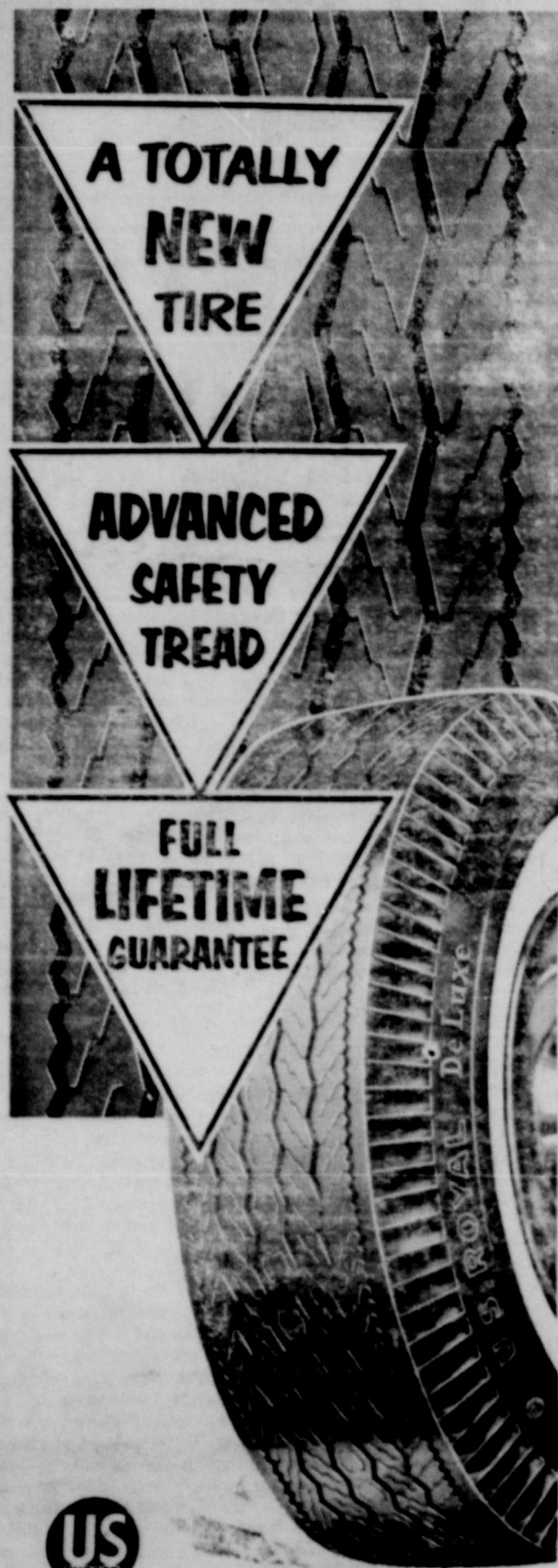
A basket lunch was served at noon and slides were shown in the afternoon by Floyd Willis.

Can We Afford To Take A Chance?

A Problem from the Beginning

When Spur was first founded, only three or four wells furnished water that was drinkable and the owners of such wells furnished many neighbors with water to drink, the really good neighbor furnished soft water so the ladies could wash their hair.

In a few years, the Spur Inn and a few of the business houses had a pipeline to Spade tank, but this water was muddy and had to be filtered for drinking.

Ten years later water in good quantity was located at the confluence of the Dockum-Duck Creek Valley, two miles north of town. First wells were hand dug and quicksand in the alluvial sand-gravel formation was a major problem. A few years later the gravel-pack technique was employed to drill wells to red beds, and wells of greater capacity resulted.

Water Supply Threatened

Water from City wells has been adequate in quantity, but rapid development of irrigation in the two valleys now threatens to deplete this supply.

Quality of water is below standard of the U. S. Public Health Service in total solids by 150 to 420 parts per million, sulphate by 68 to 181 ppm, and some of the wells show iron above the recommended level. All wells show flourides more than the 1.5 ppm recognized as a safe maximum. Some wells are 65% above the maximum. Mottled teeth are common among school children and adults raised here. Many families with children use bottled water.

Our water is expensive in many ways. Household appliance dealers in Spur say the average life of a water heater is three years and an evaporative air conditioner two years. Washing machines, plumbing -- even surgical and dental instruments have a very

short life because of the water we use in Spur.

Estimates have been made that irrigation is withdrawing 80 times as much water from the Dockum-Duck Creek Valley as the City wells. The drilling of irrigation wells has continued to increase this year. While the rate of recharge in the Valleys are comparatively high, it has or will be exceeded by the rate of withdrawal by irrigation.

White River Is Our Only Chance

The permeable formations from which the City derives its supply of water, and the very flat contour of the valley preclude storage of adequate amounts of water to serve the needs of Spur.

The watershed north and east is in the Croton Breaks area of gypsum beds offering no possibilities for a source of water. The Salt Fork and Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos south of Spur are below the level of the gypsum beds and are therefore not possibilities.

White River affords us our only opportunity in this area for a surface water supply. And it is quite possible that if we do not take advantage of the present opportunity of building a dam and reservoir we may never have the chance again. Other people down river on the Brazos have water trouble too, and if the water that runs down White River is ever assigned to someone else our opportunity is gone.

Costs May Go Down!

While the cost of underground water will continue to sore, surface water will cost less as the years go by. Increase in consumption and retirement of bonds will both lower the cost of water to you. Within a few years water from the White River Reservoir might possibly cost you less than you are paying for water today.

Bruce Long Visits Venice Cathedral; Heads for Russia and Visit to Moscow

Traveling north from Rome and Naples we reach the colorful city of Venice, Italy with its twilight rides down one of the many canal streets, a visit to St. Marks square considered by many as the most exotic tourist attractions in Italy and lunch and drinks in the numerous sidewalk cafes with their small string orchestras playing everything from Strauss to Beethoven.

The fact that it rained throughout our stay in Venice did not hinder our enjoying the venetian hospitality. The biggest attraction in Venice was St. Marks Square which is over four blocks in circumference. On one end is the beautiful St. Mark Cathedral, built in the seventh century to commemorate the life and influence of the disciples. Built in the oriental architectural design and looking much like an oriental Moslem Mosque, St. Marks stands as one of the few remaining manifestations of the influence of the Orient on the west during the eleventh and twelfth centuries.

Adjacent to the church on the north west corner of the square are two men cast in bronze which move mechanically to strike a huge bell every hour on the hour.

A nights pleasure and relaxation venetian style is offered all visitors in the many sidewalk cafes located around the square. One may either eat a full course meal or sip a 50c Coca Cola while listening to the side walk orchestra.

Leaving Venice the morning of the sixteenth we traveled by train to Yennatt, Switzerland where we spent three days wondering around on the slopes of the Swiss Alps and enjoying the warmth of the Swiss hospitality. First day out we decided to ride a car lift part way up a mountain rising straight up behind the village, walk a mountain path to the highest lake in the world nesting between two huge mountain peaks 12,000 feet above sea level and later cross one of the few existing natural glaciers in the world today on the return to the village.

Due to our inadequate knowledge of the means of mountain navigation, we wondered off the path while crossing the glacier and wondered aimlessly on the ice caps for nearly two hours before locating the trail leading back to Yannatt purely by accident. Tired and disgusted from over eleven hours of walking the three of us retired that night confident that after only 1 day's navigation we were ready for the big one, Mt. Matterhorn. Rising 14,000 feet above the village of Yanett it presents even the most experienced climbers an irresistible challenge. Upon meeting one of the Swiss guides on the trail that morning, we talked it out among ourselves and decided to try the climb. We had not taken our eyes off the peak the entire time we had been there and although we knew little or nothing about the techniques of good scaling we knew that amateurs had done it and we would too.

As the custom was we climbed the mountain trail half-way up a guide and spent the night in a ridge hotel before beginning the difficult climb the following morning. Our climb to the ridge was made more hazardous by chilling rains then blinding sleet and snow. To a south plains boy a mountain climb in blinding sleet and snow is not an experience encountered during an ordinary day.

But as fate would have it the bad weather continued through the night and we woke to find ourselves marooned 11,000 up by a five inch snow fall. After waiting for a time for the snow to melt, we began the long walk back down, unable to make the difficult climb because of the snow. We returned to the village to find a warm summer day. The villagers knew of the snow storm only by word of mouth by those who had come down earlier.

Despite the fact that we were three disappointed mountaineers, we concluded the snow might have been a blessing in disguise after we learned that four people were killed during the past two weeks including an experienced guide. A total of 93 persons have been killed in an attempt to climb the Matterhorn since it was first summited in 1892.

We are at present enroute to Stockholm, Sweden where we will make preparations for our two weeks visit behind the Iron Curtain. After nine long months of correspondence both by mail and wire we have received our visas into the USSR. We will spend five days in Linnegrad and five days in Moscow, the remainder of the time enroute between the two cities and seeing the Russian country side. We are fortunate enough to be in Moscow for the last three days of the Communist Youth Festival where over 50,000 youth will gather to rally for communism.

There will be no newspaper articles written during this two weeks period for safety purposes but you can expect a "whammy" the first week after we come back out.
