SEAMAN WILBURN RIPPLE AWAITING TRANSFER

Seaman Wilburn E. Ripple, USN, son of Mrs. Myrtle Ripple of Spur, is now at the U. S. Naval Receiving Station, Norfolk, Virginia awaiting transfer to USS ROOSEVELT (CVA 42).

The Norfolk Naval Receiving Station, Commanded by Capt. J. C. G. Wilson, USN, processes approximately 8,000 men a month on their way to and from Naval activities all over the world.

Mrs. A. G. Dunwoody returned to her home on Friday after spending a week in Brownfield in the home of her sister, Mrs. E. V. Riley. The sisters and their mother meet together every summer for a weeks reunion.

Reese McNeill reminds area folks that the sole purpose of parking meters is to control parking space in the business district and not to raise city revenue.

To date the city has paid a total of \$1,527.60 on the meters and installation. Enforcement of the meters has cost \$900.00, making a total cost of \$2,427.60. The meters have taken in \$3,055.12 and overparking charges have totaled \$453.11, making a total income of \$3,508.23, and a net return of \$1,080.63.

However, it is pointed out that if the meters have caused Spur customers considerable inconvenience or nuisance, and are not desirable, then they are not serving their original purpose.

Ballots may be cast either in person at the city hall or by mail. The city council has asked that every ballot be signed and the address given so that a more comprehensive picture will be reflected.

Spur Key Rate Reduced To 31c

Fire insurance key rate in the Spur business district have recently been lowered from 35c to 31c, states City Fire Marshall Joe Bell.

Bell reports that on July 15 a 2c charge was lifted when fire department records and reports were brought up to satisfactory. Then on Aug. 1 the city received a credit of 2 per cent for fire school attendance by Spur firemen.

Next steps in the fire marshal's plans to further reduce the key rate include two new fire hydrants, building law enforcement, adequate water works wiring and dual siren service. All of these, reports Bell, would lower the key rate an additional 15c to an all-time low of 19c. The low rate in recent years has been 28c.

Proper enforcement of the existing city ordinance on buildings within the fire zone, or business district, would merit a 7c credit. The ordinance was passed in October of 1949 but the city has not received credit for enforcing it. It deals with fire-proof construction and repairs in the fire zone and requires a city permit for new construction in the zone. A copy of the ordinance is available at the city hall for anyone's inspection.

Bell states that the ordinance will be enforced in the future and that he is making inquiries as to how and how soon the city can receive credit for its enforcement.

Faubus Gins First Bale For \$500 Bonus

The bale came to town about a week or ten days before it was expected, explains Glenn, so all bonus donations are not yet in. However, he adds, it is expected to be in by this week end.

The bale weighed 600 pounds and was ginned from 2100 lbs. seed cotton. Faubus pulled over 8 1/2 acres for 800 lbs. lint.

Farmers To Consider Commercial Broilers At Gym Tomorrow Night

Tomorrow night, Friday, Aug. 17, area farmers will meet in the Spur High School gym to discuss a commercial broiler business for the area.

The discussion will be led by Ken Looper, district Puren representative, Arthur Clary, Lubbock poultry processor, and several successful broiler growers from O'Donnell, Texas.

Over 175 county farmers have been invited to the meeting by letter, and anyone else interested is urged to attend.

Local promotion of the project is being handled by Eldon "Big Boy" Reynolds and County Agent Bob Berry.

The broiler program as planned will include at least 25 houses in the area to raise 4,000 birds each, five times a year. A grower will be asked to build and equip his broiler house through Title I FHA and local financing. The

Clary Poultry and Egg concern will finance the baby chicks and the feed until the broilers are sold.

Looper states that growers will net approximately 8c per bird following the Puren feeding plan.

If the program is accepted by local farmers, Reynolds will be made manager of a local Puren outlet, handling first only the broiler feed, and with plans for a complete retail store within a year.

The meeting will start at 8 p. m. in the high school gym.

STATE BOARD CALLS HEARING ON WATER DISTRICT SEPT. 10

The State Board of Water Engineers has called the hearing on the petition for organization of the White River Water Control and Improvement District for 10 a. m., Monday, Sept. 10, in Austin.

The hearing represents the initial legal step toward the dam project west of Spur.

The legal notice states that "On the date for said hearing, any person whose land is included in or would be affected by the creation of such District, may appear and

contest the creation thereof and may offer testimony to show that such district is or is not necessary, would or would not be a benefit to the lands in said District or a public utility and would not be feasible or practicable, and any interested person may appear and offer any such testimony."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their office, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly received, or promised to receive any money, or valuable thing, or reward for any public office or employment, as a consideration for giving my assent to the confirmation thereof; so help me God.'

"The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their office, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: 'I, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly received, or promised to receive any money, or valuable thing, or reward for any public office or employment, as a consideration for giving my assent to the confirmation thereof; so help me God.'

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall be printed in the following language:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oath of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and the same shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

"PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956."

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 11-B, giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation and not feasible for the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to the Needy Childless, or be resident in any compulsory State supported institution, providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to amend from Federal funds provided for the State financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals, provided that the amount of State funds may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month out of State funds and may not exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; provided that the amount of State funds shall not exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) per year, providing for the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 11-B, which shall read as follows:

Section 11-B. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature proper, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who have reached their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not reached their sixty-five (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation and who are residents of the State of Texas who have reached in this State for at least one (1) year continuously immediately

previously provided for the State financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals, provided that the amount of State funds may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month out of State funds and may not exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; provided that the amount of State funds shall not exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) per year.

"FOR the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the State of Texas, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap."

Section 2. PROCLAMATION. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for an election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State.

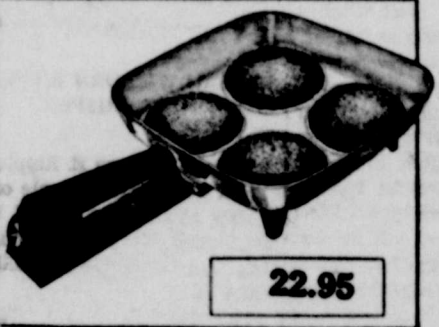

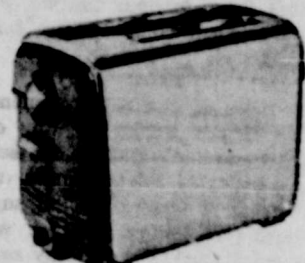

NOTICE is hereby given that a hearing will be held at 10 o'clock, A.M., on the 10th day of September, 1956, at the Office of the State Board of Water Engineers of Texas, in the City of Austin, Texas, Travis County, Texas, upon a petition for the creation of said water control and improvement district, in keeping with the following order, duly passed by said State Board of Water Engineers, to-wit:

On this the 30th day of July, 1956, the State Board of Water Engineers of Texas met in regular session at its regular meeting place in the City of Austin, Travis County, Texas, with the following members present, to-wit:

R. M. Dixon, Chairman; H. A. Beckwith, Member; O. F. Dent, Member; Ben F. Looney, Jr., Secretary.

There came on to be considered a petition signed by more than fifty (50) holders of title to the lands therein, praying for the organization and establishment of a water control and improvement district to be known as White River Water Control and Improvement District situated in the Counties of Crosby, Dickens and Garza in the State of Texas, the territory described in said petition being as follows, to-wit: The area and boundaries of the City of Spur in Dickens County; the Cities of Crosbyton and Ralls in Crosby County; and the City of Post in Garza County; as such

boundaries existed on May 15, 1956.

Said petition prays that said district be organized for the purpose of controlling, storing, preserving and distributing water for domestic and industrial uses, irrigation and for other useful purposes, and for protecting, preserving and restoring the purity and sanitary condition of waters within the State of Texas.

The general nature of the work to be done is to construct a dam and reservoir, lay out, construct and maintain pumping and filtration systems, pipe lines and other works necessary or incidental to acquiring a source of supply and to furnishing the inhabitants of the District with fresh water for domestic and industrial uses, irrigation and other useful purposes.

And it appearing that the Board has jurisdiction to entertain said petition, under the provisions of Chapter 25, Acts of the Thirtieth Legislature, together with all amendments and additions thereto and particularly Section 21 thereof as amended, and it further appearing that said petition is signed by the requisite number of qualified holders of title to lands situated within the territory to be included in said proposed District and that said petition has been duly filed with the County Clerk of Crosby County, Texas, and recorded as prescribed by law, and certified copies thereof filed in Dickens and Garza Counties, and that said petition meets all of the requirements of said Chapter 25 and of Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas and is accompanied by a deposit of Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars, as further required by law, to be used, if necessary, for the payment of costs in this proceeding.

It is, therefore, ordered by the State Board of Water Engineers of Texas that said petition be received and filed and the same be and it is hereby set down for hearing before this Board at its office in the City of Austin, Travis County, Texas, at 10 o'clock, A.M., on the 10th day of September, 1956.

On the date for said hearing, any person whose land is included in or would be affected by the creation of such District, may appear and contest the creation thereof and may offer testimony to show that such District is or is not necessary, would or would not be a benefit to the lands in said District or a public utility and would not be feasible or practicable, and any interested person may appear and offer any such testimony.

It is further ordered that a public notice of such hearing shall be prepared, which shall include a copy of this order, and the Secretary of this Board shall deliver to the County Clerks of Crosby, Dickens and Garza Counties, Texas, an original and sufficient copy

thereof, and the Sheriff of each of said Counties shall post a copy of said notice at the Court-house door in his County, at least fifteen (15) days prior to the date of such hearing and shall publish a copy thereof in one or more newspapers to give general circulation in the area of the proposed District once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks, the first publication thereof to be made at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of said hearing. The Sheriff shall make due return of service thereof, with a copy and affidavit of publication attached to the original prior to the date of hearing.

Upon motion by Dent, seconded by Beckwith, the foregoing order was passed by the unanimous vote of all members, all members voting "AYE" and none voting "NO".

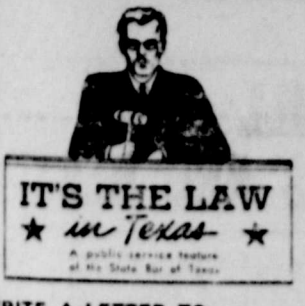

WRITE A LETTER TO YOUR HEIRS

Every person should, of course, make a will, so that his wishes for those he cares for may be carried out after his death. Our courts will then see to it that his wishes are put into effect.

But as a rule your will is too important to clutter with detailed facts and advice to your survivors. It is not the place to tell where you keep your important papers, although your survivors should know. They might need these papers in probate proceedings or to carry on your business. Some of these papers may bear on your survivors' actions.

So put these vital facts in a letter to your survivors:

Where is your will? In a safety deposit box? At your office? Or tucked away some place for safe keeping? You might have hidden it so that nobody can find it. It might be destroyed by accident. Your will is no good unless it can be found.

Who is your executor—the person or institution you want to carry out your will? To whom do you look for sound business advice?

Where do you bank? With whom do you deal at the bank? Some persons have a savings account in one bank and checking accounts in others. Where are your safety deposit boxes? Do you keep important papers in other places? List these places.

Where do you keep all your insurance policies—life, health, car, accident, others? They may cover your family as well as yourself. Your family may wish to continue them.

Where are your personal account books? Letters about your business affairs? Your cancelled checks and receipts? These facts will protect your estate from false claims.

Do you own real estate? Where are the deeds and abstracts or title insurance policies? Do your records show a capital gains basis for your real estate and what you invested in any piece of real property? Tell your heirs what you think they should do about your real estate and other property.

Do your records show which property is separate and which is joint? The division of your property may rest on these records. Besides, good records may save tax dollars.

Besides current bills, do you have any debts? If so, list them

and your creditors. Where are the copies of your income tax returns? Your car title?

Note these subjects: Old age and survivors' insurance, pensions, profit-sharing plans, group insurance, club memberships, royalties, estates and trusts, and joint ventures. Put down your social security number.

These are just a few things to cover in the letter you leave. You will think of others. Give your heirs every bit of pertinent information about your properties and business activities.




