Chamber of Commerce Doings . . . CITY TO POSTPONE STREET PROJECT IN FAVOR OF HOSPITAL FINANCES

The City Commission, in turning down a proposal by the Chamber of Commerce to widen Burlington Avenue, explained this week that they had taken the action because they thought it unwise to take any further obligation until the Hospital construction expenditures could be determined.

The City will have to spend a good sum of money to meet State requirements and then be ready if a loss comes the first year or two.

The widening project is still under consideration, but action will be delayed until a later date. The Commission agreed that they project was of great importance to Spur but thought it wise to delay action because of other expenditures. The project would cost \$3,000 per block, financed by property owners over a five year period, with the City bearing part of the expense.

CRTC Lets Contract For Telephone Work

Thursday, March 27, a special meeting of the board of directors of the Cap Rock Rural Telephone Cooperative, Inc., was held to open and accept bids for the construction of telephone lines to be built to serve approximately 1200 subscribers in this area.

James R. Wright, manager of the cooperative, stated that the bids received were from the contract between the Alpha Construction Co., in the amount of \$410,366.24, and the cooperative, has been forwarded to REA in Washington for approval. From the date of approval the contract will begin and will have not more than 150 days to complete all of the construction in this 1200 subscriber section.

This cooperative has the distinction of being the first cooperative to have actually built telephone lines west of the Mississippi. The first section was completed approximately six months ago and was built from Jayton through Claydon and reaches near the east boundary of Garza County line. D. R. Florence Construction Co. was the contractor.

At the present time the Cap Rock Rural Telephone Cooperative is serving 262 subscribers with the old magneto type telephones. These 262 subscribers are included in the 1200 members who will be served with the new automatic dial type telephone.

This section of the cooperative is being financed by REA with a \$500,000.00 loan.

Reburial for Area Servicemen Killed In Philippines Held

Relatives of two South Plains Air Force men, both believed to have been victims of the infamous "Death March" in the Philippine Islands during the early days of World War II, attended a mass reburial, which included the remains of two soldiers, at Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery outside St. Louis, Missouri, Friday, March 28.

The two soldiers were Pvt. Stanley J. Fisher of Calgary and S. Sgt. Clyde L. Deering, of Lubbock.

Pvt. Fisher, the Army says, died of cerebral malaria, May 27, 1942. Sgt. Deering reportedly died May 7, 1942 of malnutrition following the "Death March."

Survivors of Pvt. Fisher include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry E. Fisher of Calgary, two sisters, Mrs. J. L. Parsons of Spur, and Mrs. Sam Wahl of Lubbock; four brothers, John, Jr., L. E. Harold W., all of Lubbock, and Rupert, of Little Rock, Ark.; three sisters, Mrs. Lewis Mosley of Fort Worth, and Mrs. A. J. McKaughan, of Arizona.

Both men were originally buried in Cape Tarlac Cemetery in the Philippines.

Post Office Delivers First Mail April 1

April 1, 1952, city mail delivery was inaugurated for one hundred and fifty families of Spur, under the direction of the local Postmaster, Guy B. Karr and Inspector Bell of Lubbock.

Mr. Karr reported that much have had ensued as a result of the change, causing the postal employees to operate behind schedule, and to work long hours.

He produced as evidence of the confusion in his office, a huge pile of letters, all of which bore improper addresses. Each of these addresses had to be corrected before the letters could be allotted to the city carriers. Mr. Karr strongly recommended that all patrons served by the post office immediately advise their correspondents of the new address so that speedier and more efficient service may be expedited.

There are post office boxes now vacant, many of which have not as yet been returned to the post office. It is urged that all people in possession of these keys return them as soon as convenient, otherwise, it will be three months before the box may be used by another patron.

At present, two city carriers have been employed. They are Jackie Simmons and Billy Winkler. These men were photographed by Mr. Sneed of Fort Worth as they left the post office to make their first delivery.

Mr. Karr reports that he, his office employees, and his carriers, are desirous of giving you the speediest and most accurate service possible, and they solicit your cooperation, which is necessary, before they will be able to do this.

THE "DESERT FOX," EPIC DRAMA, TELLS STRANGE STORY OF ROMMEL

"The Desert Fox," Twentieth Century-Fox's dramatic story of

the man who defied Hitler, Field Marshal Erwin Rommel, starring James Mason in the title role, will have its local premiere at the Palace Theatre in Spur at Preview, Sunday and Monday showings.

Based on the best-selling biography "Rommel—The Desert Fox" by Brigadier Desmond Young, which won wide acclaim

Johnson also persuaded author Desmond Young who fought Rommel in North Africa and later was taken prisoner, to play himself in addition to narrating the film.

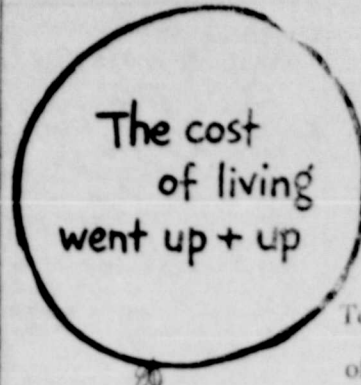

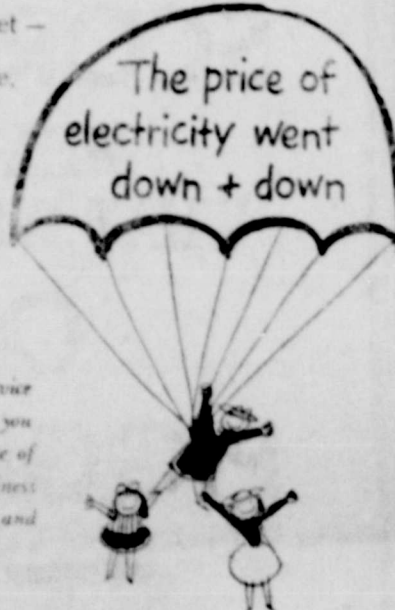

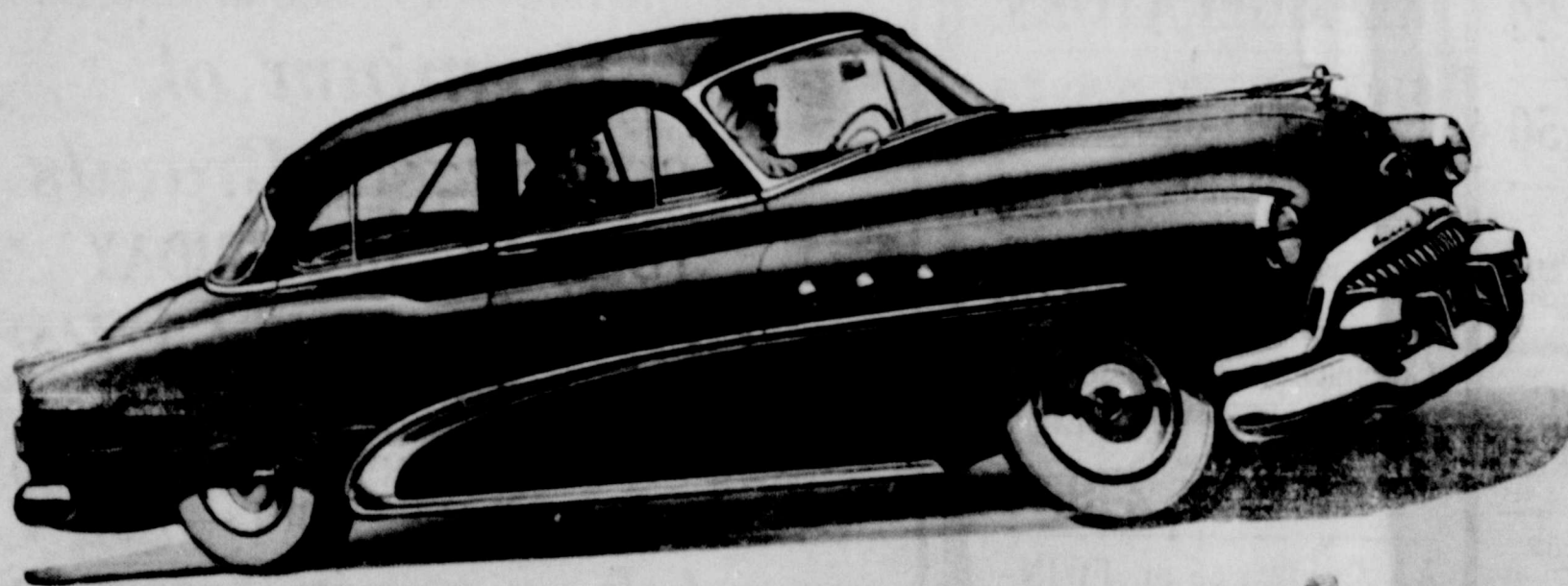

Gov. Dan Thornton Commencement Speaker at Tech

It will be old home week May 26 when the class of 1952 at Texas Tech graduates. Gov. Dan K. Thornton, governor of Colorado and an ex-agriculture student at Tech, will give

the commencement address. He is the second ex-student to speak to the graduating class at Tech. The ceremony starts at 8 p. m. in Jones Stadium.

The Colorado governor was born in Hall County, Texas, Jan. 31, 1911. He moved with his parents to Slaton, Texas, where he attended high school three years, transferring to Lubbock High

School to graduate. He attended Texas Tech two years, then continued his education at the University of California at Los Angeles.

After leaving college he worked in the California oil fields, then moved to Arizona in 1936 where he started ranching and raising registered Hereford cattle. He moved to Gunnison, Colo., in 1941 to continue his ranching activities.

Thornton was elected to the Colorado State Senate from the 11th Senatorial District in 1948. In 1950, the Republican candidate for governor died shortly before the election. The vacancy committee named Thornton to run in the deceased's place, and he had only five weeks in which to campaign against the incumbent. He was elected by a sizable majority and was inaugurated as governor Jan. 9, 1951. The governor is up for re-election.
