The children were rushed into the main elementary building where its roof was partially ripped off by the twister. The Cozby's son, Ronnie, a student in the main building, was not injured. Their home also was undamaged.

Tubeless' Sunday Found Many Motorists in Trouble

Service stations in Hico Sunday, as well as most of the nation, traffic here was much lighter than the case on a normal Sunday.

Some of those who were found themselves in trouble with not enough fuel to get home.

One span of five minutes, automobiles checked four stations from the "Y" for the purpose of securing fuel, only to find them closed.

Some of the motorists, traveling from Falls, said that he only had a half tank left, and it

appeared as if he would have to find a place to spend the night and await for stations to open Monday morning. Several other travelers were in the same predicament, and one motorist became indignant when told that all stations were closed.

Not only from a fuel standpoint, the Sunday closing was causing other problems as well.

For instance, a flat tire could create a crisis. With most tires being of the tubeless type, a person can't carry along a repair kit and fix it himself.

Also, the holding of Sunday funerals could be affected. People

who must travel long distances to attend services will not be able to do so.

One person was seen Saturday morning purchasing two five-gallon gasoline cans to carry along a reserve. But this can be dangerous.

Such an act claimed the life of an 18-year-old Colorado City youth early Sunday morning when his vehicle was in an accident. Traveling to Comanche, the youth's car containing four metal gasoline cans hit a guard rail and the fuel ignited.

The solution? Limit your weekend travels to a distance that can be traversed on one tank of gasoline.

55 MPH Is Now Law in Texas

Station (AP)—The Texas Commission voted unanimously Tuesday to set the maximum speed limit for all highways at 55 miles an hour.

Commission said it was acterased the turmoil brought by different speeds. Commissioner Greer noted that some states were following the recommendation of President Nixon and Gov. Briscoe to drive no faster than 55, but others were still stepping up the gas.

Commission order, adopted by a vote, will become effective

as soon as the new highway signs can be posted, probably in about two weeks.

Chairman Reagan Houston of San Antonio specified, however, that the commission order will be delivered to Texas Atty. Gen. John Hill Wednesday for his approval.

If Hill should decide the Commission does not have the authority to change the maximum speed limit, the order will be void.

There has been considerable disagreement over whether the speed limit can be changed without a legislative act. At least two House members, Gene Jones and Hawkins Menefee, both of Houston, have threatened to file a lawsuit to block the commission from altering the speed limit.

- Turn thermostat down at night. Turning it down 10 degrees can save approximately 10 percent.
- Tune up heating system. Keep air filters clean. Have a qualified person check and adjust furnace.
- Close shades and drapes at night. Keep fireplace damper closed when not in use.
- Insulate heating ducts exposed to unheated spaces. Insulate hot water pipes that pass through cold spaces.
- Install six inches of attic insulation. Can save up to 20 percent.
- Close off; don't heat unused rooms.
- Install storm windows and doors. Can save up to 15 percent.
- Caulk window and door frames. Weather strip windows and doors. Can save up to 4 percent.
- Close attic off rest of home. Seal cracks around door, pulldown stairway, air duct passages, etc.

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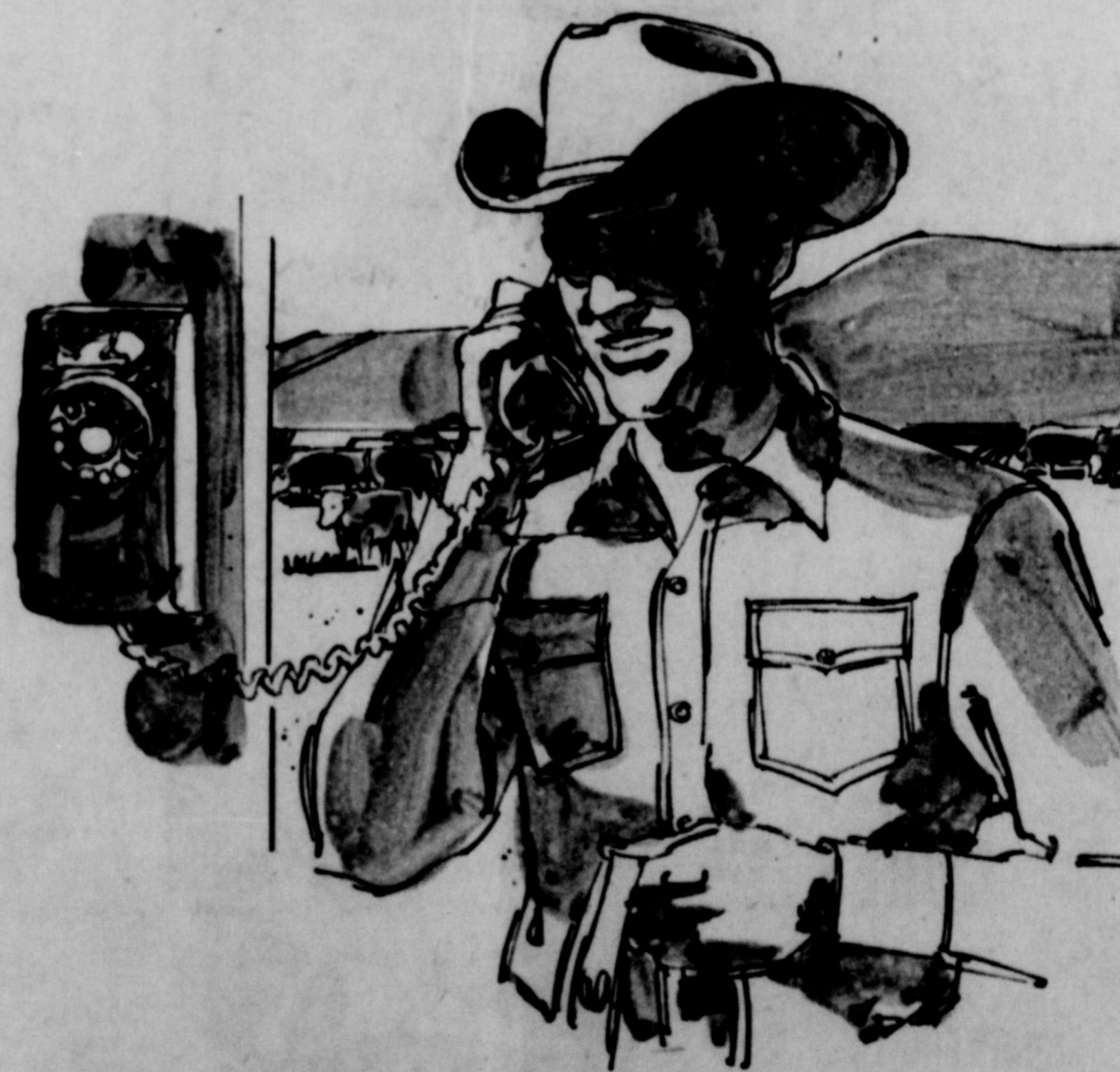
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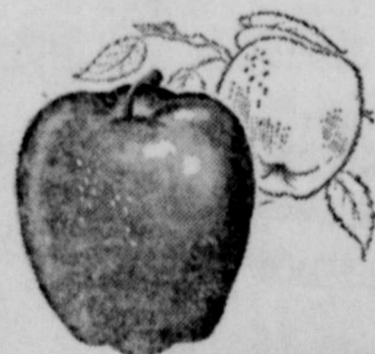

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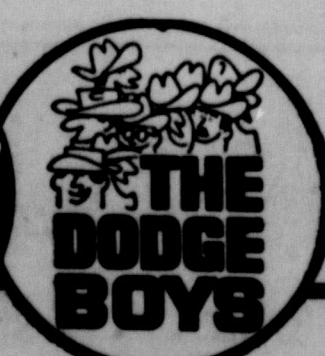
