FFA, 4-H Boys Win \$790 In Livestock Show Premiums

Show Is Termed Success

Although the number of entries fell off from last year, and despite the fact that freezing weather and rain hit, the Dickens County FFA and 4-H Livestock Show was termed a success by judges and show officials.

Approximately \$790 in premiums was given away, at this year's show. Last year approximately \$1133 in premiums was given away as 356 animals were entered in the show. This year the number of animals entered dropped to 312.

Inclement weather held down the Saturday crowd, as 24 inches of rain fell Friday night and the temperature dropped to 36 degrees. Friday's low was 31 degrees.

Johnny Goen, 4-H club, exhibited the champion heavy-weight calf, and the grand champion calf of the show. Ronnie Ragland, Patton Springs FFA, showed the reserve champion.

Melton Webb, Spur, had the champion fine wool lamb. He exhibited the first and second-place lambs in that division. Max Edwards, Patton Springs, had the champion crossbred lamb. Freddie Walker, Spur, the second-place animal.

Marshall McGalliard had the champion of breed in the Southdown and Shropshire division and the best pen-of-three fat lambs. Ronnie Hill won second place in the breed classification and Max Smith, Spur, had the second-best pen-of-three fat lambs.

In the breeding classes, Curtis Watson, Spur, had the champion female, which won first place ahead of Eric Swenson, Spur, in breeding ewe entries.

Edwards had the first-place ewe lamb, the first-place ram and the best-trained lamb. Curtis Watson, Spur, had the second-place ewe lamb and Lenora Harvey, McAdoo, the second-place ram.

David Marion, Spur, and Ragland placed first and second, respectively, in the lightweight calf division. Ragland also showed the best pen-of-three calves, ahead of Barney Benson, Spur. Donnie Arnold won first and second in a rate-of-gain contest.

Guy Goen, Spur, had the champion hen and the best pen-of-three laying hens. Mike Kearney, Spur, had the second-best pen-of-three fryers.

In the breeding rabbits contest, Benton Watson had the champion. Curtis Watson had both the first-place buck and the first-place doe. Joe Copeland had the second-place buck. All are of Spur. Curtis and Benton Watson placed first and second respectively in the pen-of-three fryer rabbits.

In the beef breeding classes, Guy Goen showed both the champion female and the champion male. Larry Roberts, Patton Springs, had the best-trained calf.

Friday, Calvin Dozier, Spur, showed the grand champion female hog; Roy Kendrick, Spur, the grand champion fat barrow; and Joe Copeland, Spur, the grand champion dairy female.

John H. Jones of Texas A&M was judge for the lamb and calf shows. J. J. Scharnberg, Lubbock, judged the poultry and rabbit divisions.

Spur FFA Boys To Show 76 Animals In Lubbock Show

Twenty-nine Spur High School boys will lead their show animals at the FFA project barn Saturday morning for a five-day trip to the 25th Annual South Plains Stock Show in Lubbock.

Calves and lambs will be shown Monday; swine Tuesday. The auction sale will be held Wednesday. This show will climax the show trips of the year beginning with the State Fair at Dallas last fall and including the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show.

The school will furnish a school bus to transport the boys to Lubbock. They will be accompanied by Bill Gregory and Tommy Kissinger, vocational agriculture instructors.

"The Spur boys wish to thank the merchants for their ads that made their 1958 Cooperative Calendar possible. If you didn't get yours and want one, just let one of the ag boys know and they will see that each merchant gets one," Gregory says.

Approximately 100 Cubs, Scouts and parents from Spur attended the Boy Scout Exposition in Lubbock Saturday, March 8, held in the Lubbock Coliseum. One hundred thirty-eight booths were exhibited by scouts from the South Plains area.

Spur Pack 103 presented a booth on birdhouses and the Cubs from Spur actually built birdhouses in the booth during the show. Plans for a bird house was handed out to the

public by the boys. They called attention to their booth with a bird call record that was played during the show.

The booths were judged on several points which included being ready in time for the show opening; attractiveness; boys in uniform; activity within the booth, and public attention to the booth. The Spur Pack received a blue ribbon.

The show was attended by about 25,000 people.

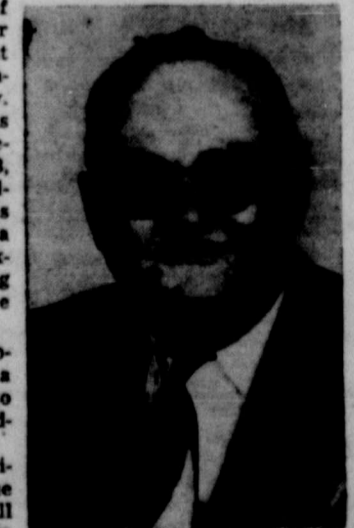
W. R. Weaver Completes 30th Year With West Texas Utilities

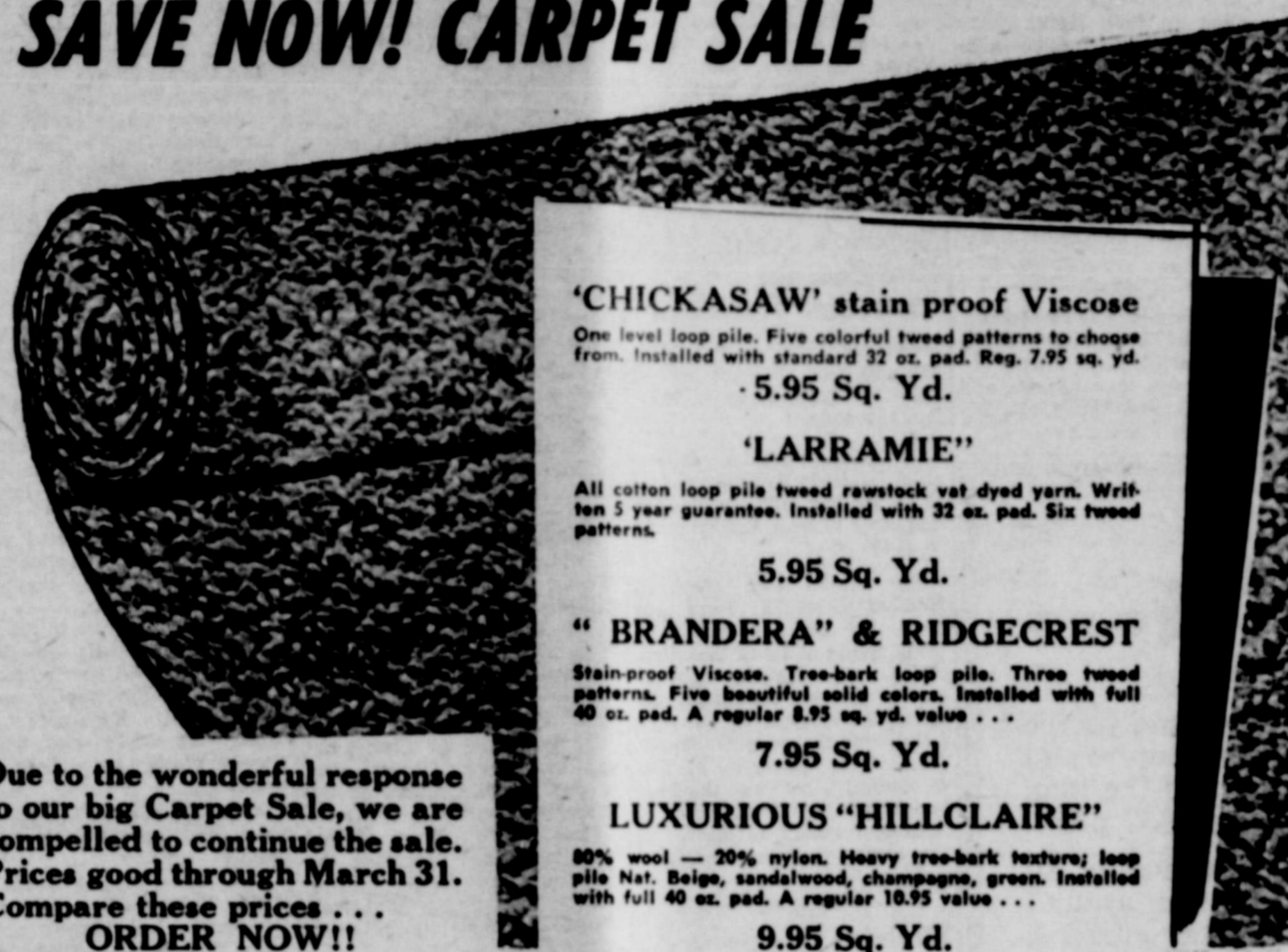

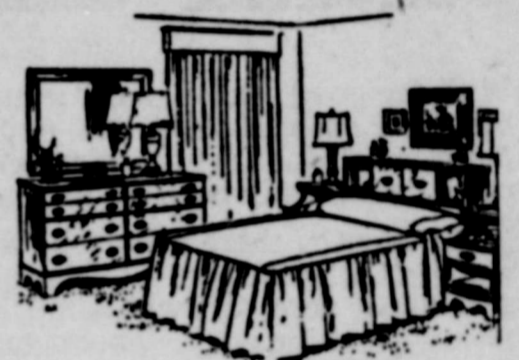
