## Last Rites Held For Galen Christian, 19

Funeral services for Galen Boyd Christian, 19, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, May 10, in the First Baptist Church in Hico, with Rev. Ed Malphrus officiating. Interment was in the Clairette Cemetery.

Christian passed away Sunday, May 8, in All Saints Hospital in Fort Worth from injuries received in a pickup-truck accident March 19 on the Highway 19 at Clairette.

He was born May 4, 1955 and lived his short lifetime near Hico. He was a 1973 graduate of Hico High School and a member of the Hico Baptist Church. At the time of his accident he was employed as a welder at Carlin's Welding Shop in Hico.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Christian of Clairette; two sisters, Mrs. Belinda Scroggins and Miss Christian of the home; paternal grandmother, Mrs. R. C. Christian of Clairette; maternal grandmothers, Mr. and Mrs. E. O. Pate of Crowley; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Eber Stephensville.

Though Galen lived only a short time, his life was a life full of accomplishments.

During his school days, he participated in all activities, was cooperative with his teachers and fellow students, and above all, was dependable.

His popularity among the student body was emphasized by being chosen All-School Favorite his senior year. Galen was also Junior Class Favorite.

Young Christian served as vice-president of the junior and senior classes, and was president of the freshman and sophomore groups. Also among his school offices was that of President of the FFA Chapter. He also participated in FFA judging contests, being a member of the Livestock and Land teams.

In sports, Galen excelled in football, basketball, track, and was a member of the golf team. Winner of numerous weekly awards during the regular football season, he was recipient of the Tiger Pride Award at the 1973 Athletic Banquet. Galen was also a co-captain of the 1972 Tiger team.

Galen will long be remembered, not only for his athletic ability, but for his friendly smile, his outgoing personality, but most of all, for the exemplified manner in which he lived his life.

The centennial of the formation of the Spring Creek Baptist Church will be observed Sunday, May 26 at the old church building south of Iredell.

The Spring Creek Baptist Church was constituted on May 24, 1874 with nine members, by Rev. G. W. Roberts of Iredell, aided by Rev. J. H. Johnson of Meridian and J. W. McCullough, a deacon of Iredell. Rev. Mr. Johnson became the first pastor and this was his first pastorate.

The nine charter members were Daniel and Nancy Auldridge, W. C. Cowart, Benjamin and Sarah Falkner, Lucy Gosdin, Amarantha Harris, J. R. and Sarah Williamson.

## Second Fellowship Breakfast Slated Saturday Morning

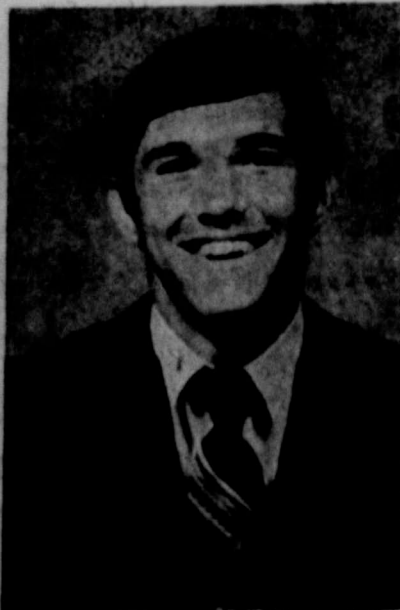
