RALLS CHAMBER SUPPORTS WHITE RIVER DAM PROJECT

How well voters in Spur, Crosbyton, Post and Ralls meet the challenge to provide a logical, adequate water program will be decided Saturday at the election being held in the four cities to create the White River Water Control and Improvement District.

Voters should ponder carefully the proposed district. One thing is sure—land without a guaranteed water supply is virtually worthless.

Of further importance is that fact that underground water, suitable for municipal needs, is being rapidly consumed for irrigation in most parts of the area embraced by the proposed district. The four affected cities have no other way to insure future water than to impound the surface water.

One large neighboring city, by attempting to buy water rights in adjacent areas for municipal water purposes, has caused bitterness among people from whom this water is being taken.

Furthermore, it is almost impossible to find land for water rights anywhere on the South Plains at a reasonable cost if such were possible, the constantly lowering water tables indicate that such a move would be a

temporary respite from water shortages, and the cost of piping water long distances would cost more than the White River project now under consideration.

Voters in four cities must answer these two questions Saturday.

1. What is my land worth without water? and
2. Where will my town turn for its water?

Saturday's election is not for a tax bond, or revenue bond issue. It is only for the purpose of approving the White River Water Control and Improvement District. If the district is approved, citizens of the cities will, at a later date, plan whatever action is necessary to guarantee their water supply.

By creating the water district now, legal and legislative action can be planned by directors representing the four cities. Should bonds to construct a dam, filter plant and pipeline be voted next year, actual work on the project could be completed within five or six years.

This is a long-range water project. The chairman of the State Board of Water Engineers told interested citizens from the four cities last month that the proposed dam and waterworks is a worthy and vital undertaking, and congratulated the cities for

Agriculture Department being in charge of the Bracero Program instead of the Labor Department.

12. A program to improve the process of grading and sampling of cotton. This would include machine sampling and grading. Light spots be graded as such and loan be made on same. Cotton to reflect true sample and fair price.

13. They are on record as being in favor of lower interest rates for the benefit of our economy, and better farm credit at lower interest rates.

14. The insurance laws be changed to allow Farm Bureau Ins. Co. to set own premium and benefits to policy holders in casualty insurance.

15. Texas Farm Bureau Fire Insurance Co. be allowed to write three and five year policies.

16. Seed of White Granex, a first generation hybrid onion, should be available this fall in limited quantities from commercial seed stores. WHO? Every qualified voter residing in the city limits of Spur, Post, Crosbyton or Ralls, who owns either real or personal property, is eligible to vote in this election.

WHAT? This is the Confirmation Election. This election confirms the action taken by the State Board of Water Engineers in creating the White River Water Control and Improvement District, and approves the five-man board of directors temporarily appointed by the State Board.

HOW? By at this time confirming the water district, the voters of Spur, Ralls, Post and Crosbyton will authorize the directors to continue plans with the engineers and fiscal agents. If this election carries, at a later date the voters will have the opportunity to vote on the necessary bond issue and water contracts. The preliminary work is completed - now we are ready for the first big step as voters the Confirmation Election.

WHY? A group of citizens from Spur, Post, Crosbyton and Ralls have, for many months now, been studying the municipal water resources of the four cities. Careful study of the municipalities and the possibility of impounding surface water has revealed it to be both feasible and economically sound for the four cities to form a water district and erect a dam across White River in southeast Crosby County to create a 30,000-acre-ft. lake, complete with filter plant and pipe lines to the four cities.

Perhaps Spur's "Why" for the water district is unique from the other three cities. Our City Council reports that Spur is in no immediate danger of running out of water. However, any considerable growth in Spur, or a continuation of current drouth conditions could alter this "plentiful water" situation in a matter of months. Also, if Spur is ever to attract industry of any kind, an ample surface water supply will be a major consideration. Spur's unique need, however, is in water Quality more than water Quantity. According to recent reports from both the U. S. Dept. of Health and the Texas State Health Dept., Spur's water is far above the maximum solids and florine content recommended for human consumption. Many Spur families are now spending from \$50 to \$100 per year for bottled drinking water and water softeners. Spur children and adults alike now carry unsightly stains on their teeth caused by Spur water. Lake water will also mean family savings in plumbing repairs, laundry soaps, water heaters washing machines, etc., plus a conveniently located lake for recreational use.

WHEN? **SAT. OCTOBER 27**

Is the Confirmation Election and must carry by a majority to continue with the project. (Tentative plans call for the bond election about March 1, 1957, and the water contract election about July 1, 1957.)

WHERE? In Spur, voting will take place at the office of Dickens County Electric Co-op. The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

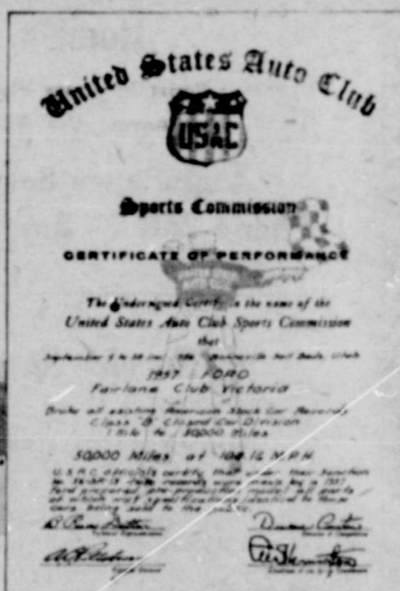

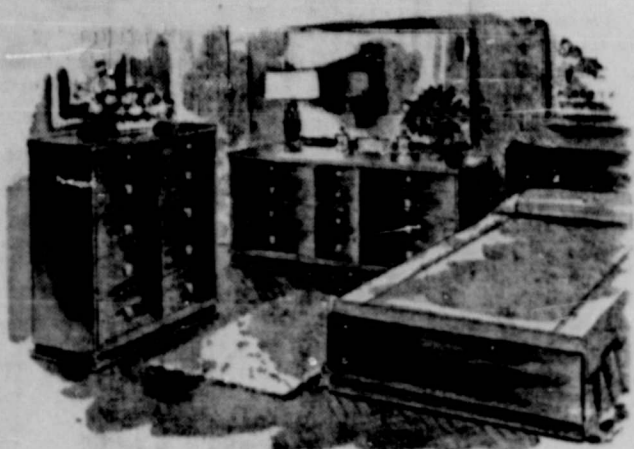

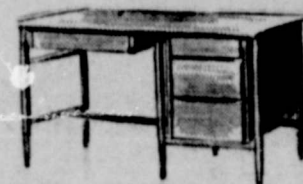
