## \$136,000 Slated For Improvement Of Highway 70 Through Spur In '58

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$136,000.00 for improvement of State Highway 70 through Spur during 1958, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer,

has announced. This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program.

The State Highway Commission has approved this appropriation to improve the existing route by widening the Dockum Creek bridge and widening and resurfacing the pavement along Hill Street and southeast to the intersection of State Highway 70 and Loop 21. Additional right of way width will be required along Hill Street.

## Post Office Is Expecting Huge Deluge Of Mail

The mounting volume of Christmas mail makes it more important than ever for everyone to "Mail Early for Christmas," Postmaster Guy Karr said this week.

The Postmaster explained that the Post Office Department is making every effort to move the biggest volume of mail in history on time, but public cooperation will be a big factor. The Department has added extra employees and extra trucks that have been borrowed from other government agencies and is poised for an all-out effort at keeping the mail moving.

If an even flow of the mail can be achieved, the public will benefit, the Postmaster declared, through better service and less cost.

The postal patron can cooperate in these ways, he explained. Mail early in the month and early in the day. Wrap packages securely with sturdy materials. Address plainly and completely, using zone numbers for addresses in larger cities. Always include your return address. Mail Christmas cards now.

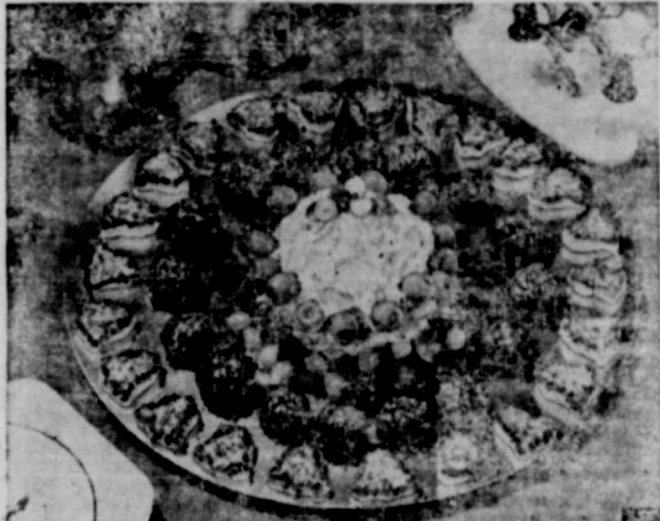

### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

#### Trust Arrangements Explained

When property is placed in trust it is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiaries. It is a method of disposing of your property and may be used in conjunction with a will.

Trusts have many advantages. A trust may be used to provide income for persons unable to support themselves, to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable institution.

In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease income and inheritance taxes.

A trust arrangement works roughly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor. The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be a bank, and individual, or trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to distribute the trust property or income. The trustee will then manage and distribute the trust proceeds or property in whatever manner the grantor desires.

A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the income from the property to a wife for her life, and on her death the trust is to end and the property is to be distributed to the grantor's children.

An interesting type of trust is that which is sometimes called a spendthrift trust. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

This type of trust is generally used in wills where a person desires to leave money to an individual, but feels that the individual is not capable of properly caring for the money and that if left to them in full that the party receiving the money will spend and waste the money and not receive the maximum benefit from it.

Trust property quite often consists of securities. The law regulates the type of property in which trust funds may be invested. However, the grantor may designate the type of investments the trustee may make.

The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper creation. To avoid the pitfalls and dangers of lawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or careless drawn trust instrument can not only defeat the objectives of its creator, but may prove costly as well.

Your lawyer can advise you whether a trust arrangement will be advantageous in your particular situation, and is qualified by education and experience to prepare properly the legal papers necessary to set up a trust. If you have in mind some bank or trust company to act as trustee, that firm's trust officer will be glad to discuss the matter in a conference with you and your attorney.

### Dallas Judge Says Texans Can't Brag About Present Juvenile Facilities

Texans like to brag and we have reason to be proud of our history, our vast ranches and cattle, our natural resources, and, most of all, our people. But one thing we can't brag about—our facilities for handling juvenile delinquents are very insufficient. What we have is good, but it is far from enough.

Many counties have no probation or parole officers. In these counties if a youngster is put on probation there is no official to keep him in line. A boy released from the state institution to a county without a parole officer has no one trained to assist him in finding a place in the community. Effective supervision after release is just as necessary for rehabilitation as training in the school; and without it, money and effort expended are a loss to the state as well as to the child.

In some instances small boys 10 to 13 are sent to Gatesville because the county has no facilities for handling them and doesn't know what else to do with them. They may have committed only minor offenses and have no home. This is no good. There are 40 to 50 boys this age at Gatesville. They sleep in a separate cottage, but otherwise—at meals, in school and at play—they mix with older boys who have longer criminal careers and are good instructors in the ways of crime.

The community which allows a 10-year-old to be committed to Gatesville is failing in its responsibility to youngsters.

Gatesville, in addition to not being able to do the right kind of job for boys between 10 and 13, is heavily overcrowded. The result is that boys usually stay only about 7 months, not long enough to complete training.

The result of a too-short stay and no state parole officers is a high rate of return. Last year, 34 percent of the boys released from Gatesville returned.

The last regular session of the Legislature provided for new buildings at both Gatesville and the girls' school at Gainesville. But it was far too little. The buildings will take the place of those that are already unsafe for occupancy and will permit less crowding. The increased juvenile population of the state is not taken into account, and unless something is done immediately, the present situation will be back at us.

There is, however, something that can be done. And it is up to the people to do it.

Public officials respond to what the voters want. After all, they have to be elected, and if the people feel their responsibility strongly enough and vigorously urge their officials to provide necessary facilities for delinquent youngsters, it will be done.

On the county level it is the

Commissioners Court which must provide for probation officers, foster homes, and county institutions for dependent and delinquent children. If your county is very small a volunteer probation and parole system might be set up, or perhaps two or more counties could cooperate in providing a paid officer.

The Legislature has the responsibility for the state institutions and parole officers for such institutions. If there is a strong enough public opinion favoring adequate facilities for training and rehabilitating delinquent children the Legislature will provide.

Public opinion is something you can be a force in developing—by conversations with friends, by talks to clubs, by letters to editors. And then the Commissioners court and the Legislature should be made aware of your opinions.

Until we have done whatever is necessary to provide proper facilities for juvenile delinquents, let's not blame the youngsters. Put the blame where it belongs—on the communities and the state.

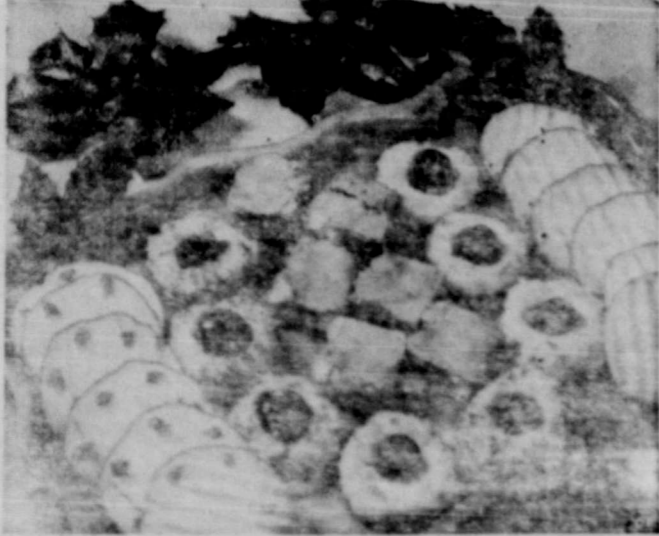

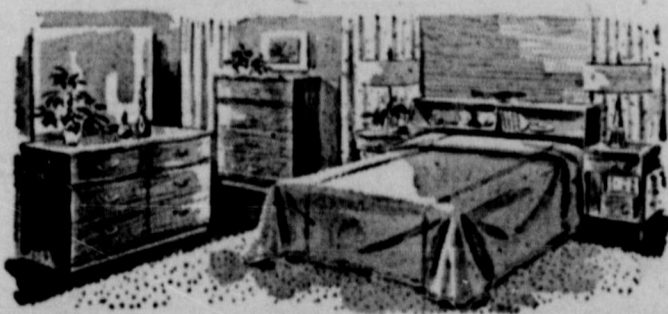

## Act Now To Trim Your Federal Income Tax Bill

This is one of a series of four articles on Federal income taxes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

You still have time—but not much time—to do a little year-end tax planning and assure yourself of the best possible break when you file your tax return next April.

Millions of high, low and middle income taxpayers, realizing that careful planning of their financial affairs between now and the first of the year can pay off handsomely when the tax collector calls next spring, have already begun to establish those extra deductions and special exemptions that will reduce their tax bills.

You can do this too, but you must act no later than December 31.

To alert you to the tax-saving steps you may be able to take before the end of the year, this newspaper is printing a series of articles prepared with the help of the national and state organizations of certified public accountants. These articles—if you keep them and follow their advice—can save you money.

**Evaluate Income Prospects**  
If you are like most individual taxpayers, your goal at this time should be to level out income for this year and next year. Needless or careless bunching of income in either year can be costly. The sharp bite of today's progressive tax rates—which you can assume will be as high as possibly only slightly less in 1958—makes it much better to have an income of \$8,000 in each of two years, rather than \$6,000 in one and \$10,000 in the other.

Taxpayers who are in danger of being whiplashed from one tax bracket to another because of wide fluctuations in their 1957 and 1958 income should act before December 31 to try to average out their taxable earnings. This can be done by careful shifting of income and deductions from one year to the next.

**How to Shift Income**  
For example, if your two-year income estimate shows that your income for this year will be significantly higher than next year's, you should take immediate steps to throw as much income as possible from 1957 to 1958. At the same time you should speed up the payment of all expenses that can be deducted on your 1957 return by concentrating deductions in the higher year and switching income to the lower year will keep your taxes for both years in the lowest possible tax bracket.

**Special Income Situations**  
There are special situations in which it can be advantageous to bunch income in a single tax year. For example, a husband and wife can file a joint return to gain the benefits of income-splitting. Should one of them die, the survivor may file a joint return for the year in which the spouse died and also for two succeeding years under certain conditions. Thus, a widow or widower may profit by throwing more income into this year and less into next if his or her spouse died in 1955, since the privilege of filing a joint return will be lost in all cases in 1958.

If you are planning to be married in 1958, remember that the income-splitting privilege you gain will act like a rate cut for you. At \$7,000 of income, your taxes will be \$240 less than if you were single, assuming that you take the standard deduction and claim only exemptions for you and your wife. For this reason, young couples planning marriage might consider postponing income from 1957 to 1958, while accelerating deductions from 1958 to 1957.

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SPUR, DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS, PROHIBITING PARKING OF VEHICLES IN CERTAIN AREAS IN SAID TOWN AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SPUR, DICKENS COUNTY, TEXAS:

Section 1: The word "vehicle" as used herein shall mean any device which may be used to transport any person or property upon a highway, except those operated upon rails or tracks.

Section 2: No person shall park or leave standing any vehicle, whether attended or unattended, in or upon (1) any part of Hill Street in said Town of Spur or (2) any part of Sixth Street which is situated between Burlington Avenue and Trumbull Street in said Town of Spur.

Section 3: Whoever shall violate any part of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than \$200.00.

Section 4: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 5: It is deemed by said City Council that an emergency exists, and this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and publication according to law.

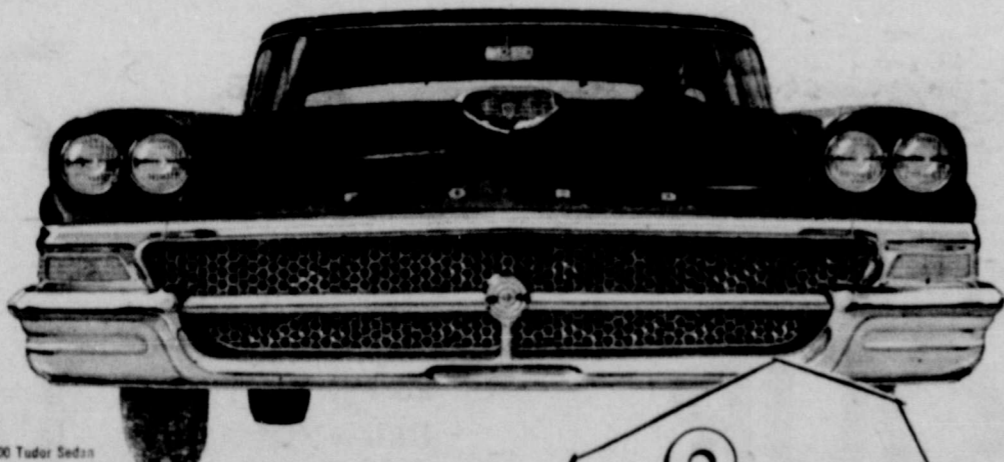

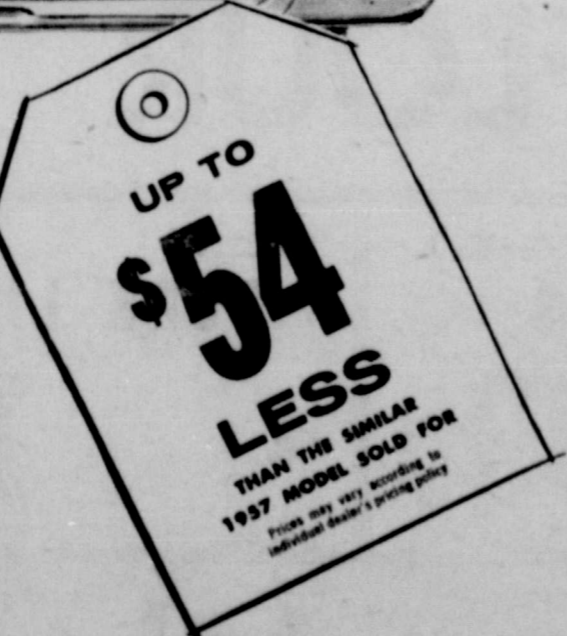

We have on feed at the present time 169 lambs, 28 calves, 9 dairy heifers, 82 pigs, 150 broilers, and 41 rabbits. There is also a total of 145 acres of crops in our program.

From week to week we plan to have a report on each division of our project work. We would also like to report that there are several boys who have breeding projects in swine, sheep, cattle, and rabbits. We will try to have reports on their progress. Next week we will report on our sheep program.

This year the Spur FFA has 74 members who plan to exhibit the above animals at several shows in our area. Some of these shows are as follows: Dallas Fair, Fort Worth Stock Show, Lubbock Show, and our own show in Spur, which will be held on March 7 and 8. Four of our boys exhibited at

Freddie and Ralph also stood high in showmanship. Out of 600 boys showing animals, Freddie placed seventh and Ralph tenth. The boys are to be commended for such a fine job.

Entries are now being processed for the Fort Worth Show. After they are complete we will have a report on who will go and how many animals will be exhibited.
