James Horton is Named Winner of Major Scholarship

James Horton, 1974 graduate of Hico High School, has been awarded a \$1,250 Houston Endowment Scholarship by the Texas Intercollegiate League Foundation.

The Houston Endowment provides for 20 of the \$1,250 grants given to outstanding participants in University Interscholastic League academic and literary contests. The ILLF administers the grants.

Horton earned eligibility for the scholarship by participating in League Reading and One-Act Play competitions.

In 1974 he won second place in Reading at the State Meet. In 1973 he was named All-Star Cast and his play won first place in district One-Act competition.

In 1972 he won second place in Regional Prose Reading and placed second in the 1971 Number Sense competition.

Horton has a four-year scholarship of 97.218. He has received the Science Award and the Individual Award in state range and Pasture Judging. He served as editor of the school yearbook and columnist and business manager for the newspaper. He is vice president of the junior

class, president of the Math Club, and a Student Council representative.

James is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Horton, and plans to attend the University of Texas, Austin, to major in journalism or natural science.

Homer William Koonsman, 61, died at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo Saturday, June 1, where he had been a patient for a week.

He was born Aug. 31, 1912 in Erath County, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Will Koonsman, pioneer settlers in this area. He moved to New Mexico in 1944 from Snyder, and was employed at the Ranna Ranch Headquarters near San Jon, N.M. He was foreman at the Ranna Ranch for eight years. He had also lived at Porter and San Jon. For the past six years, he had been living at Tucumcari, N.M., and was an employee of the 7A Land and Feeding Co.

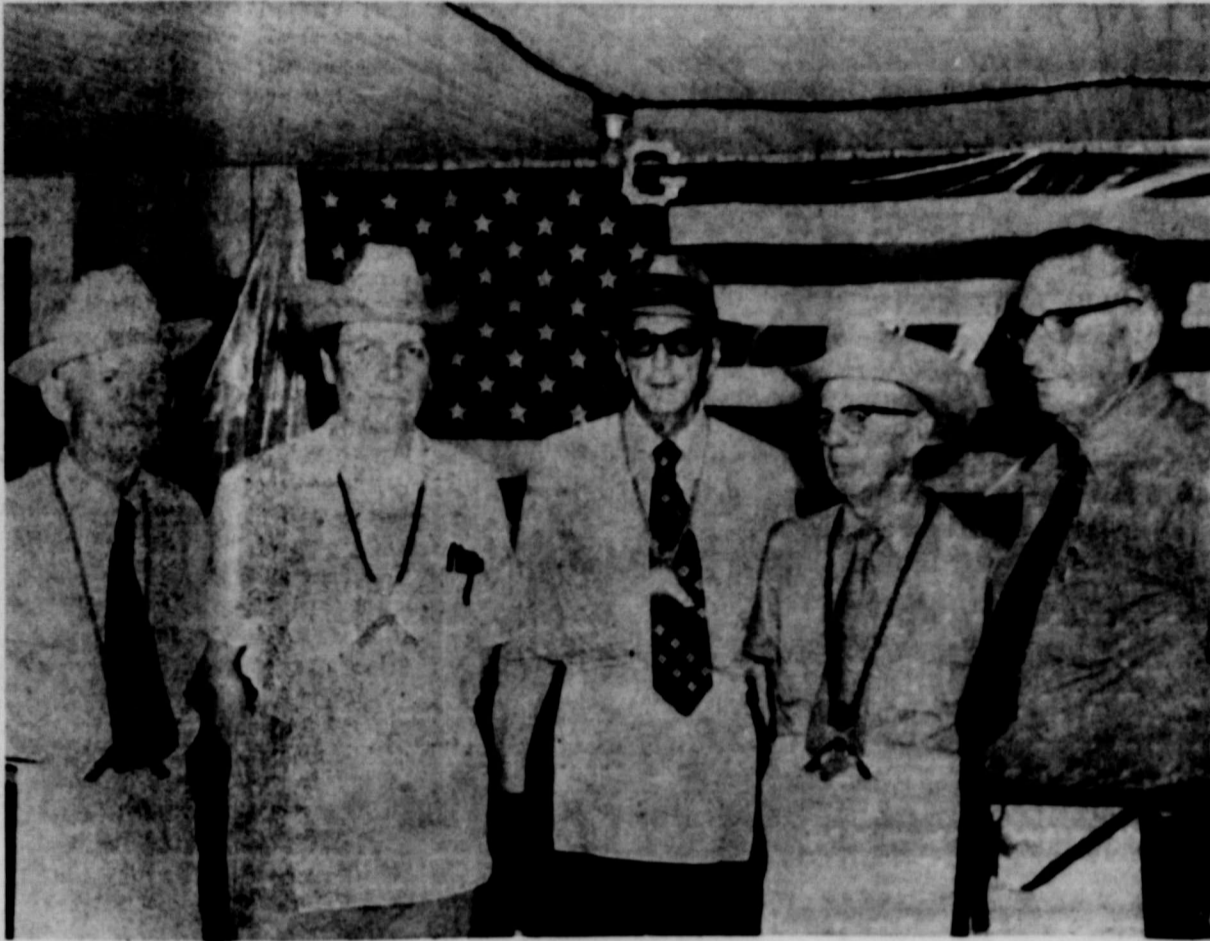

Bank to Observe Revised Hours

Officers of First National Bank are this week announcing new business hours for the local institution.

Floyd Clifton, President, said that effective July 6, First National will not open on Saturdays, but will remain open an extra one and a half hours on Friday afternoons.

Also announced was curtailment of bank holidays. Business hours at the local institution will remain the same Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., but on Friday the bank will be open from 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Clifton said that formerly the bank had observed 13 holidays annually, and this figure will be reduced to the seven mandatory holidays.

Willard Leach Cited For Role as Weather Watcher For WBAP

Willard Leach of Hico has been awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by Channel 5's chief meteorologist Harold Teft. The certificate was presented in recognition of Mr. Leach's services as a WBAP Weather Watcher for one year.

During this time he has compiled daily rainfall sheets that are then totaled monthly and sent to the station's meteorology department for tabulation. He additionally informs the Channel 5 Staff of any threatening or dangerous storms in the Hico area, thus providing Hico residents with up-to-the-minute conditions via WBAP-TV weather reports.

The Area 5 Weather Watchers, now numbering approximately 150, provide the only localized weather information in this area. Reports from these volunteers are the only record of precipitation for the smaller communities on file with any Dallas-Fort Worth television station.

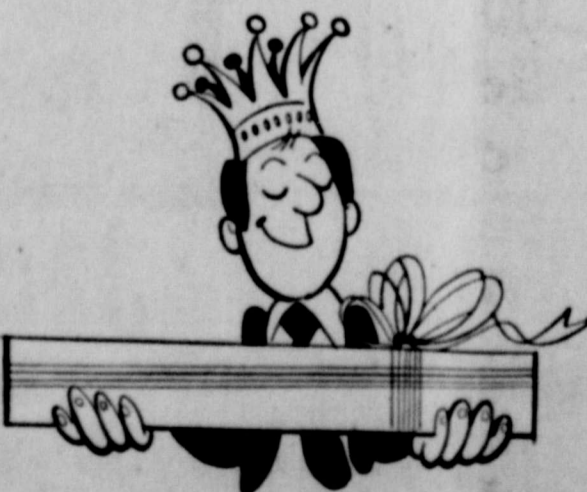



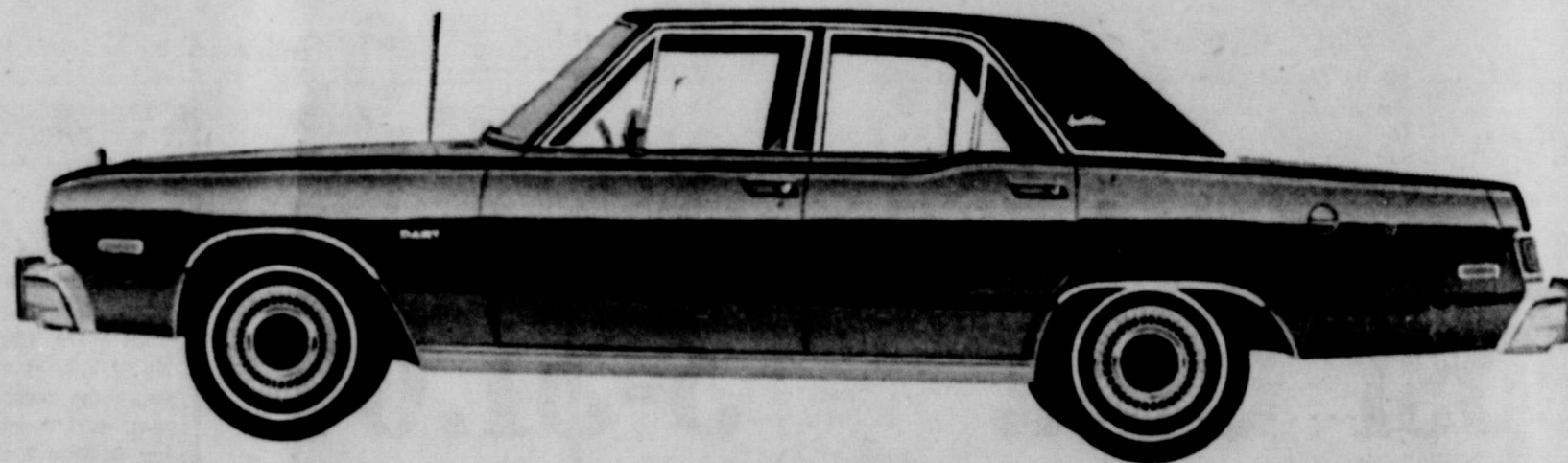
