Predator Control Training April 18

Austin (Spl.)—Training sessions in the use of the M-44 predator control device will be held in Hamilton County Thursday, April 18, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has announced.

Classes previously scheduled had to be cancelled when a restraining order was placed on the Texas program before it could get underway. The order was lifted March 29.

Ranchers in the 44 counties designated in the study must attend the training classes in order to receive a permit to purchase the device or the sodium cyanide capsules approved for the program. Commissioner White said.

Mayor, 1 Councilman Re-Elected Saturday

Two School Incumbents Lose In Re-Election Bid



Hico voters gave a clear-cut margin of victory to the two incumbent city officials seeking re-election last Saturday, while residents of Hico Independent School District voted out two incumbents and named three new board members. While city voters were returning the two incumbents, they were also making history, electing the first woman ever to serve on the council. Miss Louise Blair not only becomes the first lady official, but

she led the balloting by a large margin, polling 173 votes.

Mayor O. L. Davis won re-election over James Brown by a 139-77 margin, and Councilman W. C. Howard was re-elected to the city governing body. Howard received 131 votes, and newcomer Gary Connally won the other Council post, receiving 121 votes.

A total of 223 votes were cast in the city election. All city officials were elected for two-year terms.

In the order that they appeared on the ballot, candidates drew the following votes:

Glen Ross received four written votes for mayor, and Vernon Chew received one.

School Election

In school balloting, Floyd Drake and Don Ross led the ticket, polling 215 and 196 votes, respectively, to win places on the board, and Marvin Walters finished high for the third seat, receiving 109 votes.

The two incumbents, Guy Bulman and D. L. McCoy, received 98 and 66 votes, respectively. The other incumbent, Tommy Johnson, did not seek re-election.

Terms of school trustees are for three years.

For County Trustee, Precinct 3, V. H. Jenkins was unopposed and tallied 164 votes. Lagree West, also unopposed, polled 140 votes for the at-large post.

A total of 247 votes were cast in the school election.

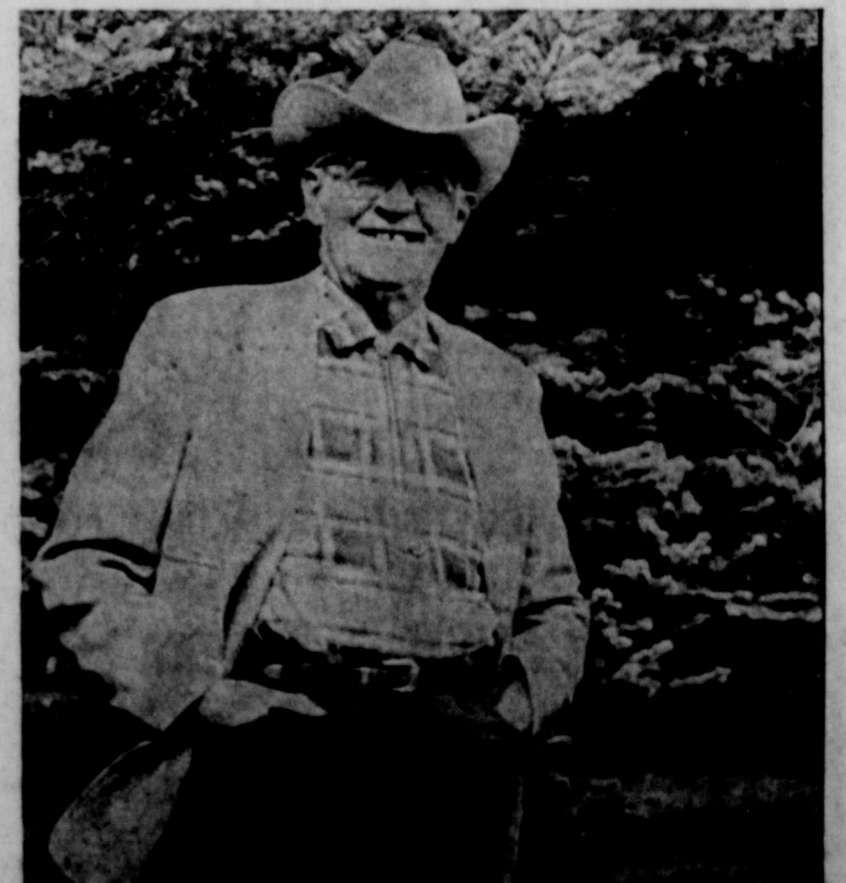
Homemaking Students Observe FHA Week

A pall of sadness fell over this and surrounding communities when word was received that Marvin Porterfield had passed away in the Hillcrest Hospital in Waco. He had driven to Waco Tuesday morning to get some prescriptions filled at

the VA pharmacy. While waiting for these to be filled he suffered a massive heart attack and blacked out. He was rushed to Hillcrest but never revived and passed away about 8:15 p.m. Thursday without regaining consciousness.

Funeral services were held in Park Heights Church of Christ at Hamilton, of which he was a member, at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 6, with Ministers John Lowery and George Tolbert officiating. Burial was in the Fairy Cemetery.

Marvin was born to the late Walter W. and Maud Simons Porterfield in Cedar Ridge, Colo. on May 29, 1918. He was married to Miss Marie Smith on Oct. 16, 1941. They have lived in the Fairy and Lanham communities most of their married life, except for some months spent out of state where he did evangelistic work for the Church of Christ. He was a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jeff D. Porterfield of near Fairy, pioneers who settled near here in the 1880's. He attended school in Hamilton.

Marvin had been associated with the Park Heights Church of Christ for some time, visiting patients at the hospital and in rest homes. We feel sure he will be greatly missed.

Marvin was a diabetic which was a great handicap to him. He seemed to bear his illness with patience.

Survivors are his wife, Marie, a son, Billy Marvin of the home; three brothers, Lawrence of Dallas, Louis of Waco and Charles White of Houston; one sister, Mrs. Helen (Robert) Hurt of Plano; several nephews and nieces. Our deepest sympathy to the bereaved family.

The Porterfields lived on the adjoining lot just back of my home and I will surely miss him.

The writer and many others from Fairy attended the services.

The writer also attended funeral services for Mr. Elbert White of Hamilton, who passed away early Friday morning in Harris Hospital in Fort Worth following a brief illness.
