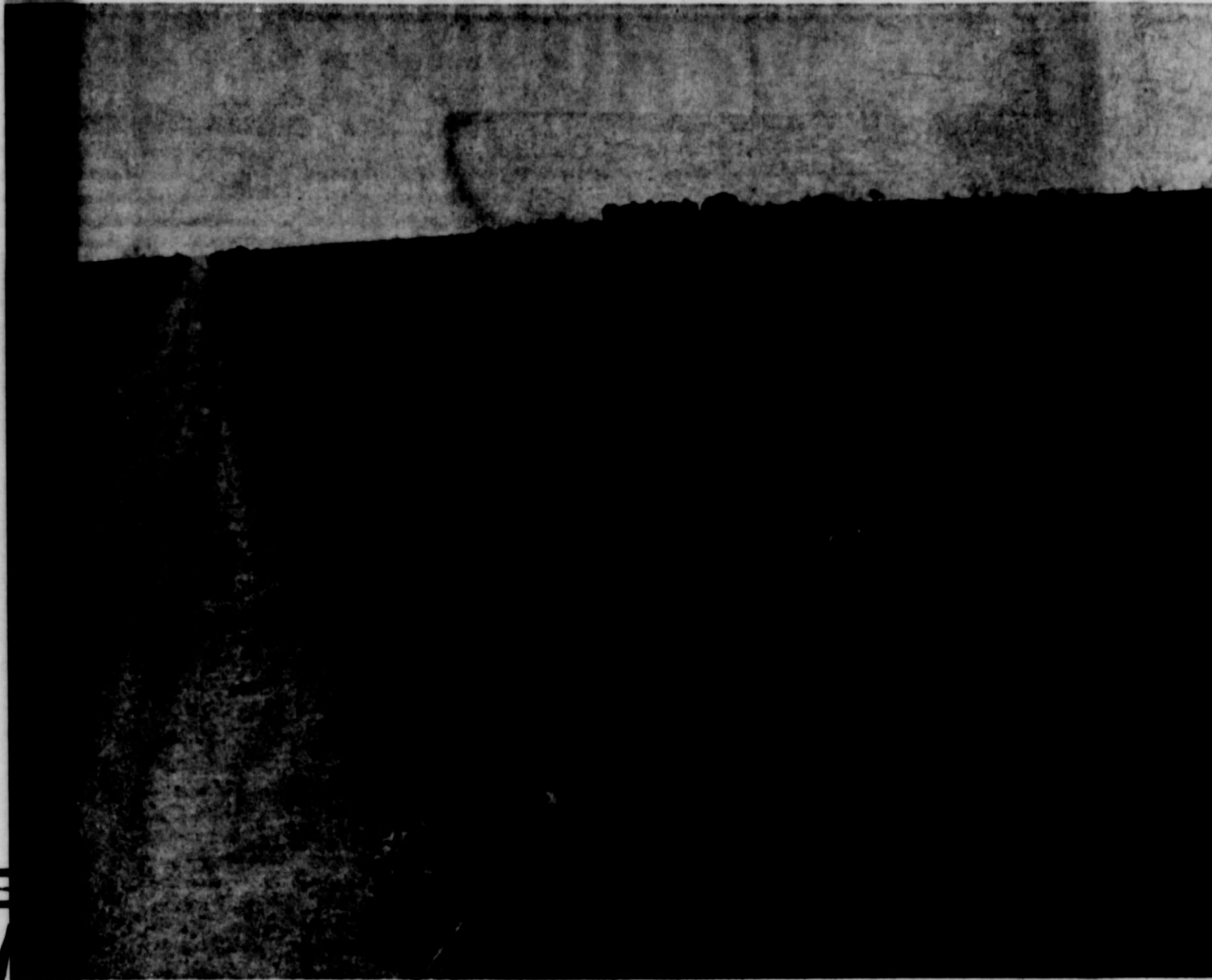

Hico Featured on Area 5 News Report

Citizens of this area who were fortunate to be watching Channel 5 Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock, enjoyed seeing a film featuring scenes in and around Hico.

Area 5 newsman Wayne Brown was here recently making the film and interviewing Hico people in regards to the history of the town.

The TV commentator told that the original town was founded before the Civil War, in 1854, and was located on Honey Creek. A picture of the memorial plaque on the site of Old Hico was shown, as was the remains of the railroad tracks that once was so important to the growth of Hico, and caused the town to be moved to its present location.

In 1908, with a population of 3000, Hico was known as one of the larger cotton centers of the area. A picture of main street was shown—people, horse and buggies and wagons filled with cotton, depicted the bustling town at that time. The picture now hangs in Hico's Cafe, the Koffee Kup.

The film then changed to the city as it is today, showing the old Kight Gin, now Toegen Feed Mill, the old Roller Mill, now vacant, and the old Weiser Mill on the banks of the Bosque.

Even though the town today is modern in every respect, the newsman got a picture of Henry Herrin plowing his garden with an antique plow pulled by his horse, "Old Blue."

The robbers were caught near Waco and returned to Hico where they were locked up in a log shed on the Charley Oxley place. That night a mob stormed the shed and shot the robbers. The next day the people of Hico, men, women and children, were allowed to walk through the shed and view the bodies. Mr. Ramage said maybe that was the reason there was no crime in Hico today—the criminals could be shot before a trial could be held.

Other pictures in the film strip showed a group of P.E. girls at school changing classes, a dog and cat fight at the Knudson farm, and a view of Hico's main street as it is today.

At our last P-TA meeting we learned from Mr. John McIntosh that there are 160 million people in the world who have no written language. They do not read; they do not write. There are no books in 2000 languages of the earth because those languages have never been reduced to an alphabet and written words.

The Summer Institute of Linguistics on Camp Wisdom Road in south Dallas trains anthropologists, missionaries, government workers, Peace Corps volunteers and anyone who has a desire to learn one or more of these unwritten languages. There are universal principles of grammar and sound that can be learned and then applied when one is confronted by a new language.

Mr. McIntosh of the Wycliffe Bible Translators lived in a remote Mexican village for many years and was the first person to write down the Chol language. He gave us many insights into this fascinating work. Not only must the sounds be understood, but the culture of the people and the idioms with which they speak must be absorbed. The richness of the Tumbala Chol dialect can be appreciated when one learns that "jealousy" would be translated "a shivering heart"; "sadness" would be "a nailed heart"; "gladness" "a large heart"; "a troubled conscience," "a talking heart"; and "love," "a pain in the heart."

In English, "love" can mean many things. Will your Valentine know what you mean when you pledge your love? About 2000 years ago Paul, who lived in Turkey, wrote to some folks who lived in Greece this definition of love.

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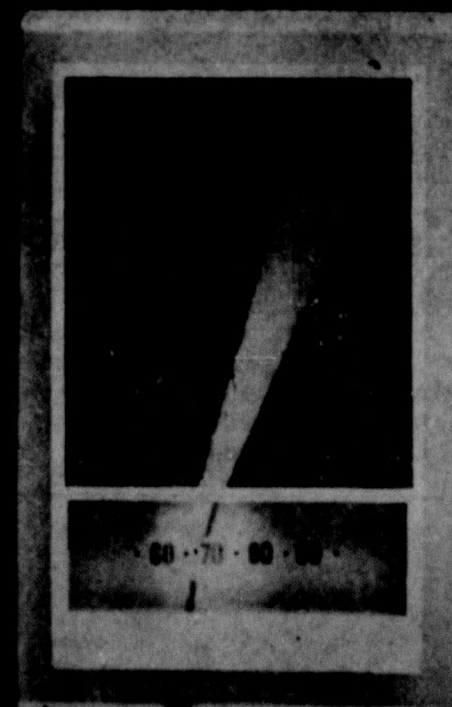

MR. EINFELDT PRESENTS PROGRAM ON 'GRAPHIC ARTS' FOR GARDEN CLUB

The Hico Garden Club met Friday, Feb. 8 at 2 p.m. in the Community Center with Mrs. John Golightly presiding.

Mrs. W. E. Goyné gave the opening prayer, and roll call was answered by each member and guest naming a famous painting or favorite artist.

After a short business meeting Mrs. Golightly introduced Mr. Geo. Einfeldt, a well known Texas artist. Mr. Einfeldt was born in Germany where he had his early training in art from his father, who was an artist and by attending art schools there. In 1924 his family moved to Houston. For 44 years he was art director for an outdoor advertising company in Houston until his retirement. He was president of the Houston Art Association for a number of years.

Mr. Einfeldt gave an interesting and enlightening program on "Graphic Arts" illustrating each type by showing wood cuts, etchings and lithographs drawn and printed by famous artists.

Graphic Art is the oldest art known to man. It is found portrayed by cave men in caves and on rocks showing early man using bows and arrows for hunting animals and fighting. The most famous of these drawings are of life-size bison supposed to have been made from 15,000 to 10,000 B.C. These drawings were discovered in 1879 in a cave at Altamira in Northern Spain, still well preserved.

Another art that dates back to the dawn of history is the wood cut. This art was highly developed in China and Japan. The earliest known prints on paper came from China about 800 A.D. Important seals were made on wood cuts to be used on documents and letters. This art was more highly developed later in Europe with a religious theme. Hard wood is preferred rather than soft wood by artists for wood cuts. Printing should be done by artist himself for first prints are most valuable. Each printing of a drawing is numbered. The more prints made of a wood cut the less valuable it is.

In the western world the great master of this art probably was Albrecht Dürer, born in the city of Nuremberg in 1471. He was a contemporary of Luther and joined the Protestant movement. Gutenberg had just started printing from movable type and books with illustrations by wood cuts were in great demand. Wood engraving, copper and steel engraving prints do not lose value after first printings. The most modern application of this form of printing is the linoleum cut. An etching is done on very thin copper or zinc plates, using a steel or diamond point needle to cut design or drawing through an acid resistant ground or varnish covering the plate. Then the plate is immersed in a strong acid, either hydrochloric, nitric, or sulphuric. The acid bites or eats into the metal making the drawings or design, but does not attack the varnish. When the varnish is cleaned off the plate, it is ready for ink or printing on high grade paper.

Some of the great etching artists are Goya, Whistler, Millet and the greatest of all, Rembrandt. His most famous etching is probably "Christ Healing the Sick."

The art of etching is being revived today by modern artists using the dry point method where the design or drawing is done directly on the plate without action of the acid.

Another graphic art is lithography discovered in 1798 by Aloys Senefelder, who, though not an artist himself, gave the world a medium tremendously useful both in the commercial and fine arts field. The name lithograph is derived from two Greek words, litho, meaning stone, and graph, meaning writing or drawing. A surface of the stone is ground smooth and treated in such a way as to accept water and refuse grease. This process is highly developed today, however using a zinc base. Most magazine printing and other commercial printing is done by lithography. The best impression though, still results from the use of stone. Toulouse-Lautrec is best known for his litho-

graphed posters. The Currier and Ives prints are well known lithographs that flourished in the 1850s. They were hand colored and could be bought for a nominal fee, depending on size of the print. Today the original lithographs bring high prices on the antique market, the highest so far \$8,500.00.

Another form in the graphic arts is the silk screen process (1925), a stencil method of printing a flat color design through a screen of silk stretched over a wood frame. This type is used extensively in the commercial field as printing in magazines, on T-shirts, towels, glasses, dress materials, etc. Designs are drawn directly on the stretched silk, then flooded with glue and later painted. Each color is put on a separate screen. It takes a specialist to do this type of printing.

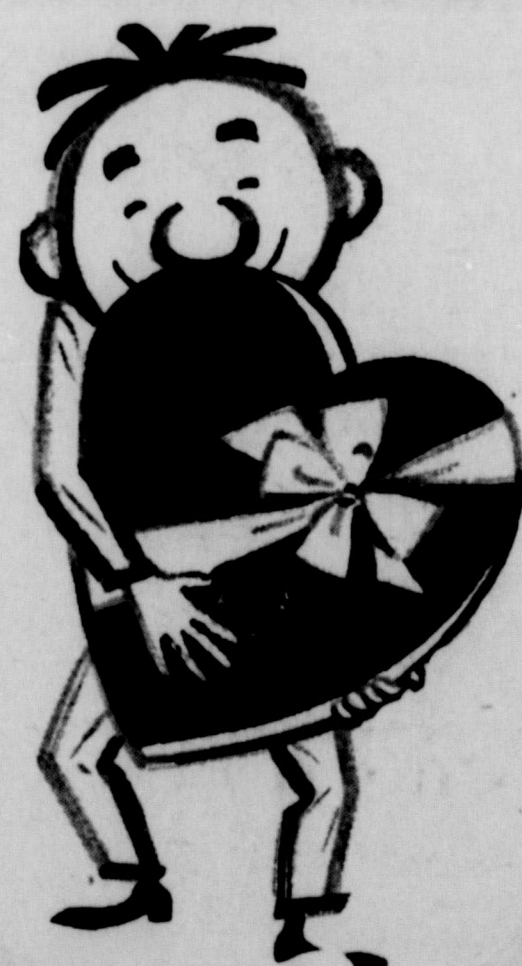

Lanham Farmer Produces More, Protects More

By GLENN RILEY, SCS

J. A. Edwards, a farmer in the Lanham community, is managing and operating his farm for higher production and soil protection.

First of all, his conservation cropping system consists of a rotation of milo, small grain, and cotton. These crops are grown in sequence with all the residue from each crop left on or near the soil surface until planting time for the following crop. This provides a cover and protection for the soil almost the year around. His crops are planted on the contour, with terraces that conserve moisture and increase crop yields.

During the past two years, Edwards has constructed a little over two miles of parallel terraces and a grassed waterway of approximately three acres for terrace outlets.

He has other established terraces and waterways constructed prior to 1972. With these practices and his interest and efforts to protect his land from erosion and increase soil fertility, Edwards is continually producing more and better crops.

He also produces beef on the place. About 30 acres of Coastal Bermudagrass is managed and grazed with cattle. His overall farming operation is geared on producing more by better protection and care of what he has.

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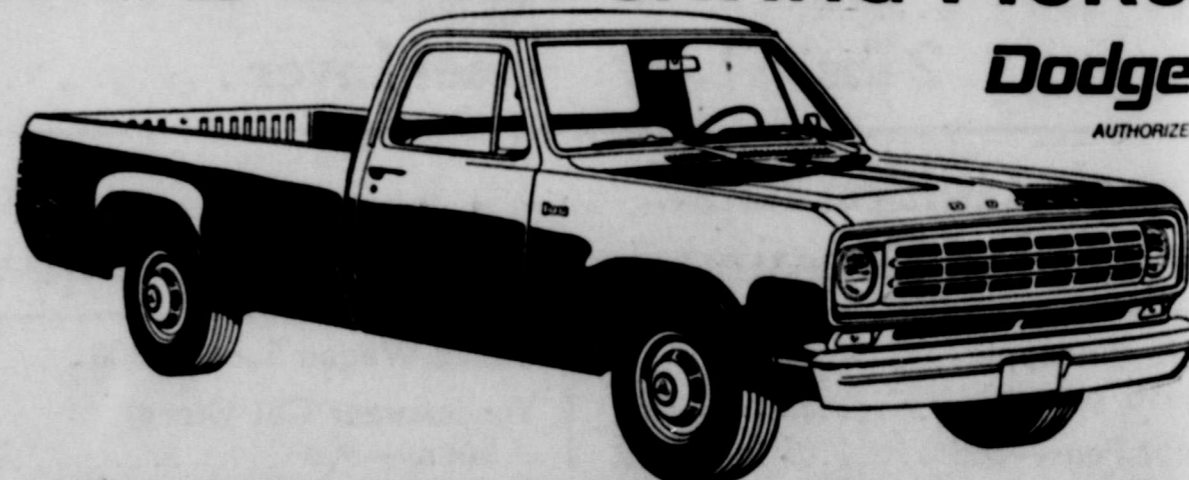

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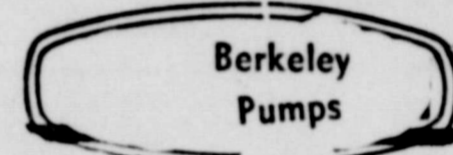
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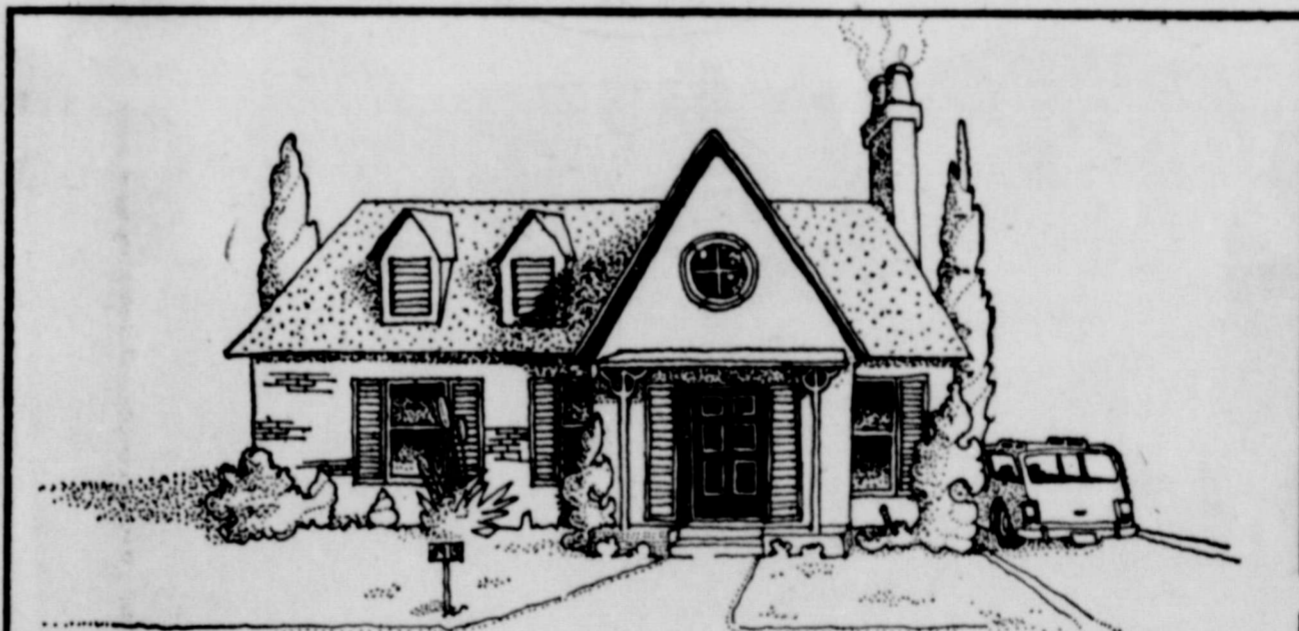
