 3. Circus Unit.
 4. Hawaiian Unit.
 5. Indian Unit.
 6. Spirituality and Patriotic Devotion were stressed. The music, games, art work. Stories to fit the theme, were presented at timely intervals to develop the unit along with Good Manners and Right Conduct.
 The children attending had experience with these skills:
 1. Associating with each other
 2. Conversing intelligently on the subject studied.
 3. Singing together about the unit studied.
 4. Listening together.
 5. Playing games that meant an enlargement of the theme of the unit.
 6. Acting out and speaking about the idea studied.
 These children learned "to do

by doing" they had an experience. They learned to take directions. They learned to work together. Their interest span was lengthened. They learned to share ideas. They learned to work with a group as a unit for the accomplishment of a set goal. Good Education, I say and an experience Every Child Should Have.
 Some one has said, "Knowledge is power only when it is used! Just as coal is power only when it is burned!"
 It is a secure feeling to know that we have people in Spur who have knowledge as to what to do with children, and it is more secure to see them putting the power into action by directing the human creation, designed by the God of the universe in whom He can live and move and have His being!

Wouldn't it be wonderful and certainly a sign of progressive education, if a Play School were organized on Every Street in Spur! 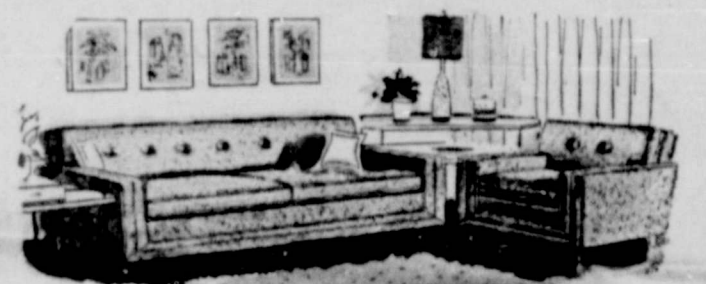

Voting Procedure Told In Effort To Get Out The Vote

In an effort to "get out the vote" throughout our area, the social relations committee of the WSCS submit the following non-partisan facts on voting procedure.

First. Absentee Voting:
A. Dates, October 17 - November 2 (or opening not more than 20 days prior to any election date and closing no later than 3 days prior to said election.)
B. Eligibility to vote absentee: Any qualified elector unable to go to the polls on day of election due to absence or physical disability. Application for ballot must be made to the County Clerk and, in case of disability, it must be accompanied by a certificate from a licensed physician. Absentee Voting may be done in person at the office of the County Clerk or by mail in the case of disability. In the later case, the elector must cast the ballot in the presence of a Notary Public and must include a statement by prescribed form stating cause of absentee voting. The ballot should be voted the same as in any regular election.

Second. Qualified Voter:
A. Any citizen of U. S. between ages of 21 - 60 who has paid required poll tax. An elector becoming 60 years of age before January 1, 1955 may vote without having an exemption certificate in cities under 10,000 population. Those becoming 21 after January 1, 1955 and before election dates of 1956, must secure an exemption certificate 30 days prior to the date such elections are held. (House Bill 6 chapter 5 Section 4.)
B. An elector must reside in the state 1 year and within the county 6 months.
C. Indians not taxed, persons deaf, blind or dumb; those who have lost a hand or foot; permanently disabled; and all disabled veterans of foreign wars, if the disability is 40 percent or more, are not required to pay poll tax.
D. Persons not qualified to vote in Texas are: persons under 21 years of age; idiots and lunatics; paupers supported by any county; and persons convicted of any felony.

Third. Time:
In counties having a population less than 100,000 according to the last Federal Census, the polls shall be opened at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m.

Fourth. Election Judges:
In a general election the election judges are named by the county commissioners court. This body also canvases said election.

Fifth. Precinct and County Delegates:
The number of precinct delegates to the County Convention is determined by the number of votes cast for the party's candidate for governor in the last preceding general election; namely, 1 delegate to every 25 votes. In the county, 1 delegate for every 300 votes cast are eligible for the state convention. Since the vote cast in precinct conventions is the only direct voice a citizen has in the selection of a president, this is of vital importance to the success of democratic processes.

Sixth. Voting a Privilege as Well as a Duty.
The winning slogan held by the by Parade Magazine was: "Vote—Ford Foundation and sponsored You Lucky American". A very timely suggestion.





You might say that he stayed in the same place but the names went off and left him. Reminded me some of the political situation in Texas.

There are some things they wished he'd done a little different, but by and large they think he has made us a fine President. At least all the hometown boys are back from Korea, and as far as we can tell the government is being run honestly.

Somebody asked that Missouri suit salesman how Mr. Truman was getting along, and he said he didn't know. "He isn't in the clothing business any more," he explained. "In fact, as far as I can tell, he is clear out of all kinds of business."

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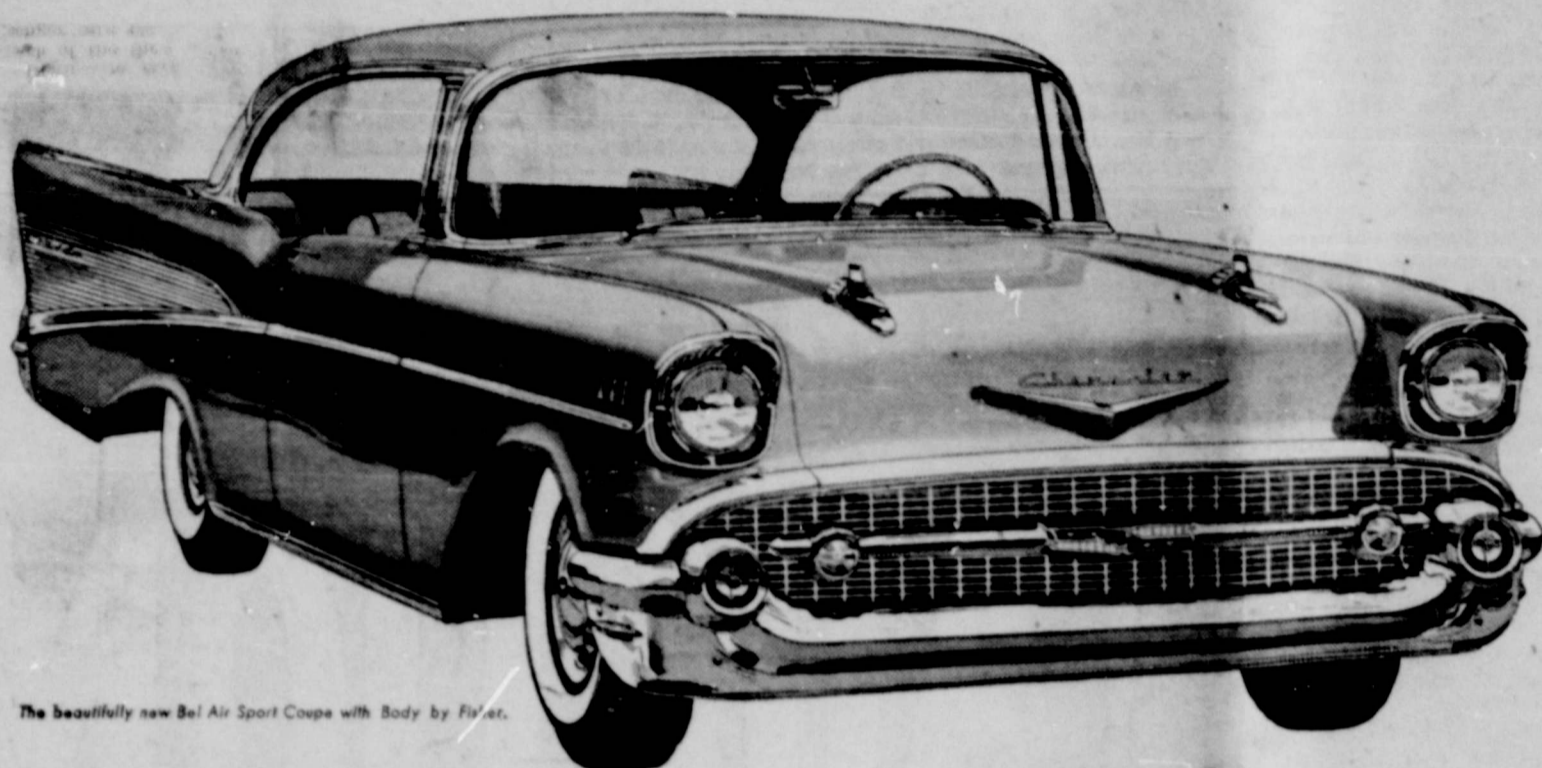
