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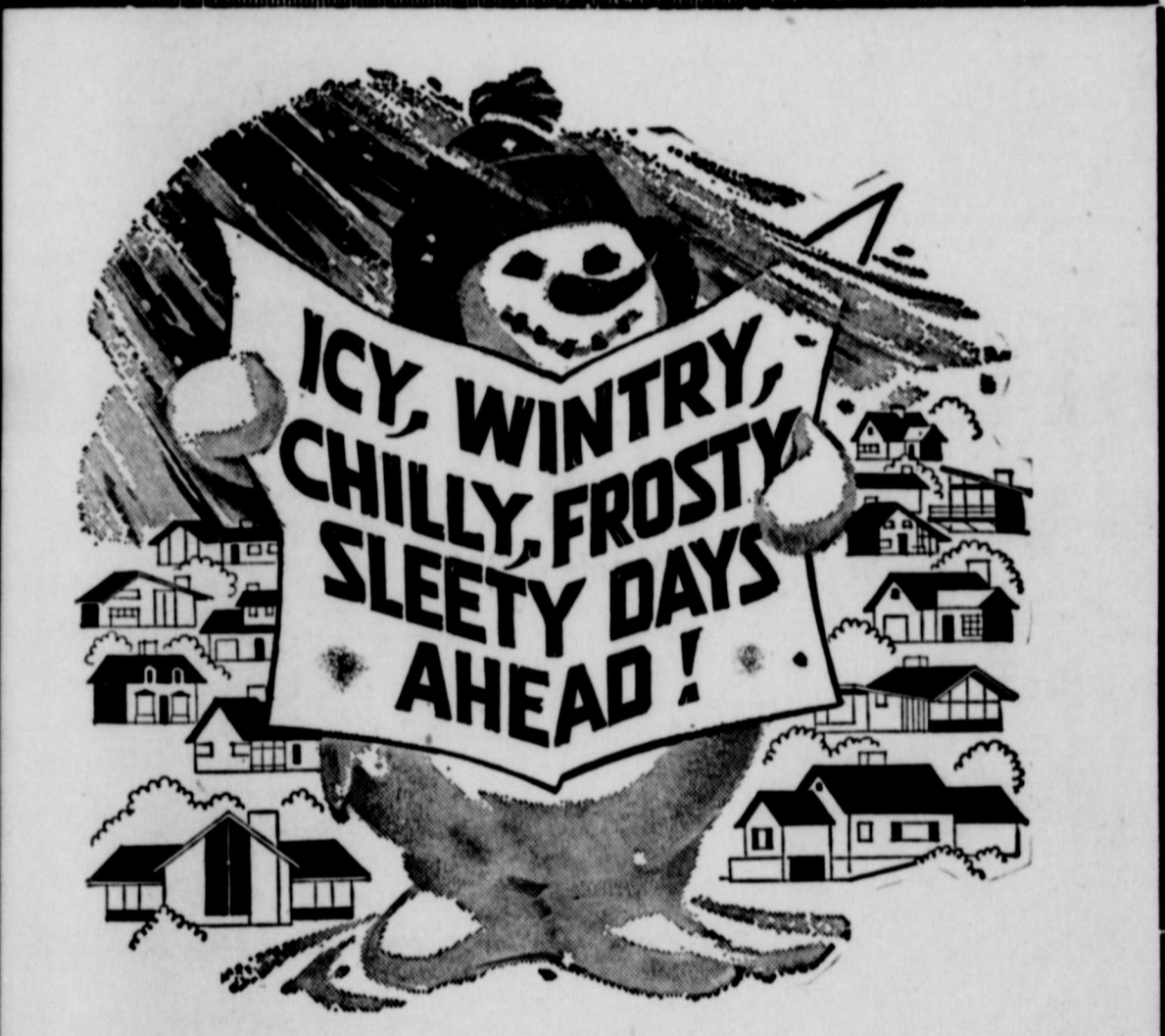

'EARLY AMERICAN PATRIOTS' IS TOPIC OF THURSDAY REVIEW CLUB PROGRAM

The Review Club met Sept. 26 at the home of Mrs. H. W. Sherrard. A refreshment plate was served to the members.

Mrs. Odie Petsick, as Federation Counselor, pointed out several articles in the recent issues of "Texas Clubwoman" for members to take special note. She particularly emphasized one article, "Know Your State Government."

Mrs. Petsick and Mrs. J. E. Lincoln spoke on "Early American Patriots." Mrs. Petsick displayed a framed engraved facsimile of the Declaration of Independence, stating that since John Hancock was chairman of that convention, he signed first. As there was a British bounty on his head, he wrote a bold signature. A true patriot and a wealthy one he gave considerable sums to the Continental Army.

"George Washington," Mrs. Petsick declared, "looked upon his country as a good son does a father." He helped set up a wise and good government and was courageous during the days of the Revolution, especially maintaining the loyalty of his soldiers at Valley Forge. If his men were disloyal they were traitors and treated as such. As president of the Constitutional Convention he chose the right men to do great things. He had a temper and had to control it. He was interested in the protection of life and property. A man of great integrity was our first President.

Thomas Jefferson, who drafted the Declaration of Independence, put considerable bite in the language he used. John Dickinson was appointed to soften its tone. Jefferson was a great diplomat, taking the U.S. and its international rating very seriously. As a political thinker ahead of his time he was a leader in Congress. His collection of books was the nucleus of the Library of Congress.

Patrick Henry aroused the country by his speeches and set up docks to protect the coasts of Virginia. He was against the Declaration of Independence but accepted it as the majority voted for it.

"We still have patriots today," Mrs. Petsick said. Mr. Nixon's departure from the Presidency was sudden, but there were wise and patriotic men who foresaw what did come and worked to bring about a quiet, peaceful transition to Mr. Ford's Presidency.

Mrs. Lincoln further defined patriotism as involving love and admiration for land and people. A citizen, she said, is shaped by the customs and beliefs of his land, and warned against exaggerated patriotism which serves as a cover for mob leaders, citing Fidel Castro. A patriot has the best interests of his country at heart and votes in every election; a patriot shows allegiance to one country.

James Madison was strongly in favor of the Constitution and collaborated in the series of papers known as "The Federalist."

James Monroe, our fifth President, promulgated the Monroe Doctrine to the effect that the United States was never to entangle itself in the broils of the Old World and not to suffer it to interfere in the affairs of the New.

Henry Clay, Mrs. Lincoln likened to Henry Kissinger.

Andrew Jackson firmly believed that the laws of the U.S. must be preserved and obeyed.

He further states that failure to save the women and children, a high percentage of men having been lost, will cause a nation to face extinction. Mr. Heinlein suggests that patriotism has lost its grip on a large percentage of our people. If that is the case, he says, our nation is on the skids. The author ends his article by giving an illustration of a modern patriot. One Sunday a young married couple was crossing the railroad tracks in Swope Park. She caught her foot in the frog of a switch, and try as they might they could not get her foot loose. A tramp showed up and tried his skill. A train whistle blew; neither man tried to escape and continued working. All three were killed. The husband's behavior was what we would expect, but what of the nameless stranger?

Mrs. Petsick gave three copies of the Hallmark book, "The Spirit of '76" to be presented to the high school library.

The meeting closed with the pledge of allegiance to the flag, the singing of "America," and a prayer by Mrs. Vernon Roberson.

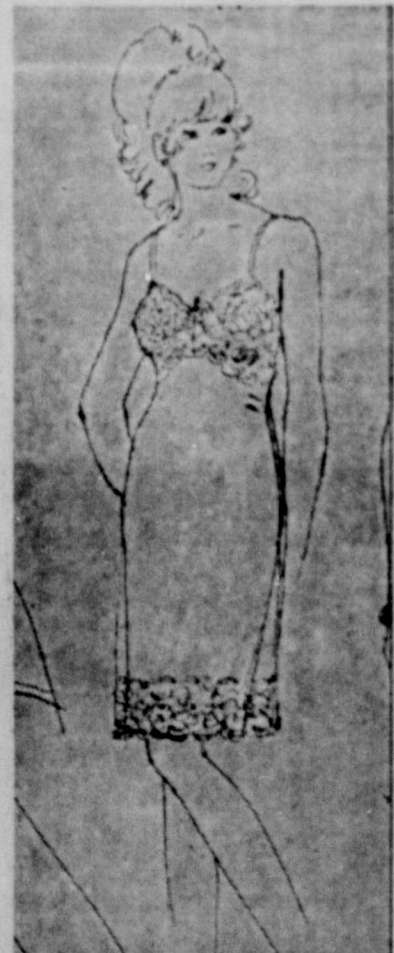
HUDSONS AND FAIREYS VISIT LAS VEGAS
