## CISCO CITIZENS ARE BUILDING A REAL CITY OF CISCO.

**Making a Home City; Began Early and are Succeeding. Rapid Growth Attributed to Shrewd Business Men and the Operation of People Located**

Immediately after the oil had been discovered in Eastland county in the fall of 1917 Cisco began to take on new life and her citizens at once realized that they must begin to get ready for the building of a city. Unexpectedly oil was discovered at Ranger, the depth seeming unreasonable. Several wells had been drilled in this county, and one or two in Callahan county, but none of them reached over 2,500 feet, almost one thousand feet this side of the oil. The McCleskey was brought in first and the influx of the people began. When the oil was struck in the Moran field some few years ago, it was thought that a real boom came at that time, which gradually faded away, but that was nothing compared to the boom which was started by the oil found in the McCleskey well. Some time later, several months, other wells went down. The Walker well which shot gas for a long time finally came in. The field widened until even greater and bigger wells were discovered. The drilling was extended into Stephens county where some of the best producers are now found. The field still went west from Ranger until it reached something near to five miles and the recent wells brought in are the biggest producers. For instance, the Norwood well which is producing something like 16,000 barrels per day. The T. W. Connelley well widens the field still further and it is a big producer also. The wild-cattling began and reached into the Desdemona country where probably as good a field as Ranger has been discovered. Wells were drilled near Eastland, but little oil was found, but the indications are that this is a good field. Then the drillers have reached to Gorman, Carbon, Mangum, Putnam, Baird, Abilene and even further west. In the Putnam field oil has been found, and the result is that quite a number of new locations have been made in Callahan county near Putnam. Deep tests are being made in Schackelford county near Moran and Albany, and these are looking good, those which have been drilled deep enough. With these tests and the good showings made puts Cisco right in the center of the activities. In this immediate territory there are five or six wells going down, and two of them have reached over 3,200 feet and are in the black line with a showing of oil and gas. As stated above just as soon as the people of Cisco learned of the possibilities of Cisco becoming a city the business men began to get ready for the great influx. It is true that we had quite a number of vacant houses here at that time, both residence and business houses, but the long-headed business men could see that in our condition at that time we would be unable to handle the crowds, not only the visitors but the many enterprises that would want to come here, hence they got busy. A building campaign was begun and the result was that several hundred houses have been constructed. Of course our people could not foresee the conditions which were brought about by the war, hence at times the building made much slower progress than was anticipated, but it was kept up, and with each succeeding month the building increased. Most every man who could command sufficient money has had erected a residence, and some of them several. It proved a profitable investment and others seeing it would join in the movement. Building, buying, selling getting good rents, and the loyalty to the town has brought about a phenomenal growth to the resident section of Cisco. The result is that Cisco has more modern bungalows than any town in this section. When the building first began most of the new buildings were to be rented, but soon the people were so interested that now most the buildings are for real homes for those who are build-

ing. Numbers of people have sold their old homes and are building more modern and more expensive houses. Chamber of Commerce started his campaign, and R. Q. Lee, president of this organization, took the lead in it. He has had over fifteen modern bungalows. Chamber of Commerce was organized a little more than one year ago. A mass meeting had been held, and at this meeting almost \$9,000 was subscribed for the purpose of carrying on the work of building a city.

Two refineries have been located in Cisco. The Lib Refining Company with a capacity of 1,000 barrels per day has been operating for months, and at early date will enlarge its plant a 2,000 barrel capacity. The Be Valley Oil and Refining Company is not only in the refining business but is having wells drilled, and begin the construction of a 2 barrel capacity refinery within short time. This refinery will be the city limits. These two companies are the strongest in the field, they have their offices in Cisco, besides the refineries we have many of oil companies. Probable of the greatest things accomplished during the past twelve months was the securing of the offices the Texas Company for Cisco, by now have offices in a building on the main street, but occupy two floors in the new building now being constructed by Cisco Banking Co. The Ohio Gas Co. with W. E. Morris as manager has its state office here. J. B. Anderson is manager for the Sun Co. and a number of other large companies. The Sun Co. is to locate here and occupy the second floor of the Gray building now under construction. Quite a number of other companies have their offices in Cisco, and the smaller ones are Ranger-Cisco Co., the Dixie Company, the Imperial Co., the Ranger and Gas Co. The New South Oil and Gas Co. the Southland Oil and Gas Co. With each of these companies there are a number of stenographers, clerks, etc. The Texas Company having more than any of the others. This company has something like thirty people with the office here and when the company gets into the building fifty or more will comprise the staff. Quite a number of employees of this company sell as other companies have phased homes and are not only citizens of our city but are sufficiently interested to help build a city. The men command good wages and they not only believe in having them but they desire to live in this town in this section and thus they strive to make Cisco such a town. The majority of oil men in Cisco are town builders and most of them are investing their money in property. Thus they are proving their faith by their works.

Since oil production started in this town Cisco has been the attraction from the standpoint of a home town. And this citizenship it to make since the beginning their town, although we have been in the proven field the town is so located that it is convenient for all the oil fields. Other towns may flourish as a mushroom, they may put up tents, shacks, but it has been the slogan of people to make every thing substantial so that it would be permanent, and this has been done to a large extent. Cisco is in a class itself as a "home town" because several things. We already have a large power plant, we already have a splendid sewerage system, already had natural gas, we already had a water system that would accommodate a city almost ten times the size of Cisco at that time, already had two railroads leading to the Ranger oil fields,

west to Putnam, North to the Albany and Moran fields, south to Gorman and DeLeon; we already had an ice plant, with a capacity to supply all the neighbor towns, we already had two wholesale grocery stores which are supplying the smaller towns in this section, we already had a beautiful and commodious city hall, which will supply our needs for years to come, we already had a newly finished hotel, with a number of other ones, sufficient to accommodate the trade at that time, we already had first class dry goods stores, grocery stores, hardware stores, furniture stores, in fact Cisco was already a live little city before the oil production began.

But since the liquid has been flowing the little city has grown rapidly. Most every week the production of oil increases. Last week the statistics gave the production in Eastland county 66,000 barrels, and in Stephens county the production reached near 22,000 barrels. All this helps Cisco and every enterprise in this section.

Since the influx of people to this city we have built a three-story, fire proof hotel with almost a hundred rooms, we have built rooming houses, we have built a wholesale grocery house, a planing mill, numbers of business houses, miles of side-walks and curbs, hundreds of residences, two new lumber yards, etc.

We have under construction a five story building, an ice cream factory, a modern garage, several business houses, a three-story theatre building, a large building for the ice factory and power plant, in fact to get a list of all the building that is now under way a reporter would have to take the rounds and put them down with pencil, because it would be difficult to remember all of them. The Round-Up has tried to be conservative since this building boom has commenced, and the reporter has asked men who have come here if they felt that the paper had exaggerated on the development of the town and as to the future prospects that we have here, and the answer has always been "no", you have not put it strong enough, and they have been readers of the Round-Up. One man who owned property in Cisco subscribed for the Round-Up. Just before he received the first issue he had written a letter offering to take a certain price for his Cisco property, but after he had read the paper he decided that he had priced his property too low and immediately wired to cancel the proposition, the telegram bearing his letter here. He took the first train to Cisco and after getting here found that he had saved \$10,000.00. Pretty good saving. Most people fail to realize the real value of a newspaper. This man had not been a regular reader of the Round-Up, but more than likely he will keep it coming now. "Have you got any sense?"

R. S. Whiteley came to Cisco something like one year ago and formed a company for the purpose of buying and selling real estate on commission. He proved a very valuable citizen and has been helping to build the town. Mr. Whiteley has associated with him his sister, Miss Pearl Whiteley. They are making money and do not hesitate to help with the various enterprises of the city.

A. P. Slater is an old time business man of Cisco. He has had his ups and downs. For years Mrs.

Slater was in very poor health. She has regained it. They now own a home in the corner of Avenue E and Sixth street. They bought this property when it was real cheap and could now realize several thousand dollars profit on it for business lots.

H. E. Carter came here some few months ago from the west and immediately began to be a booster for Cisco. His business was good from the beginning and he is still making money. He is selling real estate and is in the oil business.

R. E. McCord came here from west Texas and is now manager of the Higginbotham-Harris Lumber Co. Mr. McCord knows the lumber business and although has been here only a few weeks he is catching step with the business men.

W. T. Foy is proprietor of the Cisco Drug Co. He came here from Rotan where he had been in business for quite a while. He is right in the center of activity and has a good business.

W. H. Mayhew is probably one of the most popular young business men of Cisco. Everybody likes "Bill" as he is familiarly known. He is a hustler and has made good money out of the oil business.

G. D. Remer is the local manager for the Cisco Gas & Electric Co. Since he came here something like eight or nine months ago he has been insisting on the company having erected a new building for the ice factory and the power plant, and this large building is now under construction. Mr. Remer deserves credit for this.

I. Lamb has been in Cisco since the early days. He has been builder and contractor for these many years and has put up some of our best buildings. Although he is getting up in years he is still active and is overseeing work all the while.

Tom Johnson looks almost as old as his daddy. He has been here along time and can tell some interesting things of the early days in this section. He has held the position at the Rockwell Bros. & Co. for a long time and is always dependable.

Dr. J. E. Griffin came to Cisco from Scranton. Since he came here the people began to learn of his ability as a physician and he is now enjoying a good patronage. He is a quiet, unassuming man yet a very valuable physician.

Fred Davies lives some few miles in the country. He used to be a citizen of Cisco, and claims that privilege yet. Mr. Davies is one of the "old reliables." He owned some land out near where the Prairie people are drilling and the price of the land has increased and he could now get a good price for his royalty.

T. J. Nabors is one of our old citizens. He is still selling pianos, organs, etc. He has had a part in helping to make the town better. He stands four-square on all moral questions.

M. G. Cooper is one of our new merchants. He opened a store for gentlemen some few months ago. He deserves a good patronage and is getting his part of the trade. He is an experienced business man and is making good.

Jay Warren was in the barber business but found the oil business more profitable. He has been buying and selling leases and royalty and has made good money. He has been in Cisco for several years.

Other sites are being sought for industries and office buildings are being erected to accommodate other oil companies desiring to open offices here. The demand for store houses and residences is stronger now than at any previous time in the City's history.

Seventy-five residents are now under construction one of which will appropriate \$75,000.00 in cost. Around \$300,000.00 in brick buildings are under way with \$100,000 more in immediate prospect. Arrangements have been made for all telephone and telegraph wires to be put in conduits on the main business street and for a white way with modern lamp posts on this street.

## OIL PRODUCTION ON THE INCREASE

**New Wells are Reported in Several Counties; Field Extended and Land Prices are Higher.**

### RANGER DISTRICT

The average daily production of the Ranger field during the present week was about 66,000 barrels. Last week the production went as high as 73,000 while the Norwood well was doing its best, and other new wells of the field were making big initial production. This figure represented flush production, however, and could not be taken as a criterion of the average production of the field.

The present production of 66,000 barrels a day is more oil than the field has ever shown before on anything like settled production. Figures that have shown more oil than this amount coming from Eastland county have been inflated by initial production from new wells or by over estimates.

The present production is distributed among the different companies about as follows:

The total amount of oil in storage by all companies in the Ranger field is about three million five hundred barrels this week, according to a compiled total of the holdings of each company having storage there.

There is storage available for about one million barrels more than the total now held, this available storage being well distributed among all the companies operating in the county.

Three pipe lines are now taking oil from the Ranger field, the Prairie, The Gulf and the Texas Company. The last two run oil to Fort Worth and to Dallas, while the Prairie's line is taking it north to Oklahoma refineries. The Magnolia's line from Corsicana is expected to be in operation within 30 to 45 days, and the Prairie's line north will be doubled by that time. These lines together will give a carrying capacity of 120,000 barrels a day from the west Texas field. It is expected that this will be sufficient to take care of the needs of the need of the field for some time to come, especially with the aid of the large number of tank cars coming from eastern refineries.

Ranger crude is getting more and more in demand as its value is being ascertained by refiners. Some Eastern plants are already beginning to use Ranger crude, depending upon tank car shipments for the supply, and this demand will likely be increased as the lubricating qualities and gasoline content of the Ranger crude become better known.

The greatest amount of oil in storage at Ranger is held by the Prairie, having 2,700,000 barrels stored in 55 tanks, the most of them being 55's. The company has storage available for about 150,000 barrels at the present time. Other companies having oil in storage, and the number of tanks, runs about as follows: the Gulf, 21,000 barrels in 8 tanks with space available for 225,000 barrels more; Magnolia 270,000 barrels in 9 tanks, with space for 215,000 barrels available; The Texas Co., 165,000 barrels in 4 tanks with 50,000 barrels available space; Steiner and Wagner 6,000 barrels in one tank; T. & P. has space for 55,000 barrels in one tank, and the Lone Star Gas Co. has space available for 130,000 barrels in 3 tanks.

The Prairie has three more fifty-five thousand barrel tanks under construction and is building them as fast as the needs of the field demand.

The new production in Eastland County this week all comes from inside wells, there being nothing in tests that are drilling in territory that is calculated to add extension to the field.

### METHODIST CHURCH, SOUTH, SETS WEEK OF MAY 18 AS FOR COLLECTION OF \$35,000,000

Need of Christianify and Proper Religious Education at Home as well as abroad is emphasized by Bishops and Clergy who made Survey of Entire World.

The sum of \$35,000,000 will be raised by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, during the week of May 18 to 25. This money will be spent to promulgate Christianity in the war-ridden countries of Europe; to carry on missionary work in the darkest corners of Africa, Asia and South America, and a considerable sum will be spent in the Southern states for the education of both the whites and negroes.

While statesmen will rebuild shattered governments, educational interests will erect colleges, business men will devote their energies to reconstruct shattered communities and industries, the church will devote its money and efforts toward the spiritual welfare of the war-ridden people.

When the war was at its height the Methodist church of America decided to inaugurate a movement in commemoration of the hundredth anniversary of the first missionary work done by the church in America. This movement had as its original object the establishing of a greater mission in what are known as heathen countries. When the question came from devastated Europe, "What do the churches intend to do?" the leaders sent back the answer, "Rebuild the churches and help you rebuild the spiritual lives."

These leaders were convinced there could be no lasting peace and the world could not be made safe for democracy until the right kind of religious work was developed simultaneously with the material.

**Campaign Directed from Nashville.** In the City of Nashville the campaign for \$35,000,000 is being directed. There Dr. W. B. Beauchamp, director-general and his staff are working day and night to secure the co-operation of eight million people directly interested in the Methodist church, South.

Thirty states have been grouped and divided into districts in charge of both laymen and churchmen. Every church has been card-indexed and an amount designated that it is expected to raise. Meetings are being held all over the country and as the date of the campaign approaches there will be a large army of dis-

ciplined workers who will get results.

No movement has ever excited so much interest. The bigness of the undertaking is easily comprehended when compared to some of the campaigns conducted during the war. The greatest of these was the United War Work drive which brought in \$200,000,000.

#### Survey Made of the World.

A complete survey of the entire world has been made that the needs of the church might carefully and intelligently studied. That has been accomplished by sending commissions over the various fields. A budget has been prepared as a result and the campaign for the thirty-five millions started.

Bishop James Atkins is Chairman of the Centenary Commission for the whole Southern church. Working in connection with him is Dr. W. W. Pinson, General Secretary of the Board of Missions. Dr. W. B. Beauchamp, General Secretary of the directing head of the organization. He is assisted by Dr. W. G. Gram.

#### Fair Held at Columbus.

During the latter part of June there will be held in Columbus, Ohio, an exposition that will be unique in the annals of the world. It will be the largest of its kind ever arranged and will consist of natives brought from Africa, the Orient, South America and Asia. These natives will be shown in their own dwellings, and in their native life and through charts, maps and all kinds of illustrations their transformation from savages to modern christians demonstrated. Each group will be in charge of experienced teachers and missionaries who will accompany them from the far away countries.

This is another of the many forces that are working to make the Centenary an overwhelming success.

### OBITUARY

One of the prominent men of West Texas passed away in this city the 13th of this month. Mr. William Wesley Eddleman, son of Mr. R. W. Eddleman of Cisco, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. Neal W. Turner, early in the morning of March 13th, 1919. Mr. Eddleman was born in Brown County, February 19, 1872. He came to Cisco at the age of ten, and lived here until he was grown. He has always been associated with the town, thru his family and his visits to his childhood home.

For a number of years Mr. Eddleman has been a member of the firm of Higginbotham-Harris Lumber Co. For a while he was the Secretary-Treasurer of the Company. He had a prominent part in its affairs during a number of years. For several years, Mr. Eddleman had been in charge of the firm's yard at Sweetwater, and he had just completed the new yard at Eastland and was rapidly bringing the Cisco yard to completion at the time of his death.

Mr. Eddleman was one of the prominent citizens of Sweetwater. At the time of his removal from that place, he was President of the Chamber of Commerce and Chairman of the Red Cross organization. He had been a member of the Methodist Church for many years, and his membership was in the church at Sweetwater.

During the hard years of drouth when business was at low ebb thru all the western country, Mr. Eddleman managed the business of his company with skill. He was one of the men who believed in the West and gave his life to promoting its industrial development. His death came as the result of years of unceasing concentration and devotion to his work. Those who knew him best had the greatest confidence in him as a man. Friends came from many places to pay their last tribute to him at his funeral. His private benefactions and constant giving were known only to a few, but his kindness and loving help remain as sweet memories in the hearts of those whose lives were often brightened by his thoughtfulness.

Mr. Eddleman is survived by his father, Mr. R. W. Eddleman, a brother, Mr. J. D. Eddleman, and two sisters, Mrs. Joe Wilson and Mrs. Neal W. Turner; all well-known in this city.—Contributed.

### THE LEAGUE

The idea of establishing a league to enforce peace is too good to remain a mere idea. It deserves to be a fact.

It is more likely to be one if we avoid pipe-dreams. If we recognize its numerous imperfections—and the prospects of complete breakdown—the scarcer will its imperfections—and breakdowns become.

And here is one little circumstance hardly anything has been said about the relationship of the signatories if one or more of them indulged in a revolution. Are the rest of them still bound by their signatures?

If, for example, Italy turns bolshevist, and elects an Italian Trotsky and Lenin. Are the other nations bound by promise made to the present Italian government?

Or if the majority of the powers turn bolshevist (which is not at all improbable) is America bound to accept that majority's ruling and co-operate with it in a series of comic escapades resembling the daily program in Russia? Bedlam might break loose among the preponderating members of the league and what would become of the intelligent minority.

Let us pray that in signing this document we make such reservations as we need for our protection. Let us, for example, define with absolute precision the interpretation of its terms if a responsible foreign government is superseded by a non-descript aggregation of circus clowns. It is supremely desirable that all nations sign it. Most of them will be prepared, if necessary, to put their own construction on the letter of its provisions.

Saturday, April the 5th we will elect four school trustees. The terms of R. Q. Lee, Geo. D. Fee and A. M. Patterson and W. F. Walker, expires, and to take the places of these gentlemen will be offered J. H. Bullock, S. E. Hittson, J. S. Stockard and Wm. Reagan. The men retiring would not consent to have their names put on the ticket. They have served on the board several years, some of them eight years and have done good service. Three of the gentlemen named on the new ticket are experienced school men and if elected will make good.

### THE 1919 WHEAT CROP

If weather conditions in this country are favorable there will be a record wheat crop in 1919. And every bushel of this wheat under the government guarantee will bring \$2.26.

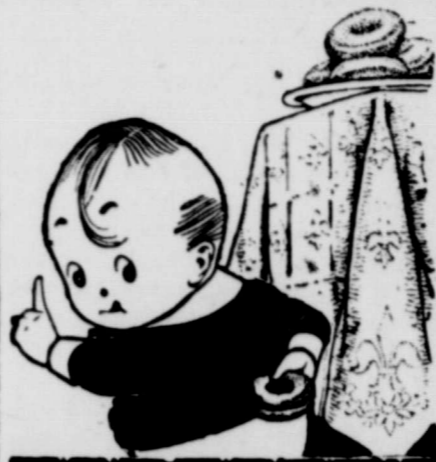
This guarantee has back of it an appropriation of a billion dollars made by congress for the purpose of supporting the wheat price.

It is possible that the loss of the government may not be as great as anticipated. Mr. Hoover informs us that Europe will need more wheat than the estimates have called for. There will be no wheat raised in Russia, Serbia or Bulgaria, so these countries which are usually exporters will be obliged to import wheat. The Australian wheat crop for 1919 will be small, and the Argentine crop will not exceed the usual amount.

These conditions may force up the market price of wheat and relieve the pockets of Messrs. Taxpayer & Co. As the pockets of Taxpayer & Co are not especially full at present, such a result would be a welcome one.

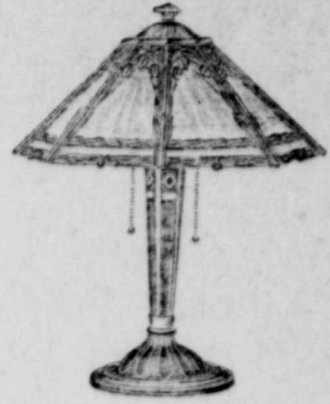

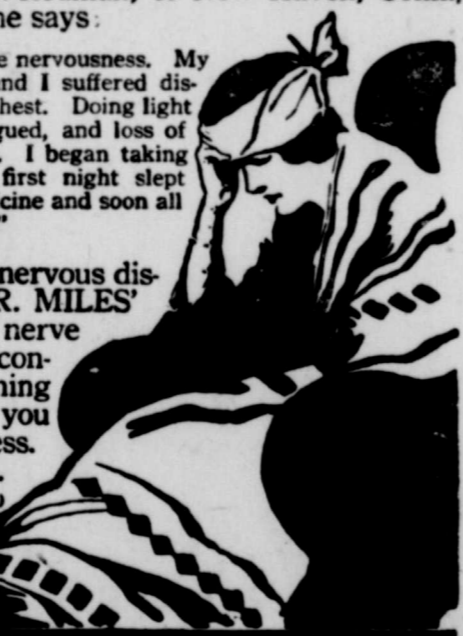

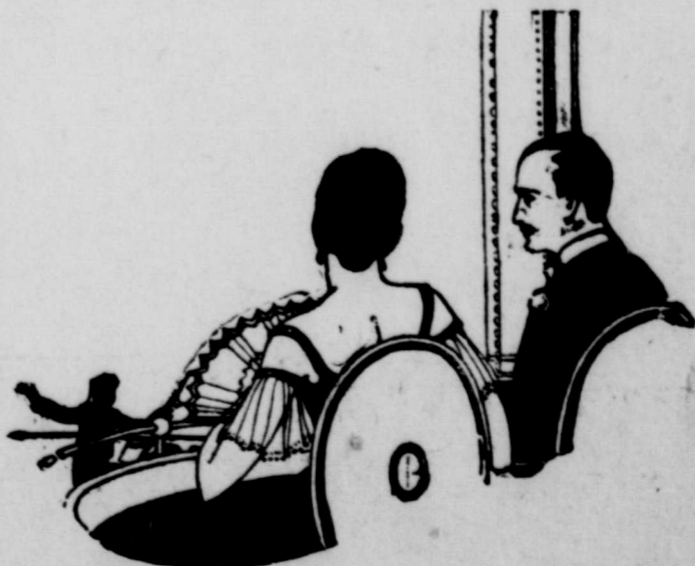

### LIVE BUNCH OF WACO BUSINESS

#### MEN VISIT CISCO IN 7-COACH TRAIN

**Famous Bettis Band of 16 Pieces  
Plays Stirring and Patriotic Music**

**Cordial Welcome Given by Cisco Business Men**

**Visitors Speak Words of Praises and Utter Ex-  
amations of Surprise at the Wonderful  
Growth of Cisco. Get Personally

#### SPEECHES AND SMOKER IN CITY HALL

A special train consisting of seven coaches and bearing 145 business men of Waco arrived in Cisco early yesterday morning. These people are spending some several days touring West Texas and stopping at all the towns from Rotan to Waco on the M. K. & T. railway. These business men are making this trip for the purpose of getting better acquainted with the business men in this section.

The train was met at the station by R. Q. Lee, president of the Chamber of Commerce; C. R. Lancaster, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce; J. M. Williamson, mayor; and quite a number of the business men. Headed by their sixteen piece band, "The Bettis Band" the entire crowd marched in double file down main street to the City Hall

where social meeting was held and speeches were made.

The band played "Over There" and the crowd joined and sang this inspiring song. The Waco "boosters" sang a song giving Cisco words of praise.

A. J. Bush, who had the train in charge presided over the meeting.

R. Q. Lee, president of the Chamber of Commerce, called the meeting to order and introduced Mayor Williamson who delivered the address of welcome. In his remarks he apologized on account of the condition of the city, of its seemingly torn up condition, but further stated that he hoped that the Waco business men would come again, and then we could show them a nice paved street, and other improvement

We learn that the Germans are not unanimously disposed to regard the latest peace terms with complacency. There is even now the possibility that they may prefer to fight.

We learn also that if they do so the allies will find themselves in a position of considerable embarrassment. They are not nearly as well prepared as they should be for forcible occupation of additional German territory. Mutinous outbreaks in the British army indicate the urgent need of rapid demobilization and in well-informed diplomatic circles it is admitted that the French authorities are uneasy about the possible consequences of contact between their own war-weary conscripts and Bolshevik influences in Germany. Fraternizing will be hard to prevent, and its results still harder. A superlatively strong military establishment among Germany's enemies is indispensable just now. It seems a peculiar time for America to junk so much aeroplane equipment.

### MEDICAL SERVICE IN SCHOOLS

The greatest asset we have—far beyond crops and cattle and stocks and bonds—is the children of our land. They will be the citizens of the next generation. And if they grow up to health and strength it will mean that they grow up to efficiency and power.

It is our manifest duty to take whatever means we can to bring about the most favorable conditions for the health of growing children. That as a nation we have failed lamentably in this respect is shown by the number of men in the selective draft who were rejected for physical imperfection. Thirty-three per cent of our young men—one out of every three—were below the normal physical condition which makes a man fit for army service.

Many of these young men were subject to physical disabilities which could readily have been prevented or remedied if they had been recognized and properly dealt with the

subject's childhood.

A thorough physical examination of each child of school age should be made twice a year. This would lead to the detection of many incipient troubles and their cure. The time will come when we shall see the services of a doctor and nurse available at every school in the land as part of the school system.

The result will be a healthier, happier and more efficient manhood and womanhood. We should all advocate such a provision for the health of children and should do all in our power to bring it about.

**TERMS AFFIRMED**

Dispatches from New Orleans state that the United States Circuit Court of Appeals has affirmed the sentences of G. T. Bryant, Z. L. Risley and S. J. Powell, convicted in the Federal Court at Abilene about eighteen months ago of conspiracy to hinder the Government in the carrying out of the selective service draft law. Bryant, Risley and Powell were leaders in the Farmers and Laborers' Protective Association in Texas and were indicted along with thirty seven other members of the organization for alleged attempts to obstruct the wheels of the draft machinery.

Few cases that have been tried in West Texas aroused more interest than the trial of the three men. They were found guilty by a jury and the court fixed their punishment at six years imprisonment. The other defendants were acquitted.

**"Levy War" One Charge**

Bryant was State organizer; Risley, president and Powell, secretary of the association.

"That the defendants conspired to overthrow, put down and destroy by force the Government of the United States and to levy war against it," was the specific allegation of the indictment on which they were found guilty.

It is a part of the record in the

case that plans were made at meetings of the association to kill draft officers; that members were urged to buy high powered rifles; that it was proposed to blow up railroads and take charge of the telephone and telegraph lines at a means of retarding the progress of the Government in raising and moving an army.

In the testimony it developed that the Cisco convention held in May, 1917 in discussing the method of carrying out open revolt against conscription, a speaker had said.

"The President of the United States will disappear during the uprising."

An explanation of this threat was that it was not intended to kill the President but to seize and hold him as a captive.

It was charged that the association had three emblems:

The leather strap to represent the slavery of the worker.

The dirk a sign of self protection.

The pistol with which to oppose capitalists.

United States District Attorney Odell was in New Orleans last month to present the Government's side of the case in the appeal before the high court.—Fort Worth Star Telegram.

**GETTING DOWN TO BRASS TACKS**

What the world needs now is PEACE.

And by peace we do not mean merely cessation of war, but a peace of definite boundaries, plainly defined fights, restoration as nearly as possible of ante-war conditions in the countries so recently at strife.

Since the last gun was fired on the 11th of November, 1918, a great deal of water has run under bridges. A peace conference has sat at Versailles, discussing alternately Utopian theories of internationalism and selfish projects of national aggrandisement. France wants an enormous indemnity from Germany, and England, through fear of losing her commercial advantages, has not consented to the course which will alone make Germany once more a producer and enable her to pay an indemnity of any amount whatever.

Meanwhile, as the days pass Germany becomes more unsettled, more self-exultant and more sullen and resentful.

It is time for the peace conference to cease considering theories and begin on actualities, in other words, get down to brass tacks.

What Germany and Austria-Hungary need is food and employment. All blockades should be removed, that these countries may receive food and raw materials. The central states, regardless of whether they deserve it or not, should be fed, given the chance to resume manufacturing, and so receive an opportunity for the restoration of normal conditions.

Otherwise, while the peace conference sits formulating the principles and bylaws of a league of nations, Bolshevism may raise its ugly head uncomfortably near the door of the conference. It is a time for practical hard sense—not for any dreams.

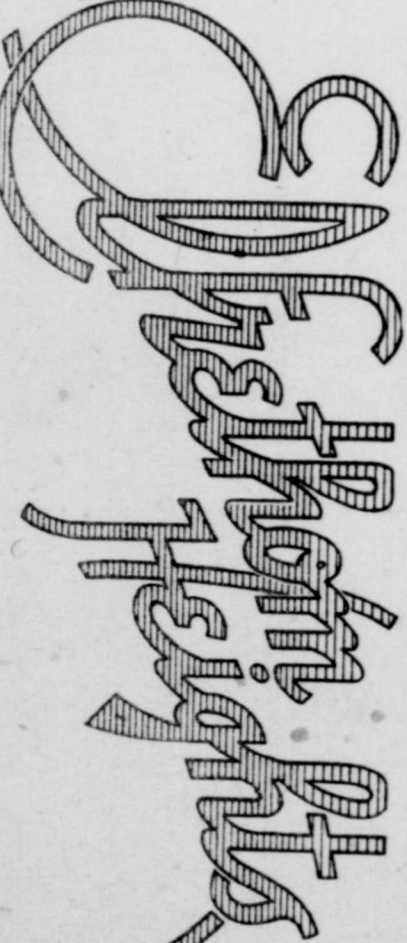

### OIL PRODUCTION NOW ON THE INCREASE

(Continued from Page One)

Terry is a 200 barrel well at 3475 feet and is drilling on below that depth in the hope of increasing the production.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Henson is showing for a 150-barrel well after a shot at 3230 ft.

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 5 Slayden is a 2000 barrel well at 3,480 feet west of Ranger.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 2 Brewer is making 75 barrels a day at 3205 feet south of Ranger.

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 2 Slayden has 600 feet of fluid in the hole at 3400 feet.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 1 Walker is swabbing some oil at 3,240 feet.

Gulf Production Co.'s No. 1 Eastland has been shot with 60 quarts of nitro at 3515 feet with no results.

States Oil Corporation's No. 1 Parrack six miles north of the village of Eastland is drilling again at 3900 feet in the state. This test got a sand at below 3600 feet that looked good for several hundred barrels a day. It was drilled on through the sand, and got salt water which cut off the flow of oil. It is drilling again to test for deeper sand as the folding of the structure is not known definitely in this vicinity the Parrack being the first test to reach 3600 foot sand.

The Atlas Oil Co.'s No. 1 Mann in the southern part of the county has resumed drilling after being shut down for several months and considered a failure.

In the early stages of the development of Eastland county the southern part of the county was largely condemned by a few dry holes in various sections along the southern end. System Oil Co.'s No. 1 Underwood the test on the Alsbrook just west of Gorman the Brashear well of McAllister et al., the Main well of the Atlas Oil Co., and possibly others, tended to make the southern part of the county look nonproductive.

After the Brashear well had been abandoned for sometime it was found that several hundred feet of oil had "seeped" into the hole. Later it began flowing a little, and was rigged to a tank and line. It is now

one of the consistent producers of the field.

Sometime ago it was reported that the Mann well of the Atlas Co. was sanding 1800 feet in oil. Now it is being cleaned and drilled deeper, and may yet prove to be a producer.

Texas and Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Whitson will go on the pump at 3640 feet. The well is located about a mile north of Ranger.

The Norwood well of the Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co. is still making a lot of oil, though an accurate gauge of the well was hard to obtain.

The Norwood is an old well that was drilled deeper and started out making 12,000 barrels a day. Its production is likely below 10,000 barrels this week, though it is yet the biggest well in the Ranger field.

Barnadale Oil Co.'s No. 1 Brown southwest of Cisco is shut down at 3230 feet with an increasing gas pressure and some oil showing. It is estimated at 30 to 50 barrels.—Oil Weekly.

### BRECKENRIDGE DISTRICT

The daily production from Stephens county this week is about 22,000 barrels a day, only about 5000 barrels a day below the production of last week when the W. E. Carey well of the Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company was doing its best, and several other new producers were in.

This cannot be said to represent the actual settled production of the field, as a lot of the oil is coming from the Carey well, 10,000 barrels a day of it, and this cannot be expected to hold up at this figure. With the wells under way and nearing completion in this county, however, the figures should steadily increase during the next six months.

The Bradford well of the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company in Section 66, block 6 of the T. & P. RR. Survey has been drilled into

salt water at 3590 feet.

This well was reported completed in January and was making about 300 barrels after drilling deeper in February. Its production fell off and it was decided to drill deeper for another sand. The well is ruined unless the salt water can be plugged off.

The Texas Company's No. 1 John Black, between Breckenridge and Caddo has the hole full of water in the week at 3390 feet.

The Texas Company's No. 1 E. S. Curry is drilling at 3225 feet.

The Gladstone Oil and Refining Company's No. 1 Stephenson is making 50 barrels a day at 3520 feet, late in the week.

The Texas Company's No. 1 Grosch is good for 100 barrels at 3,100 feet, and will drill deeper, after setting a packer.

Superior Oil Company's No. 1 Haga man is a 25 barrel well at 3243 feet.

The Texas Company's No. 1 Pierce is good for 200 barrels a day with an 80 foot sand at 3200 feet. The well is located about four miles west of Breckenridge.

The Mid-Kansas Oil and Gas Company's No. 1 Jennings north of Ranger in Stephens County is still making a heavy flow of gas, and 10 to 15 barrels of distillate, and is not being drilled any deeper. The well may be saved for a gasser.

The Texas Co.'s No. 1 Keathley 6 miles southeast of Breckenridge will shoot at 3317 feet; No. 1 Black Bros. is shut down at 3485, making 50 barrels; W. F. Houston will go back for shot at 3427 feet; No. 1 Brooks, 3 miles south of Breckenridge is drilling at 3220 feet; No. 1 Chaney 5 miles south of Breckenridge is fishing around at 3195 feet; No. 1 Pace is building a new rig at 3305 feet; No. 1 C. H. Houston is changing tools at 3347 feet; No. 1 Billingsley 3 miles southeast of Breckenridge is drilling at 3215 feet; No. 2 Sandidge 2 miles southwest of Caddo is drilling at 3250 feet; No. 2 Brooks 6 miles east of feet; No. 2 Brooks 6 miles east of No. 2 Parks 5 miles southeast of Breckenridge is changing tools at 3,477 feet; No. 1 Havins is fishing at 3667 feet.

Lone Star Gas Co.'s No. 1 Cassell is shut down and will plug back for shot.

Manhattan Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Moon is shut down at 3417 feet.

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Proctor is drilling at 3895 feet No. 1 Powers is drilling at 3385 feet.

Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Yates is drilling at 3015 feet.

The production of the present week shows a gain of 5,420 barrels over the week just closed in the North Central Texas fields and Comanche County; with its 10,000-barrel well on the Tex-Penn Petroleum Company, No. 1, on the Knowlies, which was drilled deeper, increasing its flow from 850 barrels to the above figures, and some reports place the well's production at an even higher output.

Stephens and Eastland Counties show a little decline due to the falling off somewhat of the big wells in those fields, the first named losing 2,000 barrels and the latter 4,000 barrels. Burk Burnett shows a gain of 500 barrels over the past week while Electra shows a little loss. The steady gain of the past few weeks in the entire district argues well for a constantly increasing production in the months to come unless water conditions shut down the activity in the summer months.

As has been stated, the Tex-Penn well furnished the sensation of the week, although the Carey and the Norwood wells still continue to hold their own and rank right along with the Comanche well. It is the second time the Knowlies well has been deepened, the first time increasing its flow to 5,000 barrels.

The Phoenix Oil Company's well in Erath County is a disappointment. It was shot with 40 quarts from 3,035 feet and with a similar amount of nitro from 3102 to 3114 feet and the net results are about a 15 or 25-barrel well.

**UTILITIES**

A few months ago, among a group of towns in one of the northern states, the type of service being rendered by the local railroads created an acute situation. Freight charges were exorbitant and deliveries nearly always a matter of speculation.

The causes of the disease suggested the cure. A few opportunists got together, put up some money, and started operating a motor truck service among the towns. The different communities were interdependent, and welcomed the new enterprise as Elijah welcomed the ravens. Consignments of goods began reaching the consignees on time. People with something to sell were no longer afraid of promising delivery before the end of the next war. Both in rates and speed the truck service competed successfully with the railroads. Everything was lovely.

It was altogether too lovely for the politicians. Politicians never want things to be lovely. They can't pose as saviors when no one is asking to be saved. They can't agitate for reforms when nobody can name anything needing reformation.

So the professional patriots reached the verdict that the truck service was too aggressively useful. It was in fact, a utility. And utilities are things which must always be taken from the people who manage them properly and be run by professional elocutionists who don't know how to run anything, from a lathe to a cigar stand.

Accordingly they demanded legislation to regulate the service, and tell it what it could and couldn't do—particularly what it couldn't. And the truck system—which once satisfied everybody—seems in a fair way to die from overdoses of legislation—just like the railroads.

Anything that everybody finds useful is a utility, and as such is pie for politicians. If you ever invent a new way of using mineral produce, or preserving foodstuffs, or conserving energy, or developing motive power from the tides or solar heat or anything else, don't do it too well. At least, don't do it well enough to make it useful to everybody.

Life was less complex in the day when it challenged each man to do the best he could. We must learn a greater precision, now that the art of living consists in doing one's work just badly enough to escape being forbidden to do it at all.

**IN CASE**

Before the end of the war the English had built and operated submarines that carried twelve-inch guns. All the tests applied to them proved them capable of everything that submarines had ever accomplished—and then some.

We are a little over-anxious about our role of panoplied crusader in a white surplice. The surplice will be none the less white because of the panoply and if our record as a nation is not good enough to guarantee us against any charges of lust of conquest, America has lived in vain.

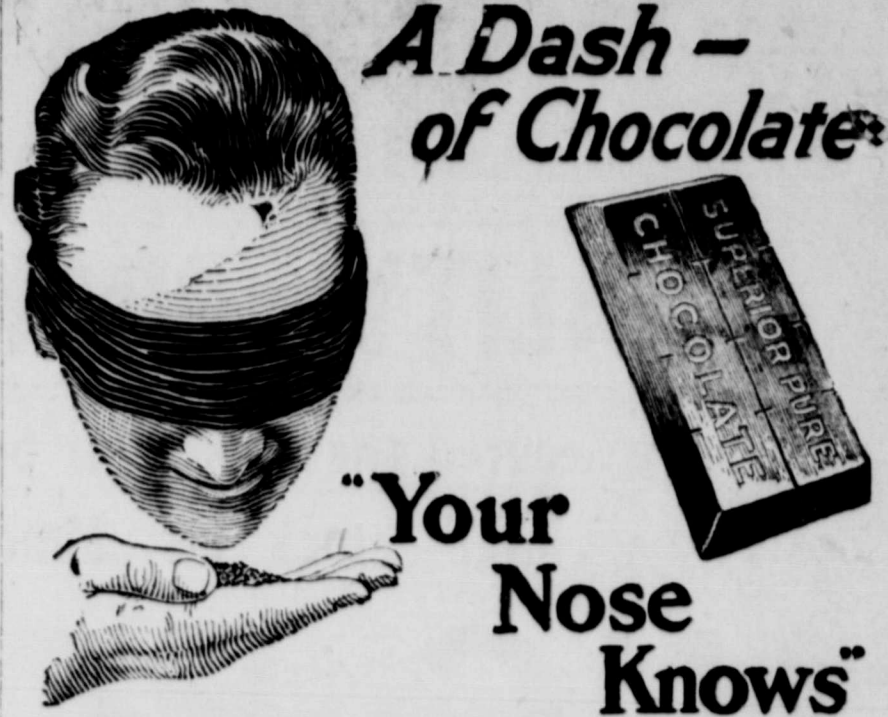

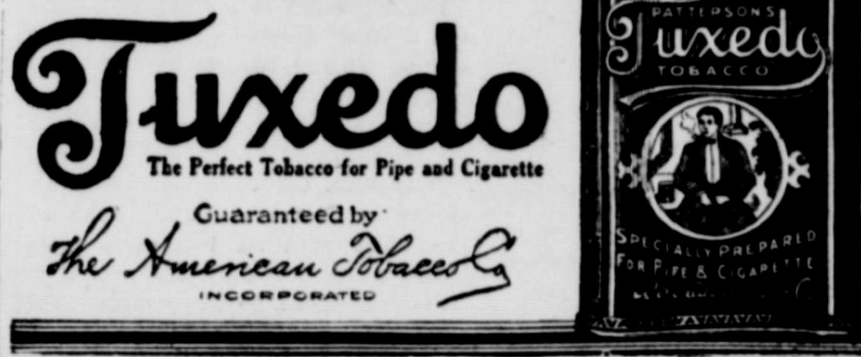

### FOUR AMENDMENTS

There will be four constitutional amendments submitted to the people in the special elections called for May 24. There can be no others submitted on that date by the present legislature, because of the limited time for complying with the law's requirements in the matter of advertising.

Governor Hobby has said that he will call the Legislature in special session about June 17 to vitalize the amendments which may be adopted on May 24. The amendments are embraced in the following joint resolutions:

House joint resolution No. 1: To make Texas dry by prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter, exchange and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

House joint resolution No. 18: Empowering the Legislature to enact laws permitting the State to lend money to heads of families to acquire and improve rural homes for farming and stock raising. It is the Governor's land for the landless platform.

Senate joint resolution No. 7. To permit women to vote in elections held in Texas. It is the equal suffrage amendment. It imposes the obligation of American citizenship to vote and requires women to otherwise be qualified electors.

Senate joint resolution No. 13: Increasing the salary of the Governor's from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each year. At this time there are several State officials who draw more salary than the chief executive of the State.
