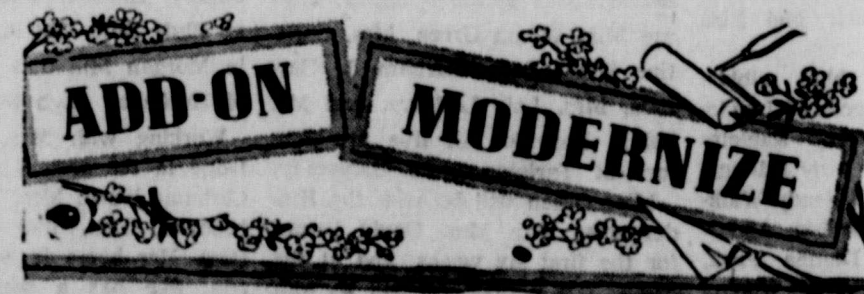
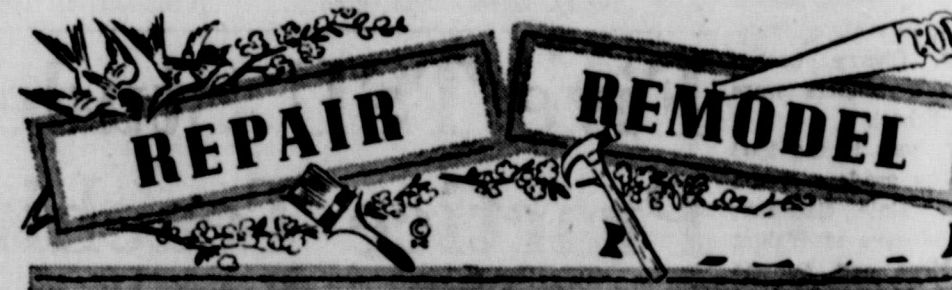

Mr. Haenisch stated that recreation is beginning to be a phase in one's lives that takes very high priority. He indicated that you can gauge the feelings of the people of a community by taking a look at the facilities that are provided. He was quick to point out that one man's recreation might be another man's work—that recreational needs and desires are widely varied.

Accompanying his remarks with beautiful color slides taken in this general area, he numbered several recreational opportunities available. These included using the State Parks, rodeoing, picnicing, hunting game such as deer, wild turkey, water fowl, quail and dove, fishing, water skiing, boating, target practice at rifle ranges set up in certain areas, and golfing.

Next, Mr. Haenisch turned to the problems that confront a group when they attempt to set up a new recreational facility. He stated that an area either goes up or down and cannot remain static. He gave the quotation, "The city without progress in our dynamic seventies may be in danger of becoming another permanent village." He said that the statement can be applied in any place regardless of population.
