# CALL MADE FOR LIQUIDATION OF W.S.S. PLEDGES THIS WEEK

Pledges for War Savings Stamps made by 1,107,336 Texans are due for payment before Oct. 31.

Pledges for November and December should, if possible, be paid during this eight-day period.

Every person in this county should make arrangements to completely liquidate his pledge during this week of Oct. 24-31, which has been officially designated as Pay W.S.S. Pledge Week.

War Savings Stamps equal to the present unliquidated portion of your pledge may be had at any bank, the postoffice or any sales agency.

Because of the immense amount of money needed now by the Government in connection with the vast military operations which are taking place, the War Savings Committee is calling for the complete liquidation of all War Savings Pledges.

To this end the eight-day period beginning Thursday, Oct. 24, and ending Thursday, Oct. 31, has been designated for the payment of the out-standing amounts of all pledges.

"There are some pledges or portions of pledges which call for liquidation in November and December, but in view of the extraordinary needs at this time every loyal pledger is most earnestly requested to make his payment during Pay W.S.S. Pledge Week, even though it may require close figuring and personal sacrifice upon the part of that patriotic person," Louis Lipsitz, State Director of War Savings, declares in the official announcement.

"Not only is it a solemn duty required of us for the Government, but at this time the complete payment of November and December pledges along with the portion due Oct. 31 will be of the utmost value to the Government in pushing to victorious conclusion the vast and vital operations on the fighting front.

"The full payment of the year's pledges may be just a bit hard to make on or before Oct. 31, but I know that the loyal Texas pledgers, thoroughly understanding what their action will achieve, will give full attention to the call and answer it as Texans have always answered their Government's requests."

### Promises vs. Money

The Government can't spend promises. Your W.S.S. Pledge is of no value unless it's paid.

The soldier can't fight with an empty gun and a broken bayonet. He will have to do without gun or bayonet as long as you put off paying that W.S.S. Pledge. The Government can't buy cartridges and bayonets with promises.

The Government needs fuel to use in the engines of the transports that take the fighters to France. The Government can't buy coal and oil with your pledge. It must have the money. Are you willing to tie up the transports in harbor by failing to pay that W.S.S. Pledge promptly?

Every day you delay liquidating your pledge you delay the coming of victory.

### YOU PASSED YOUR WORD

"My word is as good as my bond!" Have you ever heard that said about you or some other person? It means a whole lot, doesn't it?

When you made your War Savings Stamp Pledge you passed your word and gave your bond to the Government. That pledge is due now. The Government is calling for its payment. You pledged the United States Government and you told President Wilson and Secretary McAdoo they could depend on you. Is your word as good as your bond? Prove it by liquidating that pledge speedily.

A man or woman is known by the sincerity and willingness with which he or she does what the Government asks.

Suppose you were attacked by a gang of ruffians who nearly killed you, and you were saved by some plucky doctor who himself was injured in the struggle, but who stayed by you night and day until you recovered.

by buying Thrift Stamps, Savings Certificates and Liberty Bonds on a scale bigger than ever before. We are going to economize and save, not because we are afraid of the Hun getting his foot on our neck, but because we are grateful to Almighty God, our sainted dead, the boys who are coming back with victory in their hands, to our beloved President and his helpers, to all of whom is due the credit for the glorious result.

### We Are Going to Save, Too.

because we have found out that it is just the grandest thing in the world for us, mentally and physically. We are going to save because it brings us a solid satisfaction and peace of mind.

The fighting has ceased, the hands do not play or the flags wave now, but the earnest purpose behind our effort in the great world war remains yet to be accomplished. 

**GERMAN HELMETS FOR EVERYBODY**



Everyone will have a chance to get a German helmet for a keepsake of the great war. Watch for the coupon bearing an order for a helmet. These coupons will be dropped from airplanes which will fly over towns in the Eleventh Federal Reserve District during the Victory Liberty Loan campaign. If you see a scrap of paper fluttering in the treetops shinny up the tree after it. It may be an order for a helmet. It's your chance in a lifetime to get one. These bright, shiny new helmets were never worn. They were a reserve supply to be worn by the boche when they marched into Paris. The boche didn't get there, but the helmets did—by freight. They were shipped in by the victorious allied troops after they marched into Germany.



**COMING!**

Medals made from captured German cannon will be given to every worker in the Victory Liberty Loan campaign. It just goes to show that the Government appreciates what its soldiers at home have done toward winning the war. It will mean to the Liberty Loan worker what the Distinguished Service Cross means to the American soldier.

**WANT A GERMAN HELMET?**

Bona Fide Victory Loan workers will have a chance to win one of these trophies to be distributed among patriotic Americans who kept the home fires burning. The tanks are fully equipped with guns and ammunition just as they went onto the battlefields, and you will get a real taste of war when these guns are fired. Eloquent speakers will accompany the tanks to tell you all about them, and what it cost our Government to "Treat 'em Rough." Your Victory Liberty Loan County Chairman will have charge of the routing of these tanks in your county. Don't fail to see them.

**SEE GREAT WAR FILM**

Among the pictures which will aid in floating the Victory Liberty Loan is the remarkable film, "The Price of Peace," in the taking of which one of the photographers was killed. The film tells the animated story of the great attack at Chateau Thierry; shows a German airplane being destroyed in the air; shows a field gun and its crew being destroyed by a high explosive shell, and concludes with scenes of the American Army in Germany. The film is 5000 feet long. This picture will be shown without admission charge in as many theatres as can be reached during the Loan campaign.

**WATCH THE SKIES**



# ANTIQUITY OF DECORATIVE ART

Strange Sources From Which Pigments Used by Modern Painters Are Derived.

## PRESERVATION OF SURFACES.

Crude but Effective Processes Employed by the Egyptians and Greeks of Pliiny's Day—Noah Prudently Water-proofed the Ark.

Whether paint was invented in answer to a need for a preservative or to meet a desire for beauty is a question fully as knotty as the ancient one about the relative time of arrival of the chicken or the egg. It was invented, though, and it serves both purposes equally; so whether it is an offspring of mother necessity or an adopted son of beauty remains forever a disputed question.

The first men, cowering under the fierce and glaring suns of the biblical epiques, constructed rude huts of mud to shelter them. The perishable nature of these structures caused rapid decay, and it is probable that the occupants, seeking some artificial means of preservation, hit upon the pigments of the earth in their search. It is perhaps natural to suppose that it was the instinct of preservation that led men to the search, although the glories of the sunsets and the beauties of the rainbow may have created a desire to imitate those wonders in their own dwellings.

The earliest record of the application of a preservative to a wooden structure dates from the ark, which was, according to the Bible, "pitched within and without." The pitch was a triumph of preservation whatever it lacked as a thing of beauty.

Decorations applied to buildings first comes to light with ancient Babylon, whose walls were covered with representations of hunting scenes and of combat. These were done in red and the method followed was to paint the scene on the bricks at the time of manufacture, assuring permanence by baking. Strictly speaking, this was not painting so much as it was the earliest manifestation of our own familiar kalsomining.

The first Hebrew to mention painting is Moses, in the thirty-third chapter of the book of Numbers he instructs the Israelites, "When ye have passed over the Jordan into the land of Canaan, then shall ye drive out all the inhabitants of the land from before you and destroy all their pictures."

At later periods the Jews adopted many customs of the peoples who successively obtained power over them and in the apocryphal book of the Maccabees is found this allusion to the art of decorating, "For as the master builder of a new house must care for the whole building, but he that undertaketh to set it out and paint it, must seek out things for the adorning thereof."







**FOUR AMENDMENTS**

There will be four constitutional amendments submitted to the people in the special elections called for May 24. There can be no others submitted on that date by the present legislature, because of the limited time for complying with the law's requirements in the matter of advertising.

Governor Hobby has said that he will call the Legislature in special session about June 17 to vitalize the amendments which may be adopted on May 24. The amendments are embraced in the following joint resolutions:

House joint resolution No. 1: To make Texas dry by prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter, exchange and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

House joint resolution No. 18: Empowering the Legislature to enact laws permitting the State to lend money to heads of families to acquire and improve rural homes for farming and stock raising. It is the Governor's land for the landless platform.

Senate joint resolution No. 7: To permit women to vote in elections

held in Texas. It is the equal suffrage amendment. It imposes the obligation of American citizenship to vote and requires women to otherwise be qualified electors.

Senate joint resolution No. 13: Increasing the salary of the Governor's from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each year. At this time there are several State officials who draw more salary than the chief executive of the State.





## CISCO'S RAPID GROWTH SHOULD NOT PREVENT HAVING A CLEAN CITY

### People Are Neglecting Their Premises, The City Should Be Cleaned-Up And Kept Clean.

#### Property Values Now Justify the Spending of Large Sums of Money On Property--Some Pertinent Remarks.

Because Cisco is busy, because our people are exerting themselves in building, improving, caring for the streets and new corners, and taking care of the business that has increased to such proportions that it is almost impossible to take care of the town, is no reason why we should not have a clean town. It is true that labor comes high and workmen are hard to get, but that is no excuse for not having the premises cleaned. In fact there is no excuse in any city, for this is one of the most important things that confronts us at any time. When the workmen finish a new residence they are rushed to another one, and when the bricklayers finish one business house they are spirited to another job, when the laborer finishes his work he gets away in a hurry, and some times a great deal of trash and rubbish is left in the streets, or pushed away in the alley, and the fellow who has been paying for the work is left with his new home and a lot of rubbish, and no doubt feels that he has spent all the money that he can spare on the new building, but he should bear in mind that the job has not been finished. The pile of sand in the street, the trash left in the alley or street detracts from the new building, and in many instances, where old cans, buckets, etc. have been thrown into the pile, breeds mosquitoes and is a breeding place for flies. Every new house built in Cisco and every house that has been remodeled should be cleaned around, the streets, the alleys, the lawns and the yards. There is one thing that is always noticeable in any city or town, and that is the bad condition of the back yards. The average person imagines that so long as the appearance of the front is kept attractive that is sufficient, but not so. The back yard is the place where the children usually have their play-ground, old cans should not be allowed to accumulate and people should not throw things in the back yard that would cause flies or mosquitoes to breed, for it is then that they come right into the house if per chance they find the screen door open. The chicken lots, the cow lots should be cleaned at least once a month. People as a rule, keep putting off these jobs from day to day and from week to week and from month to month until the town gets in such condition that it is unsanitary. Why could we not have a real clean town? Why not have a clean up campaign, each

home for itself? We should not wait for the mayor to issue a proclamation calling our attention to the condition of Cisco. It would be a shame to have some other fellow tell us that our premises needed cleaning. In the first place we had better begin at our homes. Not only clean the back yard, the front yard and alley, but carry on a crusade against the weeds now growing at a tremendous rate. When we have gotten our homes in "apple pie" order then begin with the business section. Why let the rubbish accumulate around the business houses? Why do business men who take a great deal of pride in making a neat personal appearance let their places of business look like a dump pile? Why will they stack away box after box, crates, and trash behind the building? Why will a respectable business man allow his place of business to get filthy? Why will he tolerate such a condition? We are not talking about Cisco altogether, for this thing exists in most any town. Why will men come into an office and in greeting you will first have to empty his mouth and spat over the amber on the nice floor and invariably in a corner where you can hardly get to it with a mop. Just why a decent man will thus insult his guest cannot be explained. If you should visit his home and greet him with a "spat" as he greets you in your office a shot gun would no doubt seem a small implement to him. Some men are worse than hogs, and the condition of their mouths are worse than that of a dog. They give less attention to cleanliness of their mouths than do the average dumb animal, and yet if you told him that he had less sense he would want to "put out your light." Some men keep their "chicken traps" in such bad repair and in such unsanitary condition that it is a wonder that the divorce docket is kept so small a number. And the wonder is that some women object to the men staying out both day and night. If every man and woman in Cisco should at one time realize the importance of keeping the mouth clean the local dealers would not have sufficient stock of tooth brushes and tooth paste to supply the demand. And Cisco is not in a class to herself, either. But why not let us wake up to the fact that we should at least have a little common sense. If the average persons would use

common sense in caring for their teeth we would not need one half the dentists we now have. But the people will pass all such advice as this by, and I doubt if this will result in the sale of half a dozen tooth brushes. But back to the condition of the town and not so much personality. Take the average man and he works from eight to twelve hours per day. He is wrapped up in his business, in fact does not divide his time with thoughts that should give him more profit than does his thoughts spent studying big business. The woman is at home both day and night and takes great pride in the appearance of the home, but what does she do? She is constantly reminding the husband about this little thing and that little thing that is needed. He gives it a passing thought and seemingly has no interest in it. His thoughts drift to his place of business. He works and talks all day. When he goes home he talks of practically nothing except his business. His wife spends the day at home working all day, and when they meet of evenings she must listen to his business talk, and he has little time to listen to her business talk. What is the result? The improvement of the home is neglected. The work that the wife cannot do goes undone, and all the time, all the thought is made money out of the business. Take the average business man and he is a slave to his business, in other words he lets his business control him, when it should be the other way, he should control the business. So much for the business man. Take the man who works on a salary. Instead of making an attractive home and keeping up the little corners at spare hours, he spends his hours loafing. Not all men do this, but quite a good percent of them do. Why not cut out this and begin to improve and to keep our homes beautiful? The city will profit by it, the neighbor will be pleased and the wife will be delighted. Take for instance a home that needs trees and flowers, or needs some repairs in the fence, the steps or needs painting. Why not spend two or three hours of each day, while the days are long, on work around the home? The result would be that the home would be more beautiful, the home would be happier, the property would be enhanced in value and you will be contributing to help to make the city prettier, and at the same time you will be developing into a more useful citizen. Why keep the business section in such dilapidated condition? Just now the business district of Cisco is going through a very strenuous time. The streets are torn up on account of replacing the water main, and on account of paving the Avenue D, and also on account of the building now in progress in most every block of the business district. But why will some of the stores where there is no improving allow the rubbish to stack up? Why do the business men keep pushing things out and wait for the city authorities to give them notice that they must clean up? Why be so trifling? Most every town, city and village has a clean up campaign about once a year, and this is ridiculous when you

## New Building For Cisco Banking Company





think about it in the proper way. Why have a certain day, once in twelve months, for a clean up day? Of course when the town gets in such condition that the Mayor is ashamed of it, it becomes necessary for him to do something and a clean up day is the best that he can do. Why not every day be a clean up day? Every day should be, and is with the progressive citizen. Spring is now in full glory the flowers are blooming and the place where flowers and shrubbery and shade trees have been planted is beautiful. The rains have caused them to grow and likewise the weeds and grass have grown and are now rank and in some parts of the city are getting to the point where they will soon be unsightly. Every family in Cisco should give some attention to helping kill the weeds, and it should be done right now. The City Authorities should not put off the cleaning of the streets, both of weeds and the trash and the officers should keep close tab on the man who is neglecting his duty. Right now our city should be looked after, and we should not get too busy to keep our streets and alleys in sanitary condition, and our back yards, lots, and in fact every foot of property in Cisco should be kept clean. We notice that some of the vacant lots in our city are in bad condition. The owners should have enough self respect to keep these lots in better condition or sell them to some one who will show that they put some value on them by their appearance. Quite a number of Cisco people are taking pride in the city, a pride in the property which they own, and in fact are constantly spending money to beautify their property. Not spending it in the fullest sense of the word but investing it, would be the proper word to use. In nearly all parts of the city workmen are busy building side walks and curbs. People are having this work done and it adds to the property's value and greatly beautifies it. One year ago property values in Cisco would hardly justify spending great sums of money on improving it but now since every foot of land has become very valuable the owners can easily afford to spend money. The editor was talking to a man last week along this line and he told a little story that carries a great truth with it. He said that he owned a small farm in Parker county some few years ago. He offered the farm for \$850.00. It had an old shack on it which had never been painted. He took several prospective buyers to look at the farm but it always resulted in no sale. Finally he decided that he would spend a little money on the house and that might help him to sell the place. He spent \$50 in paint and little carpenter work. He then offered the place for sale. He found a man interested and he took him out to see the farm and priced it at \$1,000.00, and he sold it. What this man did other men can do. He invested \$50, and received \$150. The business men are figuring along this line and are making their houses better, they are putting in new fronts, they are putting on another story which not only makes a good

investment but makes the building have a more prosperous look. Some men who own business property have made no move to make their property more valuable. They hesitate to spend money, we know not why, but the property is in just the same condition that it was five or ten years ago, and to see all the property adjoining it made handsomer and beautiful, and then make no move to improve it, just why they do this is better known to themselves, the average person cannot understand it. And take the fellow who is living in a home that has needed repairs for ten years or more, and not a nail has been driven, not a fence post replaced, not anything done to prevent the place from depreciating in value. Oh, my! If the entire citizenship of Cisco could catch the snap and get the progressive spirit within them that a majority of them have, this town would move with such momentum that would not only command the attention of the entire State but it would be the guiding star to the people all over the United States as the center of the greatest activity, not as the center of a great oil field but the center of commercial enterprises, the real center of all activities in a business world. The thing that hinders the growth of any city is not dissensions or two or more factions. It is not the fellow who tries to keep the town from building by his loud talking, neither is it the fellow who tries to sit on the lid, but the greatest hinderance, the greatest calamity which confronts any town or city, or as for that matter anything is the indifferent fellow—the man who will not become interested in any way or in anything. The more progressive people have him as a dead weight to carry. The progressive citizen has his indiffer-


ence to overcome and in many instances has to put up money to carry on the improvements for him. It would hate to be in this class. I would much prefer to be called a contrary man, or a knocker, than a lazy, sleepy and indifferent man. Then let us get back to the condition of the town. It is not what it should be. True we have some beautiful homes, well kept, it is true we have some splendid business houses and they are well kept. But they all should be beautiful and sanitary. There is no excuse for not keeping them this way. The property is valuable and is worth careful attention. Public places should have better care. Quite a good deal of criticism have come to this office because of the unsanitary condition of some of our public places, and so far as the editor knows it is just criticism. Some people are taking advantage of the torn up condition of main street. They are stacking rubbish and would have you believe that the building is the cause of it. They try to lay the blame on the builders. The city authorities should see that the business districts are kept clean. If the people do not care about it, they should be prosecuted. The people should see to it that the residence section is kept in the best sanitary condition, and if they do not do it, then the city should see to it that the law is enforced. Summer will soon be here, the mosquito and the fly will be here, and the town should be cleaned up before the malaria gets a hold on the people. Nothing alarming about the present condition of Cisco but now since property has become so valuable people should take great pride in beautifying their property and in helping to keep the city in a sanitary condition.



#### DISASTER RELIEF

##### How to Prepare—What To Do

Should a disaster strike your community, what kind of an organization would you have, ready to handle the emergency? It is not the purpose of this article to cause undue alarm, but we all know that no district of any size can be certain that it will escape for an indefinite period, visitations by fire, flood, disease or other forms of community disaster. We must be prepared, not only at the Division Headquarters, but in each local chapter, to meet such an emergency. The nature of an organization and the methods employed depend largely upon the nature and extent of the disaster and upon those conditions which are peculiar to your locality.

A Relief in disaster, as interpreted by the Red Cross, means the necessary materials and services which the individuals affected cannot provide and the lack of which would cause suffering. The Red Cross does not undertake to indemnify for personal or property losses. In other words it does not take the place of an insurance company, but it assumes the moral obligation of applying the funds and other resources which may be contributed or appropriated for the relief of suffering caused by the disaster, provided the community affected is unable to wholly provide such relief for itself. It is the policy of the Red Cross to rely upon the strictest community to participate to the fullest extent of its ability in the work of relief and adjustment.

The moment a local disaster occurs the Division Manager or the Director of Civilian Relief should be notified by telegram or long distance telephone. He should also be advised as to whether the local Chapter is able to handle the situation without help from the outside. The Mayor should be consulted when a disaster occurs and his publicly expressed desire and approval that the Emergency Relief Committee have entire charge of the work should be given. Work of such emergent character can be effectively handled only under one centralized organization.

ANOTHER CISCO BOY RETURNED

Too much can not be said to praise our boys who have rendered their service in fighting to maintain our country's freedom as well as their own. We take off our hats to them and it is with a heart full of love and gratitude to them that we glad-

ly welcome them home.

One of the first boys to volunteer his service to Uncle Sam was Charlie Austin. He enlisted July 2, 1917 and on the following May he sailed on the "Great Northern" with 3700 more soldiers for Brest, France. But upon reaching the submarine zone they were surprised by a submarine that tore away the end of the ship. Two submarines and eighteen prisoners were captured.

It was not until June 2nd that the landing was made at Brest. From Brest they went to Bordeaux and was there until July 18th. Then came hiking to Chateau Thierry, where they found the first dead Dutchman.

Austin was in action there for twelve days but on the tenth day was gassed and then went to Paris to a French hospital.

After spending thirty-one days in the hospital he went back to the regiment at St. Nechiel but was there only until Sept. 14, when he was wounded. This time he was sent to an American hospital, remaining there until Oct. 8 when transferred to 37 Division Co. I. 145 Inf. This division saw its last action at Belle Woods. They were relieved by another regiment then the 145 Inf was divided into casualty detachments.

Leaving Brest, France, March 20, Austin landed in the States April 2, but was not until Saturday, April 19th that he arrived at Cisco.



**THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY COUNCIL.**

Good for the farms, good for the towns, good for the nation:—GOOD ROADS!

Every good road is a blessing to its locality. Where the roads are in good shape, intercourse between the town and the country tributary to it is facilitated. Perishable products from the farm, instead of being left to spoil on the ground, can be brought promptly into town, and either utilized there or shipped away to find their market. The town has the benefit of increased trade from the farmers.

To these manifest advantages we may add the lessening of wear and tear on horseflesh, wagons and automobiles which good thoroughfares bring, and the prevention of a thousand annoyances. Social and civic intercourse are also made much easier for the farmers. If they can reach their nearest town in ease and comfort they will make friends there, take an interest in its improvements and business and become members—and most valued ones—of the community.

A new body called the Federal

Highway Council has just been organized to further the building of hard roads in all states of the union. It will act as an advisory council to state and local organizations, working in harmony with them and striving toward the same end.

It will back the Townsend bill now pending in congress, which appropriates \$425,000,000 for national highways. This sum, if our legislature pass the law, will be used to further an improved system of roads for every state.

An excellent reason for carrying out this work at present is the amount of employment it would supply to returned soldiers and sailors. The benefits of this undertaking would be felt by every class of people in the nation.



the Duke field this week is about 6,725 barrels. The Duke field embraces wells in the corner of Eastland county that are producing from the same sand found in the Duke and Knowles wells.

The production for the district is divided as follows:

The gas flow in the wells in Comanche county is proving to be a serious handicap, not only to drilling wells in the vicinity of the gassers, but the gas pressure is holding back the oil in wells that otherwise might be producing.

Some of the wells have had to be temporarily abandoned because the crews could not work in the gas from nearby wells that had reached the sand, and also because of the fire hazard.

The Skelley-Sankey well on the Hog tract proved that if the gas is allowed to expand itself the well may become a producer. This well, is now making 500 barrels a day and for several weeks after it reached the sand it made nothing but gas.

The Cosden well on the Carruth tract has been capped and it had been making about 40 million feet of gas, with an increasing amount of oil.

It is becoming a problem what to do with the gas in this field. If it is allowed to blow wild it creates a fire hazard that is not inviting, and is also a waste of the gas. But it has to spend itself before the wells becoming likely producers.

There is at present no way to utilize the gas in this section. Casing and gasoline plants may be installed but it will take some time to do so. Converting the gas into casing and gasoline seems to offer the logical solution of the matter; and this plan is being studied.




