Drug Firm Robbed Wednesday Night

Burglars entered Howard Drug sometime last Wednesday night, and carted off around \$4,000.00 in drugs and merchandise.

The robbery was an exact duplication of the December break-in at the drug firm, when a like amount of merchandise was taken.

Entry to the business was the same as in the December break-in. The burglars entered through an old stairway, breaking in a door to the main building.

In the latest robbery, yeggs took about 40 men and women's watches, the same number estimated to have been taken in the December robbery, but took more drug items than before.

This is the third time in two years that the local business has been entered. In the first robbery, yeggs gained entrance to the building by breaking the large glass door at the front. In that entry, the safe was tampered with, but no merchandise was taken.

Sheriff Boots Young, local Constable Buck Shepherd, and Texas Ranger James Wright investigated the break-in.

The farmer and rancher uses the guide to locate people, places and things. Law enforcement officers, fire departments and emergency vehicles can use it to locate a fire or accident.

IMPRESSIVE CHURCH CEREMONY UNITES JOHNETTE WALKER AND OLE KNUDSON

Officiating at the double ring ceremony was Austin Emery, minister of the Hico Church of Christ.

The altar was decorated with a center arched candelabrum holding tall blue Cathedral tapers against a background of banked greenery. Flanking the arch were standing baskets of white gladioli and green pom mums intermingled with greenery, and spiral candle trees holding blue tapers. Special pews were marked with arrangements of green and blue pom mums.

Organist for the occasion was Mrs. Wayne Rutledge, who accompanied Mrs. J. C. Braune as she sang "Wedding Song" and "The Lord's Prayer."

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a formal length gown of pure silk organza veiled over silk taffeta in a diamond white and combined with imported Venice lace. We hope you understand this situation and will cooperate with us. Lots unworked.

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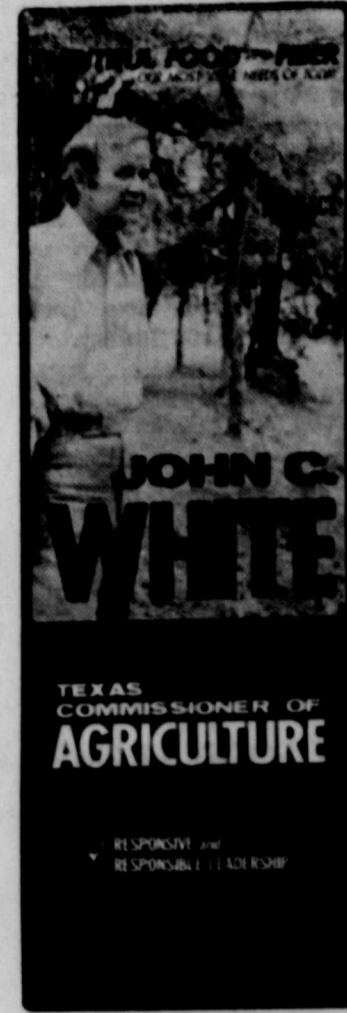

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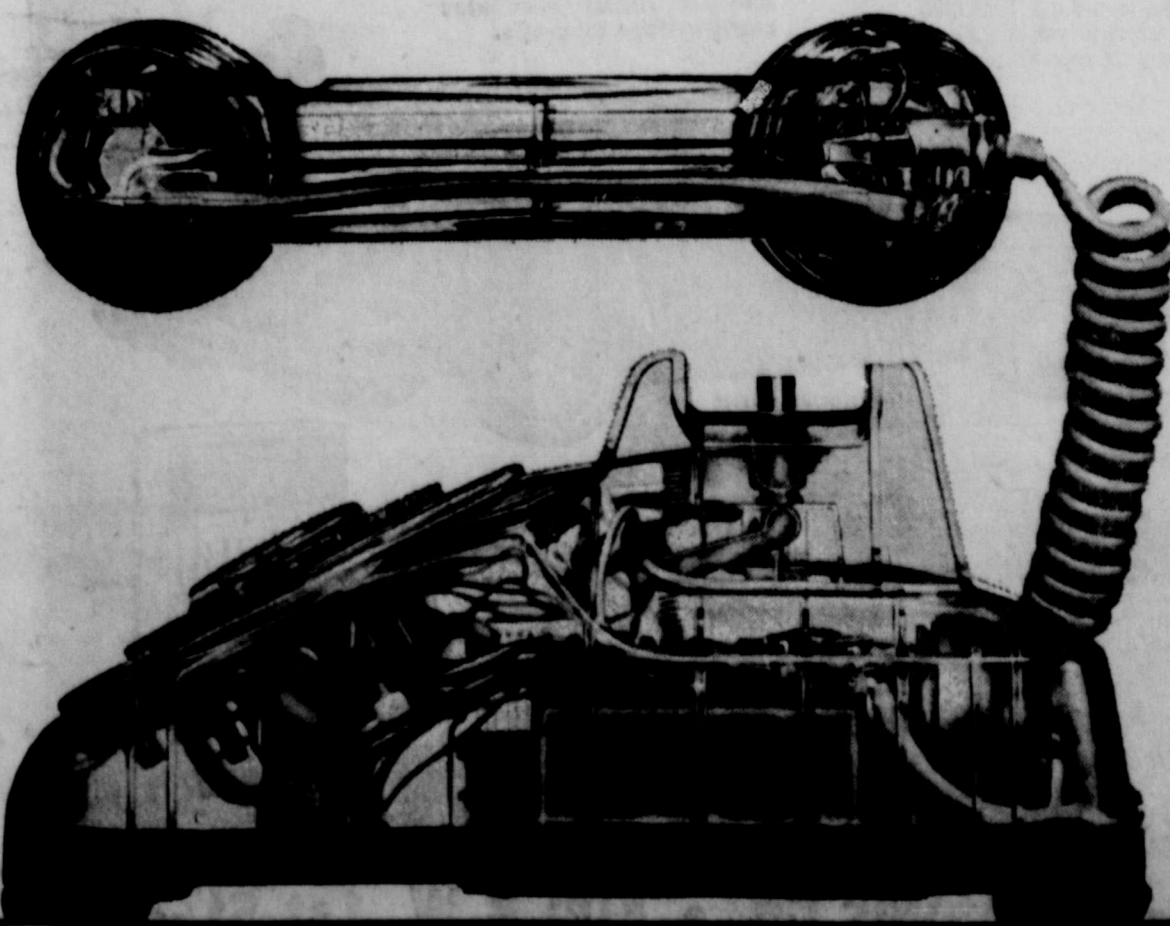

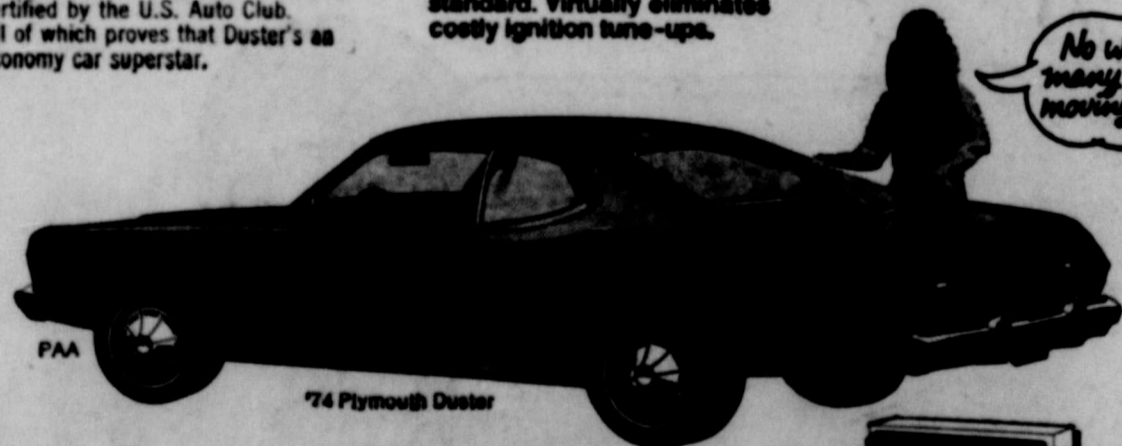
