Deer Hunters Will Converge on Area

A great influx of deer hunters is expected to converge on this area over the weekend for the opening of the season, which begins 30 minutes before sunrise Saturday, Nov. 16, and continues through Jan. 1. The Hico area has become extremely popular with sportsmen in recent years, and practically all acre of huntable land is leased for the sport.

Deer picture, which looked bleak in mid-summer, has brightened and hunters taking to the field will find deer in excellent condition, and in plentiful numbers. However, some observers believe bagging a buck may be more difficult than in some years due to the plentiful food supply and lack of cold weather. Deer are only to go a few steps to the food, and they are not moving as much as might be expected.

Hamilton County falls under the "either sex" law again this year, which means that a hunter can bag two deer of either sex. The aggregate may be a buck and a doe, two bucks, or two does, as long as they are properly tagged.

Parks and Wildlife officials have cautioned hunters to use particular care in tagging their deer this year, as most citations for violations are issued for improper tagging.

Officials also pointed out that if a hunter gives another a portion of a deer, the recipient must have a note verifying his possession.

Expecting the usual rush on last-minute supplies, Hico merchants have their stores stocked with almost everything that might be needed for a successful hunt. Also deer storage will be offered at two local businesses, one of which will also offer complete processing.

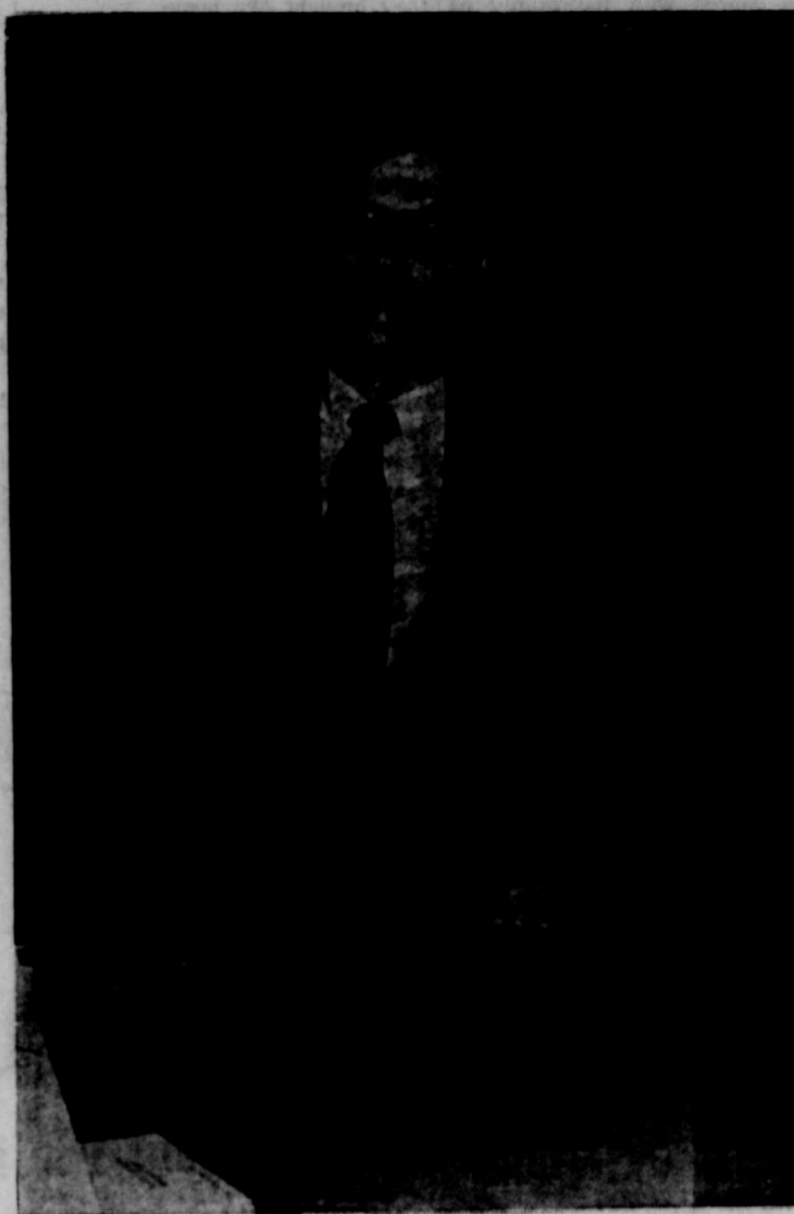
