## Fire Marshal Points Out Basic Rules Often Violated During Local Fires

Fire Marshal Russell Powers and Billy Ray Barrett were returned from Firemen's School in Bryon, and have suggested a series of articles concerning fire safety and prevention.

A good place to start is with some basic laws that are violated almost every time Spur has a fire.

The captioned Act of the 50th Legislature of Texas, Regular session, (1947), contains several Sections of interest to fire chiefs, fire marshalls, firemen, and city officials of Texas towns and cities, as follows:

### Article XII—Stopping, Standing, and Parking

Sec. 95. Stopping, Standing, or Parking Prohibited in Specified Places.

(4) Within fifteen (15) feet of a fire hydrant.

(10) Within twenty (20) feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station and on the side of a street opposite the entrance to any fire station within seventy-five (75) feet of said entrance (when properly signposted).

### Article XIII—Miscellaneous Rules

Sec. 100. Following Fire Apparatus Prohibited. The driver of any vehicle other than one on official business shall not follow any fire apparatus traveling in response to a fire alarm closer than five hundred (500) feet or drive into or park such vehicle within the block where the fire ap-

paratus has stopped to answer a fire alarm.

### Sec. 101. Crossing Fire Hose. No

driver of a street car or vehicle shall drive over an unprotected hose of a fire department when laid down on any street, private driveway, or street car track, to be used at any fire or alarm of fire, without the consent of the fire department official in command.

### Sec. 107. Fire Extinguishers

Every school bus and every motor vehicle engaged in the transportation of passengers for hire or lease shall be equipped with at least one quart of chemical type fire extinguisher in good condition and conveniently located for immediate use.

Recent rains have diminished the dangers of grass and woodland fires in some areas, but the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council warns that grass fires pose a real threat for livestock producers. Motorists and rural residents are urged by the Council to observe fire safety rules. Community and county organizations are suggested as effective means of fighting grass fires.

## Texas Fishermen Benefit Under New Legislation

A new Sports Fishing License Law which increases fishing license fees becomes effective September 1, 1957. The additional revenue will enable the Game and Fish Commission to increase its work program by about 25 percent and will generally benefit Texans interested in better fishing.

The new law states, in effect, that it shall be unlawful for any person to fish in any waters of this state without first obtaining a fishing license, according to Ed Cooper, wildlife conservation specialist.

The exceptions to this law, says Cooper, are persons under 17 and over 65 years of age; any person, or member of such person's immediate family when fishing upon property he owns or upon which he resides; and persons fishing with trotline, throw line, or ordinary pole or line having no reel or other winding device when fishing in the county of his residence. No other fishing license shall be required of a person who holds a commercial license issued in this state, adds the specialist.

The new differs from the old one in ways besides fee charge, points out Cooper. Unlike the old law, the new one is not concerned with the type of bait to be used.

## THE HAPPY WANDERER

### Dove Banded By Cecil Fox Shot In Guatemala, Central America

Every hunter knows that doves begin a mass migration after the first norther of the season. Biologists of the Texas Game and Fish Commission for a number of years have been tracing this migration, with the assistance of sportsmen. A break-down on the movement of doves has just been issued by Eugene A. Walker, Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Commission.

Most of the Texas dove seem to move into Mexico, with the coming of the winter months, according to figures of the report. It also shows many of the doves are killed within the first year after banding.

The baby birds are banded while they are still in the nests. Hunters are then asked to send the bands from the birds bagged telling where they were killed.

One dove, banded by Warden Jack Gregory, three miles north of Kerrville, on July 3, 1951, was killed December 22, 1956 near Hacienda San Angel, Humonico de Mora las, Michoacan, Mexico.

Since most of the dove banding was done in the Panhandle of Texas, a majority of the bands returned are from that area. Strangely enough many of these birds are killed in Michoacan in Mexico.

One bird, banded by Warden Cecil Fox, 12 miles north of Dickens, July 26, 1954, was killed two years later in Guatemala, in Central America.

A dove banded by biologist E. G. Carney, near Mt. Pleasant, July 2, 1956, was killed November 13, the same year at Mexico City.

A number of doves banded by biologist W. H. Kiel, near Edinburg, in the Valley, in 1955, were killed in Louisiana in 1956.

Other states also participate in the banding program. Bands have been returned showing that 44 birds banded in Louisiana, were killed in Texas.

Fourteen birds were bagged that had flown to Texas from Missouri; 10 from Nebraska and 9 from South Dakota, and 7 from Oklahoma. One dove banded in Massa-

chusetts also was killed in Texas.

The Director made a plea for persons killing banded doves to send the bands to the Commission for checking.

"If we can have the full cooperation of the sportsmen it will enable us to do a much better job in our studies," Walker said. "In this way we also will be able to work out a better program to provide hunting with assurance of a harvest for the sportsmen."

## WT Utilities Plan Program For Expansion

West Texas Utilities Company today announced plans to spend an estimated \$51,000,000 during the next five years for construction of new electric facilities in West Texas.

Cal Young, WTU President, said the company's expansion plans were based on recently completed surveys and studies which indicate that West Texas will greatly increase its use of electricity by 1961.

"Most of the proposed five-year outlay will go for the construction of new plants and installation of additional generating equipment, new transmission lines and

expanded distribution facilities," Young said.

New generating equipment for WTU, including one new power plant, is expected to cost over \$22,500,000 and will increase by more than two-thirds the company's system generating capability.

WTU plans to spend almost \$15 million during the next five years

for the construction and improvement of distribution facilities. Another \$11,500,000 has been allocated for the building of new high voltage transmission lines connecting WTU power plants and load centers. The remainder of the planned expenditure will be used primarily for general construction and improvement of WTU facilities.

## Doves Lead-Off 1957 Season For Texas Hunters

Open season and bag limits in Texas for the 1957 hunting season now have been pretty well established, according to Howard D. Dodgen, Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

At a meeting in Austin last Friday, the Commission set down the seasons for migratory birds. These will need final approval of the Fish and Wildlife Service, which will be forth coming soon.

The deer season generally begins November 16 and extends through December 31. This is for white-tailed deer, especially in the Hill Country. Turkey season, for the most part, is open at the same time, with one gobbler permitted.

Antlerless deer permits will be available from landowners in certain areas where too many deer are present.

Drawing for permits on the Management Area hunts will be held in October.

The mule deer season West of the Pecos has been set for November 20-27 inclusive.

There will be open dates on antelope in the Trans-Pecos country October 1-3 and October 5-7. This hunting will be by permit. The Panhandle antelope season will be October 14-16 and October 17-19. The hunt will be permitted in definite areas in Hartley and Oldham counties. Antelope hunters will be selected through a public drawing in Austin.

The Panhandle deer and turkey season will be November 16-25 inclusive.

Quail season will be December 1, to January 16, generally throughout the state.

The Commission also recommended a whitewing dove season in the Valley to be held on alternate days, September 13, 15, and 17, 12 noon to sunset, with a bag limit of 10 birds in the aggregate, whitewing and mourning doves.

The regular dove season recommended will be for 47 days in the north zone to begin September 1, and 48 days in the south zone, beginning October 1.

The Commission also recommended opening of the duck season on this year on the first Friday in November.

"A new digest of the hunting and fishing laws of Texas now is on the press and will be ready for delivery where licenses are sold, or they can be ordered by postcard from the Austin office," Dodgen said.

**Our Doctor**  
 When we mention early days in Afton, it is only natural that so many of us immediately form a conscience association in our minds of our old time doctor, Dr. J. N. Haney, for it wouldn't have been Afton without him. Typical of the legendary country doctor, who went any place under all circumstances, Doctor Haney did more good with those little pink pills and other valuable aids he carried in that old black bag than many of our modern psychiatrists and psychologists who analyze us today. Many of us were about half grown before we knew there were any other doctors in the world, and the picture you may have evoked of a country doctor's untiring efforts is certainly true in this case, but this capsule

sketch of his life seems unworthy of one whose labor and skill helped so many people.

Doctor J. N. Haney came to Afton in 1916 and bought a cafe building which was located on the gin lot. He moved it to the west side of the street and put in drugs and a soda fountain and used it as an office. The Haney family left Afton for about four months in 1920 and when they returned, Dr. Haney and his sons bought out the Bivins Business, which store burned in July 1931. After that Byron Haney, established a business known as the "Afton Grocery Store". Mrs. Allie Barton became interested in this business and in August 1933 this store became known as "Haney and Barton", and remained so for several years.

Doctor Haney and another son, T. B. Haney, bought a business from Mr. Loving and organized the J. N. Haney and Son Business in a building on the west side of the street. This building had previously belonged to J. W. Thompson. Two years later this building was moved to the east side of the street and they ran this business several years.

In the year of 1920, when the Haney family left Afton for a short while, they sold their business to the Newberry brothers, Sam and O. C. Newberry. Later Mr. O. C. Newberry sold his interest to Mr. Knox Lawson, and the business became "Newberry and Lawson" and a dry good department was added. Mr. Newberry disposed of his interest and Mr. Lawson continued to operate this store for several years.

**First Cars**  
 Old timers relate that the first car they can remember, in Afton, was driven by Doctor Haney, who could then get around to his patients better. Soon thereafter, Bro. Stokes purchases one. The mail was carried by wagon and team on the star route from Roaring Springs to Spur and when a car was put on the route the people felt that they were moving fast and progressing.

**Early Barber**  
 In the early days before a barber shop was built, Jessie Powell cut hair in the gin office on Saturdays. Soon thereafter, he put in his shop and barbered here many years. Mr. Jess now resides near Spur, but for many years he made his home here, ran the barber shop and farmed, owning the present farm of Oscar Stokes. The

Powell family make for a very real part of Afton. Mrs. Powell's father being one of our very first settlers, Uncle Joe Jackson.

Many people remember Jess Powell as giving their first haircut. All the little girls went to the barber shop then and got Buster Brown bobs same as the little boys. In order to be high enough the children sat on a board placed across the arms of the barber chair, and the day Jess told them they were big enough to sit on the seat without a board, they were sort of sad, for it had been a lot of fun to sit on the board and be whirled around. One little girl that went there for Buster Brown bobs never did tell very many people, if she ever told anyone about this but it is funny now. Seems she had a childish notion that the wrap Mr. Powell pinned around her neck when he cut her hair, was choking her but she would never tell him. Instead she would imagine she enlarged her neck muscles just as much as she could while he was pinning it on, and relax afterward and could imagine it really helped. Other than that I think this little girl enjoyed the haircuts more than almost anything. She can still smell the talcum as it was whisked on her neck with the brush to whisk away the trimmed hair.

In the fall of the year the traveling tent shows came to Afton and camped, sometimes as high as a week, and everyone went to see the silent movies. When "talkies" came in the wonder was almost unbelievable and Doctor Tate's medicine show was a traveling feature that attracted everyone at night. The young folks had rather have gone to these than a fine production on Broadway, mainly, I suppose to be with others of "the gang". "Snowball" was the main attraction in the medicine show.

Mr. Gene Gates ran an early day garage in Afton.

**Dr. J. N. Haney**  
 The following sketch of Dr. Haney was given me by one of his sons, T. N. Haney of Afton. "Before our family moved here in 1916, we were living in Titus county, at Mount Pleasant, Texas. E. W. (Uncle Lish) Winkles wrote papa about needing a Doctor at Afton. (He had done practice for him in East Texas). So we moved out, and he bought a building that was known as Hodges Halle Cafe, this building was on the gin lot and was moved and made into Afton's first drug store. In 1919 he put in groceries and later that year bought out the F. A. Loyd building. About 1920 he bought out his sister, A. D. Bivins and Co. Mr. O. L. Hale built this store and home. When he doctored here

he drove a double buggy and later bought a car but never learned to drive himself. One of the boys drove for him. When he first landed here there were no telephones and when people wanted a doctor they had to come after him. He had many experiences to tell about the roads he had to travel to get to the sick folks. He always carried his medicine bag with him and after diagnosing the case he left the medicine to be given with the patient right then as doctors those days did not write out prescriptions to be filled, but had the medicine "Johnny on the spot."

He passed away in 1938, leaving many memories among Afton folks who have gone horseback or on foot for "the Doctor" for so many years. Soon the time will have passed when Doctor Haney will only be a legend and the will of a Higher power, as we had no miracle drug to help. Such men as Doctor Haney helped in each link of the chain to make way for today's better health. By his side working faithfully was his wife whom we remember well and in 1937 she preceded her husband in death by a year.

Their memories stand as a tribute to the early days when we had such a struggle to keep healthy.

Much has been said about the "good old days" but few of us would go back to them if we could for that is what soft living has done for us. Perhaps we would not want to leave our air conditioners and other modern equipment. Understand, I am for prosperity but the fact remains that with it we are becoming a race or age of more unsatisfied people. To quote Duff Green, "This existence we call life, what more should it mean than happiness, peace and content? If they are ours why desire more? Why lose them in an effort to gain artificial and material things?"

When that is answered it isn't so difficult to understand why our present environment is so unnatural, grasping, and brutal. That is one reason why the pioneer loved the frontier, where he could live close to nature, love and be respected by his neighbor, enjoy a life, even filled with hardships in preference to an existence of strife, bustle, and worry for worldly gain alone. The ranks of the West Texas pioneer are rapidly thinning by time and will soon be another memory clothed with a romantic halo. As many as I have known or heard of, I have yet to find a single one that would not gladly exchange our present condition for those they once knew.

Age is no barrier, the only thing that curbs their restless spirit of disgust is the fact that this is no longer a frontier to be a haven of refuge to them. They, like the ice bound ships of the arctic are helpless but not satisfied and content. A new comer sojourner for the night in a long cagion of the pioneer. He saw no conveniences and little to represent comfort. When bedtime arrived the pioneer threw a cowhide in the general direction and said "You sleep there—I'll rough it". Though the visitor shared the meager comforts of his benefactor doesn't necessarily mean that he lived longer than the man who "roughed" it. Unquote.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49c of Article III providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform the duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49c, as follows: "Section 49c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law. "The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called "Texas Water Development Bonds," shall be secured in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes set forth herein. "All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law. "Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including: irrigation, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized under Article XVI, Section 53 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact corporations to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, including the conservancy and reclamation of the water resources of the State, including the control, storage and preservation of its streams and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension or construction of dams, reservoirs and other storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods. "Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law. "While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by law, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. "The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board. "From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year requirements on all outstanding bonds received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1955, and all moneys so received shall be deposited to the principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited to the sinking fund for the State bonds except that which amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside, and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid in interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturity of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature. "The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election, each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State." "Sec. 2. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 62 of Article XVI relating to the establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as hereinafter set forth: "Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of the State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 61 of Article XVI of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b), of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund. "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State." "Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election, and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) per year to Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the authority to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) per year to Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) per year, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until such person has additional amounts as matched by the Federal Government. "(1) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years shall be paid out of state funds for assistance in needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from state funds from Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) per year to Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) per year, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application. "(2) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions here-in set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds of federal funds and provided never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds. "The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for public inspection. "Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Commodity Fund and appropriated to the State Department of Public Health for the period beginning December 1, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments for the payment of assistance to recipients of such assistance who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person; and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until such person has additional amounts as matched by the Federal Government. "(3) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years shall be paid out of state funds for assistance in needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from state funds from Twenty Million Dollars (\$20,000,000) per year to Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) per year, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application. "(4) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application. "The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

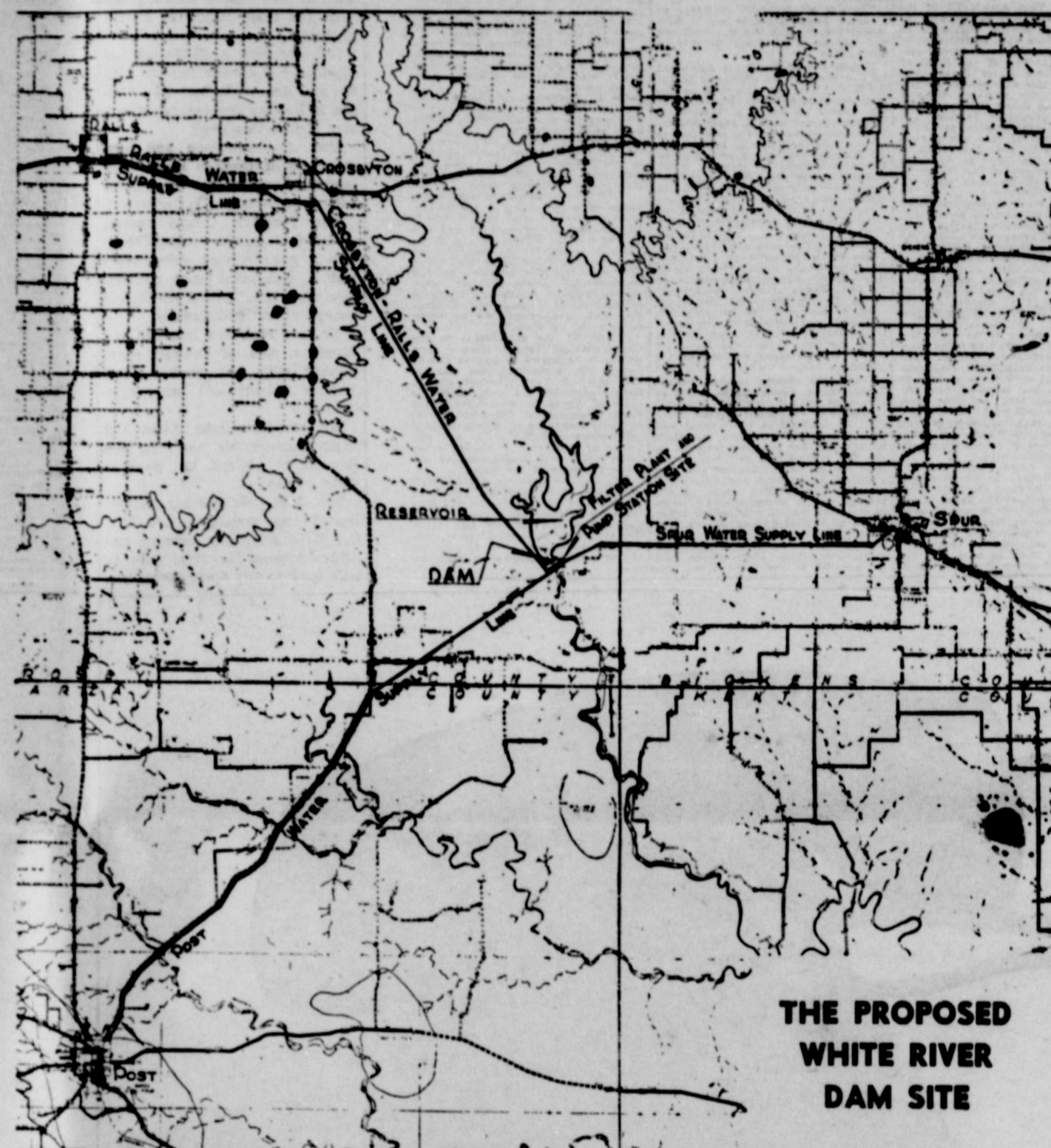

"Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison," a unique and intriguingly paradoxical film co-starring Deborah Kerr and Robert Mitchum, will have its local premiere on Sunday at the Palace Theatre.

Charles Shaw's best-selling novel of the same title provided the story for this production.

"Heaven Knows, Mr. Allison" tells the strange and moving story of a gentle nun and a tough Marine stranded on an island in the South Pacific under hazardous wartime conditions. It is packed with physical action, yet is primarily a drama of human and spiritual emotions played with infinite delicacy and moving tenderness against the counterpoint of the violence of war.

Director Huston spent six months scouting locations before he decided on Tobago, B.W.I. 6,000 miles from Hollywood. Its coconut palm-fringed beaches, natural caves and even the shark-

infested waters and rodent-like animals fitted perfectly with the requirements of the script.

On this tiny island in the Caribbean the two stars, a production crew of fifty, a group of Japanese extras and a detachment of 30 U. S. Marines from the U. S. Naval Station at Trinidad worked under Huston's meticulous direction in 120-degree heat to bring Shaw's story to cinematic perfection.

Three major sets were built on the island — the island village in which "Sister Angela" and "Mr. Allison" find themselves the only occupants; the interior of the cave in which they hide from the enemy, and the interior of the missionary buglaw. Since all the action for the picture was filmed on Tobago, Huston also had to equip the smallest studio in the world for the interior scenes. He used the Community Center of the town of Scarborough.

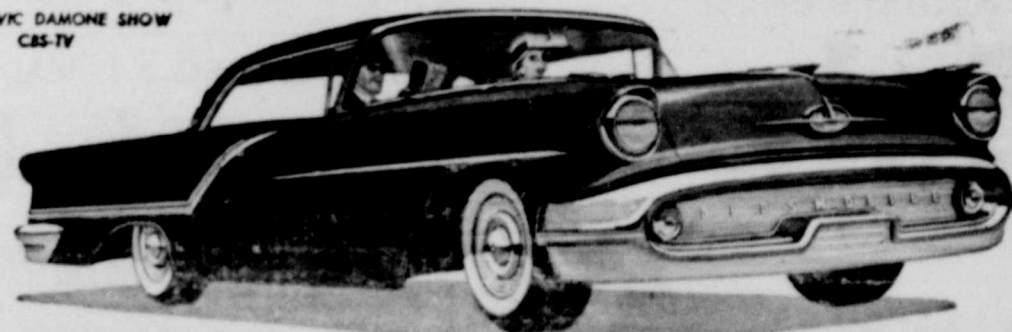

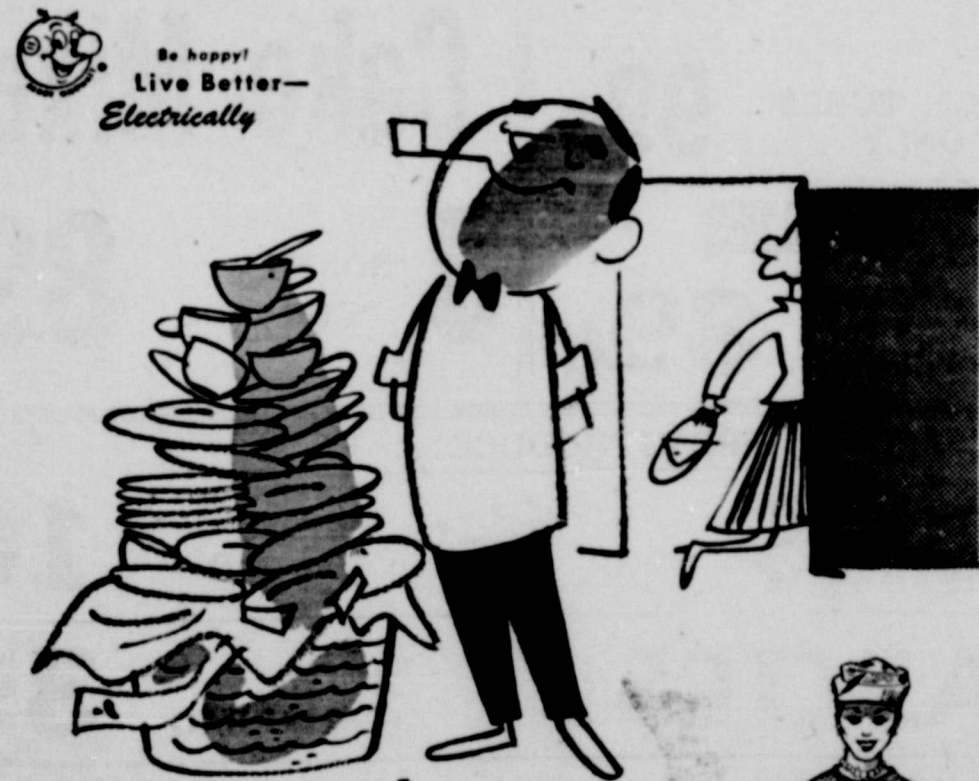

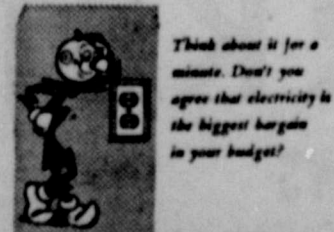

Farmers and ranchers and other employers of agricultural workers such as cotton gin operators, are reminded by John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration, of some changes in the method of reporting the wages of their employees.

In 1957, agricultural work is covered by social security if either: (1) cash wages of \$150 or more are paid to a worker by his employer during the year; or (2)

regardless of the amount of wages, if an employee works on 20 or more days during the year where the wages are figured on a time basis.

The total covered wages of farm workers are reported only once a year, in January for the preceding year to the Director of Internal Revenue. Mr. Hutton added that if employers keep an accurate record of the name, the social security number, and the amount of wages paid to each worker that will be all the information needed to complete this annual social security report.
