88th Reunion in Full Swing

Water Ban Still in Effect; Conditions Termed 'Better'

The city water situation, at the critical stage last week, has been alleviated to some extent, but is still not in adequate supply for officials to lift the watering ban.

The ban on outside watering was imposed last week by the City Council when tests showed that all three city wells were pumping sand.

W. R. Hampton, water superintendent, said Wednesday morning that the water level had risen some 30 feet since last Wednesday, but was still approximately 130 feet below normal level.

Residents received some relief from the watering ban last Friday when the area received around 1½ inches of rain. Light showers have also fallen during the week, cooling ground temperatures to an extent that lawns are not suffering for moisture at present time.

City officials were keeping a constant check on all three wells, and Hampton said that consumption had dropped enough to allow pumps to catch up. All storage facilities were full Wednesday morning.

"Get Happy '74" was the theme for the Wednesday parade which officially opened the 88th Annual Old Settlers Reunion, and a happy time it was as the usual throng of people lined the shaded side of Main Street to take in all the "doings."

While not as elaborate as some parades in past years, the 1974 edition was lengthy enough to keep the spectator's attention, and including preliminaries, the entire show took about one and a half hours.

Starting at 6 p.m., the Stephenville Senior Citizens Dixie Band performed for about 45 minutes, giving forth with their entertaining music, plus a square dance exhibition. Those in the crowd gave their approval of the entertainment by requesting additional numbers.

D. F. McCarty, a Hico native now of Abilene was principle speaker. McCarty, who is general manager of the Abilene Reporter-News, reminisced about his early days at the Reunion, and wished for Hico more Reunions in future years. He was introduced by O. L. Davis, Hico mayor.

The speaker, who is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. F. McCarty Sr., has been away from here for many years, but his enthusiasm was still evident for the old home town.

McCarty has long been known in Abilene circle as "Hico" McCarty, a name tag placed on many ex-Hicoans. His trade-mark is "Hico Will Shine Tonight," a song which was popular back in the days of his high school career, especially at athletic contests. As a complete surprise, two Abilene couples, Mr. and Mrs. Mack Epley and Mr. and Mrs. James Stowe, arrived in time for the parade with signs on either side of their car. "Hico McCarty, Abilene's Pride and Joy Shines Tonight."

The parade was led off by one of the Fire Department trucks, and was followed by several units from Fort Hood and the 1st Cavalry Division Band. Funeral services for Ted J. D. Roberson, 64, were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday morning in the funeral home, with the Fleet Reunion Association presiding. Funeral services for Mr. Roberson were held in the Cage-Mills Evangelical Chapel in Corpus Christi.

Mr. Roberson passed away Friday at the Naval Air Station hospital in Corpus following illness.

Mr. Roberson was born in Herald, Texas June 12, 1910, is the son of Mrs. Effie Roberson and the late A. Roberson of Hico.

He resided in Corpus Christi for the last 22 years. He entered the military in 1929 and retired in 1956 after 26 years of service. During his military career he was a prisoner of war for four years in World War II. He was a Chief Boatswain Mate, and in his retirement, he went to work as a fire inspector at the Naval Station in Corpus until 1968. He was a member of the Reserve Association B.R. 94 and the Christian and VFW Post 1, and Masonic Lodge of Hico.

His survivors include his wife, Mrs. M. Roberson of Corpus Christi; his mother, Mrs. Effie Roberson of Hico; one daughter, Janice Dreyer of Houston; one son, John Roberson of Corpus Christi; three sisters, Mrs. Nona Dean of Cisco, Mrs. Nell Strassburg of Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Allyne Meroney of San Angelo.
