

have heard many times. How true and significant this statement is today, being faced with the many complex and scientific farm and ranch problems.

Planning to effectively conserve our son, water and plant resources calls for the best known techniques. Here is where basic farm and ranch planning comes into play through your local soil conservation district. This kind of plan could be defined as one that would provide for the use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and the treatment of each acre in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement.

Soil Conservation Service technicians assigned to the districts assist farmers and ranchers develop basic conservation plans that meet the above objective and technical standards in the dis-

Different soils, slopes, erosion susceptibility, and present soil conditions present different problems and each are carefully considered and treatment planned acordingly. This treatment must e coordinated if it is to be most effective in meeting the needs of the land and economic conditions of the farm or ranch. Many prac tices will fail if they are not prop erly planned, properly applied, and properly maintained. Some people still think of soil conservation as the application of individual unrelated practices without consideration of all supporting measures that result in a lasting and profitable conservation program.

In developing and fitting a com lete conservation program to the land the owner should know and understand his problems, the structure and capability of his soils, their erosion hazards, and further understand the principles of treatment for each prob-

When this has been done with the aid of a planning technician a complete program or basic plan is written down. A conservation plan map and soils and capability maps are also furnished the farmer or rancher. This makes up a basic plan which may be referred to from time to time as application work progresses on the farm or ranch.

Further technical assistance is available in the application and maintenance of the planned program by SCS technicians through the Soil Conservation District.
