Hico, Whitney to Play Here Friday

Hico and Whitney, two teams that appear to be about even on talent, will tangle Friday night at the local stadium in the second district game for each team.

Whitney shows the best record for the year, owning an even 3-3 slate, one of the wins being a district contest. The Wildcats were victorious over Grandview in their opener last week while the Tigers were falling to China Spring.

Whitney shows wins over Grandview, Masonic Home and Hubbard, while dropping games to Valley Mills, Meridian, and Trinity Valley.

The Wildcats feature the running of 160-pound junior halfback Doug Miller, and most Hico fans will remember him as the hard-running youngster who was instrumental in the Wildcats' 21-6 upset win over the Tigers last year.

Hico will go into the game with two front-line performers on the shelf. Senior center and kicker Joe Harris underwent an emergency appendectomy Tuesday morning, and is out for the season. Junior defensive back Gary Reed is also out for the remainder of this season with a severe back injury.

On the brighter side, senior running back Byron Rumph will be ready this week, and Coach Jackie Bullion has switched him to halfback, leaving Buddy Mayfield at the fullback post. Starting in the place of Harris at center will be sophomore Dean Walker, who saw some action at that position last week. Defensive ace Edd LeFevre was out of school the first of this week with the flu-bug, but is expected to be back for the Friday game.

Game time will be 8 o'clock at Tiger Stadium.

A full slate of games will be played Thursday night when Hico's seventh, eighth, and Junior Varsity teams go to Whitney. First game will start at 5 p.m.

Only two games are slated for the juniors next week, the seventh and eighth, and the contests have been changed from Thursday to Tuesday night. The two games will be played at Grandview.

Last week the seventh graders downed China Spring 8-0, the eighth graders won over the visitors 6-0, and the Junior Varsity completed a clean sweep for Hico by turning back China Spring 8-0.

Austin H. Emery Resigns Ministry

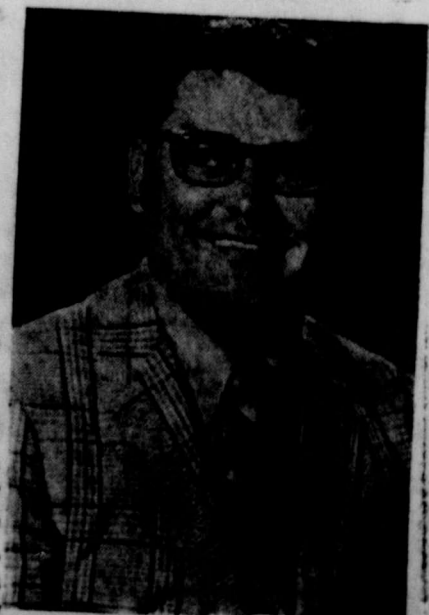

Emery served on the Boy Scout Troop Committee that re-initiated scouting in Hico; served as Explorer Advisor for the Hico Post for two years; and was president of the P-TA for the 1972-73 school year. He has also worked actively with various youth programs, both in his church and the community.

While serving the Hico church, the minister also completed two programs of study at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, leading to the Master of Divinity and Master of Religious Education degrees. He is now a candidate for the degree of Doctor of Ministry at Brite Divinity School in May, 1975.

Cougars Live Up to Billing; Drop Tigers By 31-6 Count

The China Spring Cougars, living up to advance billings, hopped on the Hico Tigers for a 31-6 win last Friday night, and headed toward their second consecutive district championship.

Few among Hico fans would disagree that the Cougars are definitely the class of District 11-A, and only a major upset will prevent them from going 9-1 for the season and sweeping the championship with a clean slate.

The Cougars are good, no doubt about it, because the Tigers put forth a tremendous effort in the losing cause, especially in the final two quarters.

China Spring posted a 14-0 lead in the first period, extended the count to 20-0 at the half, before the Tigers came out fighting in the third period to play a ball control game and completely stymie the Cougars. After Hico narrowed the margin to 20-0 in the fourth quarter, China Spring hit on a long pass for the insurance TD, and later in the game, the Tigers gave up two 2-point safeties to raise the final count to 31-6.

China Spring received the opening kickoff and put together a 62-yard grind 'em out drive for the first TD. Heralded 230-pound fullback Ed Daniels got the score on a two-yard plunge.

The Cougars got a "cheapie" score on Hico's next possession, picking up a fumble at the Tiger 20. But the Cougars had to work hard for the marker, taking five plays, with two penalties mixed in, to dent the end zone. Daniels scored from the one. Mike Lowry kicked his second extra point for the 14-0 lead with 2:04 left in the period. Penalties played a key part in the first quarter as the Tigers drew 30 steps at crucial times.

In the second quarter, China Spring put together a 53-yard drive for a 20-0 halftime lead. Ronnie Marsh got the last step with 2:04 left in the half.

Hico completely dominated the third period, but was unable to put anything on the board. The Tiger offense controlled the ball all the way, allowing China Spring only four plays in the period.

The Tigers started on their only TD drive late in the third, and when the teams changed ends of the field, Hico was on the Cougar 28. On the first play in the fourth quarter, Jimmy Helton hit Edd LeFevre for a 13-yard gain to the 15, and on the next play, Helton called another pass, and real alert football by Walter Lucas got the marker. Throwing to LeFevre, the ball was tipped, Lucas ran under, and Hico was on the board. A pass for

the conversion was no good, and the score was 20-6.

China Spring roared back, and in three plays after the kickoff they hit the end zone. The score came on a 40-yard pass from Jack Miller to Foy Light, and upped the count to 27-6.

Hico gave up a two-point safety when a Cougar punt was touched and went out of the end zone. A short time later, the Tigers were caught in their own end zone for another two-pointer, and that was the ball game.

The Tiger defense was really more adept than the score might indicate, with several players standing out. Walter Lucas, Eddie Needham, Glenn Bolstad, Charles Roberts, Edd LeFevre, David Ogle, and Loyd Roberson led the defensive charges.

Offensively, the Tigers could never get their running game untracked, but Helton clicked on 11 of 16 passes for 121 yards in the passing department.

The Cougars, mostly thought of as a "one-man" gang in the form of Daniels, has more going for them than that. The Cougars are amply supplied with good backs, have a good offensive line, and a defense that hasn't allowed many points this year, and are definitely the class of District 11-A.

a person from a foreign country what he thinks of the United States on his first visit over and over again. "It is wonderful," or something to that effect.

It was the response of Georg Sandner, native of Germany, who has been visiting the United States for the first time. Mr. Sandner has been here since Oct. 3 visiting in the home of his only child, Mrs. (Helga) Wright and family.

The Sandner family is from Fulda, Germany, where he is a plumber by profession and working in a factory. During their visit, the Sandners have been quite popular, with his wife playing the accordion. Twice he has entertained the Civic Club, and two weeks ago he played the accordion at a half-time of the Hico-Valley football game. Mr. Sandner has been a fan of both Hico and Valley Mills fans. After playing for some folks and drawing strong praise, he crossed the field and was greeted by the visitors and a "more, more" ovation

from the crowd. The Sandner's witnessed their first football game while here, and thought the action "too slow."

Perhaps the thing that most impressed the Sandners about Hico and the U.S. was that "the people are so friendly." Mr. Sandner said that in Germany, the people went around with a long face, but here "everybody seemed happy." He continued, "over here everybody

rides. In Germany you walk or hitch." (He gave the familiar sign of a hitch-hiker.)

Mr. Sandner said that the U.S. was quite different from what he had expected. He said he thought everything was "sand," and was surprised at the terrain around Hico. He described the country as "pretty."

During their stay here, the Sandners visited many areas of interest, including Dinosaur Park near Glen Rose. They were accompanied on most of the visits by Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Tranham.

From Hico the couple was going to Las Vegas, Nevada, where they will visit Mrs. Sandner's sister, and then back to Hico for a short visit before returning to their home October 31.

And so, even with the problems, the anxiety, etc., that the U.S. people are experiencing, there must be something "right" about this country.

"It is so pretty, wonderful," as the Sandners would say.

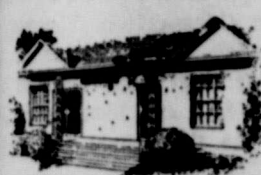

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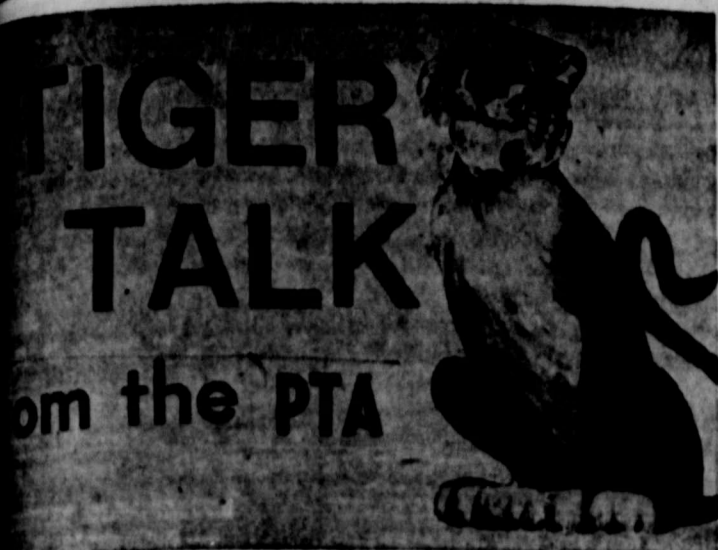

you know the difference in being a "bead" and "pushing a bead"? The Tiger learned about a lot of other things during his visit to the VoAg classes...

a strong workbench. Mr. Ronnie Partain, teacher, seemed to be in five places at once. The noise level was such that no one could hear more than one foot away from the speaker, so Mr. Partain went from bench to bench, as he was needed. First he helped a boy cut out a cardboard pattern for a decorative edge on a corner cabinet. Then as a table saw heated up, he went over to change the blade. Other problems—"Mr. Partain, the wood spit when I nailed it." So "try a smaller nail." "Mr. Partain, these ends aren't even. Shall I sand them?" "That may take all day. Use a plane first."

put carefully in the proper places in the large tool chest, and Mr. Partain prepared for the next class. Ronnie Partain knows his way around the ag building. He graduated from Hico High School in 1965, and in 1969 received his degree in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech. He taught science and coached at Rochester, married Cinda, and worked a year at Baylor University as director of the Athletic Dormitory. Last year he moved back to Hico to fill the teaching position vacated by Mr. Walker. Mr. Walker spent 25 years as Ag teacher before accepting the position of superintendent. Though Mr. Partain's parents now live in Waco, he and Cinda are enjoying living on the home place. The older, more experienced boys of VIII came into the room with a few well-chosen wisecracks about the VAIH projects. Mr. Partain quietly and quickly reminded them of what they had been building just one year ago. Memories were refreshed, and wisecracking ceased. A short session in the classroom reviewed the basic principles of welding. Mr. Partain, in discussing the use of oxyacetylene, said, "There is only one way to light a torch, the safe way." Then he added, "79 percent is not passing. If you don't do this 100 percent correctly, none of us will be safe in this room."

We moved out into the shop area near the ominous tanks of oxygen and acetylene. Questions and answers went back and forth, "How many oxygen valves are on a pressure tank? Two. What do you do first? Close the regulator valve. Then turn the cylinder on. How much pressure do you want in the tank? Oxygen 40, Acetylene 5. What kind of flame do you want for cutting? Oxidizing. What kind of flame do you have when there's too much acetylene? Carbureting." And then Mr. Partain divided the class into five groups, saw that goggles and gloves were distributed, gave the assignments, and everyone went to work. The arc welders were "beading"; and the oxy-acetylene welders were "puddling," or was it the other way around? Then the results were brought to Mr. Partain for inspecting. "That's smooth, good, not so good, you were holding your torch too straight up, that's a rough cut, but I couldn't do any better myself with an arc welder." That's an honest teacher. A fair one. These boys were learning the most practical of skills. Educators have said, "There's an experience vacuum on the part of students." These young welders know the value of welding because they have experienced the need for it at their

dairies and farms. They have friends who are now supporting their families with welding jobs and businesses. It is inconceivable to us that a man could get through life without knowing how to use hand tools. Yet our educators tell us, "Today's youngsters have fewer life experiences. Farm life is largely gone; father's spend less time with their children." On an airplane trip one day, this writer sat next to the director of personnel for Bell Telephone. He said that Bell's single biggest problem was finding repairmen and technicians. And the reason was that many of the ones they hired could not use hand tools, did not know how to use a wrench, had never had a hammer in their hands. Our VoAg boys will never have that problem. They are learning the most effective way, by doing. Mr. Partain lectures, teaches, sets up guidelines, and enforces safety rules; but the real learning takes place in the shop. The learner re-discovers in part the material that he learns. John Milton Gregory, author of "The Seven Laws of Teaching," wrote "Learning comes by thinking, not by being told. The pupil must reproduce in his own mind the truth to be learned." Mr. Partain promised the Tiger another welding lesson. Then, when a torch won't cut, maybe even the Tiger can learn to increase the oxygen.

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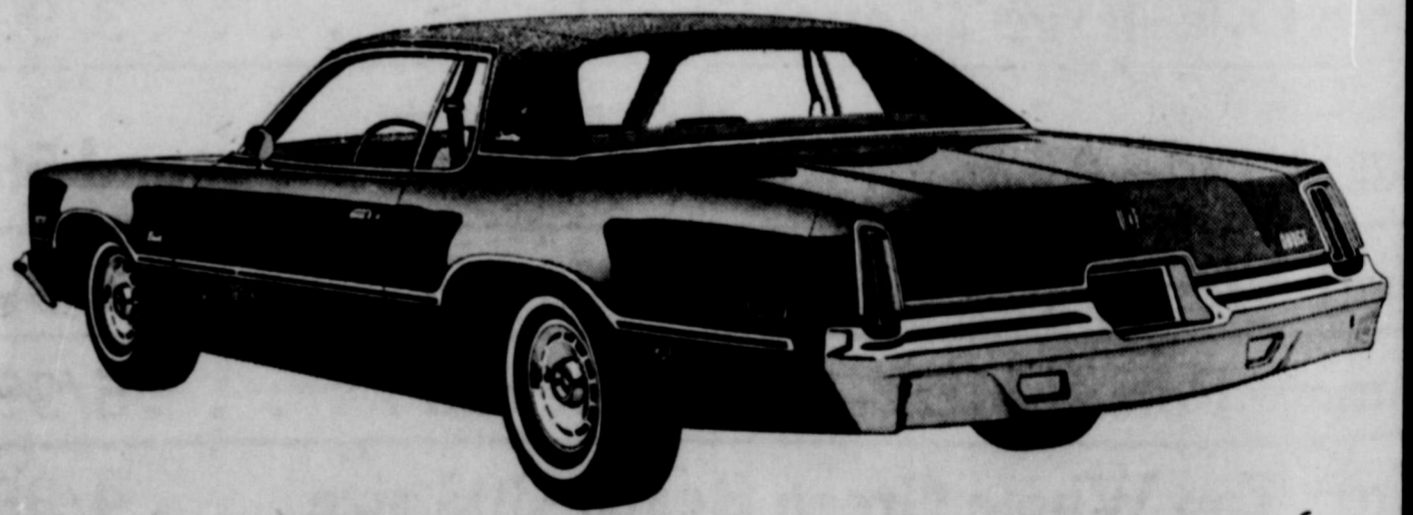
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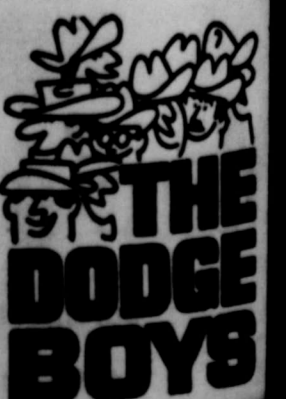

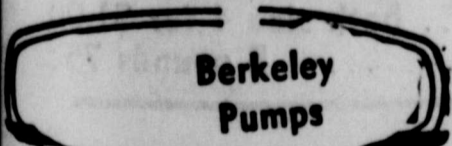
