Election of County School trustees will be held April 5, according to County School Superintendent, Robert Williams.

The election will include precincts two, three and four. Polling place for precincts two and four will be Patton Springs School. Precinct three election will be held in the City Hall, Spur.

W. F. Ragland and E. R. Roberson are both seeking re-election in precincts two and four. Everett Martin is seeking the precinct three post. Raymond Powell is currently the trustee from precinct three.

Double Parking Menace To School Traffic

City Police Chief Wayne Beadle says that double parking at Spur High School and Junior High at noon and when school is dismissed is causing a dangerous traffic hazard both to school children and motorists alike.

"Often a parent will park and hold up traffic although their child may be the last one to leave school," Beadle says.

Drivers are asked to cooperate with City Police officials by keeping traffic moving as much as possible. Beadle estimates that often 100 cars are congested around the local schools.

NEWS BRIEFS...

Traffic Accidents Over County Show Decrease

Twenty-three persons have died in sixteen traffic accidents during January and February in the Texas Highway Patrol District 5-A; according to Captain E. L. Posey, Commanding Officer. In addition, the Highway Patrol has investigated 135 accidents injuring 237 persons plus 263 property damage accidents amounting to \$294,470 damage.

Captain Posey advised that speed was the number one contributing factor in the 414 accidents investigated by his men. He urged all motorists to observe speed limits and help prevent accidents by voluntary complying with all traffic laws.

Four of the accidents investigated occurred in Dickens county with the following breakdown: Property damage, 3; personal injury, 1; and fatal accidents, 0. Captain Posey stated that this is a 2 per cent decrease in total accidents over the same period last year.

During this two month period, Captain Posey advised that the Highway Patrolmen in his district contacted 9,900 traffic law violators. Speed was the number one violation, followed by stop sign violations, defective lights and drunken drivers.

Football Gate Totals \$4,631

Income from Spur High School's athletic program totaled \$4,631.04 for the past year according to a report released by school officials this week.

Of this amount, football took in \$4,631.04 with \$2,192.79 received in gate receipts in games played away, and \$2,501.90 received in gate receipts from home games.

Basketball, both junior and senior high teams, brought in a total of \$661.00. One thousand-thirty seven dollars and forty one cents was paid out of the athletic fund to other teams along with athletic supplies, listed at \$1,837.22, headed the major expenses. Expenses totaled \$5,261.52.

The athletic fund shows a balance of \$2,049.34 for February 1, 1958.

Land Bank Cuts Interest Rates

At the recent stockholders meeting of The Federal Land Bank of Houston held in Houston, Sterling C. Evans, President of the bank, announced a reduction of 1/4 of 1% in the interest rate charged on new loans.

In addition to lowering the interest rate on new loans to 5% the bank voluntarily reduced the interest charges to Land Bank borrowers whose loans carry an interest rate in excess of 5%. This action of reducing the interest rate on loans already made is virtually unprecedented outside the land bank system. It is the second time the Houston bank has been able to reduce the interest on loans in force.

Of special interest to borrowers who already have Land Bank loans was Evans' further announcement that the bank will now close additional loans. This is a new practice and enables a borrower with a 4% Land Bank loan of \$1,000 or more to get an additional loan at 5% on the new money and leave his old 4% loan undisturbed.

The Federal Land Bank makes its loans through national farm loan associations. It has over 200 million dollars of loans in force and obtains funds to make loans through the sale of bonds to the investing public. This reduction in interest rates will mean substantial savings each year to thousands of farm and ranch owners in Texas.

a town as we do. Although fault may be found in everything, the same is true of good, and in the small city of Spur I believe the good considerably outweighs the bad. Many of us have been guilty on various occasions of making complaints against our community. We are prone to forget that this is our town, and we make it what it is. If we would stop to think about how fortunate we are in so many ways. I am sure we would be less apt to criticize. Instead of finding fault, we should emphasize the good points and many advantages.

Instead of taking the extra few minutes required to dispose of it is thrown on the highways or on other public property. Also the clutter or collections of old newspapers or magazines in garages, attics, or basements often cause dangerous fire hazards. At times each has proven hazardous. The unpaved roads, which are dusty in dry weather and exceedingly muddy following rain or snow, make driving both disagreeable and unsafe for the public.

To the youth of Spur a recreation center would be a very welcome improvement. Besides providing them with something to do in their spare time it would give the teenagers a place to have good educational and wholesome recreation, as well as a chance for social life. The churches in Spur have been exceptionally helpful along this line during the past few years by providing their youth with counselors. If this supervision and guidance could be continued throughout the year instead of being confined to the summer months, I believe it would prove immensely helpful in developing even more outstanding leaders of tomorrow.

Our high school and junior high are in dire need of repair and are also quite crowded. The condition of these schools makes it difficult to hire the teachers necessary for providing the proper educational opportunities for the students. Up to the present time we have been fortunate in securing good teachers in all the schools, but how long can this continue under the prevailing conditions.

In making ours a more prosperous and successful community much of our progress depends on the understanding we have of our town and its needs. Good citizenship should also be considered. We should take part in as many of the civic affairs and worthwhile organizations as we possibly have time for. Examples of this are the Nibs and the Ladies Auxiliary. These two organizations have greatly aided the hospital. The Ladies Federated Clubs have been very generous in sponsoring the City Library during the past few years. There are, of course, others which have been outstanding in their leadership and contributions to the welfare of Spur and its inhabitants.

Improvements such as these mentioned could be set as goals for the future, but we should not forget the many things we have to be thankful for. We live in a wonderful community and are privileged in having many kind, thoughtful friends with which to work. I am very proud, as I am sure you are, to be a citizen of such a marvelous Christian town.

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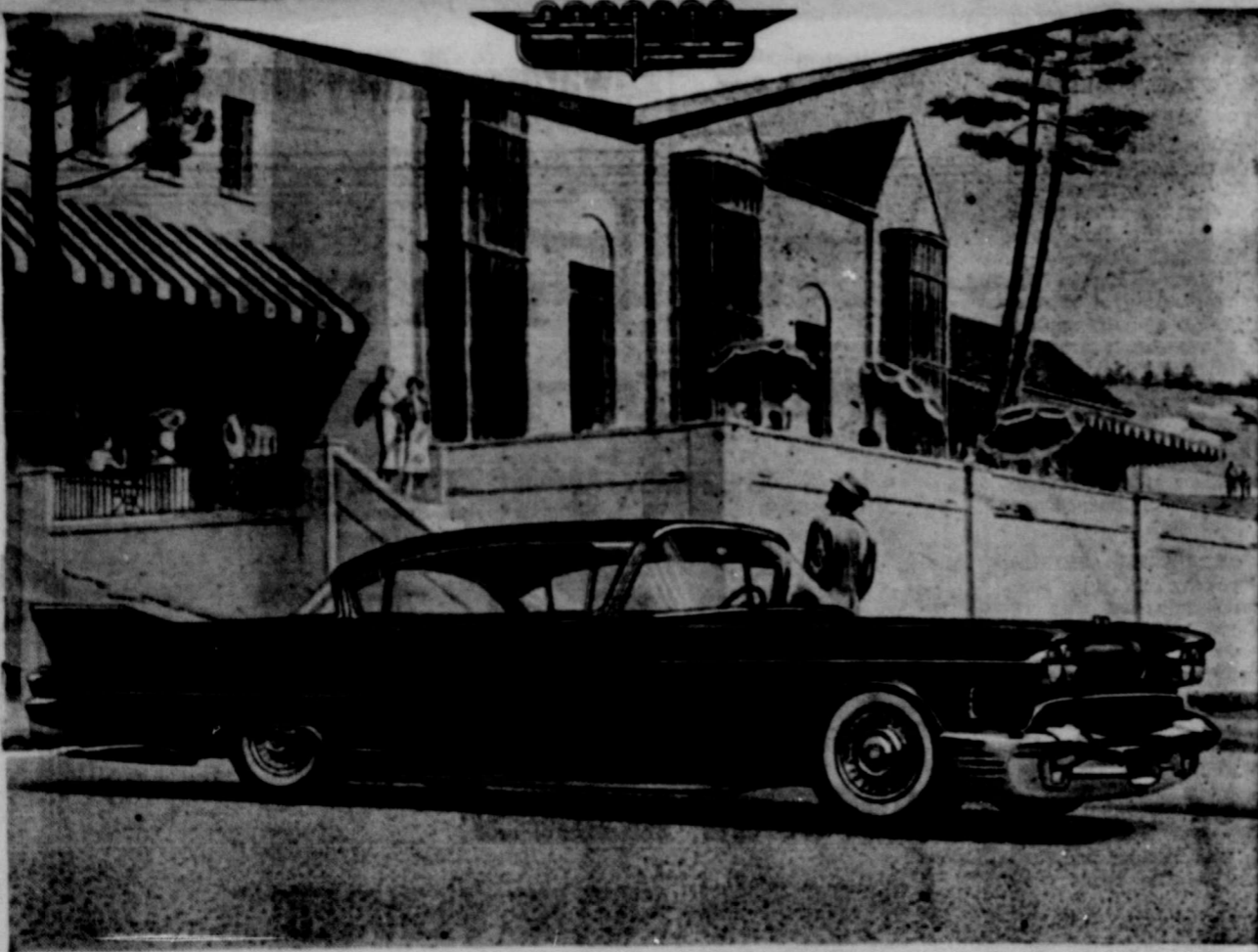

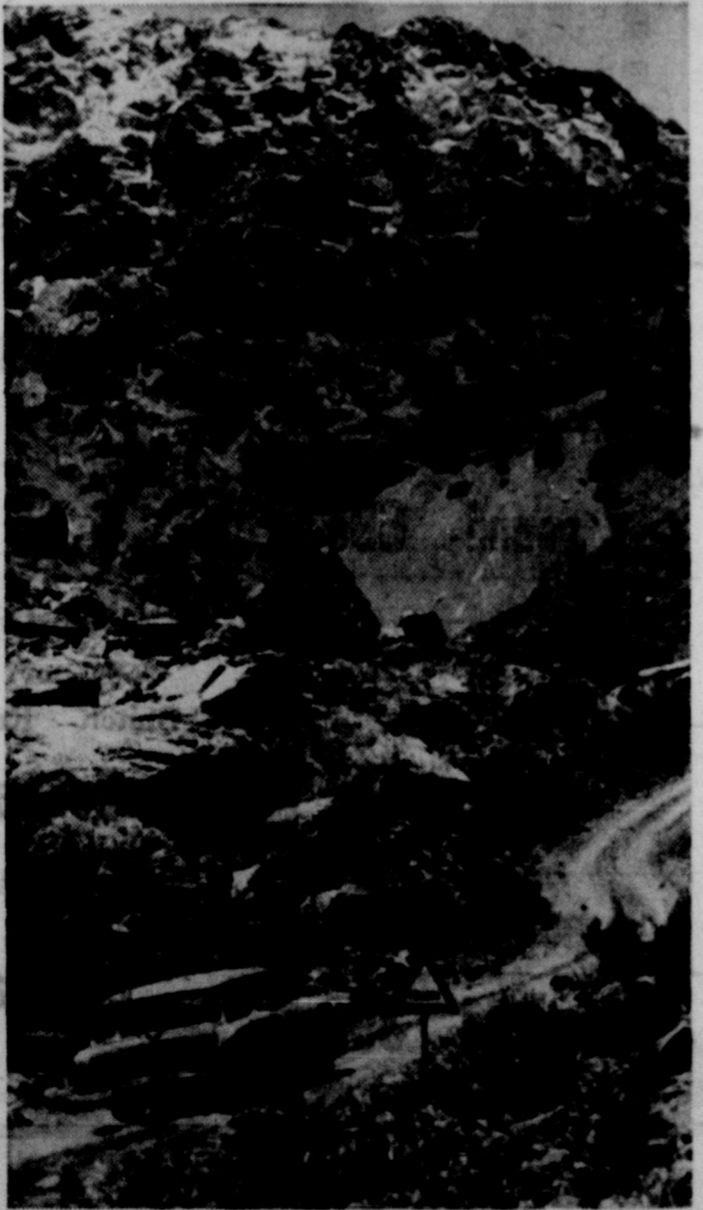
