"I hope people will come by to see the office and give us the benefit of their thinking and share their ideas," Sen. Jones said.

Jones pointed out that his campaign for election included a pledge "to seek the best information available on every issue . . . to conscientiously study and weigh both sides of every issue coming before the Senate . . . to cast my vote according to what I earnestly believe to be in the best interest of the people in the district."

"I also promised," the senator said, "to open an office in Waco if there appeared to be a need for such an office. The office is now open and will remain open as long as it appears to benefit the people."

"If there are any matters that need to be brought to my attention, I hope the person involved will call me or my Waco secretary, Mrs. Rena Luedeker, so that I may know their points of view on matters pertaining to the Senate."
