Hico Native Named Winner of National Service Award

Station (Spl.)—Stanley F. Oakley of Sherman, Grayson County Extension agent for more than 10 years, has been named to receive the highest award given by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents — the Distinguished Service Award for 1974.

Oakley is a native of Hico, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Oakley.

Year staff member of the Agricultural Extension Service is one of seven county agents in the state to be recognized annually.

His award is presented annually to the county agents who have served for a period of 10 years or more and made outstanding contributions to agriculture and have improved rural living, according to County Agent Frank M. Stockton, president of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

The seven Texas winners will be recognized at the state association annual meeting Aug. 4-6 in Irving. Actual presentations will be made at the national meeting Oct. 20-24 in Tucson, Arizona.

"A spirit of understanding and cooperation has developed between the urban and rural segments of Grayson County as a result of Stanley F. Oakley's leadership," began his citation as prepared by the Recognition and Awards Committee of the state association. "He has boosted the county's agricultural industry through short courses, meetings and tours, giving special emphasis to small grains, sorghums, peanuts and beef cattle."

Oakley was also cited for his active interest in the youth of Grayson and his support of youth training programs and livestock shows, including the Texoma Exposition and Livestock Show.

The county agent is active in the Sherman Chamber of Commerce, is vice president of the Kiwanis Club, and is president of the Sherman Band Boosters.

Oakley holds a B.S. degree in horticulture from Texas A&M University, and has done work on a master's degree. He began his career with the Extension Service as an assistant county agent in Grayson where he served for more than three years before transferring to a similar position in Dallas County for four and a half years.

In 1890 the building of the All Souls Universalist Church was dedicated at Hico, and a Universalist Church in Reading, Pennsylvania sent the Hico Church a bell. The church in Pennsylvania would like to know what became of the bell? Perhaps an inquiry in the Hico News Review might bring an answer.

A have seen a few references to this church. The pastor in 1890 was Mrs. Mary C. Billings, who came to Texas from Illinois, according to Mr. Conger, who states that Mrs. Billings was a cousin to his father and that she died at Hico shortly after the turn of the century.

It seems to me that I have heard that the old Universalist Church building was later used by the Catholic Church at Hico and was situated on the hill near where the old Primitive Baptist Church was located some years ago. However, I am too vague to be sure of this. Any information would be appreciated.




