Writer attended the funeral... McKandless, as we had... him most of his life and... attended Fairy School... the funeral we went to our... on the south side of... al chapel. We were finish... after we wanted to mail be-

fore leaving Hamilton. We saw a dear old lady sitting on her front porch. We had noticed her many times before sitting in her little garden in a lawn chair pulling weeds or gathering vegetables. We decided to go and sit with her. These dear old people who live alone get very lonely sometimes and appreciate having someone to talk to. She told me her name was Mrs. Wilkerson. I at first didn't place her. She told me she had lived many years out on the Hamilton and Pottsville road. After the death of her husband she was across the road at her barn when she fell out of the barn breaking a hip and thigh. She crawled across the road to her home and called her son-in-law who happened to be Bob Riley. After her partial recovery she returned to her home, but later moved to her home across the street from the funeral home. She was so happy to be so near her daughter, Mrs. Riley, who came up just as I was leaving. I had never seen her to know her. This dear old lady is still using crutches due to her injury. When she told me her name I still didn't think I knew her but when I told her I lived at Fairy this opened up the way. She said her father once owned the twin mountains south of Fairy. Then I inquired his name and she said Wilson. I asked her if she was a relative of the late Mrs. Altie (Hub) Wolfe. She smiled and said she was her sister. Then it all came to me. I'd known the Wilsons since moving to Fairy 69 years ago. We attended church together. The widowed mother was living then and one brother, Charlie and Miss Altie at the place Scott Blakley now owns.

Miss Altie had a cousin by the name of Alta Underwood. Each had a horse and side saddle. Miss Underwood and Altie would ride their horses together. The mother of Mrs. Wolfe and Mrs. Wilkerson was born in 1840 and passed away in 1920 and is buried here. The mother, Amanda, had a sad life while living here. Her husband,

William, started out in 1891 for Sonora looking for ranch property and to buy mules. He had bought and sold some mules near Sonora, and after several days in that area he met a man by the name of Jim Adams who had observed that Wilson was carrying a large sum of money. He told Mr. Wilson he would like to go with him to the next town. The two left Sonora Sept. 17, 1891 and camped that night near San Angelo. That night Adams killed Mr. Wilson by a blow on the head. He first drug his body to a ravine but decided that was not a safe place to dispose of the body and drug it back to his wagon and drove to an isolated place and piled leaves and brush on the body, poured kerosene on it and set it afire. Adams also set the bedding on fire and it was discovered by a farm woman out searching for her calf. Upon unrolling the bedding she noticed it was soaked with blood. She also found a pair of Mr. Wilson's trousers and in a pocket was a letter addressed to Dr. S. W. Young at Fairy. The woman took the letter to authorities at Sonora, who in turn sent a telegram to Dr. Young. Mr. Wilson's son and brother-in-law, Ben F. Underwood immediately started by wagon for Sonora. Upon arrival a search was begun for the body which was discovered by a Mexican sheep herder. Adams sold Mr. Wilson's rifle to a Mexican saloon keeper. He was apprehended at a farm home later trying to sell Mr. Wilson's team, wagon and saddle. He was arrested, placed in jail to await trial. He was sentenced to 99 years in the penitentiary and was later pardoned by Gov. Colquitt. The bad part was Mr. Wilson was killed for only \$10.00 as he had deposited the money. Mr. Wilson was a freighter, hauling throughout this section. He was the grandfather of Mrs. Eva Edwards of Clifton, Mrs. Clancy Blue of Hamilton, Wendell Wolfe of Fort Worth and the late Woodroe Wolfe of Hico and Mrs. Dalton Driver of Grand Prairie. The above writeup was taken from the Parade Progress of Hamilton County, 1838 to 1958. We feel it will be of interest to many who haven't read the story.

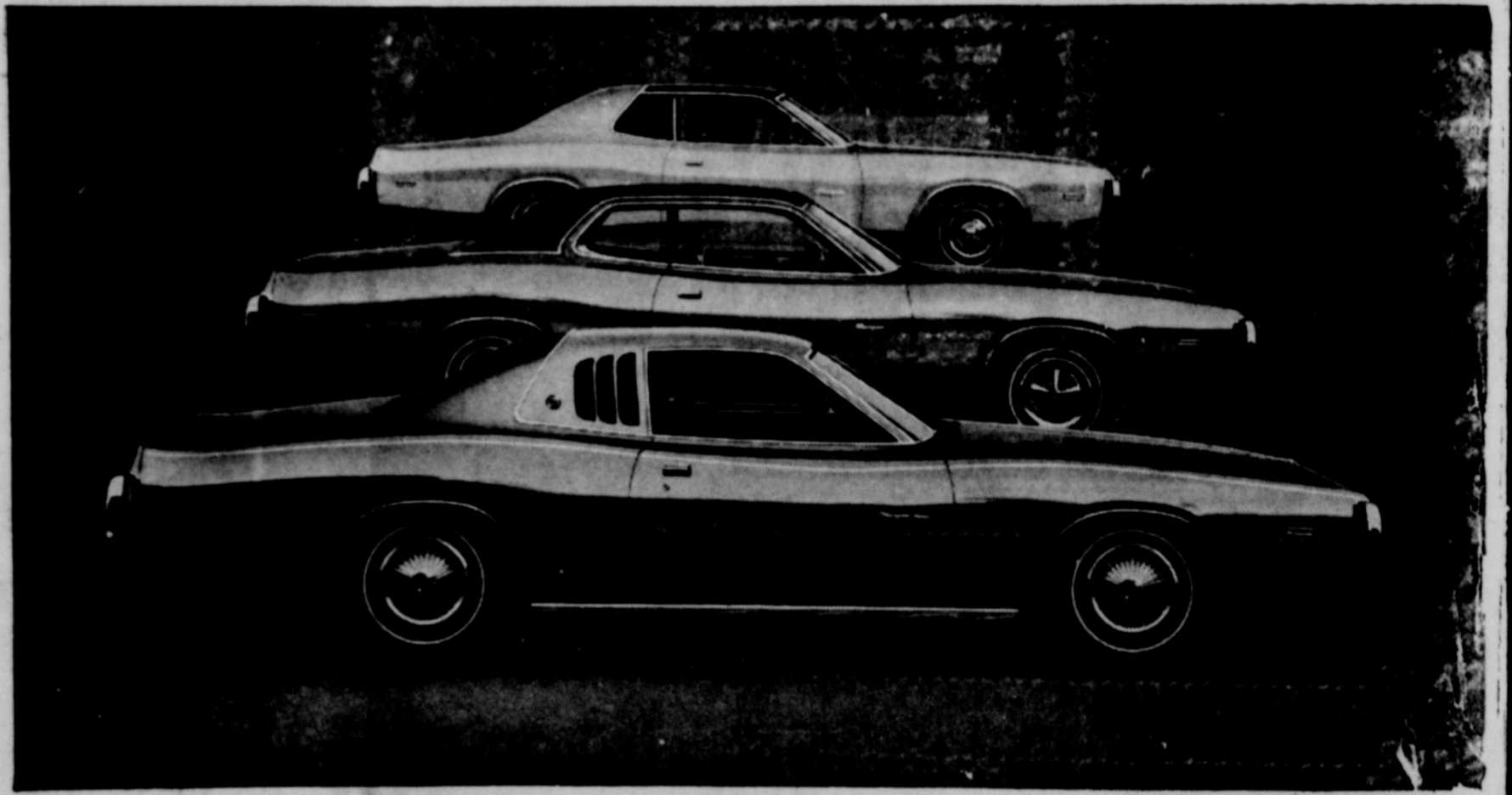

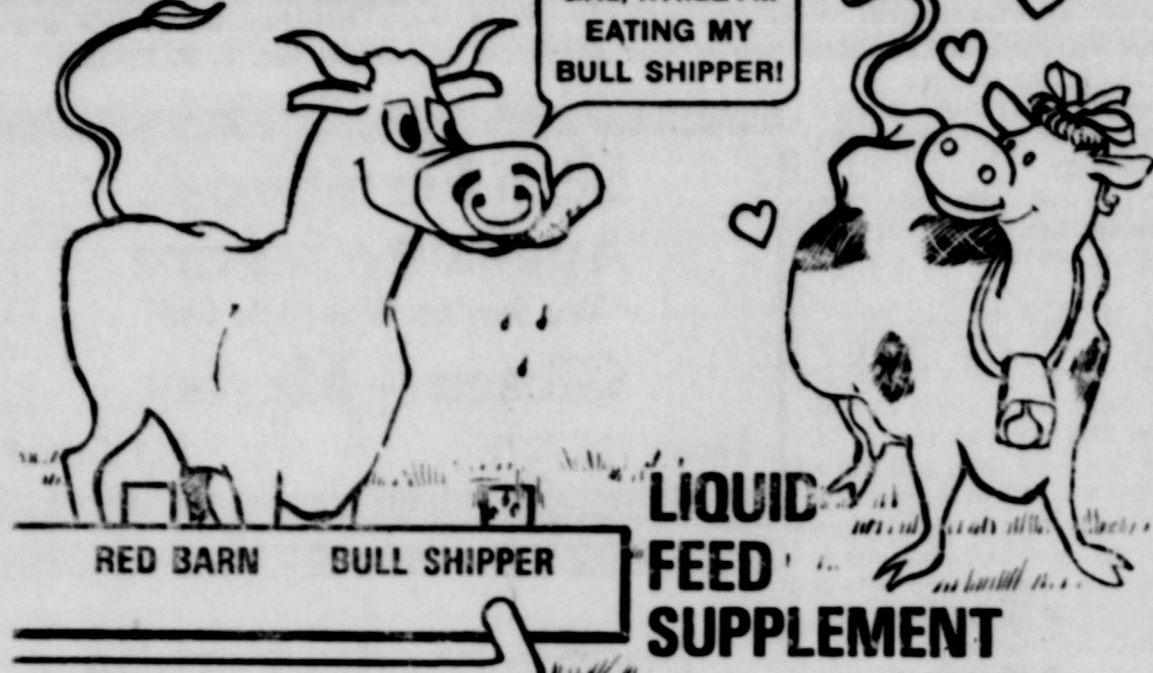

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Never before have soil tests been as important to Hamilton County farmers as they are today.

With limited supplies of nitrogen and phosphorus, nutrients must be applied where they are needed to maintain production and profits.

This is especially true for phosphorus, which accumulates in the soil and can be found in a wide range of levels on a single farm. Recent soil test summary data shows that 58 percent of over 10,000 soil samples from the Blacklands were very low in phosphorus, while 10 percent were high. Such differences must be recognized in planning fertilizer purchases for this fall and next year's crop.

A reliable soil test is the best place to start, and fall is the best time to collect samples. Early sampling gives time to make plans and place fertilizer orders early.

To provide a valid guide for fertilization, soil samples must be collected carefully. A slice or core of soil should be taken from 10 to 15 spots in each field to get a good sample. For field crops, the slices or cores should be taken to plow depth, while a depth of 3 to 4 inches has been given best results for perennial forages.

Put the soil in a clean plastic bucket, mix it thoroughly and remove a pint box full to send to the laboratory. Information sheets should accompany each sample to show past history and plans for the next crop. These plus mailing cartons for the soil samples are available at the County Extension office.

Act now to insure that your fall and spring fertilization programs are based on a soil test.
