Driver Injured in Tuesday Night Truck Accident

The driver of a truck, owned by Alton Gromatzky of Hamilton, lost control of the vehicle on rain-slick Highway 281 one mile south of Olin Tuesday night about 7:30, causing the truck to leave the highway and uproot a tree.

The driver was thrown from the truck, and was conveyed to the Hamilton Hospital by Barrow-Rutledge ambulance. He was later transferred to a Waco hospital. Extent of his injuries was unknown.

Bob Cavitt of Hico, who investigated the accident, said the truck was a complete loss.

Former Iredell Man Honored in Dallas

Dwane R. Barr, formerly of Iredell, has been selected as Officer of the Month for August by the Dallas Police Community Awards Committee. He and his wife, Bobbie, were honored by the Kiwanis Club at noon August 13 at the Dallas Athletic Club.

As Officer of the Month he is eligible for consideration for the Officer of the Year honor.

In nominating Barr for the award his supervisor, Sgt. E. R. Walt, cited Barr's dedication and conscientiousness in his work. "He applies himself diligently to the task of keeping his beat free of crime. In order to do this, Officer Barr has spent a great deal of time and effort in learning knowledgeable facts of the place, persons, and situations of crime on his beat."

"Perhaps the best evidence of this is the fact that there is hardly a burglar or a thief in the area that Officer Barr does not know personally or who is not well aware of Officer Barr's presence," Sgt. Walt continued.

FHA Guarantees Emergency Livestock, Poultry Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available next week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration, a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

George E. Krupala, FHA County Supervisor, said the agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans

made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers. Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for six months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Mr. Krupala said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable in 1 to 3 years, although renewal for two years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Mr. Krupala said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation, and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production.

FHA guarantees will be made only when the bonafide farmer or rancher cannot obtain financing without a guarantee. Loans may not be used to expand operations. Mr. Krupala said the county FHA office serving the area where the borrower's livestock or poultry operations are conducted will handle requests from lenders for guarantees, or supply information on the loan guarantee program.

MAST Will Begin Operations Sept. 1

(Spl.)—MAST, Military Assistance to Safety and Traffic program will become operative in Texas Sept. 1. This announcement was made last week at meeting of the program coordinating committee. Alan Pixon of Hico is chairman.

Fort Hood will supply six helicopters, headquartered at Robert Gray Army Airfield, for this service. One crew will be on 24-hour alert, with a second crew on a one-hour notice.

MAST will serve a 36-county area within a 100-mile radius of Fort Hood. Hamilton County is included in the program.

The counties in the area to be serviced all have designated landing spaces and some have constructed helipads.

MAST operation will provide airlift assistance in moving patients from accident scene and from hospital to home. Equipment and personnel also be airlifted if needed.

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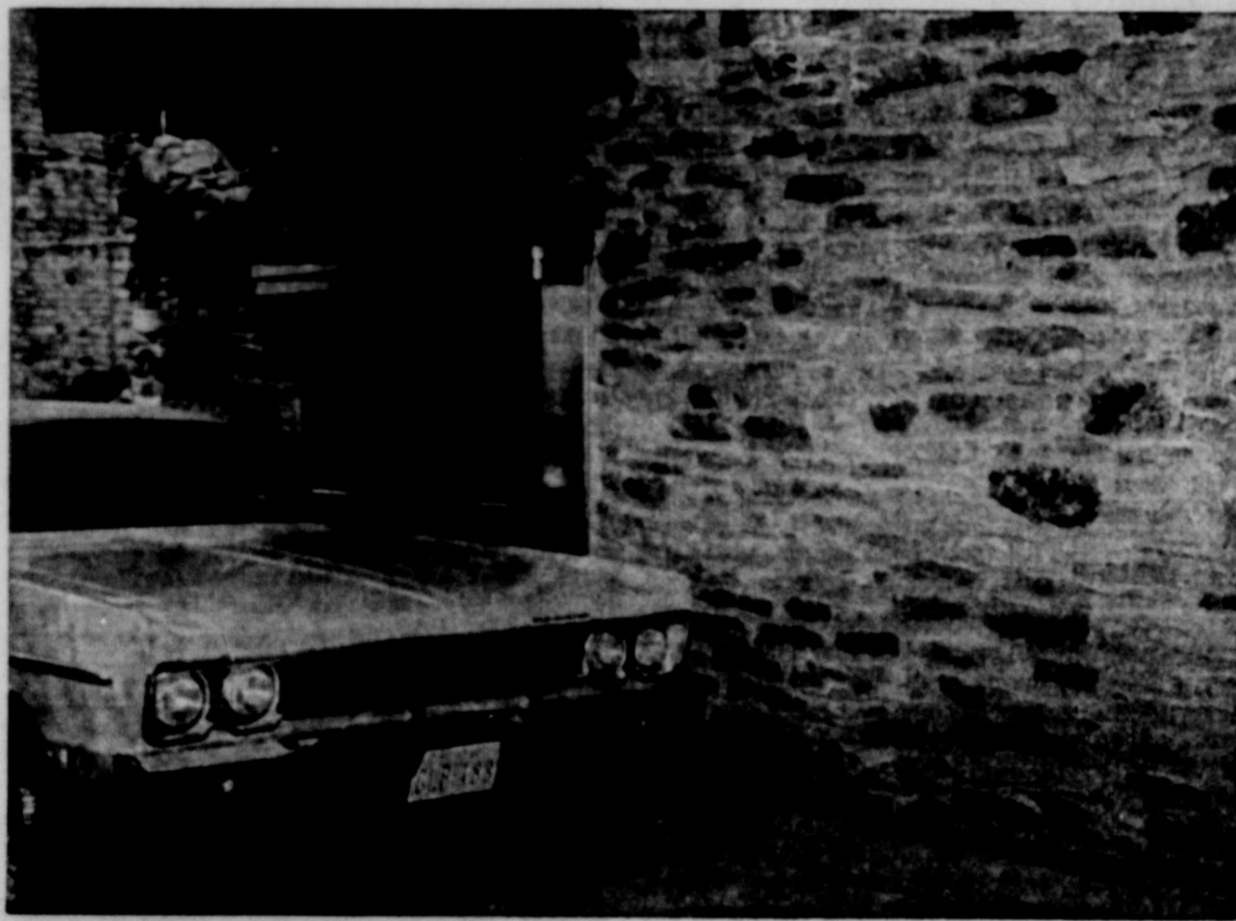

On the Home Range

That "good, homecooked meal" may not always be so good for you. Food poisoning originating in family kitchens—often written off as "something I ate disagreed with me"—is a widespread problem.

Food poisoning usually results from eating meat or poultry with gravies or sauces that have been cooked and held for some time before serving.

Symptoms of the illness are abdominal cramps, diarrhea, occasionally nausea but rarely fever or vomiting. The symptoms usually appear 4-22 hours after eating and may persist for one to five days. This type of food poisoning can be prevented by holding the cooked

meat about 140 degrees, or 45 degrees.

Refrigerate cooked meats promptly if they are to be eaten. Reheat them to 165 degrees if they are to be eaten warm. Once heated, the food should be immediately or kept hot until eaten.

Accessories are the spice wardrobe's life, one of the easiest ways to extend a wardrobe.

Carefully gathered, a collection of jewelry, scarves, belts, handbags and shoes can give most limitless variety to a few outfits.

Consider your accessories to determine its usefulness. Are you using every item to its best capacity?

Try new combinations, now to wear a scarf, a pin, a bracelet and chains.

When you shop, think in terms of multiple use for everything you buy.

When you try on a garment, try on all the accessories you wear with it. If you don't like the way the total outfit looks, give up.

It's often not worth saving clothing that requires a complete new set of accessories to make you feel happy in it.

Non-matching separates look for each other if you wear them with matching accessories—belt, beads, handbag and hat.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

A fall garden can provide vegetables that are less costly, fresher and often more nutritious than those you buy.

Many vegetables that do not grow satisfactorily during the late spring and summer are better adapted for fall and early winter production in all but the colder areas of Texas. By starting with transplants now, warm season vegetables such as tomatoes, eggplant and peppers can be grown with reasonable success for harvest, especially when the plants are protected from the first killing frost.

If you still have live tomato plants left from the spring that show signs of new growth, rejuvenate them rather than starting from transplants. Cut off all the old stems above the new growth. Spray the stems and new growth with a fungicide, such as maneb, and an insecticide, especially a miticide such as dicofol for spider mites. Keep the plants watered and fertilize them with about one tablespoon of a balanced fertilizer per plant once a week for three or four weeks.

August and early September is the time to make the last planting of summer squash and cucumbers for slicing and pickling.

Green beans planted during August or early September usually produce the highest quality for freezing and canning, since the harvest occurs during cooler weather when the fiber content is low.
