Water Officials Study \$3.5 Million Estimate

"Increases In Scope" Listed As Main Boosters To Project Cost

The engineer's estimate of the cost of the White River Municipal Water District project has been set at \$3,484,800, reports the Spur water committee headed by Lynn Buzbee and Mayor Reese McNeill.

It is reported that the approximate \$1 million increase over previous estimates is due to an increase in scope of the project, an increase in material and labor since the earlier estimates, and common errors in early estimates simply because many of the earlier figures could be set only by guess work.

City officials and water committee members in Spur, Post, Ralls and Crosbyton are now analyzing the overall situation with this larger figure before them, determining just what differences it will make in possible taxes and water rates. It is reported that a statement will be issued the citizens as soon as a definite course of action has been established.

The "increases in scope" which the engineer pointed out in his report include such items as:

1. 3600 acres more land will be needed than at first estimated.
 2. 20 ft. of sand must be removed from the river bed.
 3. A 3-to-1 instead of 2-to-1 slope must be made in the width of the dam at the base to withstand more flood water.
 4. A projection of populations in the participating cities show a need for larger pipe lines. Increases in the size of the lines to Post, Crosbyton and Ralls have already been established and at the present work is being done to determine Spur's future needs.
- The Spur chamber of Commerce has been asked to conduct an accurate census of Spur to help in estimating more accurately the

water needs of the future. The usual ratios of persons-per-meter and gallons-per-person are not as exact as officials would like, and the obsolete 1950 census figures are not indicative, so a new and complete census is planned. This work is to be directed by Bob Johnson, president of the chamber of commerce. High school students will help in the project. Along with the larger pipelines to the cities will come the need of "increase in scope" item no. 5. A larger filter plant.

The officials of the district will meet in Ralls next Thursday, Apr. 18.

Other more familiar numbers that she performed were Liszt's "Hungarian Rhapsody, No. 2, and the "Warsaw Concerto". For encore numbers, Mrs. Meadows played a lively number by Rubenstein and the difficult "Palo-noise in A-flat major" by Chopin.

Mrs. Meadows is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Berry of Spur. Her husband and their little daughter, Sharon, accompanied her here from their home in Austin where he is affiliated with the University of Texas and the University high school and she teaches piano.

Petition To Keep Operators Handed Council Tuesday

Representatives of the Spur Fire Dept. delivered a petition signed by over 500 Spur citizens to the City Council Tuesday evening. The petition was directed toward the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and asked that the company leave emergency and long distance operators in Spur after the dial system goes into effect.

The fireboys address the following letter to the citizens of Spur as No. 4 of a series on this issue:

The people of Spur have voice their feeling in an overwhelming way to our city commission about Southwestern Bell Telephone company's plans to take all of our operators out of the City of Spur. Over 500 signatures were on the petition that was placed in the hands of our city fathers by the Spur Fire Dept.

These signatures represented over 90% of the telephone subscribers.

CITY EXPECTS PROPOSAL FROM ENTERPRISE

The Spur city council at this time is expecting a proposal from the Enterprise company to settle the city's engine troubles out of court, stated Alderman Rex Holder yesterday.

A suit has been filed against the city by Enterprise, seeking the return of the engine, the refund of all monies paid and a rental on the motor for one year. The engine was shut off and sealed by the city several weeks ago, states Holder and the city's old engines have been meeting the immediate power needs of the town's electrical system.

In response to a request by the City Council of Spur, the West Texas Utilities Company has renewed its offer to lease the city light plant.

This time the lease offer consists of a \$20,000 per year for 40 years proposal, plus other considerations such as franchise tax, adjustment of city rates, etc.

The voters of Spur turned down a WTU offer to buy the plant in 1954. In 1955 when the city voted bonds to buy the new engine the utilities company made a lease offer which never actually came to a vote. It came after the bond election had been called and attempted to defeat the bond issue.

The current offer to lease the plant was presented to the city last week. An already full agenda

for Tuesday night's council meeting postponed any discussion of the proposal for a later meeting.

Several weeks ago the city council asked West Texas Utilities to make another lease offer on the plant. The request came at a time when continued rising costs of operating the plant and apparent failure of the new Enterprise engine to perform as economically as hoped led the council to wonder if it would ever again be an economically sound operation.

The present offer is said to be similar to the 1955 offer, but for \$2,500 per year less lease.

A careful study of the proposition will be made by the council before any action one way or another is taken.

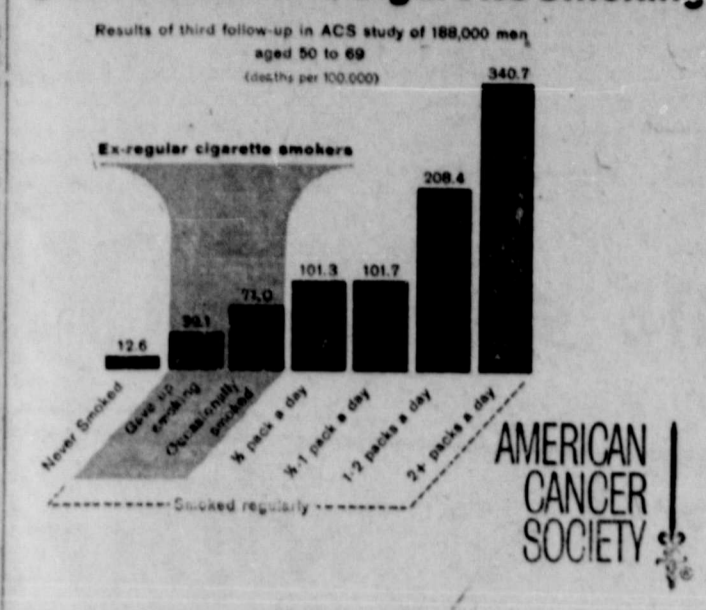

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PAKISTAN SENDS NEW BIRD STOCK

Reinforcements for the first batch of seesee partridges obtained from far-away Pakistan for experimental stocking in the Texas Panhandle have begun to arrive, according to the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration.

He said one consignment of one hundred twenty of the game birds, which are almost the same size as bobwhite quail, is being processed and that another shipment of one hundred additional birds is expected to be ready for release by May 1.

These game birds, which come from the drier parts of West Pakistan, are being tested in the rugged barren areas of the Palo Duro

Canyon, southeast of Amarillo. The original consignment of sixty-eight seesees was turned loose last spring.

The Assistant Director said few reports have been received about the first release but said project personnel were unable to locate the birds. "They have been swallowed up by the wild country and we won't begin to worry about survival until the additional numbers have been released and have had a fair chance to set up house-keeping and begin trying to raise their families."

He did say that more than ordinary attention will probably be given the Palo Duro Canyon country hereafter since the seesees will be on one side of the wilderness and the recently released wild soudad sheep will be on the other side.

The seesee partridges, described as a hair smaller than ordinary quail, were obtained from Pakistan through the United States Fish and Wildlife Service which coordinated the requisition through the United States State Department.

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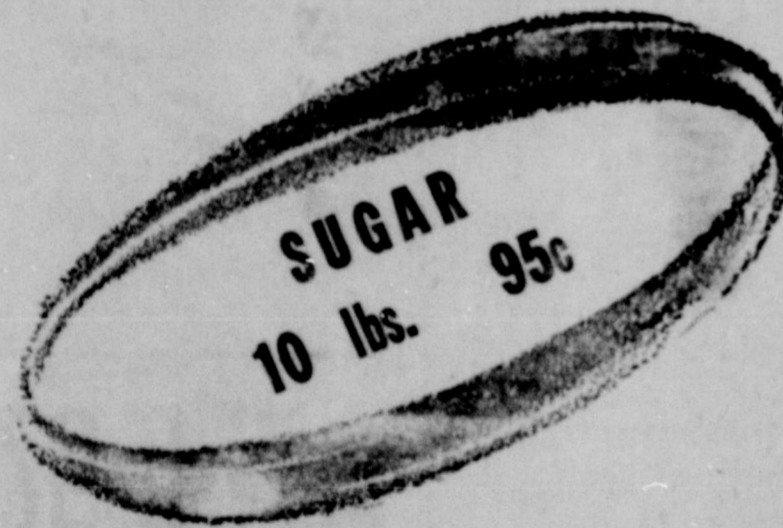

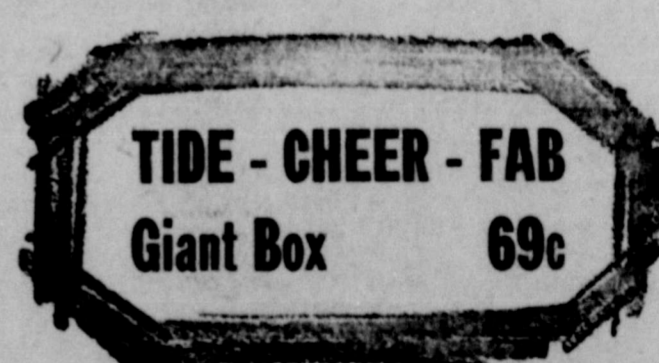
