Mrs. Kay Arendt, fourth grade teacher in the local schools was selected as an observation member of the Region XII Demonstration Schools in Individualized Instruction for 1975. The selection was made by Pam Wilhelm, president of the Texas State Teachers As-

Mrs. Arendt attended a training session Sept. 25 at the Education Service Center in Waco, and will participate in one or more visits with her team members to observe in Harris Elementary in Hillsboro and Reagan Elementary in Temple. These schools have a succesful program in which instruction is individualized.

The Demonstration Schools in Individualized Instruction network began operation in January 1972 with 35 schools participating. This year, the third for the project, there are 59 schools involved. Purpose of the network is to move good ideas from school to school. The schools selected to be observed have been chosen because they have effective programs in individualized instruction and have validated this effectiveness through ongoing evaluation.

College professors, some with Doctorates, and teachers on the public school level are chosen as members to observe, guided by a steering committee from the Education Service Center in Waco. After their observation a report is made and given to the State Steering Committee so that demonstration schools for 1975 may be select-


