Briscoe, Farenthold Renew Rivalry Among Democrats

Election of a Governor, and the issue of pari-mutuel wagering in the State of Texas appear to be the hottest issues on the ballot for the Saturday, May 4th, Democratic Primary, to be held locally at the Hico Community Center with D. E. Bulloch presiding.

Four candidates are vying for Governor, but only two are prominently mentioned in a bid for the Democratic nomination.

Incumbent Governor Dolph Briscoe has campaigned long and hard for re-election to his first four-year term, and Frances (Sissy) Farenthold has also made a strong bid for the top state post. Mrs. Farenthold surprised many people two years ago when she garnered enough votes to take Briscoe into a run-off campaign.

The Pari-Mutuel Wagering issue is old hat to Texas voters, having appeared on the ballot in years past. Actually, the proposition is in re-

ferendum form, and if approved would give Texas Legislators guidelines on enactment of the betting measure. Horse racing has long been legal in Texas, but wagering has not, so the Legislators ordered the referendum to "feel out" Texans on whether to enact legislation making wagering legal in the state.

In Hamilton County, only one proposition appears on the ballot that directly affects local people, that of County-District Clerk whose three candidates are seeking the combined post.

Incumbent County Clerk Genevieve Clark is seeking re-election, and is being opposed by Mrs. Betty Harris and Clarence Schneider.

One other office-seeker has a hometown flavor, with Hamilton banker Tom Joseph seeking a place on the State Board of Education from the 11th District. Joseph is opposing Glen L. Smith for the post.

Hico voters will also have the opportunity to vote for a new County Judge. Herman Standifer is stepping down from the position he has held ten years, and the only candidate is James H. Soules, who made an unsuccessful bid for the post four years ago.

MRS. DAYTON SPOKE ON 'ALCOHOL AND DRUGS AMONG YOUTH' AT REVIEW CLUB

When Review Club members journeyed to Lankin last Thursday to meet in the lovely and unique home of Mrs. J. E. Lincoln, they were joined by a guest and former member, Mrs. Robert Lee of Comanche. As the group enjoyed refreshments, they relived past club years as they thumbed through the scrapbook started by the late Mrs. Lawrence Lane, and maintained at present time by Mrs. Bryan Angell.

As she presided at the final business session for the year, Mrs. Angell had several points of business and announcements. Mrs. D. E. Bulloch was elected recording secretary to fill the term of Mrs. Marvin Marshall who has recently resigned as an active member. In a secret ballot Mrs. Gary Connally was elected to fill the vacancy on the active club roll.

Mrs. B. C. Dayton had the program for the afternoon, and her topic concerned "What Can Be Done About Alcohol and Drugs Among Our Youth." She indicated that the marked rise in the use and abuse of drugs in recent years has made it a prime problem in many communities. She quoted statistics which point out the great rise in the volume of alcohol to the point that Americans used enough alcohol in 1971 for every person in the U.S. over the age of 15 years to drink over 2 1/2 gallons of spirits, over two gallons of wine and nearly 26 gallons of beer. Whatever the reasons for the drinking of alcohol, the problems related to it have been severe for many.

In 1972 more than 8,000 young people between 15 and 25 died from alcohol-related traffic accidents.

Mrs. Dayton told of two specific types of centers in operation in New York which have similar counterparts all over the nation. One is a rehabilitation center and drug museum and information center maintained by the Salvation Army called the Answer, which has reunited many run-away youths with their families, as well as serving as a center to give help to those experimenting with drugs.

Of major importance in aiding youth who might get involved with drugs is the Smarteens program which began with 15 students in a suburban Los Angeles community in 1967. In three years the program had grown to encompass 1200 school and other organizations with an excess of 300,000 members. This program involves students and lets them make their own goals and has been hailed as the most successful of all programs among young people. It is a successful program because it is pro-life.

Also cited in the Texas area were the TANE information program, the "Hot Line" systems in use in most cities, an active drug education program in schools, and more active programs to help youth with drug and alcohol problems by the Schick Centers and Alcoholics Anonymous.

In closing Mrs. Dayton urged members to dare to get involved actively in any way that they can help those who might be tempted to begin to abuse drugs.

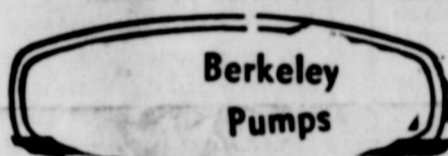

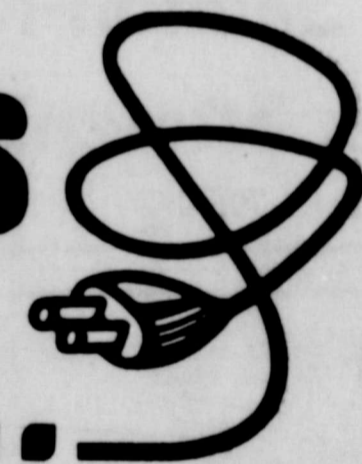
