Unlike the present housing project, the newest program would be privately owned and operated, with financing being made through Farmers Home Administration.

shows the need exists for this type of housing here. The units would vary in size, depending on the results of the survey.

Teacher In-Service Training Slated All Next Week

Hico Schools will begin Monday, August 19, with teachers reporting August 12 for a week of in-service training.

Pre-registration for High School and Kindergarten students will be Friday, August 16.

August 12 will begin with a general faculty meeting at 9 a.m. Tuesday the Cooperative In-Service meetings will begin with the teachers meeting in Hamilton that day, in Gatesville on Wednesday, Lampasas Thursday, and a general meeting here Friday.

Mrs. Barbara Harmon of Bluff Dale was hired as kindergarten teacher at a called meeting of the board last Friday. She replaces Mrs. Frances Brown, who resigned and plans to move to Floresville. Mrs. Harmon has a B.S. Degree from Tarleton State University, with kindergarten option. She did her practice teaching in the local elementary school in the first grade and kindergarten during the Spring semester.

In connection with the opening of school, buses will run on regular schedule and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

Parents of kindergarten children and students entering Hico Schools for the first time should bring health records when registering.

Senate Bill 27 is now in effect and requires that all children entering Texas Elementary or Secondary Schools must have been immunized against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis and rubella. The only students exempt from these immunizations are those presenting a statement signed by a medical doctor stating that the immunizations would be injurious to the student's health, or an affidavit signed by the parent or guardian stating that the religious beliefs of the student prevent his having immunizations.

A complete list of faculty members and other information will be published next week.

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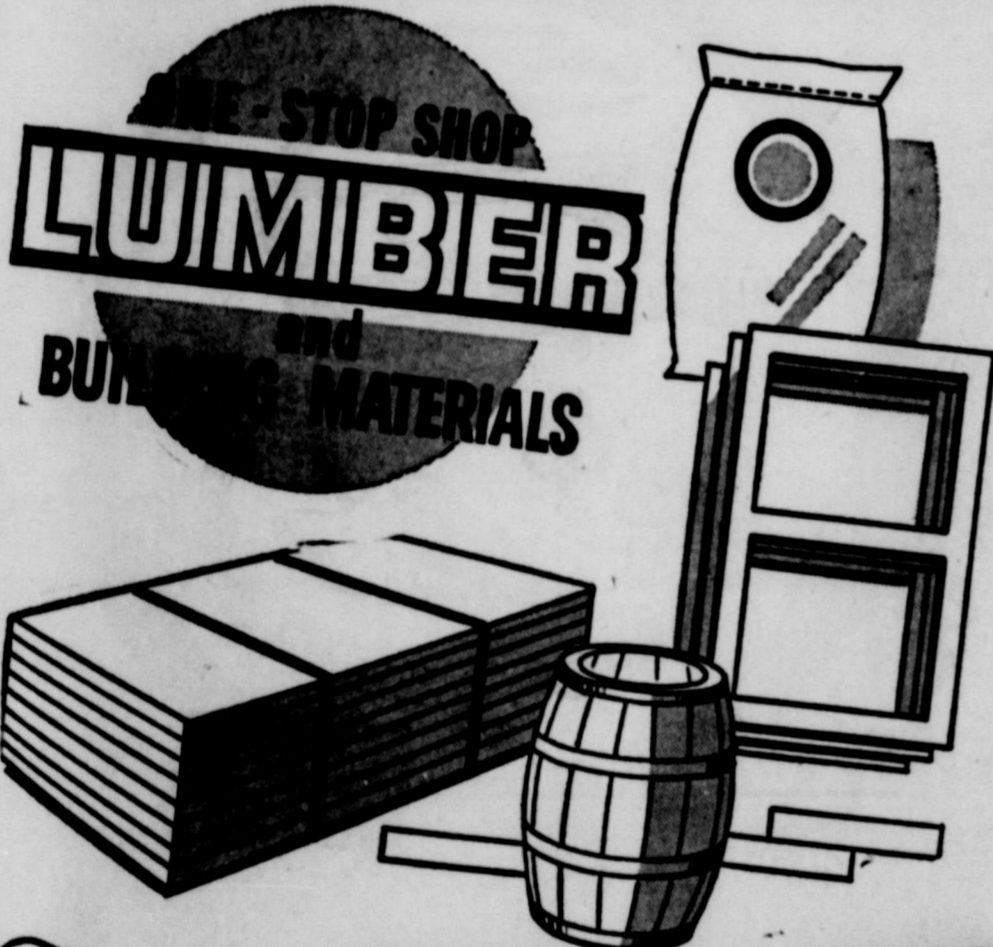

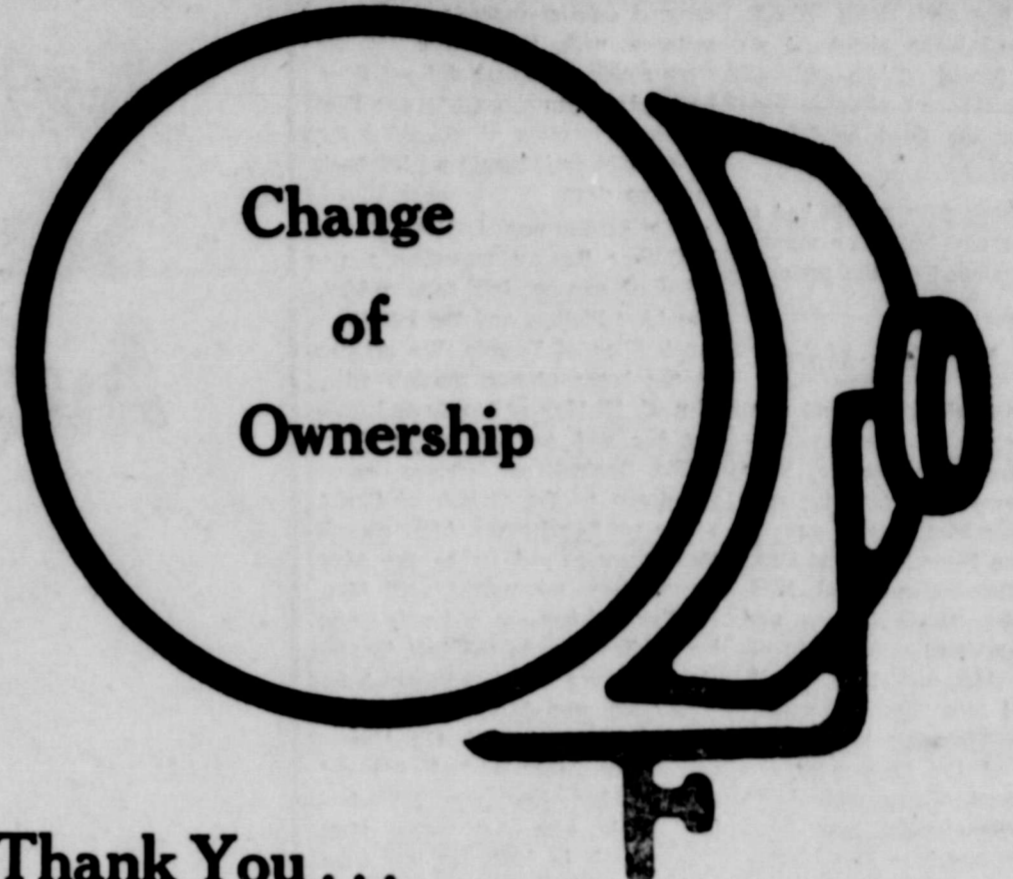

In 1909 our late husband and I accompanied our parents, the W. T. Newmans in their canopy top survey, taking lunch and supper. We ate our lunch, leaving enough for supper. Our husband and I had our wedding pictures made at Wise-man's while in town to save an extra drive. My husband folded his coat and put it under the back seat by the lunch box. When we went back the food had been eaten and the coat stolen. It was an expensive trip for us as 1909 was a hard dry year, no grain or corn made. However cotton made good that fall. Then there were two Fairy girls who had worked hard hoeing for the public to buy material to make new dresses for the reunion. They had camped on the grounds, and their suitcase with those new dresses were stolen. But they did get them back when they showed up one Sunday at a meeting at the old Fairy tabernacle. So it wasn't all fun back in those days.

This scribe was in Moody and McGregor Sunday attending a reunion of our cousin's family, Mrs. Ora May Phillips and the late Walter Phillips of Temple. We arrived at the home of our cousin's wife, Mrs. C. H. May of Moody and finding her and another cousin, Mrs. Hallie Robinett of Houston. gone, we drove to the Church of Christ where we found them. Older Americans are developing a complex and rewarding new lifestyle for themselves, with the co-

operation of their families. Unlike in the 1950's, older persons are no longer called "ex-family" or "displaced" family members.

Younger people aren't remaining indifferent to older Americans and their families. They seem to realize that all human beings need emotional support.

Older persons, in fact, require more than younger persons to face such crisis as children leaving home, retirement from employment, and widowhood.

More and more families are realizing that adult children and their children offer older Americans the greatest emotional support these days.

Current lifestyles reflect realization that grandchildren, or great-grandchildren, establish a bond of common interest between young and older families. Because of this, it's an auspicious time for the many new relationships that are developing as part of a fresh lifestyle for older Americans.

Among these, the most common is the active relationship between grandparent and grandchild.

Many grandparents indicate they want to enjoy and associate with their grandchildren, contributing more than baby-sitting services to the family. However, they don't want to be exploited in the process.

As another facet of their new lifestyles, modern grandparents are abandoning the role of the ultimate authority and assuming the role of companionship. Although there are still the rigid disciplinarians, and over-indulgent, over-protective grandparents, many are finding the role of companionship most enjoyable, as do their grandchildren. This reflects a sort of mutual
