In Counties having a population of less than eight thousand (8,000) according to the last preceeding Federal Census, there shall be elected a single clerk who shall perform the duties of the District Clerk and County Clerk, unless a majority of the qualified voters of the County who participate in a special election called by the Commissioners Court for that purpose, vote to keep the offices of the County Clerk and District Clerk separate.

In compliance to the option in Art. 1903 of Vernon's Civil Statuates of the State of Texas, annotated, it is the order of the Commissioners Court, sitting in regular session December 11, 1973 that a Special Election, to be held in each election precinct in the County of Hamilton, be held on Saturday, January 12, 1974 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. for the voting public to determine the question of whether the offices of District Clerk and County Clerk will be separate or joint.
