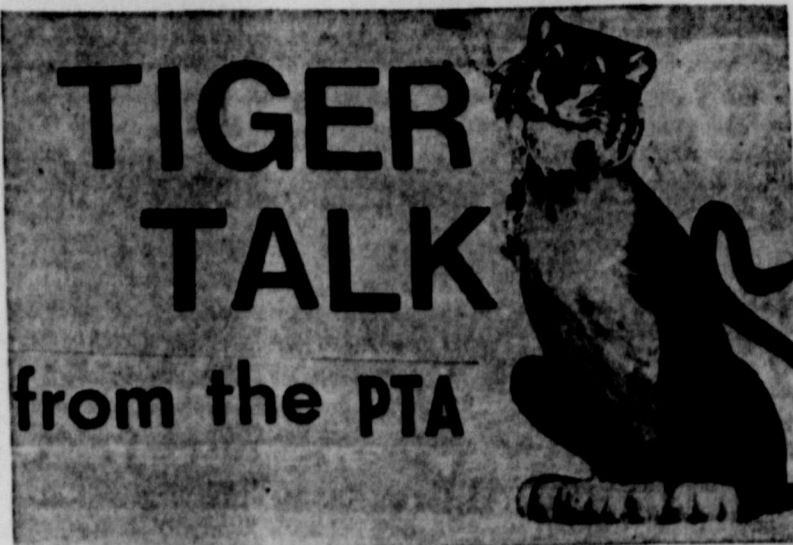

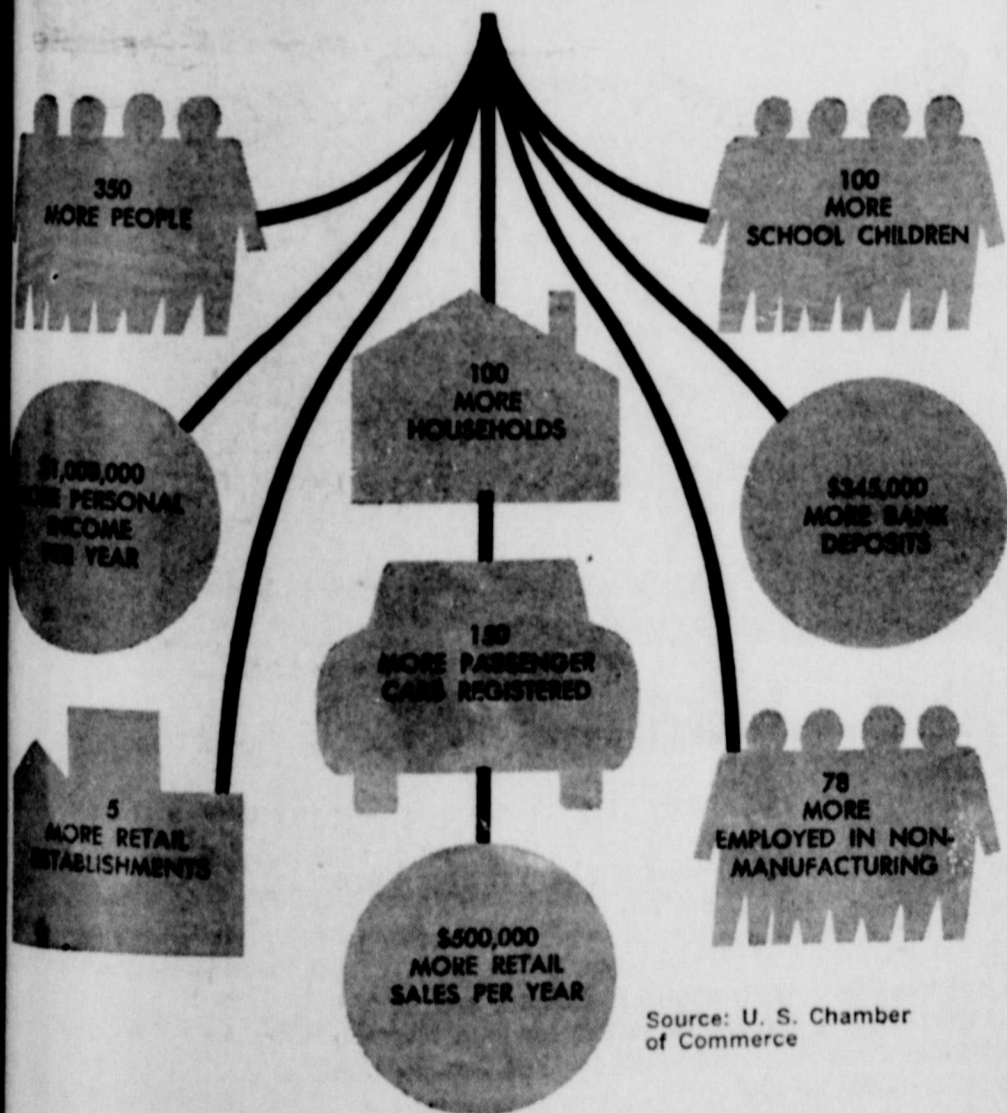
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## Fairy Community News

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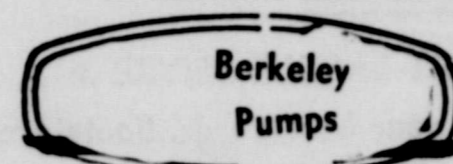
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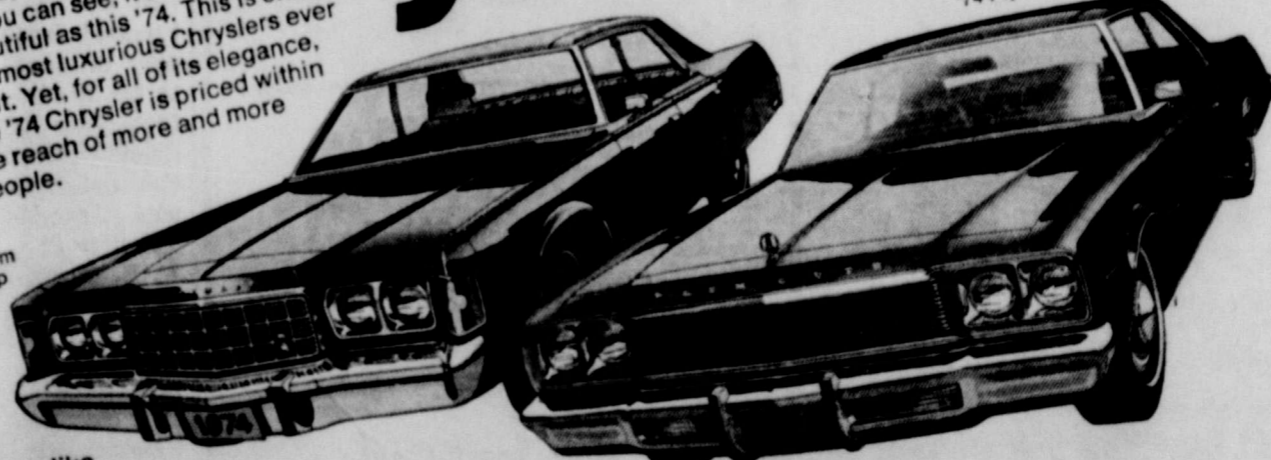

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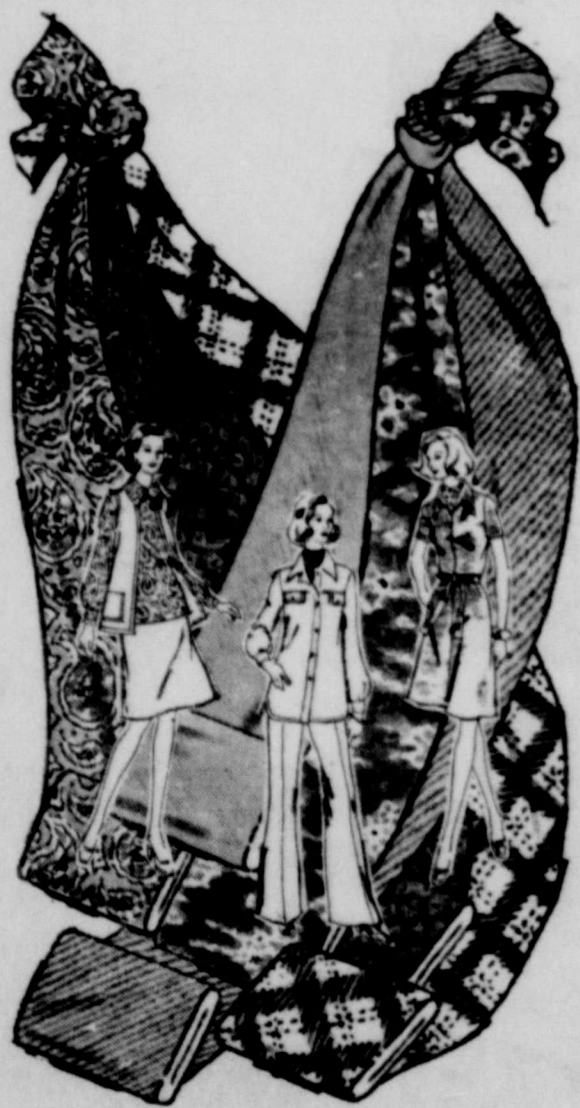
