## BAD ROADS HINDERING DEVELOPMENT OF COUNTY

### New Railroad Will be Valuable Asset to Cisco

### A Cleaner City Should be Slogan of Every Citizen--The Sanitation Condition Needs to be Improved.

Since I have been writing the article which have been appearing on the first page of this paper, which has covered a period of something like two months, quite a good many changes have taken place in Cisco and the ground, or rather local history can be gone over again and many new things recorded. I mean the things that were not included in the other articles, and added to the new things numbers of pages may be written about the progress of the enterprise and improvements which have been under way for months.

#### About Our Roads

Since I have been writing about the many things that are contributing to make Cisco a city I have never been able to say that the good roads was playing any part whatever. It is true very little has been said about the roads. The editor of this paper desires to stay away from criticisms, especially where officials are involved. In October, 1917, the road district including Cisco, Eastland and Ranger voted bonds, that is a majority of the voters two-thirds of them, signified by their votes that they wanted good roads. The roads were designated to run from beyond Ranger through Eastland and through Cisco, and \$130,000.00 worth of bonds were voted. The road had been gone over by both a representative from the National Highway Commission and a representative from the State Highway Commission and an appropriation was promised, which totaled something like \$250,000.00 in addition to the bonds voted. This was for the entire county, but most of it was to be applied on the Ranger, Eastland and Cisco roads. This promise of course depended on the approval of the specifications by the commissions. The voters expected the work to begin on these roads within a few months after the bonds had been voted. These voters were told that the specifications recommended by the National and State Highway Commissions would be followed, and were told that not only would the amount voted and the amount promised by these commissions, be sufficient to build a road as outlined from Ranger past Cisco, but that there would be an amount left for considerable lateral roads, that is the roads leading into the main road, and that the money would be prorated in the territory in proportion to the taxes paid. The voters have been disappointed. They are paying taxes but as yet no work has been started on these roads, although one and a half years have passed since the bonds were voted. The writer does not know just what condition the bonds are in, and when the commissioners' court expects to start an actual work on this road, but it is learned that the bonds have been sold and the engineers have been employed, in fact the engineers were employed almost a year ago. Why this delay? The members of the court are busy men, and this probably has had something to do with the delay. Should the voters criticize the officers of the court for the slow progress? The road which the tax payers thought would be completed at least one year ago is needed as no other in the State of Texas. It is traveled over more than any other road, no doubt, or would be if in first class condition. Cisco is not the only town that has suffered on account of not having a good road leading to the oil fields. Eastland and Ranger, and in fact this entire section has suffered. I know that there has been some difficulty to place the bonds, and there has been some difficulty in getting materials during the war but these problems have been solved in other

counties, then why let the people's interests suffer in Eastland county? There is nothing that has retarded the progress of the development of Eastland county, both towns and country as has the bad roads. This writer is of the opinion that the tax payers are not accepting the excuses that are being given. They are paying the taxes. The officers are drawing their salaries. Of course they are busy men, but the tax payers of Eastland county are paying them for their services. They have been employed to do the work that has been confronting them, and they should be able to solve these problems, if they are as capable as the voters thought when they were elected. Why play with the things that so vitally concern the tax payers, and things that contribute so much to the building of towns and communities? There are other districts in Eastland county which have voted bonds some time ago, and no work has begun in these districts, so the writer has been informed. Just who are to blame for these things, the writer will not attempt to speculate, but it seems that some one should be held responsible for it. On the buildings of the roads in Eastland county depend many things and had these roads been built immediately after the bonds had been issued the automobiles drivers, a lone would have been saved thousands of dollars, and the farmers thousands of dollars in getting his products to market. When you study this matter it will become a serious proposition, with every individual.

#### The New Railroad

Some few months ago a move was started for the purpose of building a railroad into the oil fields of Stephens county. A charter was granted and a survey was made to Breckenridge. Later a subscription was made by the citizens of Cisco and Breckenridge and they took stock amounting to something like a half million dollars. The officers of this company have been negotiating with parties for the construction of the roadbed to Breckenridge, and within a short time, so the writer understands the work on grading of the roadbed will begin. There is no telling just what this road will be worth to Cisco. It not only connects the old fields with the town, and the two railroads we now have, but it will mean that the road will be extended to one of the other roads on the north of Breckenridge. If this road is built it will mean an increase in the values of property in Cisco. It means that the people will get an increased price of at least twenty-five per cent. It not only means that we will have more business, that the population will increase greatly, that hundreds of new enterprises will locate here, and it means that it will make a better town at least twenty-five per cent better than it would otherwise. A sufficient amount has been subscribed, or that amount of stock sold, to build the track and put on the rolling stock, and the stockholders have been guaranteed eight per cent on their investment. Who would not take stock in such a proposition. In the first place if you own property here you get the advantage of the increase in the price, and the guarantee that the investment will bring you eight per cent on the money invested. No wonder the stock was sold so rapidly. If any person has not had an opportunity to subscribe that person should see the committee and buy some stock, then invest some money in real estate in Cisco. The price is going higher, and no one will make a mistake by either taking stock in the new rail-

road or investing in city property. Let the people encourage the men who are giving their time to this great movement. The Cisco people should invest their money, especially when they are assured of a good revenue from the investment, and at same time they are helping to build a real city of Cisco.

#### A Cleaner City

When the writer touched upon the subject discussed on this page last week it was not thought that the article would receive half the endorsements as has been received at this office. As you no doubt remember the cleanliness of the town was touched upon, and the many compliments received rather encourages the writer to push the subject just a little further. During the past two or three years there has been a continual improvements along the streets of Cisco. The people have put down many hundreds of feet of sidewalks and curbs. The curbs reach into the streets about twenty two feet and when put down and filled in it makes what is called a parkway. Now in some parts of the city these parkways are being neglected, while in other parts of the city the ground is being cultivated, beautiful flowers and trees are growing in them. When these curbs have been put in the city gives you this twenty-two feet of the street for your own flower garden, and you are honor bound to keep it in a beautiful condition. Take a drive over the city and you will see that some of our people are not caring for these parkways. What would you think of a tenant if you rented him your farm, and in the spring time when the green was seen on every hand that you should visit the farm and this man had made no effort to get the land in condition, he had planted nothing, in fact had let the weeds take the land and seemingly

would plant no crop? What would be your attitude in the matter? Just think of the condition of your parkway. It is almost too late to plant flowers for this season but we can at least keep the weeds cut. What are we doing with our back yards, cow lots, our chicken yards the vacant lots. We own this property and it is valuable. Will we put it in the proper condition or will we not sell it to some one who will take a pride in it? Let us think about these things, and not put it all in thinking either. Will we work as well as talk? Yes, we will do it.

#### Street Improvements

The city officials are planning to improve every street and avenue in the city, and the people cannot afford to let this get ahead of improvements on their lots. No person should allow any of their property to need attention, especially if the city is willing to spend money on the streets adjoining their property. They should at least show their appreciation by spending some of their own money which will not only beautify the property but will enhance its value. If the city is willing to spend money increase the value of your property surely you should be willing to put a little money in with it yourself. The people of Cisco should take the matter up by streets and blocks and should talk the matter to their neighbors. This is something that should have the attention of every citizen in Cisco. The Fire Chief, E. B. Jude, is looking after the condition of the business section. He made his rounds last week, and put the ultimatum to some of the business men who were a little bit inclined to want to leave rubbish stacked up on their premises. Cisco has been notified that if they do not do a little cleaning up in the business section that the insurance rate will be increased. Chief

Gude has been vested with power to see that the law is enforced and he has the right to file complaint against any man who is unwilling to clean his premises and he has the nerve to do his duty and who would be so non-progressive as to not willingly do the right thing when their attention had been called to it. Surely Cisco has no such persons in business. If they live here and are in business, then their business interests will suffer if they fail to respond to a progressive call. Let us have a clean city.

#### Unsanitary Condition

There are some places in the business district of Cisco that would put the officials to shame if they would only take the trouble to investigate some of the places. Take a look at some of our cafes, restaurants in fact take a look at some of our other places such as the rear of grocery stores drug stores, in fact quite a number of other places of business. The refuse such as spoiled bread, meats, slops, boxes, bottles, etc. The city health officer should be on his job. He should make an inspection and if he does not find things in worse condition than he imagines the cigars is on the Round-Up editor. What is needed it seems is that the health officer put the screws to some of those fellows who fail to respond when they are told to get their premises in a sanitary condition. This town should be cleaned, and the business district more especially.

#### Our Main Street

The work on the water main on Avenue D although very slow has been almost completed and the ditch which was made has been filled again on a good portion of the street. Soon the work on paving this street will begin again. One block has already been paved and there will be six or seven more. In addition to

the paving of Avenue D the side it seems that the work is progressing slowly yet the improvements will be appreciated when the work has been finished, and it will be permanent.

#### The New Buildings

The work on the new buildings now under construction in the business section is getting to the point where the finished products can be imagined. The Cisco Banking Company building has been completed as to the frame and roof, and now the brick and stone is being put into the walls. This will be of dark brick with outline of white stone and will be a most beautiful building. The Lauderdale and Judia three story building has the walls and roof finished and the inside work is now in progress. This will be a beautiful building. The work on the power plant building and ice factory building is still under way, the walls have not been completed. This will be the largest building in Cisco in point of square feet of ground covered. The second story on Geo. Winston's building, and the third story on the Chandler building are almost finished. Quite a number of other buildings are still incomplete, but the work still goes on. Within six months Cisco should have the most attractive, the most beautiful and the best business street of any city in this section. There are in contemplation several new buildings for the business section. It is said that two new buildings will be erected on the lots now vacant back of the Red Front Drug Store, the postoffice building and the Maxwell buildings on the corner of Avenue D and Fifth street. These buildings will be on the vacant lots on the west end of this block facing Avenue E.

#### New Residences

Still there are a number of new residences under construction in the different parts of the city, and just at this time the most modern and most expensive buildings are being built. Every week brings the starting of new homes, and carpenters, painters, paper hangers and other laborers are kept busy and others could get employment if they would come to Cisco. Quite a number of people have not been able to get their work done. The lumber yards are busy all day loading out lumber and other materials and one lumber man told me this week that his yard had sold as much in one week as the sales would have amounted to for an entire year until a few months ago he said. The boom is still on and is gaining momentum each week.

#### TEXAS CO. BUYS LIBERTY BONDS

Capt. T. B. Webster who is with the Texas Company of this city received a telegram Tuesday giving him authority to subscribe \$6,000 for Liberty Bonds. Other information given him in this telegram was that the Texas Company had subscribed \$1,027,000.00 in Liberty Bonds during the present drive and that \$6,000.00 had been allotted to Cisco, \$6,000.00 to Breckenridge and \$3000.00 to Moran.

Capt. Webster stated to a Round-Up reporter that not only the company was strong for the bonds but that every employee in the past had subscribed for bonds that the company had always been 100 per cent and that he believed it would be when this drive had been finished.

#### MADE MONEY OUT OF OIL

Henry Evans now living in Cisco but recently moved here from Burkburnett has made good money out of the oil business. He used to be and is yet, a contractor and builder and was employed in the erection of some oil refineries at Burkburnett when he became interested in the oil business. He got some leases and bought some royalty. Later on he was in a company that drilled a well in what was considered wildcat territory but they struck oil and it made Henry Evans rich. He is drawing his money every fifteen days from his royalty which amounts to over \$400 per month, then his increased prices in leases. He has made money out of the oil business.

**GREAT MASS MEETING HELD TO RAISE MONEY FOR VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN**

**Splendid Program Carried Out \$162,100.00 Worth of Bonds Sold At This Meeting.**

On last Monday night at the City Hall a mass meeting was held in the interest of the Victory Liberty Loan drive which is now on in the United States. A large crowd was present to hear the program which was a good one. After the program had been rendered the crowd proved its loyalty by buying bonds liberally. Although in a sense the war is over the people rallied to the call of their country by agreeing to take the bonds the total subscription amounting to almost as much as the meeting held when the other Liberty Bond mass meeting was held, and too that was when we were right in the thickest of the war.

The meeting was called to order by A. J. Olson the local chairman of the drive. The large congregation sang America after which Dr. A. E. Baten offered the opening prayer.

B. W. Patterson was introduced and made a strong appeal to the people in behalf of the Liberty Loan drive. He told of many things connected with the war and stressed the importance of the success of the Victory Loan. He said that the war was not over and gave the reasons why it was necessary to "go over the top" on this drive. Mr. Patterson made a strong speech and introduced the young Australian Sergeant who also made a strong talk. This young man joined the army in 1914 and was wounded early in the war and although he had appealed to the authorities to let him again enter the war he had been turned down on account of being disabled on account of the wounds. He related some of his experiences, and also told of the hardships the soldiers were now enduring and stressed the importance of raising money to help the closing of the war, to get the boys home and to assist the allies in rebuilding their countries. Although this young man had been wounded four times and lay exposed to the weather and bullets on no man's land for almost a whole day he did not refer to it in his speech. He made a strong talk. The quartette sung by Mrs. Burton Thompson, Mrs. B. W. Patterson and Messrs. Chas Bachman and B. W. Patterson was splendid, also the

### FOUR AMENDMENTS

There will be four constitutional amendments submitted to the people in the special elections called for May 24. There can be no others submitted on that date by the present legislature, because of the limited time for complying with the law's requirements in the matter of advertising.

Governor Hobby has said that he will call the Legislature in special session about June 17 to vitalize the amendments which may be adopted on May 24. The amendments are embraced in the following joint resolutions:

House joint resolution No. 1: To make Texas dry by prohibiting the manufacture, sale, barter, exchange and transportation of intoxicating liquors.

House joint resolution No. 18: Empowering the Legislature to enact laws permitting the State to lend money to heads of families to acquire and improve rural homes for farming and stock raising. It is the Governor's land for the landless platform.

Senate joint resolution No. 7: To permit women to vote in elections held in Texas. It is the equal suffrage amendment. It imposes the obligation of American citizenship to vote and requires women to otherwise be qualified electors.

Senate joint resolution No. 13: Increasing the salary of the Governor's from \$4,000 to \$10,000 each year. At this time there are several State officials who draw more salary than the chief executive of the State.

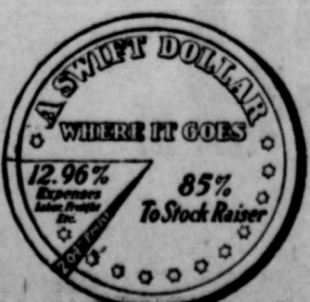

**A WORD TO TEXAS PROHIBITIONISTS.**

By J. B. Cranfill, Dallas.  
The only danger confronting the Texas prohibitionists is our self-satisfied certainty of victory. By common consent, all of our forces are at ease concerning the Constitutional Amendment election, which is to be held May 24. There is no doubt that there is abundant prohibitionist sentiment in Texas to assure success, but this sentiment needs to be vitalized and transmitted into votes. Unless this is done, we are in great danger of defeat.

I have witnessed two prohibition Constitutional Amendment elections in Texas—one in 1887 and the other in 1911. I have no doubt we were really defeated in the first election, but in 1911 the Amendment was adopted by a substantial majority, but was stolen by the brewing, distilling and saloon forces.

In the pending campaign we need to wake up. Everybody is asleep at the switch; even our trusted leaders are so supinely confident, that they are not saying a word, nor turning a hand to win this fight. Even our blessed women are silent and of all our citizenship, they should now be at their posts battling both for constitutional prohibition and the adoption of the Woman's Suffrage Amendment. Unless we wake up, we are in great danger of losing both Amendments.

Let every prohibitionist bear in mind that the liquor devil never sleeps, never takes anything for granted, never concedes a prohibition victory until every possible expedient has been adopted to steal the election, after we win it.

My word to Texas prohibitionists is: "WAKE UP!"

**E. ROPER MOVING TO CISCO**

Wisha Roper now living in Eastland has purchased the J. W. Ward home in this city and is moving to Cisco to make this his home. Mr. Roper owns the oil well in the Ranger field known as the Roper well and is worth more than a million dollars. Other wells are going down on his land. Mr. Roper has invested about \$40,000.00 in Cisco property already and no doubt will be a valuable citizen. He has fourteen children. We welcome this family to our midst.

**BANKRUPT LAND.**

They don't know much in the big cities about the decrease productive power of agricultural land. But we haven't their excuse.

We are not all farmers in Cisco. But we are in a better position than New Yorkers and Chicagoans to know what a farm looks like. There are people in the metropolis who don't seem to know that you get milk from a cow. They think you get it from a milkman. They think tomatoes come from a can.

But there are cogent truths in the science of agriculture which both New York and Cisco seem content to ignore, and which grim necessity will force us to recognize. We shall find the schooling less painful if we start the course at once.

The chemical elements which make soil fertile are nitrogen, potassium, phosphorus, sulphur, sodium, and a few others. The production of various crops impoverishes the soil in proportion to the quantity of these ingredients which they subtract from it.

At the price which tobacco farmers now pay for fertilizer the growth of one ton of tobacco takes from the soil \$150 worth of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash.

A bushel of wheat deprives the soil in which it grows of 50 cents worth of the chemical constituents which are needed to nourish its growth. And when a million bushels of wheat are exported we export with them \$600,000 worth of chemical fertilizer for which we are not paid, and which in some form or other finds its way eventually into the soil of some foreign country which is thereby enriched while ours is impoverished.

There are now in the United States less than 750,000 square miles of land waiting to be cultivated, including all ground not yet drained or irrigated. When this is taken up the steady course of soil exhaustion will be in progress everywhere, and it will be a simple problem in arithmetic how soon we will be agriculturally bankrupt. Altogether it seems high time for us to be taking under consideration the question of maintaining the fertility of arable land.

Sugar beets draw chemical strength from the soil, but beet sugar, after refining, does not contain the ingredients. It remains in the pulp and leaves. That is why the Germans

exported beet sugar, but returned the pulp to their own soil as fertilizer. It contained the nourishing chemicals, and the fecundity of the land was unimpaired.

What they did in Europe we can do. Hitherto the richness of untapped resources have enabled us to neglect those thrifty policies with which older nations have been able to prevent the exhaustion to which all cultivated land is eventually liable. The sooner we start the work of conservation the easier we shall find it.

It seems that our aviators are better flyers than talkers. When it comes to making self-glorifying speeches at banquets, their motors stall.

**New Production is in Inside Territory**

Practically all the new production in the Ranger field this week is in proven territory, though some of the outside wells are looking good, and at least one important extension is promised.

John Markham and the Tidal Oil Co.'s No. 1 Danley is a 300-barrel well at 3450 feet. This is northwest of Ranger, on the border of the proven area.

Gholson et al.'s No. 4 Harrison is a 5000-barrel well at the usual depth. The Harrison tract has been like the Copeland, in that it offered nothing but discouragement at first, and later showed profitable production. The lease is owned by Cull Moorman of the Farmers' and Merchants' Bank, E. N. Dorsey, rig builder and contractor, and John Gholson.

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Keahey is a 900-barrel well at 3365 ft.

**Danley Well Looking Good.**

Prairie Oil & Gas Co.'s No. 1 Danley is making 200 barrels of oil a day, and is not yet completed, northwest of Ranger. This well is in advance of production northwest, near the center of the Mary Fury survey. It is at least a mile north and west of the Copeland tract. If this well should get big production it would be of considerable importance in extending development towards the Farrack and Harrell wells directly north of Eastland.

**Other Completions**

Thompson et al No. 1 Thompson is an 800-barrel well at 3450-70 ft.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 3 Huffman is a 300-barrel well at 3360 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 3 Hodges is a 10-barrel well after a shot of 100 quarts at 3400 ft.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Whitson was increased from 30 barrels to 100 barrels a day by a shot at 3365 feet, of 40 quarts.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 1 Odle, in the same section with the Eppler, is making 250 barrels a day, at 2775 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 2 Bobo is dry and abandoned at 3500 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Gholson is still cleaning after a shot at 3500 feet, east of Ranger.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 1 Allen in the Jno. Foster survey, will plug back from 3500 feet to around 3100 feet, where it had a show, and was given a shot.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 17 Brewer is making 700 barrels a day at 3306 feet.

Texas & Pacific Coal & Oil Co.'s No. 1 Davis is dry after a shot at 3470 feet.

Barsdale Oil Co.'s No. 1 Brown, south of Cisco, has been shot with 500 quarts at 2910-3265 feet and is cleaning out.

Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s No. 1 Harris in the Olden section is increasing its flow and was making 1800 barrels this week without being agitated.

**Stephens Production Stronger**

The big well of the week for Stephens county field is holding up well in the face of some decided slumps in individual wells.

The big well of the week for Stephens county was brought in by the Brazos River Oil & Refining Co., M. H. Hagaman tract, Section 115, S. E. corner of the county, with a flow of practically 200 barrels an hour. Official reports as to depth of well and depth of sand have not yet been given out, but the well has kept up this production since being shot in on April 23. A well on the same tract, a little to the northwest, owned by the Superior Oil & Gas Co. came in natural with a 500-barrel flow. The well was down about 3,400 feet and the information is that the pay sand was just barely scratched. The opinion is that this

will make a better well than its neighbor to the southeast.

The Strab Oil Co. brought in a 50-barrel well on the D. Z. Pierce tract, in the same neighborhood, at 1,780 feet.

A 200-barrel well was brought in Friday by The Texas Co. on the J. S. Pierce tract, Section 2094, T. E. & L. survey, southeast of town at 8 feet in the lime.

The Humble Oil & Refining Co. on the Crudington tract, T. E. & L. survey, northwest corner of the county, has a fishing job at 2,000 ft.

Mr. Byrd of Tulsa, Oklahoma representing an independent company, of that city, visited the Smith well on the C. B. Brown tract, section 22, Lunatic Asylum Lane, southeast, which came in Thursday, and pronounced it a good one. The location and formation in that vicinity makes it look like a big well. There is a ledge to the east and the well is located on a slant.

"It is good for a 2500 to 4000-barrel well, at least," said Byrd. "It will far surpass the K Stoker."

Byrd is looking over this territory preparatory to putting in a pipe line in case his company acquires holdings here.

A site has been selected two miles south of Ranger for the erection of a 3,000-barrel refinery. The plant will be owned and operated by the Duncan Oil and Refining Company, recently organized with a capital of \$250,000.

The site is near the casinghead gas plant of Chestnut & Smith on a

200-acre Duncan tract. Adjacent to this property is a 500-acre tract held by the new company, on which there is 8,000 barrels production.

Officers of the company are T. W. Duncan, president; M. E. Colclozier, vice-president; W. J. Connell, secretary-treasurer; Adra Hugman, director; Thomas Flake, promoter, director and fiscal agent; Ray Davis, director.

The members of this company are successful business men and they have declared their intention of backing the organization to the limit with the view to making it one of the biggest enterprises in the Ranger field.

Construction work will begin within twenty days, and every effort will be put forward to have the plant ready for operation by July 1.





**SAVE THE SURFACE.**

Save the surface and you save all. Disintegration and decay are conditions which usually start at the surface of any material. Protection against deterioration or rot of substances, therefore, should begin with care of the exterior. ## SIMPLE FACTS

### ABOUT THE NOTES OF THE VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN.

There are two kinds of notes being issued. Both mature in three or four years, as the Government chooses later.

The first kind bear 4 3/4% interest yearly, payable every six months. These are free from State and local taxes, except estate and inheritance taxes, and are also free from the normal Federal Income taxes.

The second kind bear 3 3/4% interest and are free from taxation as the others are, but in addition are free from super-taxes and every other form of taxation, except the usual estate and inheritance taxes.

Ten per cent on July 15.

Twenty per cent on August 12.

Twenty per cent on September 9.

Twenty per cent on October 7.

Twenty per cent on November 11, with accrued interest on deferred installments.

Payment in full can be made on May 20, the ten per cent required with application having been duly paid on or before May 10. Payment can also be completed ON ANY INSTALLMENT DATE with accrued interest.

This accrued interest is the money you refund the Government on account of the fact that it pays you interest on the full amount of your Bond from May 20, whereas it does not have the full use of your money until you have paid the last installment. This amounts to very little of course.

These notes will be issued in denominations of \$50, \$100, \$500, \$1000, \$5000, \$10,000 \$50,000 and \$100,000.

### ARE YOUR TAXES HEAVY? THEY MAY BE HEAVIER YET

### CISCO SOLDIER WRITES SOMEWHERE IN GERMANY

Mr G. Fisk,  
Cisco, Texas;

Dear Editor and Friend:

Just a few moments is all I ask you to spare me. I am not writing you to get my letter in your interesting paper, but read as much of it as you can stand and throw it in the waste basket, or publish as much of it as you want to.

But since reading a dear old "Cisco Round-Up" that mother sent me, I noticed a letter from Sgt. John Harrell and also one from Sylvester Boggs who are in Germany doing garrison duty, and so am I. Private Boggs says he had heard from Roy, and I took for granted that he meant Roy Graves, and if he did, I might say that Roy is not with his old company, but his division (90th) is in Germany and is doing its share of the "Army of Occupation" work.

As soon as I read Serg't. Harrell's letter tonight I went to my Captain at once and put in my application for a pass to Coblenz. That place is only fifty kilometers from where I am stationed (two hours' ride by train) and I am sure going to find John Harrell if it takes me a week. Boggs did not say where he was, but as for me, I am at Berncastle, Germany and sick, but not dangerously. I hope. I eat everything I can get and I work all the time, but I am home-sick now and want to get sea-sick real soon (toot-sweet) and after that, love-sick. The only way I want the flu is to few home. I did have the flu two months ago and was in the hospital thirty-two days. Say, that flu business goes hard after being gassed a couple of times, but I am enjoying good health now, and it is certainly appreciated.

Tonight I am on guard, and therefore I have plenty of time to write. I am Corporal, and do not have to walk post, but post my guards every two hours. We have a good guard house to stay in, with electric lights and a good stove. I am on duty from 10 p. m. until 2 a. m. then I get to sleep until 10 a. m., then go on until 2 p. m. tomorrow, and at 5 p. m. we get relieved by a fresh bunch of men. We have guard-mount at 5 p. m. every day. It is not so awful hard work, just sit around a good stove, but believe me, it was sure hard work last August, and on up to November 11th, when it comes to my idea of this war Sherman was right about that argument.

Along about dark one night while in the front line trenches I was just posting my men when Roy Graves came up and visited for a short time just from 8 p. m. until 1:30 a. m. Gee, but I never was so glad to see anybody in my life. He was the first Cisco boy I had seen, and the only one. We sat in that trench and talked about Cisco, Texas while the G. I. cans from the Germans side whistled over our heads, until we could think of no more to talk about. Just a night or two later Roy was in a raiding party and got killed. Sam Clark from Rising Star, Albert Sea of Romney and Phillips of Ranger are all the Eastland county boys in this Co. now.

I could write a long letter about the front and the fighting, but I have kept a diary of all my round, so when I get home I can tell you all you want to know about my trip across the Atlantic with submarine troubles and 90 days' fighting on the front at St. Mahiel, Verdun front and the Argonne. But what I want to do is to get back home where I can read the Round-Up before it grows whiskers and also see how Cisco is growing. Everybody in my

company knows I am from Cisco, and if they read in some paper about oil near Cisco they come and tell me about it, and ask if I would like to be back there now, and filling the office of Chief of Police. Just one year ago the 26th of this month I left Cisco, and here's hoping that I will be back there before I have to see another "service-shiverer" on my coat sleeve. Respectfully,

**OIL ACTIVITIES**

It was reported Saturday that the Bradley Company were negotiating for the purchase of the holdings of the United Oil Company in the Burk Burnett field. The report was that the purchasing company is to pay the stockholders of the United Oil Company two and a half for one for their stock and issue them an equal amount of stock in the Bradley Company. President L. Anthony Lang of the United Oil Company admitted Saturday night that such an offer had been made the stockholders thru the regular channels, but that the deal had not been closed.

The United Oil Company has ten acres of land near the new Burk-Wagoner well, which has caused such a sensation in the Burk Burnett field. The company has one well down to a depth of 1600 feet.

The Gladstone Oil & Refining Co. has the rig up for its first well on the Wright tract, in Eastland county, near the Norwood of the Texas & Pacific Coal and Oil Company, according to a statement issued on April 24, to the stockholders by J. O. Galloway, president of the company. This acreage has been recently acquired by the Gladstone Company and its development will be rushed. The company now has seven wells drilling in Eastland county, according to statements of the president.

Stockholders are advised that a quarterly dividend of 10 per cent, beginning in July, will be recommended at the next meeting of the Board of Directors of the company.

The well No. 1 of the Duke Dome Oil Company in the Desdemona district has set the eight-inch casing at 2,000 feet and is now drilling at a depth of 2,100 feet, according to a report from L. A. DeLaney, field manager of the company, who was in Fort Worth Monday. They expect to reach the black lime the latter part of this week, where the six and five-eighths inch casing will be set. Without any bad luck it is expected the well will be completed early next week.

The County Commissioners of Eastland county will meet in special session in Eastland Monday, May 5, for the purpose of considering propositions to lease the public roads for drilling purposes, several parties having propositions of this character to submit. It is believed that leases of this nature will be looked upon with disfavor by the court, since the attorney general has ruled that the county roads cannot be leased for any purpose.

The Amarillo Alaska Oil Association is unloading a heavy standard rig and will begin drilling at once on their lease on the Purvine ranch located in the northwest portion of this county.

Several other companies expect drills within the next ten days and fifteen wells may be sunk within the next sixty days.

An addition to the Odessa refinery near Ranger, is under construction. When completed the capacity of the plant will be greatly increased. At present more than 600 barrels are handled daily and the plant is running one-half capacity, according to reports recently given out by officials of the company.

Andy Urbin's, east southeast of Abilene resumed drilling Friday after several weeks' shut down.

The Fort Phantom Hill Oil Company's test is removing a collapsed casing. The Wood-Gulf-Humble is cleaning out.

The Ranger Texas Oil Company has an 1,800-barrel well in its No. 1 Booles in Stephens county, according to W. R. Dodson of the company, who has just returned from the field. The location is about four miles north of Ranger. The well came in Saturday afternoon.

The Booles struck the top of the sand last week, and the first indications were that it would be one of the good producers of Stephens county.

Hogg No. 1 of Skelley and Sankey in the Desdemona district was shot with 120 quarts of nitro and the flow increased from 350 barrels to 1,150 barrels. This is one of the oldest wells in the Desdemona district, coming in shortly after the Duke and the Knowles wells of the Tex-Penn Company. The production of the Hogg has varied considerably, especially after the completion of the Hogg well of the Sinclair Gulf Oil Company, which offset the Skelley & Sankey well to the west.

This makes two good producers on the Skelley & Sankey Hogg lease, their well No. 1 making about 2,200 barrels following a shot last week.

The Allen well fourteen miles southwest of Thurber, drilled in several months ago, is considered by the promoters as being a fine producer, and only the pioneer of a great field in that section.

Dripping Springs test, four miles southeast of Allen, is drilling at a

depth of 2,000 feet, and has a good showing of some gas and oil. This prospect is being watched very closely, as it means an extension of the Allen field. All other wells are making rapid progress.

There is a general feeling among operators that this week will tell a very important story in connection with the new development at Burk Burnett. There are a number of wells in the neighborhood of the

Burk-Wagoner and Golden Cycle wells that are due to reach the depth of the sand this week. With no hard luck these wells will have reached the sand by the last of the week and will, in a measure, determine whether the new development around the Burk-Wagoner and the Golden Cycle, is a new pool or an extension to the present Burk Burnett field.

The producing horizon in the new wells is on an average of 100 feet be-

low that in the old or townsite field. It is reported, and the oil is also said to be of a different grade. It was said Monday the new oil has a specific gravity test of 42 and is of a greenish color, while the oil in the townsite pool tests a little less on the average and is of a darker color.

Dealing in acreage is at a high stage. Some operators do not consider the high prices asked for offset acreage as unusually high in view of the comparatively small cost of development and the big production.

Thomas & Ludlow of Oklahoma City and O. G. Devenish of Ft. Worth are rapidly maturing plans for drilling eight wildcat wells in Menard and Kimble counties. Definite locations have already been made for four of these tests and tentative locations for the remaining four are made. Rigs for the first four wells are either on the ground or enroute to the acreage and the other rigs will be on the ground within the next sixty days, it was announced Monday.

The geological structures in these counties have been run out by L. S. Kempher and William R. Jewell. It is claimed that the Bend time, where it is exposed south of the Mason-Llano uplift, has about twice the thickness as the same formation to the north of the uplift. There is said to be a marked exposure of the Bend along the Perdennes River in Gillespie county.

The Gibson well south of Strawn was shot yesterday with sixty quarts of nitro, and is reported to be standing full of oil. It seems that production is certain.

It is expected that the Sun Company's No. 2, will be brought in within the next ten days.

**GOOD RAINS**

Since our last issue this section of Texas has had good rains and the benefit to the grain crops cannot be estimated. We now have prospects of a heavy crop of both wheat and oats.

### FORGET THE KAISER

The Belgians have adopted a dignified attitude in declining to prosecute the Kaiser. The reasons they give are technical, but there are others—perhaps less abstract, which all the allies would do well to ponder.

The whole case of those belligerents now claiming indemnities from Germany depends upon the plea that the whole German people are to blame for the orgy of devastation which has cursed the last four years.

If the Kaiser and his immediate entourage caused it by exercising the privilege of autocracy, and the mass of the people merely obeyed orders, then the German populace can plead a good excuse.

But if the Kaiser simply acted as the spokesman of the German nation in deference to the demands of a people enthusiastically in favor of war, then it is justifiable to "soak 'em the limit."

As a matter of cold fact, the latter seems to have been very like the truth. The attitude of the German people as reflected in the press, whether socialist or imperialist, has been almost comically bellicose since 1914. The Kaiser no doubt approved, and was probably about as bad as the bunch, but not much worse. He couldn't have been very much worse.

Nearly every male German between certain ages was, if physically sound, in the German army. The acts of the German army may therefore be regarded as the acts of the German people. The two were coincident. And the conduct of the German army in occupied territory was beyond criticism. It was almost beyond blasphemy.

Soak 'em the limit, and forget the kaiser. It matters little, sink or swim, what happens to a stage-struck megalomaniac, now rendered completely harmless.

### A MATTER OF HYGIENE

It would be malicious to suggest that the government has levied a tax upon young boys, secure in the knowledge that this could be done with impunity. Boys under twenty one do not vote, so that there is no danger of retaliation at the polls.

We do not take such an extreme view. The government has merely acted from inadvertence but none the less it is up to the government to bring about a slight readjustment, if possible.

To put a tax upon sporting goods used by youngsters was an error of the venial kind. The government has enough to do at all times, and

lately has had rather more than enough to do. Faced at every turn with the necessity of determining fundamental questions of policy at the shortest notice it has found little time to devote to matters where fundamentals are not involved. Hence the injudicious tax on sporting goods.

There is no reason why a tax should not be levied on a certain class of these articles. It takes very slight acumen to differentiate between goods of the kind that are merely luxuries used by the very wealthy and the essentials of healthy exercise necessary to bodily growth.
