Hamilton Favored to Cop County Championship

Hico's Tigers, facing a double tough schedule in the next eleven weeks, lift the lid on the 1974 football campaign Friday night with an 8 o'clock joustle with the Hamilton Bulldogs.

The Friday opener for both teams, to be played at Hamilton, will be the "rubber" match in modern series, with Hico owning the first victory, in 1972, by a 20-6 margin, and Hamilton coming back for a 26-7 win over the Tigers last year.

Hamilton could possibly be the most formidable foe on the Tiger slate this year, and former Hico coach Ed Pettit may have the best team in the making that he has had in his three years at the county seat. Pettit has a veteran backfield with plenty of savvy to go with an adequate line, and the Dogs could out-strip the 5-5 record of a year ago. The Bulldogs lost around 20 seniors from last year's squad, but they return with adequate experience and some outstanding personnel to start the '74 campaign.

On the other side, Hico has a new coach, a new offense, and a possible starting team of 11 seniors. Jackie Bullion is the new coach, and the new offense is the straight "T" formation. The eleven seniors are Joe Harris, Edd LeFevre, Roy Lesley, Ron Lowery, Walter Lucas, Buddy Mayfield, David Ogle, Loyd Roberson, Charles Roberts, Barry Ross and Byron Rumph. A junior, Eddie Needham, will bump someone from the senior list, as he is slated for starting duty on both offense and defense.

Following the Hamilton tilt, the Tigers will travel to Meridian the following week for a game with the always powerful Class B Yellowjackets. The Tigers' first home game is Sept. 20 with Dublin.

Both Hico and Hamilton have been engaged in two pre-season scrimmages, but the Bulldogs have come out on the long end of the score in both of their contests. They overwhelmed Whitney, a future Tiger opponent, and then took the measure of Dublin.

Hico's A team broke even with Evant, and won their last session with Godley. Both are Class B schools.

In the Friday session with Godley, Hico failed to get anything going in the first two periods, but after the B team came off the field with a 2-0 lead, the first-teamers went to work and showed a tremendous turn-around from their initial effort.

City Council Lifts Water Ban, Discuss Traffic Safety

Two major items of discussion occupied most of the three-hour City Council meeting Monday night, foremost being the current water situation and long range plans for updating the present system. The other topic was traffic safety.

Water Supt. W. R. Hampton told Council members that the water level in two of the city wells had risen to just slightly below the normal level, but the new well was still low.

Acting on Hampton's information, Council lifted the ban on outside watering, and asked for cooperation of all residents in conserving water usage as much as possible. The ban had been in effect since

the first of August. The city governing body said that if water consumption became too great, the ban would be imposed again.

City Marshal Bob Cavitt gave Council members his monthly report. Cavitt asked that the Council consider purchasing a radar unit for the patrol car, and also asked the group to set a speed limit for Main Street. After much discussion of the radar, Council members said they would contact Central Texas Council of Government to see if financial aid was available for purchase of traffic safety devices.

On the issue of a speed limit for Main Street, members authorized an ordinance specifying a 10-mile-per-hour limit on Main and all

intersecting streets except the highway.

Cavitt explained to Council members that the suggestions for the radar unit and the new speed limit were not made in order to write more traffic citations, but more for safety reasons.

Other action by the Council was appointment of Bruce Slaughter to the City Hospital Board. He will serve the unexpired term of J. B. Woodard, who resigned in June. The term expires in June, 1977.

Fire hazards and the safety conditions of some downtown buildings were discussed; some tree trimming was suggested for traffic safety; and the remainder of the session was spent on discussion of a new water well and additional storage facilities.

'Careful Shooting' Urged by Telephone Company Manager

Now that the hunting season is underway, Gulf States-United Telephone Co. has issued a plea for "careful shooting" by hunters near telephone equipment.

Tom Venable, local manager for the company, pointed out there have been several instances recently of gunfire damage to telephone equipment in the Hico area, and said that even the smallest shot can cut a wire, shatter an insulator, or otherwise disrupt telephone service.

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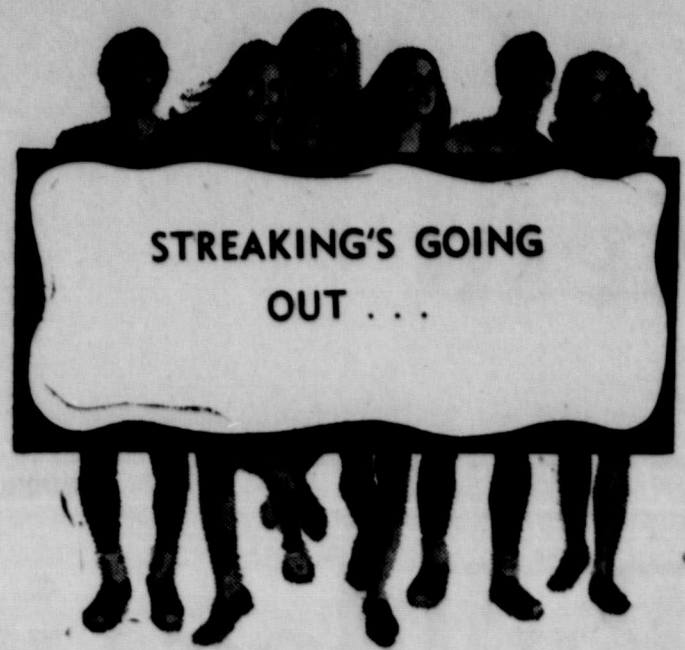

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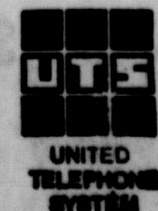
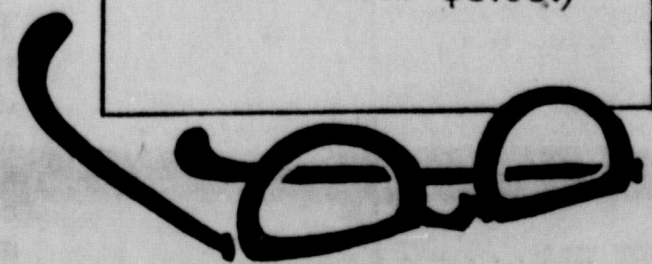

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On the Home Range

Today's casual jackets need a "finishing touch" to make them as attractive on the inside as the outside.

For a "completed" look, finish all raw edges attractively, using one of many techniques.

One way to finish a seam, hem or facing on knit or stretch fabric is to bind it. Using double fold tape, pin the wider half of the tape to the wrong side. Stitch through all thicknesses from the right side.

Or, cut a true bias strip one inch wide from a lining fabric and use it instead of tape.

With right sides of seam allowance and bias strip together, stitch bias strip to seam allowance, making one-eighth inch seam. Then turn bias strip to the wrong side of the seam allowance, encasing it with the strip.

Stitch again in groove of original stitching line. Finally, trim away excess bias strip.

Another attractive finish utilizes stretch lace, which is ideal for knits and woven fabrics that tend to ravel.

Using this method, fold lace in half to encase the seam. On hems

or facings, apply lace flat—it isn't necessary to encase them with lace.

A different type of seam also can improve a garment's overall appearance. For example, French seams make a neat appearance when using sheer fabric such as chiffon, lace, voile or eyelet.

Refined peanut oil, one of the best cooking oils known to domestic sciences, is widely used for deep fat frying in the food industry.

The high smoke point and flavor of refined peanut oil are two reasons for its use by the food industry.

At the same time, however, homemakers traditionally haven't used it.

Defining smoke point, it is the lowest temperature at which an oil decomposes to produce smoke. Peanut oil's smoke point is 460-470 degrees, which means it can be heated to this temperature before it will smoke, making it a good cooking oil, especially for frying.

It also can be used successfully in fondues, for frying donuts, meat pies or fried pies.

Turning to flavor, the nutty, pleasing flavor and the amber color of the oil is dependent upon the variety of peanut, growth conditions and refining process. Some peanut oils of good quality may be slightly darker in appearance.

Substitution of this oil in any recipe specifying a melted shortening assures excellent results.

Certain salad dressing and pastries take on unique flavors when made with peanut oil. They include, for example, oil and vinegar dressing, and peanut butterscotch squares.

Also recipes specifying olive oil are equally as tasty when peanut oil is used.

Peanut oil is termed very stable, meaning it will store at room temperature for considerable periods of time.

Noting that peanut oil is almost 97.3 percent digestible by man, one tablespoon, or 14 grams, of the oil contains 124 calories, 14 grams of fat and 7.3 grams of polyunsaturated fatty acids.

With basic changes in practices, consumers can cut home energy consumption. Refrigerators and freezers will require less energy if the consumer will:

Defrost the refrigerator when ice coating is one-fourth inch thick; have closed door seals so tight that a strip of paper won't pull through; allow for free air circulation in the refrigerator, and, turn control to a colder setting when storing large amounts of food, then return setting to normal after food has

chilled.

Laundry equipment will require less energy if the consumer will: set water level and temperature correctly for size and type of load; adjust wash cycle length for clothes that are only slightly soiled; avoid over-drying clothes, remove them from dryer with a little moisture;

be sure dryer venting has no obstructions, and keep lint filter clean.

Dishwashers will conserve energy if the consumer will: avoid over-rinsing dishes before placing them in the appliance; and use dish-washing cycle recommended for type of load being washed.

Ranges and cooking appliances will cut energy use if the consumer will: be sure the flame is blue when using gas, since a yellow flame indicates waste; keep oven vents clean and open to allow efficient heat circulation; and, start on high heat and reduce to the lowest possible setting for cooking.

So, clearing the yard of leaves not only helps its appearance and is important for good grass growth, but recycling the leaves makes good use of a valuable natural resource.

Farmers and ranchers may be a little reluctant to apply adequate amounts of expensive fertilizer to their pastures. Yet, there are some good reasons for fertilizing.

First of all, fertilizer improves the quality and amount of forage produced on pastures. This, in turn leads to more nutritious grazing for livestock and better livestock performance. Livestock prefer to graze fertilized pastures, so forage consumption is increased along with the amount of beef produced per acre.

Fertilizer also helps pasture grasses to better tolerate dry weather. Where rainfall is limited, this is especially important.

Grasses that receive proper fertilization will develop better root systems and can thereby compete favorably with weeds for moisture and nutrients. Weeds tend to infest those pastures where fertilization

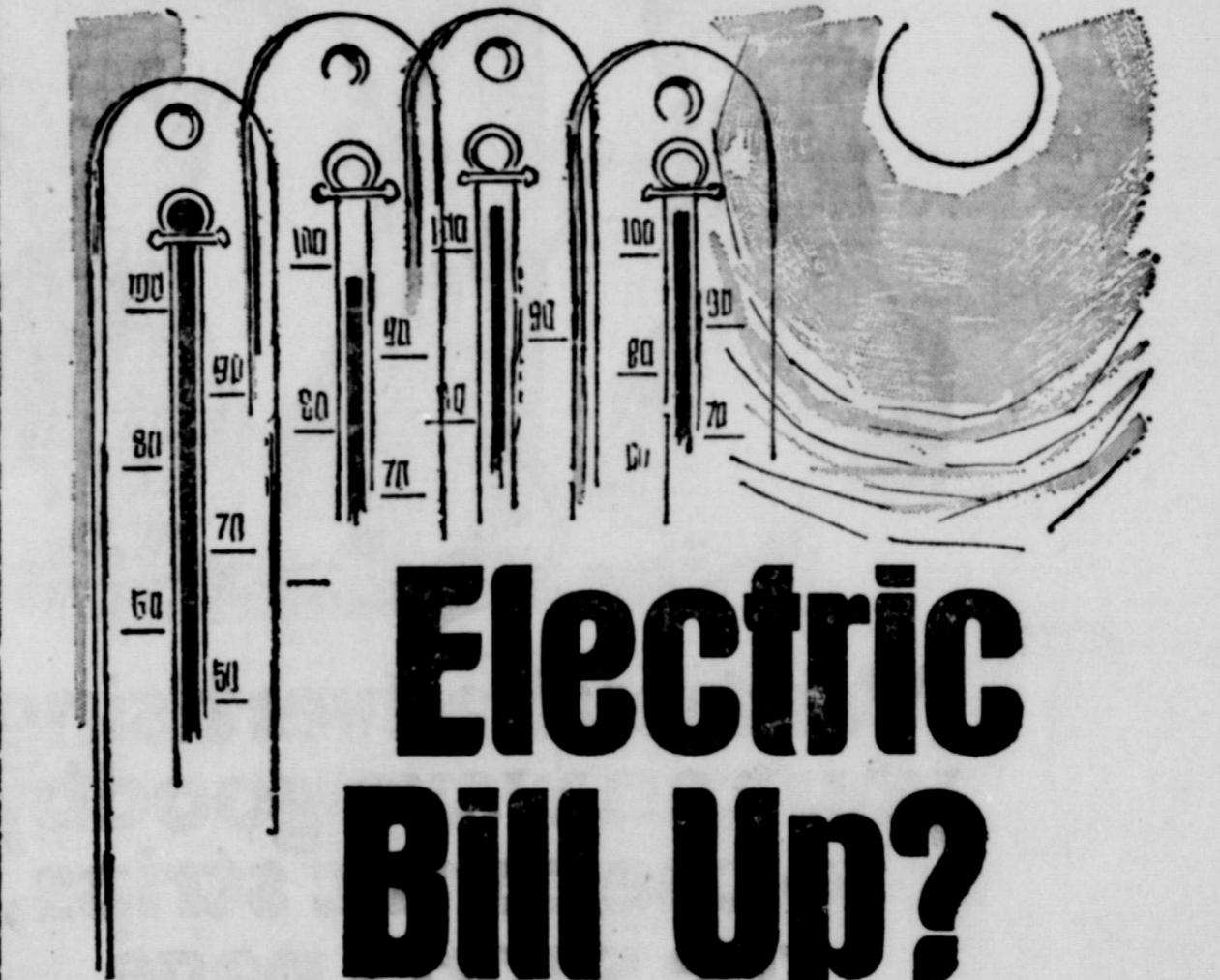
is inadequate.

Farmers and ranchers need to develop long range plans for their pastures. Such plans should include investments in fertilizer, hay harvesting, livestock, and other inputs. Budgets should show estimated expenses and returns for each acre of pasture.

In developing these long range plans, producers should study the results of numerous tests and demonstrations on pasture and hay production, weed control and grass varieties. Many of these are conducted each year throughout the state, and published results are available at the County Extension Office.

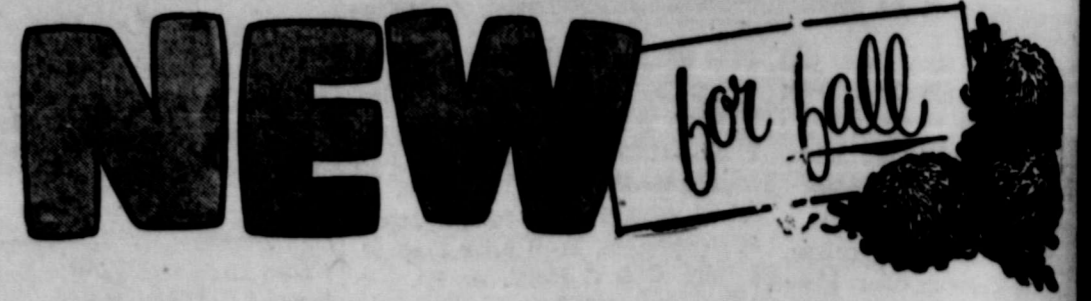
