Early yesterday morning down at the ASC office, while the sun was brightly shining and only a few little feathery clouds were loafing around, Ben Overstreet very calmly proclaimed that before the day was over, it would rain in Dickens County.

Personally, we thought he had hit his head or had been plowing too long in the hot sun. Joe Rose just smiled and said, "Well, he's definitely not a new-comer!"

Well, the Justice area, Red Hill and other sections got a pretty fair shower, and Spur got a nice little sprinkle.

Now, we want to know, just how did Ben know it was going to rain.

Some areas got that hard, frozen kind that cuts up cotton. It was reported about dark yesterday that Joe Long's place south-east of town was completely hail-out.

With county agents, experiment station personnel, lending agencies, economists, and a few others stressing diversification as the modern farmers' only hope of salvation, here comes diversification knocking at our door.

It comes in the form of commercial broiler raising through a broiler processing concern and a big feed concern. It comes with no obvious strings attached and with no promise of big money fast—but as an opportunity for Dickens County farmers to spend a couple hours a day and a reasonable investment for a considerable supplemental income.

We visited a couple of hours Tuesday discussing the plan with Ken Looper of Ralston Purina. Trying not to seem too obnoxious or smart-alec we asked him every question we could think of looking for the catch—and couldn't find one.

To us, it looks like a fine opportunity for the area with future possibilities including feed mills, hatcheries, processing plant and breeding flocks.

The first general meeting on the project is set for Friday week at the gym. Bring your questions along and let's look further into the plan!

Commercial Broiler Business To Be Presented Area Farmers Aug. 17

Project Offered As Income Supplement

The commercial broiler business for Dickens County is to be presented to area farmers on Friday, Aug. 17.

Representatives of a large Lubbock broiler processing concern and the Ralston Purina company have contacted local farmers, business and finance concerns and have received a very enthusiastic response.

Arthur Clary, owner of the largest broiler processing plant between Fort Worth and the West Coast, and Ken Looper, district representative of the Purina company will be in Spur Friday week to present the program to county farmers. The two men have already talked with local builders and bankers about construction and financing, and with several farmers about going into the business.

Here in Spur Tuesday, Looper said that a farmer can net a minimum of \$1600 per year raising broilers in one unit costing approximately \$3775. He explained

that Federal Housing Administration Title 1 (FHA) financing will be made available for the \$3,000 building.

Looper added that the Clary Poultry and Egg company will finance the chicks and feed if a grower so desires.

8 P. M. At High School Gym

Next Friday's meeting will be to explain the industry to local citizens and to answer the many questions connected with the project. It will be held at the Spur High School Gym at 8 p. m.

Present at the meeting will be Looper, Clary, County Agent Bob Berry, and successful broiler-growers from O'Donnell, Texas, where a similar industry is now completing its first year of operation.

The program has been proclaimed by those familiar with it as a very satisfactory supplement to a farm operation and as a major step toward the diversification urged by agricultural economists.

Every Dickens County farmer is invited to attend the Aug. 17 meeting if he is in any way interested in commercial broiler business.

166 Area Farmers Use FHA Financing

Farmers and ranchers in Texas obtained loans totaling \$51,416,000 through the Farmers Home Administration during the year ending June 30, Walter T. McKay, the agency's State Director at Dallas announced this week.

A total of 18,348 families were served by the agency during this period.

One hundred sixty-six farm families in Dickens and Kent counties obtained loans totaling \$320,131, John E. Quattlebaum, F. H. A. county supervisor at Spur, reports.

Credit was advanced to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, equipment, livestock and other farm-operating items needed to place farms on an efficient operating basis and to buy and improve family-type farms. Funds were advanced also for soil and water conservation purposes and to meet emergency needs.

County Farmers Home Administration committees must approve each loan application before funds can be advanced. The committee determines all loan applicants' eligibility and certifies the value of farms to be purchased or improved. It also makes recommendations on loan approvals and servicing action.

Applicants are approved as eligible only if other lenders cannot adequately supply their credit needs and only if prospects are favorable for their being able to improve their farming and repay their loans. Families are expected to re-finance their loans with other lenders as soon as they are in a position to do so.

Farm Bureau Has New Service Agent

Announcement was made this week that Floy Watson is the new full time Dickens County Farm Bureau Service Agent.

Watson has been a Dickens County farmer for 40 years and has raised a family of four children here.

In his 40 years here, he states that he has been through the dry ones, good ones, and one wet one. He adds that conditions for agriculture and businessmen throughout the agricultural area are now at their worst in 40 years.

"I feel that I was born to serve and am very proud that I have been selected to represent the Dickens County Farm Bureau in its many services to its members' states Watson.

Area-Wide Poll To Decide Fate Of Spur Meters

The City Council of Spur has called for an area-wide poll to be taken on Spur's parking meters.

Mayor Reese McNeill states that polling ballots will be published in next week's Texas Spur and that additional ballots will be available at the city hall. Everyone 21 years old or older who resides in the general Spur trade territory will be asked to vote for or against the parking meters. Those casting ballots will be asked to sign their ballots and give their address so that a breakdown of city and rural voters may be had.

Mayor McNeill reports that the balloting will continue for one week, Aug. 16-23, and that marked ballots may be cast at the city hall or by mail.

Farmers Meeting Set For Aug. 23

The Spur Agriculture Service Council will have its first farmers meeting on Thursday, Aug. 23. The Council is composed of all professional agriculture men in this area, along with the financial institutions that work with farmers.

The Council was organized by the chamber to give each agency an opportunity to learn each other's work better, and then at various times to present to the farmers of this area interesting programs.

The first program of the Council will feature A. C. Alexander, local farmer. Alexander recently went into the cage layer business and will explain to the group every aspect of his operation which is expected to be very profitable.

Notices of the meeting will be sent to all farmers of this area and anyone else interested in attending, please call the chamber office.

There will be enough cold watermelon for all.

With the prospects of a bale of cotton being ginned in the Spur area in the next two weeks, the ginners and the chamber are in the process of getting the \$500 premium money raised. Nearly all of the gins have agreed to enter the program with good possibilities of 100 per cent participation.

Gins already in the program include Spur Farmers Gin, Lloyd Hindman, manager; Massey Gin, Arner Watson, manager; Rule-Jayton, O. D. Thomason, manager; Dickens Gin, Charles Nickels, manager; Francis Gin, Buddy Francis, manager; and McAdoo Co-op Gin, Rusty McWilliams, manager. At least four other area gins are expected to come in before the week is out.

Groups are being organized in Spur now to raise the town's portion of the \$500 premium to be given the first bale.

New Wage Laws Would Ruin Farmers Says FB President

Expansion of the wage and hour law would greatly cripple the farmer's economy in this county, according to G. B. Morris, president of the Dickens County Farm Bureau.

Farm wages have increased 5.38 times since 1910-1914, whereas farm prices have increased only 2.32 times since then. Since 1947, farm wage rates have increased 27 per cent during a period in which farm prices have declined 14 per cent.

Some of the legislation now pending would include \$1.25 to \$1.50 minimum wage, including farm hands, provide for overtime payments for work in excess of eight hours in any one day, provide for time and a half for over 35 hours per week, maintain records of name, address, time work starts and stops each day for each employee, and other records.

Because many farm workers have a handicap of age, inexperience, or lack of education, extending wage and hour regulations to the farms would greatly reduce the general farm labor output of the market, states Morris. Any insuperable obstacle would be placed in the way of their obtaining employment, he adds.

AUDIT REVEALS CITY DEFICIT OF \$15,000 FOR LAST YEAR

Spur School To Open Wednesday, Aug. 29

Registration for high school students will begin Monday, Aug. 27, with the seniors registering at 1 p. m. and the juniors at 3 p. m. Sophomores will register at 9 a. m. Tuesday, followed by the freshmen at 1 p. m.

There will be a faculty meeting at 9 a. m. Monday, Aug. 27. Supt. Nunley states that the faculty is nearly complete.

Buses will make regular runs Wednesday, Aug. 29, following routes the same as last year.

Haynes School To Begin August 14

Prof. G. W. Kerr of Haynes School in Spur announced today that the colored school will open Monday, Aug. 13.

During that day registration of all students will begin at 9 a. m. and all students are urged to be present at that time.

Regular classes will begin the following day, Aug. 14, at 9 a. m., states Kerr.

Electric Department Net Was \$1,069.49

The Spur City Council has released for publication this week (page 5 this issue) a consolidated profit and loss statement for the city for May 1, 1955 to April 30, 1956. The statement shows the city operating at a \$15,034.39 deficit during the fiscal year.

Of this deficit, the hospital accounts for \$10,034.45. The water fund showed the largest profit for the year, netting the city \$9,724.29. The electric department showed a profit of \$1,069.49, and the gas department showed a deficit of \$1,835.29.

Compared with the budget set up for the city last June by ex-Mayor Walter Gruben and the city council, the electric fund fell shortest in meeting expectations. The budget anticipated a profit of \$18,337.00 on a gross revenue of \$78,200. The actual gross revenue was \$74,481.88.

The 1954-55 consolidated statement showed a net deficit of \$13,098.74.

The largest deviation from the budget was in the anticipated expenditure in the electric department. The budget called for an expenditure of \$59,862.48, while this year's statement shows an expenditure of \$73,412.39—a difference of over \$13,000. Expenditures in the water department had been anticipated at \$31,540, while actual expenditures were only \$24,300—a difference of over \$7,200.

Mayor Reese McNeill states that this year's budget is now being worked on.

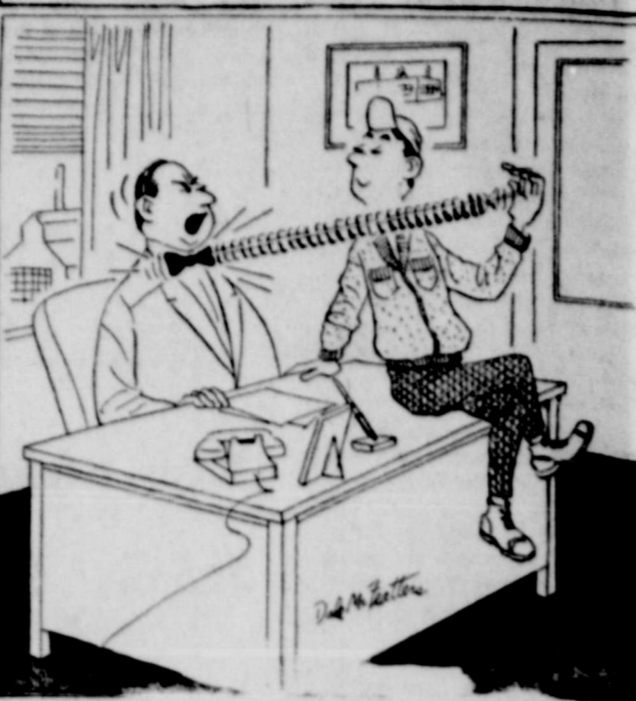

This means an increase in the costs of farm labor as well as everything the farmer has to buy to grow his crops. The farmer is already caught in the cost-price squeeze. His prices are down and his costs are up, the Farm Bureau leader says. Morris said that passage of the bills eliminating exemptions for farms and agricultural processing concerns would mean ultimate ruin for farmers.

"We are not complaining about the wage earner getting a fair price for his labor, but we feel that farmers just cannot pay higher wages and stay in business," concludes Morris.

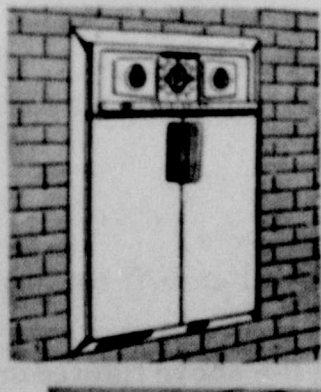
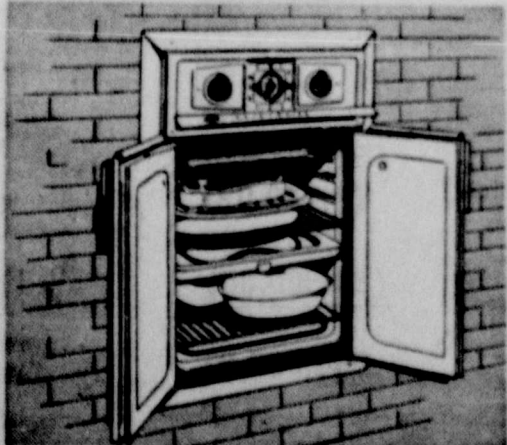

Cotton Acreage Plan Explained

By George W. Ploffenburger, Executive Vice President, Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. As you know, the subject of the amount and use of the State Cotton Acreage Reserve for 1957 has been very much in the news in the last several months. We have recently returned from a hearing at College Station in which representatives of the various sections of the state presented their points of view to the State ASC Committee.

On July 7, the U. S. Department of Agriculture published a proposed regulation in the Federal Register as follows: "Acreage allotments have been in effect for the 1954, 1955, and the 1956 crops of cotton, and in view of the data and information now available in connection with the use of State reserves during the three years specified, it is proposed that the regulations for the 1957 crop will limit the size of the State acreage reserve (except the acreage reserved for small farms) to two per cent of the State acreage allotment unless the Secretary, on the basis of recommendations and data submitted by the State com-

mittee, approves the use of a larger State reserve for the State". Upon receipt of this notice we immediately took steps to write, wire and phone the Secretary's office and the Cotton Division in Washington, as well as our Congressmen, stating that the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., was strongly in favor of this proposed regulation and urging the Department to pass it. On the other hand our friends from the eastern part of the state have been deluging the Secretary's office with demands that the proposed regulation be withdrawn. Since the final decision has not yet been made by the Department, we earnestly request

each of you to contact as many of your friends and neighbors as possible and ask them to write or wire directly to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., urging him to issue this regulation, which would limit the state acreage reserve to two per cent of the state allotment. Such a regulation would prevent our losing further acreage to other sections. Please identify this regulation as a notice in the Federal Register of July 7, page 5065, concerning state cotton acreage reserves. We suggest that each one writes in his own words and point out the injustice done to this area by last year's actions of the State Committee, which deprived West

Texas of acreage earned throughout the years by our upward trend in cotton production. We cannot over-emphasize the importance of your cooperation in this matter and we urge that you take action immediately. In addition to this action we are planning to send a delegation of two or three of our members to Washington next week in order to put every possible effort back of this campaign. Visiting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Rector this week is her father, J. R. Richburg, of Amarillo. He is a former resident of Spur.
