Lewis Accepts Position On Equalization Board

Robert Lewis, president of the Spur Security Bank, has been named to the Equalization Board of the White River Water District.

Other members of the board are: Joe Parks, Crosbyton chairman; Walter Duckworth, Post; and Bill McKee, Ralls.

Lewis' appointment completes the four man board. He was appointed by the Spur City Council in its regular Monday night meeting.

"I pledge to fulfill my position to the best of my ability," Lewis said.

Spur has been without representation on the Equalization

Board of the Water District for some time. However, the present board has adopted property valuations for the four cities of the district.

In a board of directors meeting Tuesday night, it was brought out that taxes will not be collected for the Water District this year.

The next major step in creating the dam, will be an election adopting water contracts. This election will concern each city of the district and the volume of water it agrees to purchase from the Water District.

Ransom Galloway, bonding company representative estimated that it would take the engineers

about six weeks to prepare the water contract. The contract will be the same for each city except in the amount of water contracted. The water contract election will be held about 30 days after the District has approved the measure.

This would throw the water contract election some time in November. Estimates are that the dam will be completed in about two years.

The \$4 million bond election was passed by a large majority in all four cities. It carried in Spur by nearly a 3-1 majority, 242-95. Post, 349-6; Ralls, 146-43; Crosbyton, 280-3.

S. W. Freese has been contacting oil companies in the Post and Garza county area to try to get them to contract for water from the District.

Veterans' Land Bonds Unsold; Land Sale Due September 27

A high bond market was still making it impossible last week to sell any part of the \$100,000,000 Veterans' Land Program bond issue approved by voters last November.

The net effect is that the only way most veterans can participate in the program now is to purchase forfeited land. The next sale of forfeited land is September 27.

"Until we can sell our bonds, our regular program has money to buy only about 200 tracts of land a year," Land Commissioner Earl Rudder, who is also chairman of the Veterans' Land Board, says.

School Registration Scheduled August 29

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SOCIAL SECURITY

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration.

"This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability.

"Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18," Hutton says. Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or died.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Dickens on August 28 at 9:30 a. m. at the Courthouse and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

Way Back When

With today's conveniences we know little about Grandma's method of cooking and keeping house. No running water, electricity, (or cake mix) lightened Grandma's duties as she went about her numerous tasks, outdoors as well as in. She milked the cows, fed the chickens and hogs, often made a hand in the field. She used to put her old flatirons in the fireplace or on the kitchen stove to heat and when she thought it was ready, would pop her moistened finger on the hot surface. If it popped just right she began ironing her numerous cotton petticoats which she had flour starched very stiff, like paper, and somewhat resembling today's can-cans except they were floor-length. She usually wore several for dress wear.

The home after a house was built was usually one square room and even in West Texas a fireplace was often built as a fire place was carried over from Eastern people. Hogs ran wild over the place. Their food was acorns and mesquite beans. Wild hogs were numerous in some sections and this long tusked animal could kill a team of oxen if cornered just right.

We see great grandma there in that little cabin bending down to set the long handled skillet over

a bed of fresh coals and shoveling more coals on the lid. Her cooking ware was cast iron, a Dutch oven and an iron pot for boiling, which hung from a hook in the chimney.

Any handy water hole was the source of the family water supply and from this spread the dread disease of typhoid fever for which there was no vaccine. Old timers can remember this fearful dread and say the odor of a typhoid "flu" room will stay with them forever.

It seems that this is the leading reason why we would not go back to the old days, that is, because of advancement in health.

Grandma can tell you what a peach tree branch could do to keep the flies off the table at meal time, (one fanned while the other ate) and vice-versa.

Mesquitos caused much suffering, spreading malaria, and chills. Pneumonia, appendicitis, lock jaw and mad dog bite patients were usually considered doomed, while today's skilled surgeons and miracle drugs have lessened them to a minimum.

But Grandma had one thing that was far richer than any of us possess today and that was her spiritual aspect of life. True, she did not have a washing machine, drier or dish washer, or ever hear the word "detergent", but she had a great spiritual aspect to life that is lacking in many of our homes today.

When they arose early perhaps 4:00 or so, they blew the coals to ignite a flame to cook breakfast and you may be sure no one ate a bite until Grandpa gave the

In due time through the years, Grandma was probably the proud owner of an oil stove, then came the gasoline iron and aladdin's lamp. We can all remember when electricity came to the rural area making us next to as happy as our wedding day.

But with added conveniences making a so-called end to drudgery and mechanical progress taking over our highways, that is, that lots of spiritual values and human understanding have been lost. People no longer need each other and are not so dependent upon one another as in the days when transportation and doctors were unhandy.

Many arguments and discussion have taken place lately about the value of "television" plus the relationship of "ferids". This I will leave to the CRITICS.

B. F. Yeates

One outstanding citizen who largely contributed to settling Dickens County was the late B. F. Yeates, who came to this territory in the year 1887.

of John C. and Mary Jane Shetter, and was born Aug. 25, 1875, at Fehuacana Hills, Limestone Co., Texas.

In 1920 Mr. Yeates built a new home which is the present home of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Hughes of Duncan Flat Community, she being the youngest of the Yeates family.

The following memories of the young mothers were related by a daughter, Mrs. Hortense Goodwin, Quote, "As I was so young when Mother died, my memories of her are more-or-less those of a child, but these are some of the things that stand out most in my mind. The way she always hustled and bustled around on early cold mornings, cooking breakfast on a wood burning stove, she never had any other kind, the hot biscuits, ham and eggs she cooked, the pancakes, the friend pies and taffy candy.

The coming home from church with ten, fifteen, or more people for dinner she would rush to the meat house (every one had one). The trips to Dickens city in a buggy or hack or three times a year to buy our supplies for the year. The visits while there to the yate Mr. and Mrs. Bob Shields home. Taking care of the sick in the community, always helping with a new baby. Sewing, making clothes, nursing us when we were ill and she still had time to visit with her neighbors. She had many friends, every one loved her who knew her. The good butter and butter milk she could make in the churn that stood by the fireplace. The real big occasion was the ice cream made in a bucket. (A gallon one inside a larger one) with some one turning the bucket back and forth by the handle inside the larger one packed with ice and salt until it was frozen.

My parents were strict in training on matters of right and wrong. In fact, they were typical pioneers with a love for this new land. They were the original do-it-yourself with lots of patience, hard work and fun. In this new country, they carved their home and raised their family. I never appreciated my parents sterling qualities nor understand the depth of their feeling for their family until after they were gone, and I was grown, with a family of my own." Unquote. The Yeates accepted the challenge of the frontier and made our country strong today. Mr. Yeates served the People as first commissioner of Precinct 1, passing away at his home in Duncan Flat Community in 1931. The following is a memory sketch of Mr. Yeates, written for Mrs. Goodwin, by one who knew him well, meeting him on one of his return trips to this territory after he had been away for more horses.

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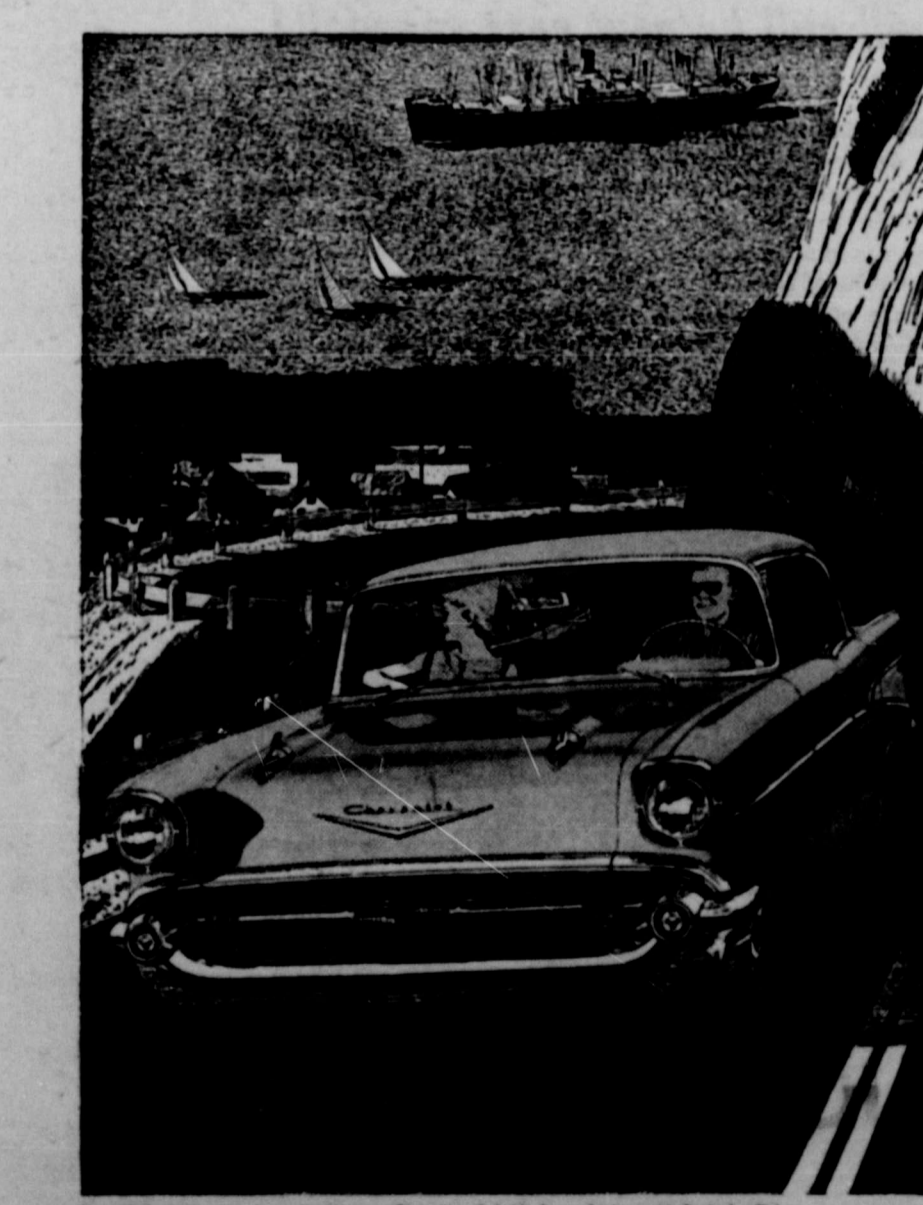

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: Section 42. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 42a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 43 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 43 of Article XVI of this Constitution. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount of the same contributions from the income of each such person, and shall be published at any election held (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 42, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamations for the special election and this Amendment shall be published at any election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 18 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 43c of Article III, providing for the creation of certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate within the State of Texas by a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State, including the control, storage, use, distribution, and disposal of water, and the waters of its rivers and streams, and all uses and benefits thereon by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of water storage, transmission, and disposal systems, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transportation of water from storage to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 43c, as follows: "Section 43c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the authority to issue additional bonds in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be secured by such funds as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose for which they are issued.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of selling or making funds available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate within the State of Texas, including water supply, conservation and reclamation, and other purposes authorized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 42, of this Constitution. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount of the same contributions from the income of each such person, and shall be published at any election held (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 43c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamations for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriations made by law.

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

Section 1. That Section 31a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 31a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Law, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be provided by the Legislature, for the payment of assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to: (1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the five (5) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the five (5) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the five (5) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

Section 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamations for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

not inconsistent with restrictions hereinafter set forth, to provide for the amount of such assistance out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall not exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall not exceed the sum of forty-seven million, five hundred thousand (\$47,500,000) per year. The Legislature shall not be authorized to make any such appropriation until and unless the amount of aid hereunder available for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall be subject to the limitation of the amount of state funds available for such purposes. Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section and the following sections are allocated out of the Omnibus Assistance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning August 31, 1957. Four million, nine hundred and fifty thousand (\$4,950,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of monthly installments, and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of the Constitution relating to making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.
