## County Bond Sales Total 87.3% Of Goal

Nathan Adams, State Chairman and Ed Gossett, State Co-Chairman for the U. S. Savings Bonds Committee for Texas announced today that \$14,236,015 in Series "E" and "H" Savings Bonds were purchased during October in Texas.

"The total amount of these Savings Bonds purchased during the ten month period is \$141,725,997," said Mr. Gossett. "In order to reach the state's goal for the year, \$51,374,003 in Savings Bonds must be purchased during November and December. We feel confident that Texas will make the 1957 goal, for Christmas shopping traditionally begins the day after Thanksgiving and numerous bonds will be purchased for gifts. We are ready for these Christmas Gift Shoppers this year with a new, streamlined, in jet propelled Series "E" Savings Bonds, and a new gift envelope to fit its smaller size.

The envelope bears the label that is now traditional for Savings Bonds: "The Gift that Keeps on Giving." On the reverse side is a space for an inscription: "To From" and the slogan: "A Gift Today for a Bright Tomorrow." These new envelopes may be secured from local banks at the time the Gift Bonds are purchased," he added.

Bond sales in Dickens County amounted to \$80,894.00 for the ten month period. This is 87.3 per cent of the 1957 goal according to R. A. Conner, Chairman of Dickens County. Conner pointed out that Savings Bonds are equally suitable and welcome as gifts for any occasion, from the birth of a child through successive birthdays, graduation and wedding anniversaries, as well as for Christmas and year-end bonuses, incentive and performance awards— "Anything that calls for a 'Present With a Future,'" Conner advised.

## Post Office Hopes To Maintain Good Christmas Record

The local post office hopes to keep its good record on handling Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve, Postmaster Guy Karr said this week.

He added that how well the mail moves will depend a great deal on the cooperation local people give in getting their package and Christmas cards mailed during the next ten days.

"It's important in the small town as well as in the city to mail early during the Christmas season," the Postmaster said.

"Most people appreciate the early arrival of a gift or card, and where there is a heavy concentration of mail early mailing could mean the difference in on-time and late delivery."

"And be sure to use the correct address," Karr added. "Wrap and address packages carefully. Take a little extra time and place the address inside the package just in case it should come unwrapped."

The Postmaster also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage—a three-cent stamp—allows a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages, too. The Post Office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling.

Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

"Incidentally," the Postmaster concluded, "it is socially correct to place your return address on the envelope bearing a Christmas card."

## Latin-American Woman Seriously Hurt In Stabbing

Mrs. Beatrice Candillo, a Latin American woman, was seriously injured shortly before noon Monday when she was stabbed on a downtown street corner by Mrs. Socorro Vasquez.

An assault with intent to murder charge has been filed against Mrs. Vasquez in Justice of the Peace Court, Precinct 3. She is free on \$2,000 bond pending grand jury action.

An argument broke out between the two in a downtown department store. They left, and continued to argue on the street. Mrs. Candillo was slashed severely around the head and neck.

## Area Gins Turn Out 8.837 Bales As Fair Weather Prevails Over County

County Agent Bob Berry estimated yesterday that about 40 per cent of the Dickens County cotton crop has been harvested.

With fair weather prevailing the past week, county and area gins have turned out over 8,000 bales.

Berry said he thought about 90 percent of the County cotton was open.

The county cotton allotment has been dropped by about one and one-half per cent for 1958 according to ASC office manager, W. W. Gunn.

"We would like to remind area farmers that on December 10, growers will vote in a referendum to decide whether marketing quotas will be in effect for their 1958 upland cotton crop," Gunn says.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland in 1957 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

Farmers are reminded that they may vote in any box in the county. Polls will be open from 8 to 7 p. m. Tuesday. Voting places will be set up at the County Agent's office, Dickens; ASC office, Spur; Gin office, McAdoo; Gin office, Afton and Gin office in East Afton.

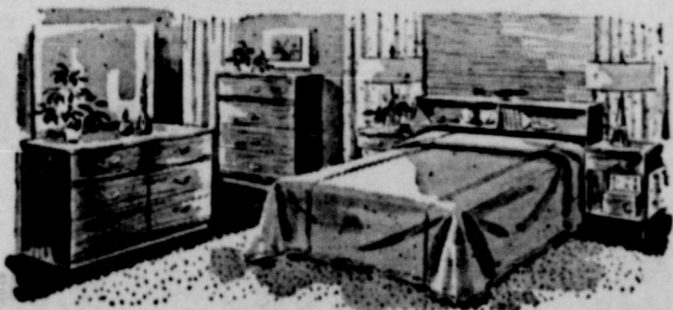

**Texas, National Draft Call Hiked**

The Texas draft call for January will be the biggest since August, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Monday.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that Texas draft boards would forward men for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in January, the first examinations to be made since August.

The state's January call for induction into the Army is 493, as compared to 340 for December, 346 for November, and 338 for October. The quota in August was 347.

Draft boards will forward more than 2,000 men in January for the pre-induction examinations, which are made at Army examining stations in Texas and Louisiana. The past August about 1,500 men were forwarded for examinations.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examination in January will be mailed from state Selective Service headquarters next Friday, according to scheduled plans.

The January quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on January 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

The Texas quota of 493 for January is the state's share of a national call for the Army of 10,000 men. This is the largest national quota since August, when the Army asked for 11,000 men.

Local Board No. 80, Jayton, has not received a call for January according to Mary L. Johnston, clerk. The board did not fill a call in December.

**National Demand For Beef Rises**

Beef producers in Texas and the nation have seen consumer demand for their products steadily increase for the past several years. Roy W. Snyder, extension meats specialist, says beef consumption on a per capita basis in the United States reached a peak of 83.5 lbs. in 1956.

He says the figure is expected to be only slightly smaller in 1957 with the decrease due to reduced beef slaughtering. The 1957 per capita consumption, however, will still be well above average figures. He credits the rise in beef consumption to a number of factors but chief among them is the favorable competitive position beef has been holding in comparison with other red meats. To further emphasize this point, Snyder says consumers ate more beef in 1956 than all other red meats combined, about 51 percent of the 163.5 pounds consumed per capita was beef. This total figure was also a record.

Promotion and advertising are also cited by the specialist as factors in the increase. Special attention has been called to the nutritive and economical values of the lower priced cuts with beef organizations playing a big part in this promotion.

To further focus public attention upon the Texas beef industry, Governor Price Daniel has proclaimed the week of December 1-7 as "Beef Week in Texas". The Texas Beef Council and the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association are climaxing the observance by sponsoring the fourth annual "Beef Supper" in Fort Worth the evening of December 5.

The sponsors, Snyder says, use this occasion to spotlight the Texas beef industry and the part it plays in the total agricultural economy of the state.

**Social Security Officer To Be Here Dec. 12**

Many persons who are filing claims for social security benefits are overlooking the requirement that certain proofs must be submitted before their claims can be certified for payment, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security office.

Hutton said that failure to present the necessary proofs at the time the claim is filed causes the claimant to have to make one or more additional trips to the Social Security office. As a result of these extra trips, people have to wait longer to be interviewed, the processing of claims is slowed up and claimants have to wait longer before they receive their first monthly check.

Hutton explained that in most cases the claimant must submit proof of his date of birth. He said that his best proof is a birth certificate established at the time of birth if one is not available, other proofs, such as a baptismal certificate or a family Bible or an old life insurance policy are generally acceptable. He added that farmers should not overlook bringing along copies of their 1955 and 1956 Federal Income Tax returns and evidence to show the returns were actually filed with the District Director of Internal Revenue. Such evidence may be cancelled check, money order stub, or a cashier's check receipt.

Dear Editor: Recently in a newspaper clipping in a Texas newspaper, we saw a reference to the Gonzales Polio Clinic. Rather frequently we have noted the use of the name: the Gonzales Warm Springs Polio Foundation.

This points up a common misconception among Texans, one which we earnestly hope you will help us correct by publishing this letter. The hospital's name is the Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation; it was formerly the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children.

While our patient load has been predominantly polio, the Foundation for many years has treated other crippling conditions. Today, as the Salk vaccine is proving its effectiveness, the emphasis is shifting to non-polio cases—auto and other accident victims and those handicapped by other crippling diseases.

Of course, there is much yet to be done for polio victims. And while Warm Springs has no official connection with the March of Dimes, we can wholeheartedly substantiate their campaign appeal for funds to continue this vital work.

However, the point we at the Warm Springs Foundation wish to make is simply that the NON-POLIO cases treated—and there are more all the time—do NOT have a source of financial assistance such as the March of Dimes. This means that Warm Springs' own welfare program needs more and more voluntary contributions so that it may continue to provide this service.

No crippled child who can be helped is ever denied admission for financial reasons at the Foundation. Now crippled adults, too, can receive treatment on a welfare basis—another phase of the operation which calls for more funds.

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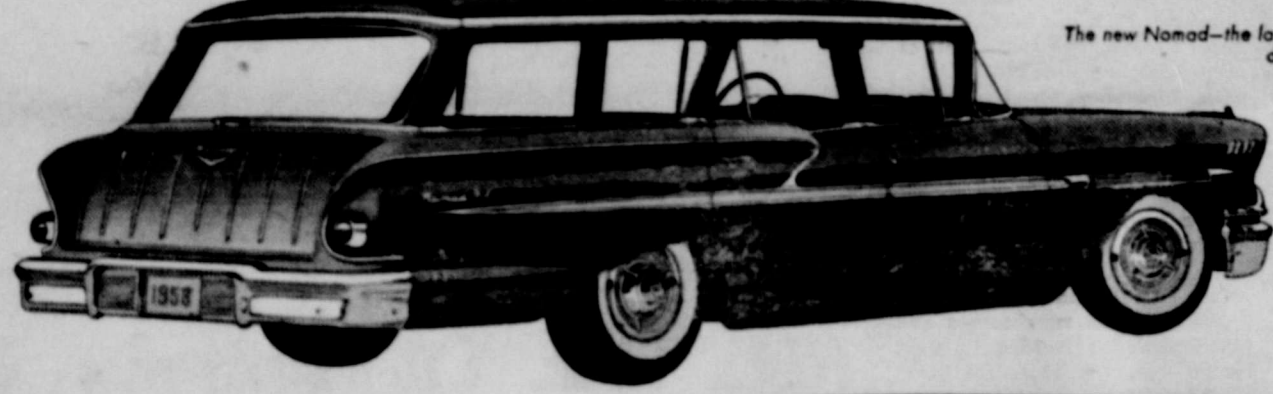
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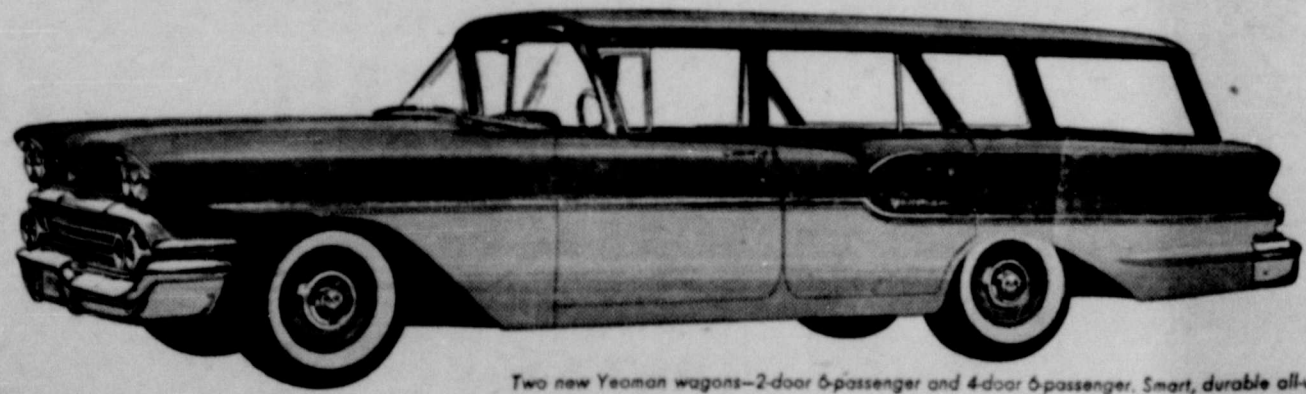

**OUR "BILL OF RIGHTS"**  
With December 15 being observed as "Bill of Rights Day" throughout the land, many persons are (or should be) thinking about what this important "document" means to them. This column will attempt a brief explanation of its meaning.

The American "Bill of Rights", consisting of the first ten amendments to our federal constitution, all adopted at one time in 1791, specifies in some detail a number of basic civil rights of the individual citizen. Unaltered by subsequent amendments and jealously

guarded by our courts, these privileges must still be respected by our governing bodies today.

Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, and specifies that no warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, and unless supported by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment encompasses not one but several guarantees. Every American is secured against being placed twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense; against being compelled to be a witness against himself in a criminal case; and against having his private property taken for public use without just compensation.

He is also secured against being held for trial for a capital (death penalty) or other infamous crime, unless upon a presentment or indictment of a grand jury. And, of course, no person may be deprived of life, liberty or property without orderly court procedures, on due process of law.

The right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury, in the locality where the crime was committed, the right to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, and the rights to compel attendance of defense witnesses and to have the assistance of defense counsel in all criminal prosecutions are secured by another section of the "Bill of Rights."

Excessive bail and fines, and cruel and unusual punishments, are prohibited in Amendment VIII. Other articles insure the right to bear arms and ban quartering of soldiers in private homes during peace time.

Then, to make quite clear to our governing bodies the underlying intent of the preceding provisions, the Ninth Amendment states: "The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

The Tenth Amendment further emphasizes this basic theory by providing: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."  
Thus, that fundamental philosophy expressed in the Declaration of Independence, that men

are endowed with certain unalienable rights, and that "to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed," has been carried forward into the highest law of our land.
