

6 miles Control Of Lice And Tick On Dairy Animals A Must

Lice and ticks on dairy cows can cause a sharp drop in milk production, but such losses are easily averted if proper insect ontrol measures are carried out. F. M. Fuller, Jr., assistant extension entomologist, recomnends for the control of lice five-tenths percent methoxy chlor or three-hundredths per cent lindane. One spraying with methoxychlor usually gives adequate lice control but two treatments of lindane at two week intervals are often needed

Fuller explains. One percent rotenone or one tenth percent pyrethrin gives effective control of ticks. Repeated and thorough applications, he adds, reduce tick popuations most effectively."

Fuller explains that methoxy hlor does not control ticks and indane doesn't have long enough residual action to give good re-






