Local Schools Set For Monday Start

Full House Expected

With a complete faculty and auxiliary personnel, and a refurbished plant, everything is in readiness for the opening of the 1974-75 school term, set Monday morning, Aug. 19 when the usual general assembly will be held.

First day students will go through a complete schedule, with classes dismissed at 2:30 on Monday. After that, classes will start at 8:45 and dismissal is 3:30 p.m.

Pre-registration for high school and kindergarten students will be held this Friday, Aug. 16, starting at 9 a.m.

Most of the faculty members are returnees from last year, but some have been shifted to new duties for the start of the new term.

Lunch prices will be 40c for kindergarten through the fifth grade, and 45c for sixth through 12th. Extra milk will be 7c until further notice.

Lunchroom policy for the new school year will be the same as in previous years. Students will be allowed to charge lunches for a period of one week if desired. Those wishing to charge for a longer period of time must have authorization from the Superintendent's office.

The free and reduced price lunch policy will remain in effect, and each student will be given an application.

New Classrooms

Two classes, the seventh and eighth, will be using the new classrooms for the first time this year. The addition was completed at the end of the spring semester, and only usage thus far was the reception for the eighth grade graduating class. The modern new facilities add much to the local plant.

Assembly Open to Everyone

Supt. Walker has issued an invitation to everyone to attend the school-opening assembly Monday morning. From all indications, a record number of students could enroll for the first day of school.

City Marshal Bob Cavitt this week issued an appeal to motorists to exercise added caution during the opening weeks of school.

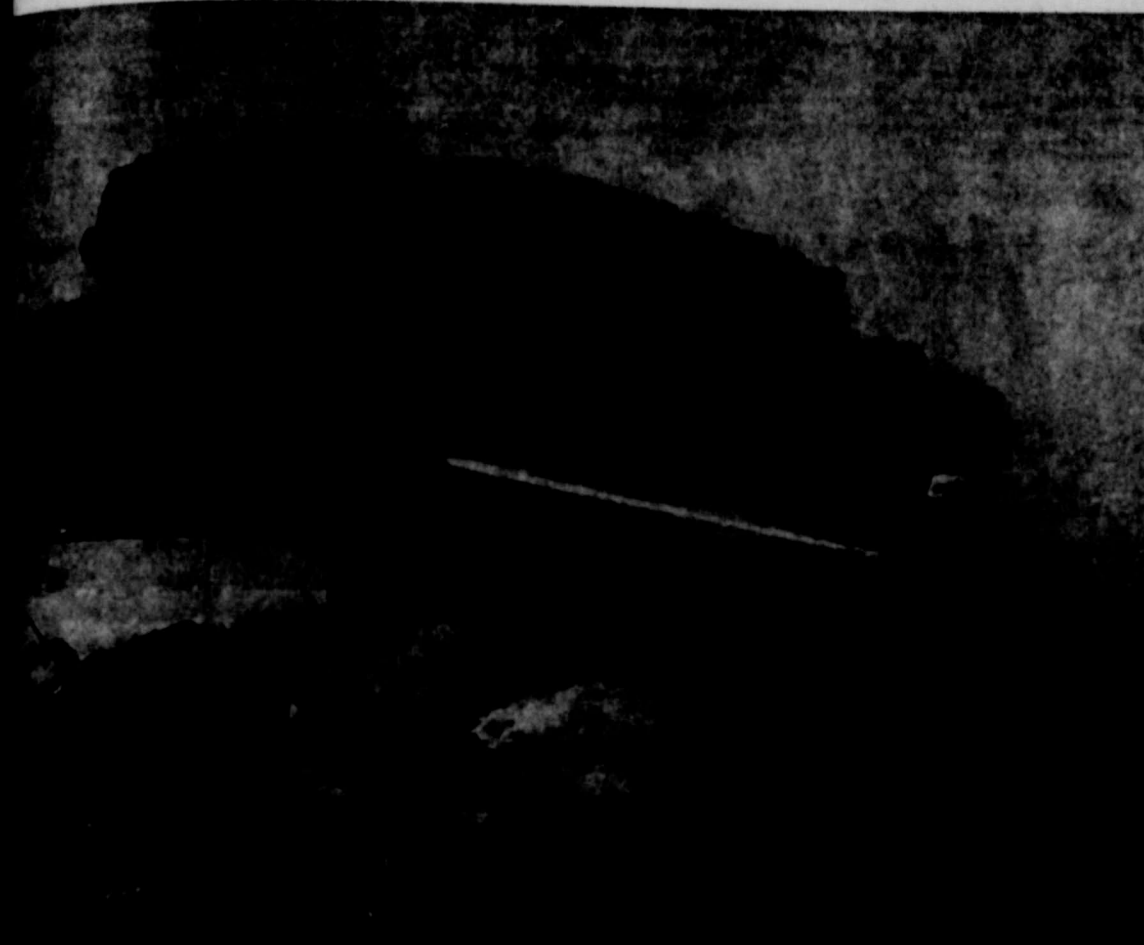
Cavitt reminded motorists that the speed limit in the area is 20 miles per hour, and said that officers would make regular patrols around the school.

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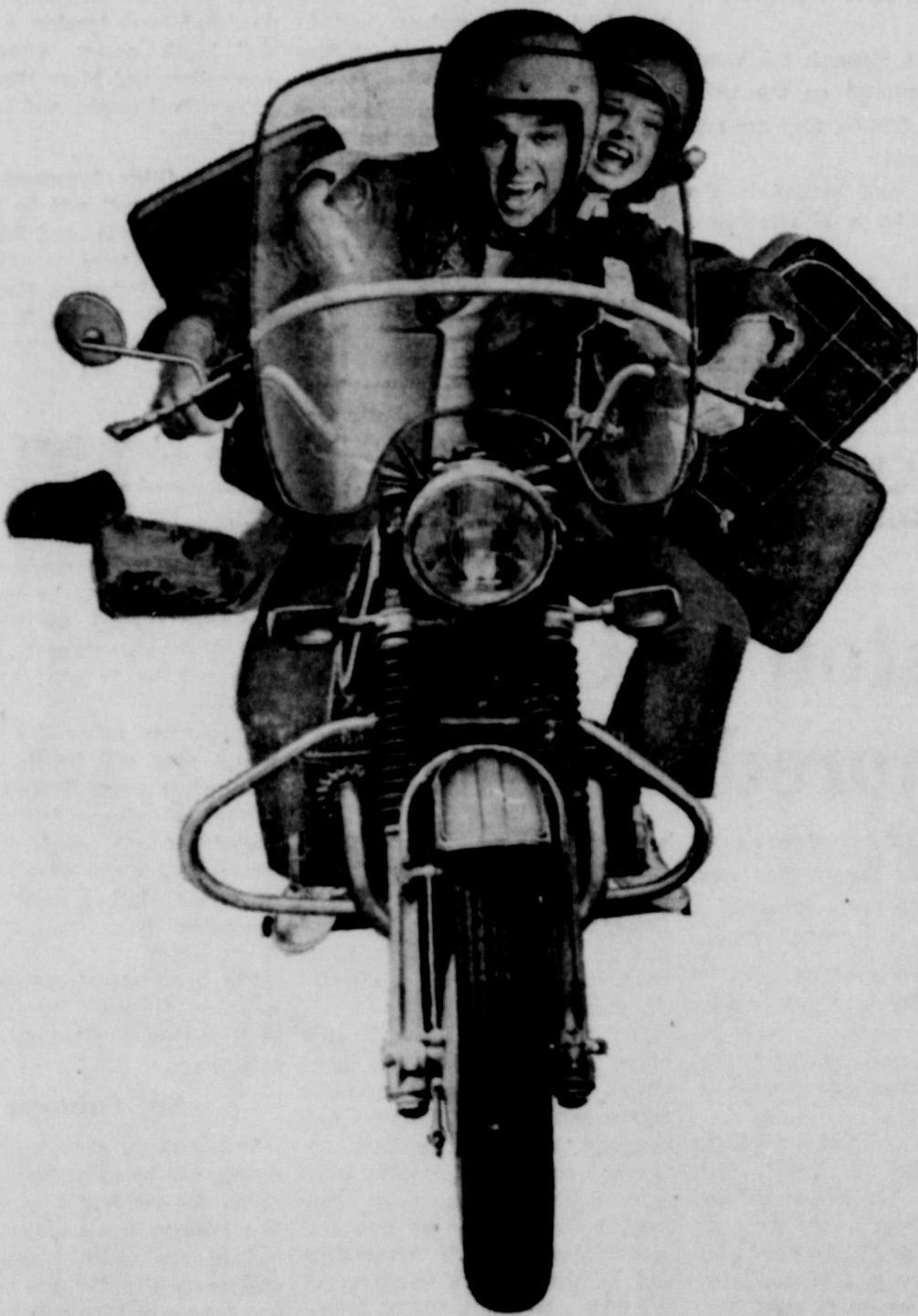

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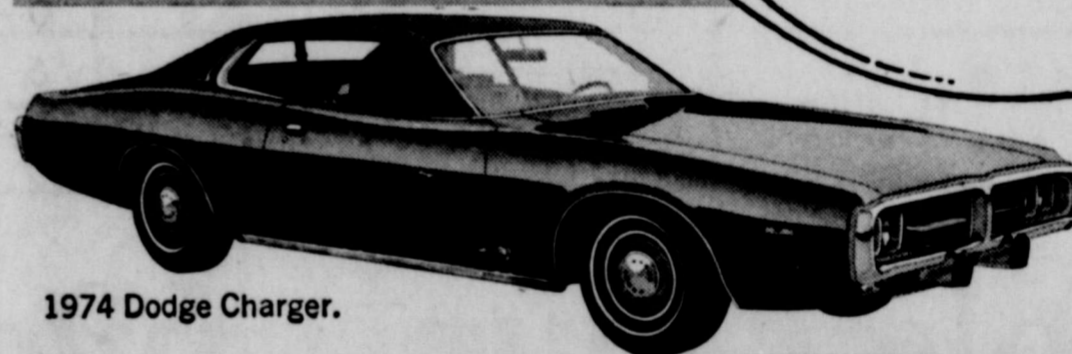

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COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Anaplasmosis is a continuing problem in Texas cattle.

Anaplasmosis is an infectious blood disease of cattle which constitutes a serious threat to the health and well-being of Texas livestock. It is caused by one-celled parasites in the blood stream which attacks and destroys the red blood cells, resulting in anemia and sometimes death. The disease does not affect humans.

Symptoms of the disease are similar to some other cattle diseases. They include anemia, a yellow appearance of the skin and mucus membranes, difficulty in breathing, dehydration and constipation. Affected animals may become excited and death can occur 24 hours after symptoms are first noticed.

Anaplasmosis is less serious in young cattle. However unless adequately treated, cattle of any age that recover from the disease usually become carriers for life and can spread the disease.

The disease is one of the most costly in beef cattle in this country. Some 50,000 to 100,000 cattle die of it each year. The beef cattle industry suffers an estimated \$100 million loss annually due to livestock deaths and decreases in beef

and cattle production. The disease has been a problem in large sections of the U.S. for many years and may continue to spread from the increased transportation of "carrier" cattle to previously uninfected areas.

Anaplasmosis is spread by insects and ticks or by man through careless use of instruments used in dehorning, castrating and vaccinating.

For an animal to become infected, the parasite must be introduced directly into the bloodstream. It is not spread by contact or by the feces or urine of sick or carrier animals.

Two tests are commonly used to diagnose anaplasmosis. Both require blood samples and are best performed in the laboratory. One is called the complement fixation (CF) test and the other the rapid card test. The rapid card test should

become available for veterinary use in the field in the near future. If so, the test can then be done on the ranch and the results made available within a short time after the sample is drawn. Presently, the tests can be done at the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory for those ranchers who want to determine which animals are carriers of anaplasmosis.

Currently, control is up to the individual. There are basically four types of control.

The test and segregate program consists of testing the herd and separating the infected animals from those not infected. This works well for the herd owner who has a small turnover.

The test and treat program involves adding chlortetracycline to the feed of infected animals at 5 milligrams per pound of body weight for 60 days.

On the Home Range

Keeping cut flowers attractive for the longest time is a challenge many home gardeners face. Certain steps will prolong life of cut flowers, whether homegrown or from a florist. Here are some suggestions to maximize cut flower beauty:

For best results, cut flowers in early morning or late afternoon.

Select flowers not fully open, avoid cutting old ones. Remove foliage from lower third of stem, along with all broken and bruised parts.

If possible, wash flowers and foliage to remove dirt, sprays and dust. Also store cut flowers in a cool area or refrigerator until arranged. Cut stems on a slant, using a sharp knife or shears.

Before using a container for an arrangement, make sure it's washed clean with soap and water.

When receiving bulk flowers from a florist, recut ends of stems about one inch above original cut.

Don't place an arrangement in direct sun, near gas fires or oil

burners. When possible, place in a cool area during the night, but not where drafts may occur. Change the water of an arrangement and re-cut stems to give them longer life. Use warm, but not hot, water.

A very weak lemonade solution, lemon juice, sugar and water, helps extend life of cut flowers. Aspirin and copper pennies, on the other hand, are useless as flower preservatives.

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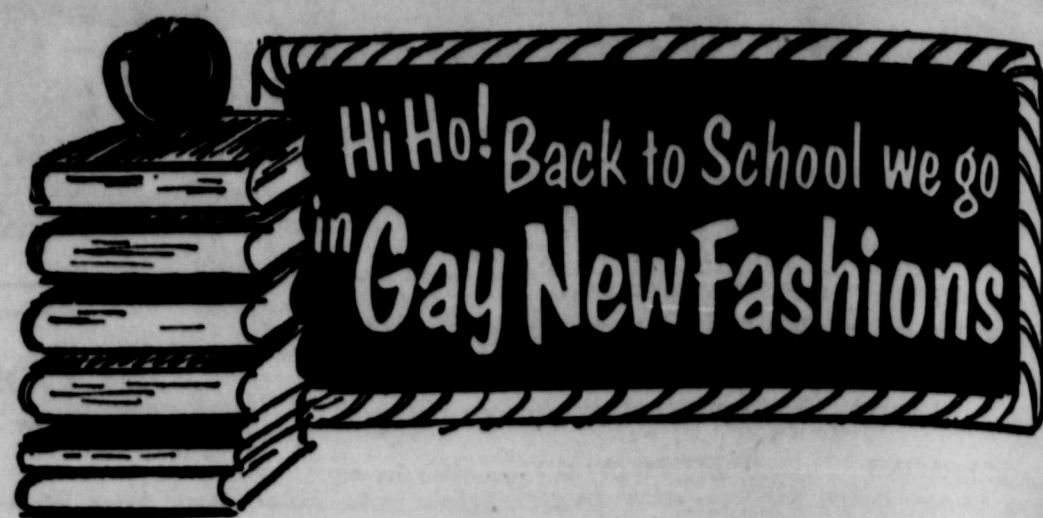
