His successful extra-point kicking against Western brings his season total to nine straight conversions.

A graduate of Spur High school, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Blair.

## Robison Employed By Experiment Stat.

E. Douglas Robison was employed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station on Sept. 1 as an assistant agronomist. His duties will consist of conducting research on the control and utilization of mesquite and other undesirable plants, and assist in the development of closely associated range improvement practices.

The employment of Robison was made possible by a grant-in-aid provided by the Dodge Jones Foundation of Abilene, Texas for expansion of the research now underway at the Spur station.

Robison was reared on a farm at Muenster, Texas and graduated with a BS degree in agriculture from A & M College in 1955. He majored in range management and was a distinguished student in school and was elected to membership in Phi Kappa Phi, a national scholarship society, and Alpha Zeta, a national honor society of agriculture.

Prior to employment at the Spur station he served with the Bureau of Land Management in Wyoming and as an assistant in Range Management with the Soil Conservation Service at Graham.

He is married, 22 years old, and has one son, Mark, who is six weeks old. Mr. and Mrs. Robison are members of the First Baptist Church.

## Gabriel Leads Scoring Spree With 4 TD's; Bulldogs Go To Abernathy

The Spur Bulldogs opened their defense of the district championship here Friday night before a large homecoming crowd with a sound 48-7 drubbing of the Tahoka Bulldogs.

Spur kicked off to the visiting Bulldogs and got a break right there as Joe Copeland's kick bounced over the safety man's head and back into the end zone. A couple of plays later Tahoka fumbled and Spur recovered on the ten yard line.

From there Dwayne Green sprinted over for Spur's first TD. All of this happened before the game was two minutes old.

Green played a wonderful game for the home Bulldogs and is becoming a mainstay in the backfield.

In the same quarter Fullback Eddie Hagins tallied for Spur and James Gordon kicked the extra point, making the score 13-0. After the kickoff, Tahoka couldn't

go for the first down, so they tried to punt. A bad pass from the center found the ball back in the end zone and Randall Gilcrease made the tackle that gave Spur a safety and a 15-0 lead.

Everybody was determined to try their hand at scoring before the game was over. Max Gabriel made three touchdowns for Spur before the night was done.

They were 40 yards, 59 yards and 16 yards. Incidentally, both teams had eight first downs, but Spur had 233 yards on the ground against Tahoka's 126.

Tahoka couldn't dent the Bulldog line as all their offense efforts were dimmed before they could get started.

Along about the middle of the third quarter, Coaches Bill Henry and Jim Eddins cleared the bench in an effort to hold the score down, but to no avail. Gordon took over the quarterback slot and gave Ray Don Powell a much needed rest. Powell has been playing some 48 minute games this year and his play-calling has been superb. He has done a good job of mixing them up in that he uses all three of his backs to the best advantage.

In the fourth quarter Gordon took over the scoring honors by skirting 16 yards around left end for a TD. Then he passed to Ernest Wilson for another tally.

Karl Prohl saved Tahoka from a shut-out by scoring late in the fourth quarter.

Everybody played a whale of a ball game. And by the same token, everybody was happy. We also saw quite a lot of constant blocking and tackling—much to the sorrow of Abernathy come Friday night.

The Bulldogs journey to Abernathy tomorrow night to do battle with their old arch-rivals. It promises to be quite a ball game. The Antelopes are still smarting from the defeat handed them last year by Spur.

## 7,000 Bales Out; Still Need Hands

Reports from the gins in the county reveal that the cotton-puller shortage has let up somewhat except in the Glenn and Afton areas. An appeal has been made to direct any surplus hands to these areas.

Through yesterday afternoon, a total of 7,500 bales had been ginned in the area. Reports are that the crop is from one-third out in the McAdoo area to better than 60 percent in the Spur area.

The prevailing wage for boll puller in the county is \$1.75 on irrigated and better dry land to \$2.00 on the poorer dry land.

Spur gins report that the puller situation has let up considerably. A total of 4,143 bales have been ginned in Spur.

At Dickens 500 bales are out and the labor shortage there is also letting up. It is reported that the laborers are moving around a good bit and that a few more could be used for dry land pulling.

McAdoo reports 375 ginned. A large number of farmers in that area have defoliated and are now using strippers. One third of the McAdoo cotton is in.

Afton, East Afton and Glenn report a total of 2,305 bales already ginned and more pullers needed.

## Brothers Face Murder Charges After Fatal Stabbing Here Saturday Night

Murder charges have been filed against two Latin-American brothers from De Leon, Texas in connection with the knife slaying of Julian Ramez here last Saturday night.

In the Dickens jail under \$5,000 bond each are Arthur Lopez, 28, and John Lopez, 24.

According to Sheriff Cleo Rogers, Ramez, 19, of Richmond, Texas, was fatally wounded in a fight about 9 p. m. last Saturday night at a dance held at the Catholic Church building on the south highway. Also seriously cut up and still in the hospital is the dead man's brother, Albert Ramez, 15. He suffers a serious throat cut and the sheriff states that it will be several days before he will be able to answer questions about the incident.

Sheriff Rogers states that Arthur Lopez has made a statement to officials that he alone fought with and cut the Ramez brothers. Witnesses, however, have told officials conflicting stories about how the fight started and just who was involved.

The fatally wounded man staggered from the scene of the fight to the home of Allen Gatlin, next door to the church building, and fell through his front door bleeding profusely. He was rushed to the Spur Memorial hospital and died there about 5 a. m.

Albert Lopez reportedly confessed the stabbing and was arrested Saturday night. John Lopez was arrested Sunday morning after witnesses reported his participation in the fight.

## POLO TEAM TO FACE EL DORADO HERE SUNDAY IN SEMI-FINALS

Swenson Field will be the scene Sunday afternoon of the semi-final palmetto polo game between the Dickens County Sheriff's posse and the team from El Dorado.

The game will be the second of a two-game series for the semi-finals berth in the Western States league. The Spur team won the first game in El Dorado 12-10. The league covers the states of Texas, New Mexico and Colorado and includes some 60 palmetto-teams.

The winner of the current series Sunday will play in the finals against the winner of the Lubbock-Albuquerque series to be played Oct. 19 and 20 in Albuquerque.

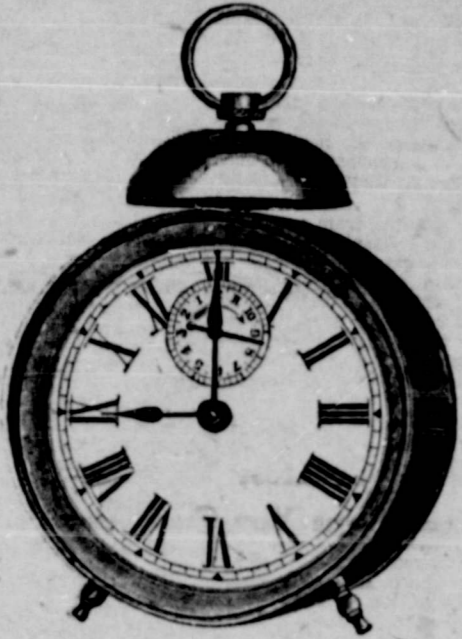

### Accurate Cotton Classing Sought

Efforts of Farm Bureau leaders in Texas to insure accurate classing of cotton by the government now has the wholehearted support of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, today announced the reactivation of the AFBF Cotton Committee to give specific study to the establishment of a non-governmental cotton classing review board—for the purpose of reviewing controversies over cotton classing.

This action is a direct result of efforts by Texas Farm Bureau leaders to obtain accurate classing of cotton by the government's Smith-Doxey classing service. A Congressional hearing—requested by Farm Bureau leaders—was held September 18 in Greenville. One result of the hearing was a promise by members of the cotton subcommittee of the House Agriculture Committee that the Congress will act immediately after it convenes in January to get a "light spots" classification for cotton put in the government loan.

Shuman also revealed that the AFBF Cotton Committee would study the question of whether present cotton grades adequately represented on the International Cotton Grades Committee.

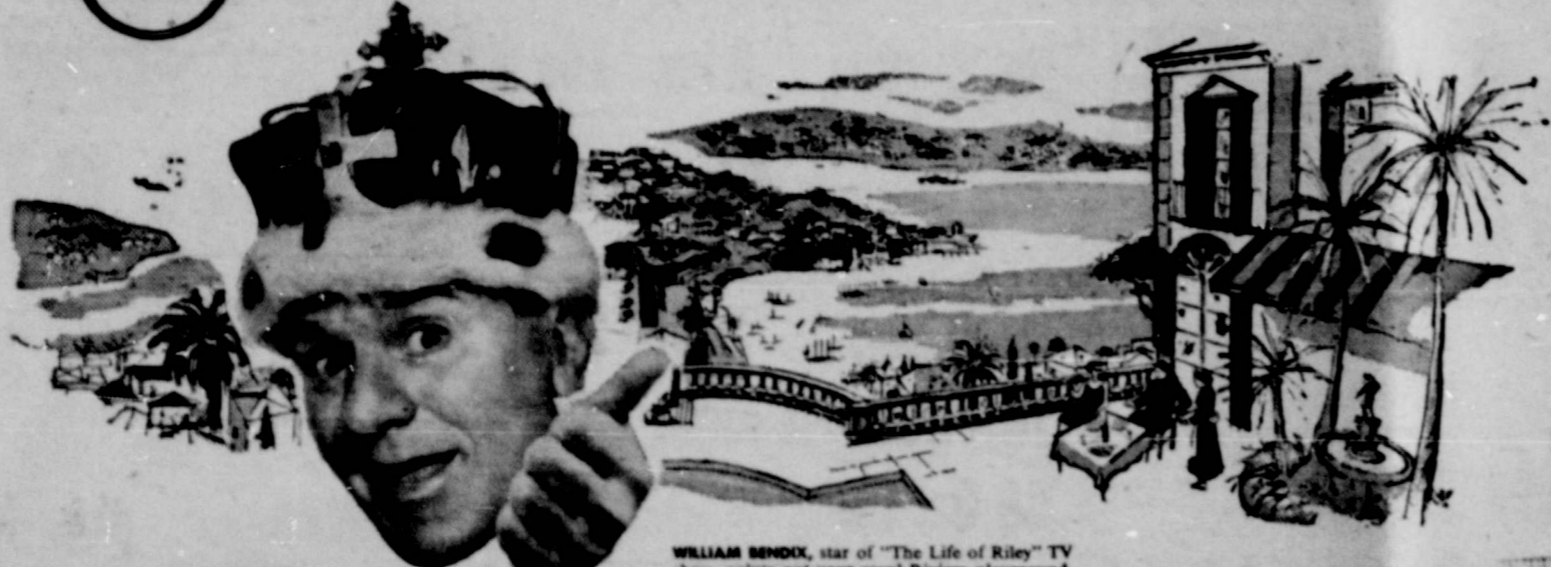

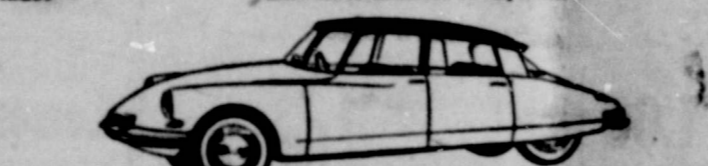

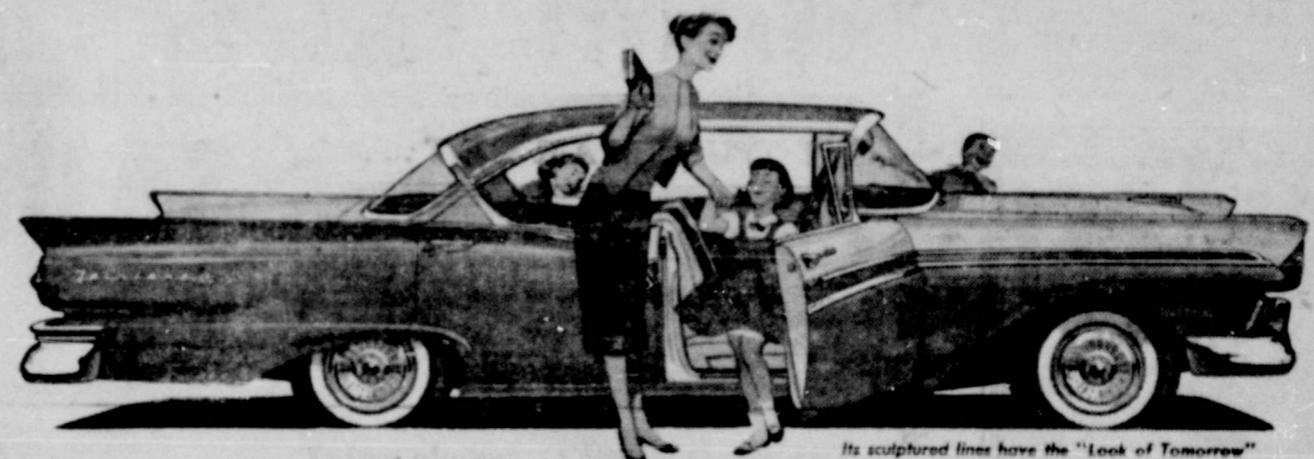
