## No Candidates For City, School Voting

With filing deadline for places on the City and School Trustee election ballots less than two weeks away, there were no candidates for any of the seven places to be filled Wednesday morning of this week.

In the city election, terms of three councilmen and the mayor expire, and terms of three school trustees also expire.

Wednesday, March 6, is deadline for filing for places for the two April 6 elections, both to be held at the Community Center.

In the city, terms of Ray Keller, Bill Howard and Roy Bates expire, as does that of Mayor O. L. Davis.

In school balloting terms of D. L. McCoy, Tommy Johnson and Guy Bulman expire.

None of the above mentioned candidates have expressed their intention of seeking re-election, and through Wednesday morning, neither election had any candidates.

Several people have indicated they would file in the city election, but a delay in receiving election supplies has prevented them from actual filing. Supplies were received Wednesday morning, and the races should start taking shape by next week.

Persons desiring to file in the city election may do so at the City Hall, and at the school or County Superintendent's office for the trustee election.

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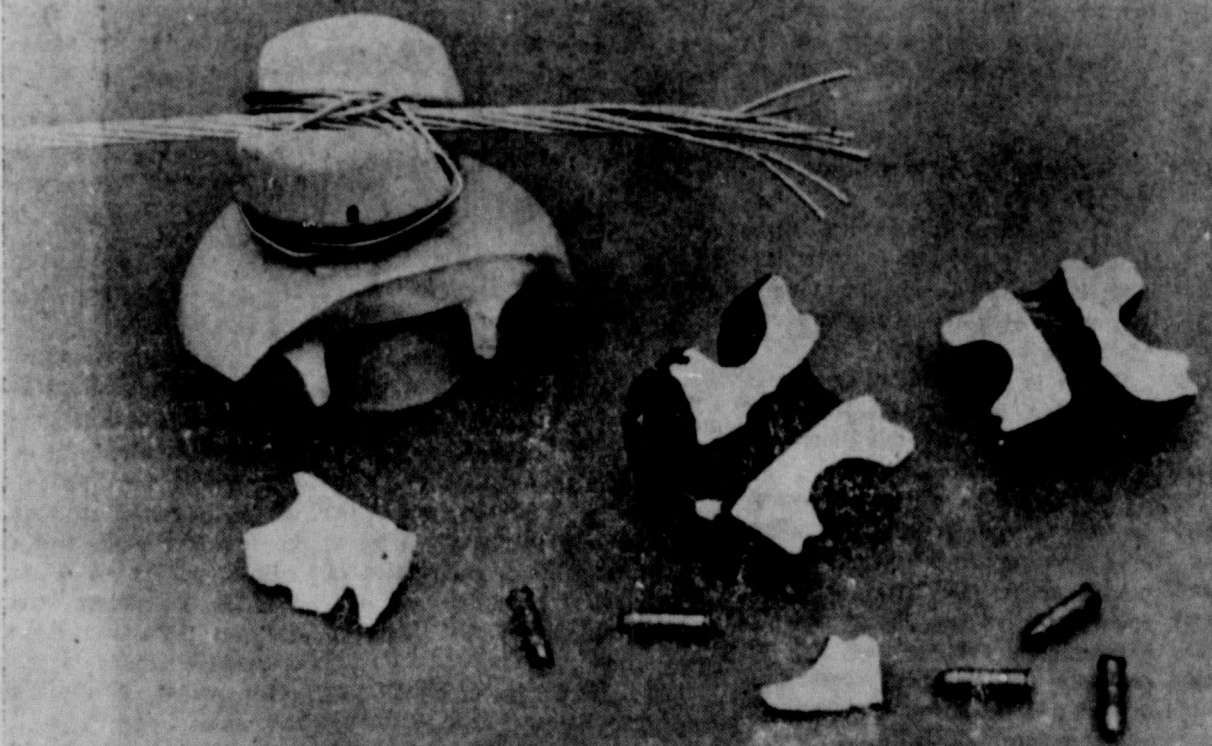
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### Superette Community News

## MR. JAMES NEWELL, TARLETON PROFESSOR SPEAKS THURSDAY FOR HICO REVIEW CLUB

The Valentine motif was beautifully displayed in decor and refreshments when the Hico Review Club met in the home of Mrs. W. F. Hafer, February 14. Members enjoyed a beautifully appointed dessert plate during the social hour.

Tarleton professor, Mr. James Newell, was guest speaker for the afternoon. He is a native of Massachusetts from the Boston area and holds Bachelors and Masters degrees. His subject was "Japan's Leap into the Industrial World."

Mr. Newell pictured Japan as a very crowded area of over one hundred million people that is first in manufacture of ships the world over; second in automobiles and electronics.

He traced the contact of Japan with the West, beginning with the visits of missionaries in the 16th century. Japan resisted the establishment of Christian colonies and the foreign element was thrust away and the area closed to foreigners by the start of the 17th century.

The next contact came when Commodore Perry entered the bay with a show of power of a fleet of ships in 1853. Japan signed a treaty and the ports were opened to trade with the U.S.

Revolution followed and by 1857 young leaders took over. Industrialization was beginning by this time. There was a 30 percent overall rate of literacy at this time and Japanese people shared the American ethical belief in work. The progress made by Japan was mostly on her own and she wanted to avoid outside influence as much as possible.

Japan was involved in war with China in 1894-95 over Korea. She gained territory during this venture and was again successful when she was in conflict with the U.S.S.R. over much of the same territory in 1904-05.

World War I found Japan to be an ally with the British and she gained more colonies during this period.

By 1930 the government became militaristic and Japan took over the area of Manchuria. The U. S. government failed to recognize the imperialistic government and this caused bad feeling between the two countries.

In 1939 when World War II broke out, Japan allied herself with Italy and Germany. She used the events of war to her advantage financially and to gain more island territory. When she moved into Vietnam in 1941, the United States slapped an embargo on Japan. She retaliated by taking Indonesia and then attacked Pearl Harbor.

This move was disastrous for Japan and by 1944 the U.S. took nearby islands. She was able to gain access to the islands of Japan and 44 percent of the urban area of Japan was destroyed.

Japan was ravaged and devastated by the war and her economy was destroyed. The U.S. took the task of rebuilding the economy and MacArthur decided to bring about reforms in the government. Imperialism was done away with and Japan prospered in the new situation.

By 1950 Japan's economy was rejuvenated and was evolving to higher and higher levels. The rate of growth was 10 percent per year in the 1950's. The gross national product level had returned to its 1940 level by 1955.

A 12 percent growth rate was maintained through the 1960's. Since that time the rate has slowed due to the following factors:

1. Maintaining the growth rate is more difficult as it rises.
2. There have been problems with labor and the lack of sufficient labor force, with pollution, overcrowding, and with inadequate transportation.

3. Japan's trading partner, the United States, has begun to protect her home industries by levying higher tariffs and raising export quotas.

Japan and the United States are having problems with one another and trade does not move as smoothly as it once did.

The oil crisis has hit Japan harder than any other nation since she must get 90-95 percent of her fuel

from other sources. At this time 83 percent of oil supplies come from the Mid-East and emergency measures to find other sources tend to turn Japan toward the Soviet Union with its vast Siberian oil fields. This could bring about an increase in trade between the USSR and Japan.

Dr. Newell predicts that the United States and Japan will continue to be very close despite troubles. He feels that Japan is becoming more and more independent.

Japan has become a major economic power and they are investing widely in the U.S. and Latin America. They are even securing property for industrial plants in Texas where they will use local labor. There is no end to the ways that they are making their investments work.

Mrs. B. C. Ochojski presented a gift to Dr. Newell following his talk to express the club's appreciation for his appearing with the group.

Mrs. D. E. Bulloch presented an International Club's report during the business session.

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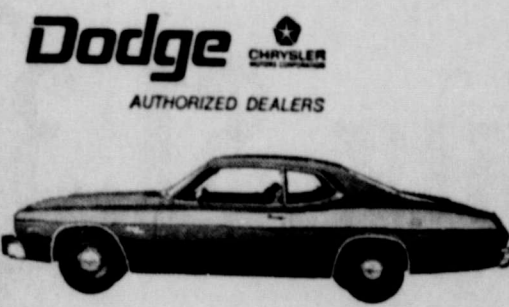
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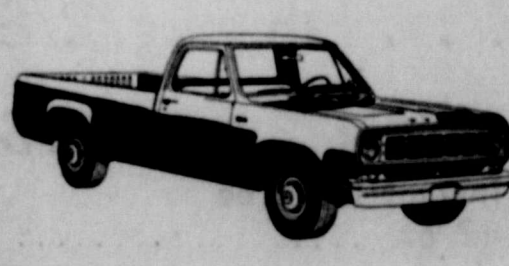

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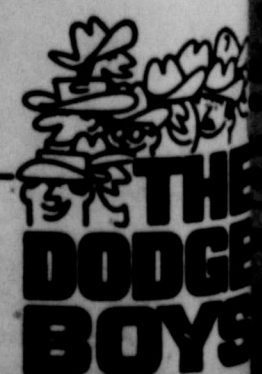

Home sewers have a new way to achieve classic tailored looks, by using knit trims.

The major types include ribbed knit trimming used at necklines, as turtlenecks or as banding on round, V-neck or scoop necks.

It's very unusual for sleeve cuffs, binding and for the waistline area of a cinched waist dress, sweater or jacket.

Sold as tubular knit, home sewers can cut it along one fold and lay it out flat. And since it's sold by the inch rather than by the yard, there is little or no waste.

Knit-band trims make up the second type.

This versatile trim provides tailored accents on bands, borders, collars, waistbands, front closures and sleeve edges.

Knit-band trim is especially good for garments with curving designs, such as round necklines. It "gives" and curves along the design.

Fold-over braid also "gives" and curves around wrap garments, serving as binding.

For a mild accent, some home sewers simply add piping to seams and narrow edgings.

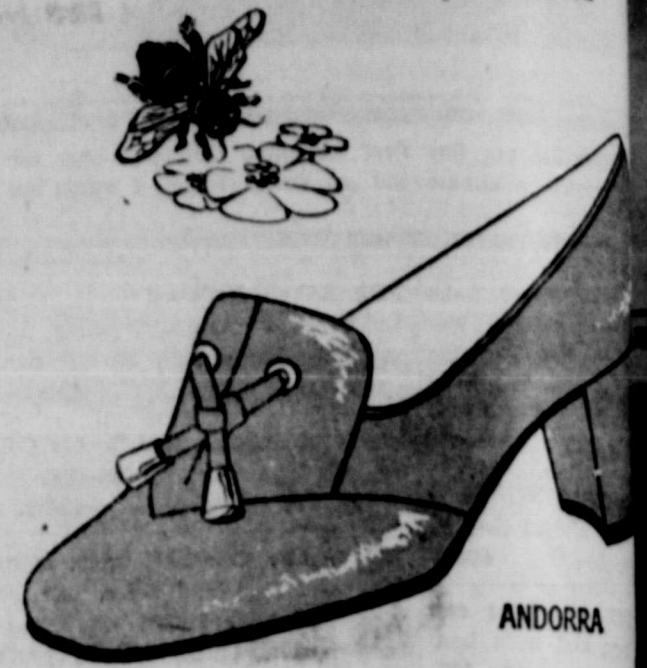

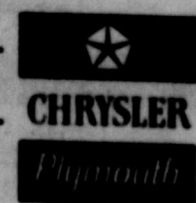
