



Dalapon Controls Cotton Grasses



The spot treatment method has been developed during years of research in the Cotton Belt by Dow and agricultural experiment stations. With this method, scattered clumps of grass are thoroughly wet with the spray. The chemical is taken in by the plant and kills from within the plant's system—ensuring effective grass control.

Cotton wet by the spray may be injured or killed as well as the grass, Watson points out. However, this loss is usually no greater than that from repeated hoeings, he says, and the Johnson loss of the dalapon treatment program is that this method kills the entire grass plant while hoeing gives only a temporary setback.

"For the first time farmers can now start moving toward the eradication of these weed grasses, while growing a good cotton crop," Watson says.

Spot treatment applications of dalapon are now being recommended for the control of Johnson grass and other weed grasses in cotton. Dr. A. J. Watson reports. Watson is in charge of the field agricultural research station of The Do. Chemical Company in Greenville, Mississippi.

Dalapon has been tested by agricultural experiment stations in cotton producing states. In January the chemical's use in cotton was accepted by federal regulatory agencies. On this basis the chemical will be seld with directions for the spot treatment application in cotton printed on the label. Dalapon is marketed under the trademark, Dowpon.



MINIATURE YEAST-RIZ CRUSTS

4 cup milk 4 cup shortening 6 tablespoons sugar

l package or cake yeast, active dry or compressed l egg, beaten 2¼ cups sifted enriched flour l egg white, slightly beaten

Scald milk. Stir in shortening, sugar and salt. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm for compressed yeast). Sprinkle or crumble in yeast. Stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten egg and half the flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in remaining flour. Turn out on a lightly floured board. Knead until smooth and elastic. Place in well-greased bowl; brush top with shortening. Cover with clean towel. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour and 30 minutes. Punch down and turn out on lightly floured board. Roll to about 14-inch thickness. Cut into rounds with a 2-inch cooky cutter or glass. Place rounds on a greased baking sheet. Let rise until doubled in bulk, about 20 minutes. Make a depression in the center of each with the bottom of a glass about 1½-inches in diameter. (Dip the glass in flour before each use to prevent sticking.) Brush each round with slightly beaten egg white. Bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) for 8 minutes. Do not brown. To store, cool crusts, stack and wrap in aluminum foil. Hold in refrigerator 1 to 10 days, as needed. When ready to use, fill depressions with cheese or meat spreads and bake at 350°F. (moderate oven) about 15 minutes until crust is golden brown.
