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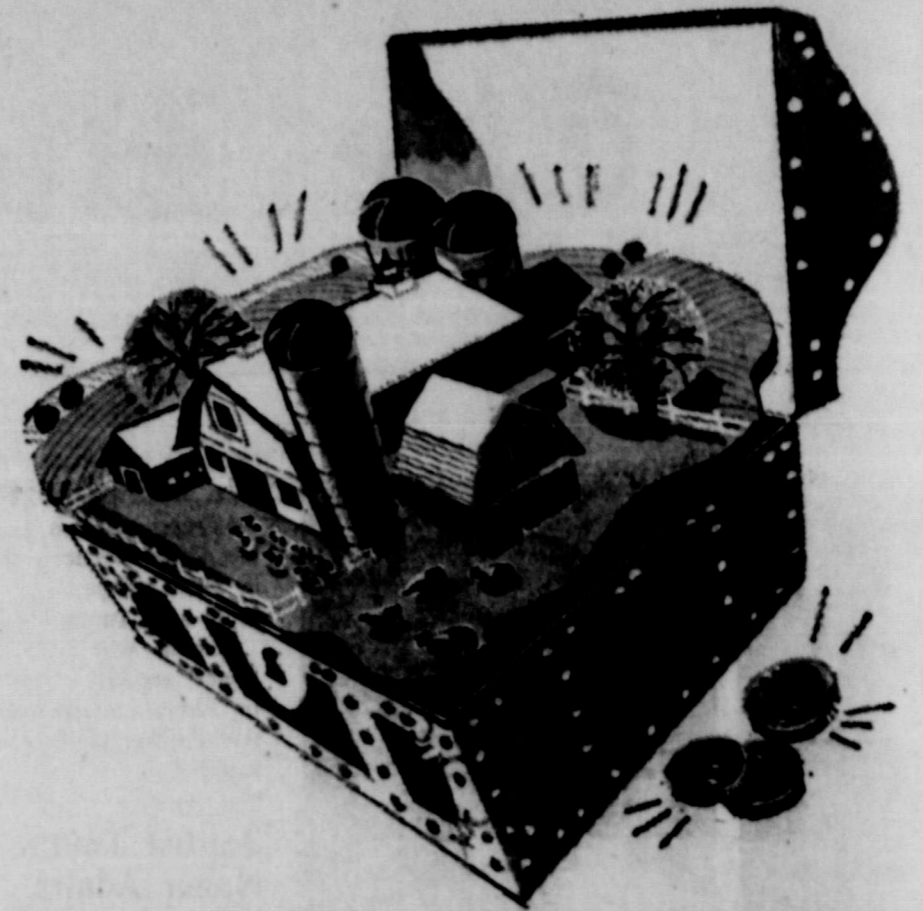

MRS. MARSHALL GIVES PROGRAM, 'OFF THE BEATEN TRAIL,' FOR REVIEW CLUB

Members of Hico Review Club and a guest, Mrs. H. V. Hedges, discovered miniature Texas flags as favors on their plates when they were served refreshments in the home of Mrs. Morse Ross Feb. 28. The occasion was the Texas Day program for the year.

Roll call was answered by members giving a Texas brag or a "tall tale" of Texas.

Mrs. Bryan Angeli presided at a brief business session before the program.

Mrs. Marvin Marshall presented the program with her review of information from Ed Syers' "Off the Beaten Trail," plus other sources.

She quoted Mr. Syers as having said that the history of an area is made of the deeds of the people who live in the land. Texas is a land that was settled by people from many areas. First were the Spaniards who established missions and left their customs, speech, and culture. The second group was the Indians who came from many tribes, especially those from the eastern seaboard. Oddly enough, there is only one Indian Reservation in Texas at the present time, that of the Alabama-Coushatta tribes.

Other groups of early settlers included the Mexicans, the Irish, the French, the Germans, the Polish, the Alsatians, natives of the Canary Islands, and of course, representatives of the colonies and early states of the U.S.

Thirty-five miles north of Amarillo there is an area called the land of the Alabates. There are 550 cliffs and mines which existed from a time of 1200 years B.C. There flint was mined by the Indians and traded to groups from many areas. Archaeologists discovered this area on the site of a lake on the Canadian River. It is considered to be the only link with the ancient past on our continent.

Also along this line, there is evidence on Galveston Island and Padre Island of the culture of the very fierce Karankawa Indian tribe. They were known and feared by early explorers such as Cabaza de Vaco and by Jean Lafitte, the pirate.

A story is told of the experience of Captain Jack Hayes, an early Texas Ranger, who in 1841 fought off the advances of over 100 Indians alone. He was atop a solid pink granite rock west of New Braunfels, known as the Enchanted Rock. It covers around 700 acres and is the largest single rock in the U.S., with the exception of Granite Mountain. Capt. Hayes was able to perform this feat because he knew that no Indian dared climb to the top of the rock because they feared that the sacrificed dead walked on the rock. They said there were footprints of the dead, that the rock creaked and groaned with the cries of the dead, and that there were blinking lights. Capt. Hayes was able to discover that water had worn the so-called footprints into the rock, that the rock creaked from temperature changes, and the flashing lights were reflections of mica imbedded in the rock in the sunshine or moonlight. An historical monument atop the rock tells of the captain's amazing victory.

Another anecdote related by Mrs. Marshall concerned the small town of Windthorst between Jacksboro and Wichita Falls. An imposing red brick church of unusual architecture dominates the scene in the small town. It was built by the Benedictine order of the Catholic Church. During World War II, 59 men of the small community went away to war and each night, the remaining citizens of Windthorst prayed to Our Lady of Perpetual Health for the safety of the men.

Following the war a grotto was built at the foot of the hill where the church stands, containing a statue of Our Lady of Perpetual Health and a plaque giving the names of the 59 men who served and who all returned safely home.

Other fascinating stories included one about 11 German-Jews who came to the area of Dallas in 1873

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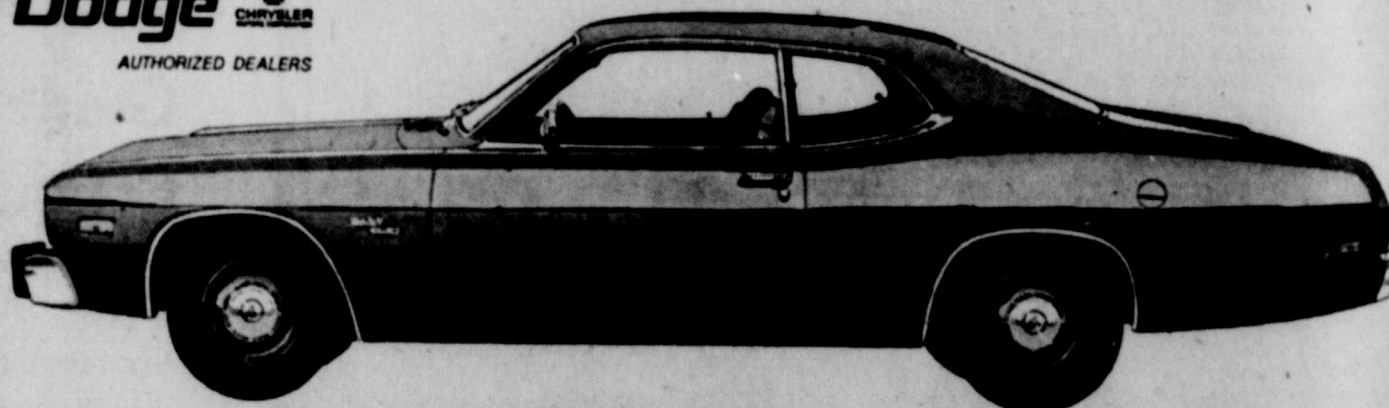

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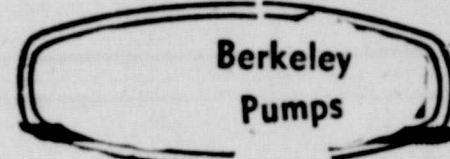

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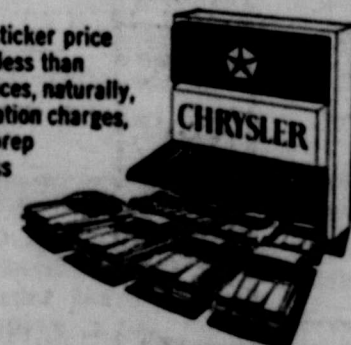
