Tiger Match is Grid Feature Friday

It is sure to be a "Tiger in the tank" come Friday night, when the Glen Rose Tigers invade Hico to match with the Hico Tigers. The Glen Rose Tiger version has been installed as a solid favorite to nip the Hico version, maintaining the strength of their previous record. For the season Glen Rose is 4-4, and 2-1 in district Hico, on the other hand, is 0-3 in the season, and 0-3 in conference action.

Glen Rose proved to be a formidable foe two weeks ago when they jumped out to a 13-0 lead over district favorite China Spring, held the lead for three quarters, and finally went down in defeat by a 16-13 count in the fading seconds of the game.

In the last two meetings, Glen Rose upset Hico 13-0 in 1972 to mar an otherwise undefeated season for the locals, and the two teams played to a 0-0 tie last year. Game time will be 8 o'clock.

Hico Voters Show Displeasure With All But Democrats

Hico voters, 225 strong, voiced their displeasure with all parties except the Democrats in the Tuesday General Election, with the latter receiving a total of 140 "straight ticket" ballots.

While the Democrats were receiving the strong endorsement, the Republican Party candidates received only seven straight ticket votes. The straight ticket was the method of voting for all candidates in a particular party, and for none in any other party.

BUDDY POPPY SALE SLATED HERE SATURDAY

The Stephenville Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will sell Buddy Poppies in Hico Saturday, Nov. 9, in commemoration of Veterans' Day, which is Monday, Nov. 11.

Boyd McClure of Hico, Post Commander, said that he and some of the Post members would be on Main Street most of the day, and asked for consideration of shoppers.

The V.F.W. Buddy Poppy is a symbol of the sacrifices made by the nation's war dead, and funds derived from the sale go for relief and welfare of needy veterans, their widows, and orphans.

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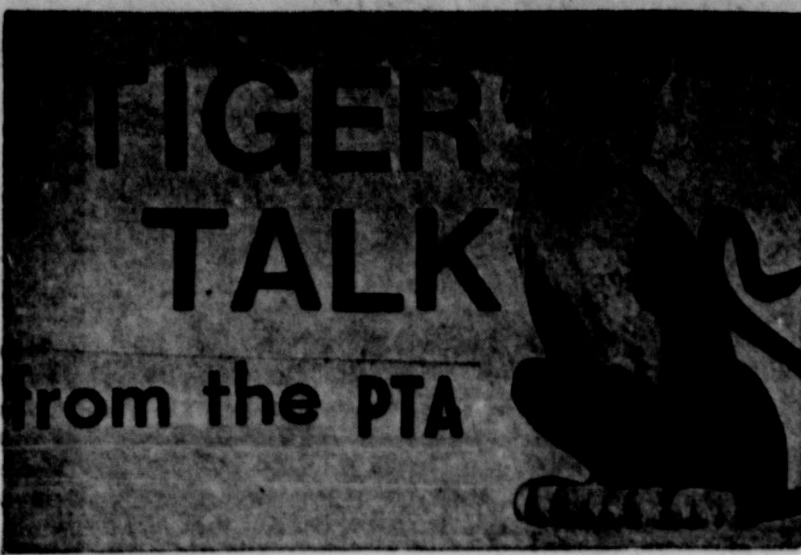


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THE DODGE BOYS

"Success breeds success." A well-known book calls this the "power of positive thinking." And so, above all, spirits must not sag; hope must not be lost.

stands, one would almost think so. However, for everyone of those, there are a dozen other spectators who care about other goals, and see other values.

We've heard that battles on the gridiron, the diamond, the cinder track, and the gymnasium are preparations for the battle of life. Being a winner is easy. Being a gracious winner is not always easy, but winning is pleasant and easy to live with. Anyone can be a winner. Life beyond high school is full of wins and losses, and very often the losses outweigh the wins. Not everyone knows how to be a good loser. A loss is not always tragic, but the reaction to it can be if it's in the form of resentment, anger, bitterness, an unforgiving spirit, indifference, intolerance. A quitter has lost the will to succeed. Paul wrote a lot about difficulties. To the Romans he wrote, "We glory in tribulations knowing that tribulation worketh patience; and patience, experience; and experience, hope."

This Tiger pays tribute to the coaches and to the players, the 1974 Hico Tiger Football Team. They have gained experience; they still have hope. But there are other things that should be mentioned. We appreciate the physical discipline that these young men have exhibited, the long hours they have faithfully put into rigorous training. We appreciate the mental discipline they have exercised, not just in learning football strategy and memorizing plays but in maintaining their grades in scholastic subjects, studying when they were too tired to study. We've appreciated the self-control they've shown when a referee makes a bad call. We appreciate the dignity with which ones have accepted an injury and the necessity for laying out a game or a season. We appreciate the encouragement teammates have given to one who makes an error on the playing field. We appreciate the maturity with which players have accepted criticism. We appreciate the humility with which

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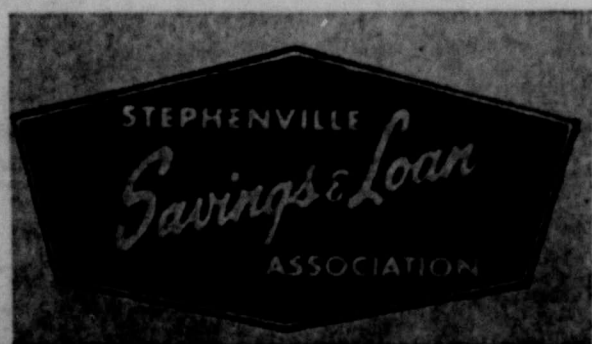
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
